Re: Future Funding for Federal Local Law Enforcement
Block Grant Program in Jeopardy

On April 24, the full House Judiciary marked up a substitute to H.R. 3 entitled the "Juvenile Crime Control Act of 1997." Consideration by the full House of Representatives is expected during the first week of May. This bill is designed to provide infrastructure for the juvenile justice system at the federal, state and local levels. It does so in three ways. First, it provides new procedures for trying juveniles in federal courts either as juveniles or adults. Second, it enhances the penalties or creates new penalties in federal courts for juveniles or persons who utilize juveniles in the commission of crimes. Finally, it authorizes a new \$500 million block grant program for states that may be used to enhance their juvenile justice facilities and by prosecutors to enlarge staff and activities relating to juveniles. To qualify for these funds, states or local jurisdictions would have to have in effect laws that 1) ensure that juveniles who commit an act, after attaining age 15, which would be considered a serious violent crime if committed by an adult, are treated as adults for purposes of prosecution; 2) impose a system of graduated sanctions on all juvenile offenders; 3) establish a record keeping system relating to juveniles who have been adjudicated delinquent for conduct that, if committed by an adult, would constitute a felony. This system would have to be similar to the one just for adults in the state. Many of the provisions in this block grant are very similar to those contained in our Youth Violence Summit Report.

The bill itself has merit, the problem is that because of the competition among programs for limited federal funding, funds previously appropriated for the Local Law Enforcement Block Grant may be reallocated to the new Juvenile Justice Block Grant Program authorized by H.R. 3.

A little review of past activity may be helpful here. In 1994 Title I of the Crime Bill created the COPs Program, designed to put 100,000 additional officers on the street to participate in community policing. Basically, \$2 billion per year was authorized for 5 years to provide funds to jurisdictions to hire new officers, or to purchase equipment that would allow existing officers to be reassigned to the streets. (COPs MORE). IACP supported this program with some reservations. When the 104th Congress convened there was an attempt to completely replace the COPS program with a Local Law Enforcement Block Grant. Such a program was authorized by the House, but never by the Senate. When the Appropriation Bills for FY '96

were being considered the appropriators in the House and Senate reached a compromise that provided \$1.5 billion for the COPs Program and around \$.5 billion for the Local Law Enforcement Block Grant as passed by the House, but never authorized by the Senate. Funds for that year have already been distributed. When the appropriators met for FY '97, a similar compromise was reached. Applications forms for these funds are about to be distributed. When President Clinton submitted his budget request for FY 1998 in February of this year, it contained a request for about \$1.4 billion for the COPS Program, nothing for the Local Law Enforcement Block Grant Program, and about \$100 million for a program involving prosecution of gang crime.

The IACP has taken a position in its Legislative Priorities for both the 104th and the 105th Congress that we do not want to see a decrease in funds made available from the 1994 Crime Bill. Several members expressed concerns with the initial COPs program, saying that the match requirements were difficult to meet and that the program lacked flexibility, because what they really needed was equipment not additional manpower. When the Local Law Enforcement Block Grant Program was being considered, these people were encouraged by its lower match requirements (10% instead of 25%) and the ability to use it for a wide variety of purposes including prevention programs and equipment. The Block Grant Program was eventually funded at only 25% of what it had been designed to provide. Contained in the original language of the Block Grant bill was a provision that if a jurisdiction was to receive less than \$10,000 under the program, those funds would be redirected to the state within which they were located. Because of the reduced funds available, far fewer jurisdictions than originally contemplated met this \$10,000 threshold. As a result, larger jurisdictions benefited from this program, while smaller ones did not. These smaller jurisdictions had been able to benefit directly from the COPs Program, if they were able to meet the match requirements. In short, each of these programs had its supporters and opponents within the IACP membership.

Regardless of the program individual IACP members prefer, they should contact their Representatives and indicate that the reduction in funding for police, to fund the Block Grant for Juvenile Justice in H.R. 3, is unacceptable.

As I have indicated, there is nothing basically wrong with H.R. 3, other than the proposed funding source. At the very least, if Congress is determined to eliminate the Local Law Enforcement Block Grant Program, despite our protest, the appropriators should greatly liberalize the COPs program, especially the COPs MORE Program.

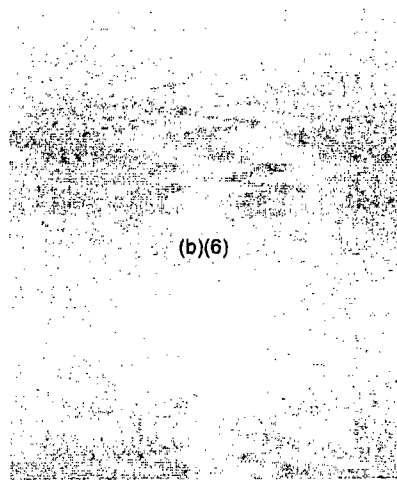
