

Through the Omnibus Fiscal Year 1996 Appropriations Act, Public Law 104-134, the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), U.S. Department of Justice has been authorized to administer the Local Law Enforcement Block Grants Program (LLEBG). Although the legislation was not enacted until late April, the Bureau has moved aggressively to implement this program, with the ultimate goal of awarding all funds by September 30, 1996. The following provides summary information on program implementation.

- Overall Program Development

Working closely with the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) and using the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI) Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) data, BJA has applied the statutory formula to the \$424 million available for FY 1996 and has identified approximately 3300 units of local government as eligible for direct funding. Consistent with the statutory language, the formula is driven strictly by UCR Part I Violent Crime reporting. BJA is making this award information widely available in a variety of forms: directly to the State Administrative Agencies that have responsibilities for BJA's Byrne Formula funding; mailings to constituent groups; electronic transmissions on the Internet; and individually on each respective local application kit. A list of the eligible applicants, and their respective award amounts is attached.

BJA determined the initial state allocations by comparing each State's total Part I UCR Violent Crimes to the national total. Then, because each State must receive a minimum share of .25 percent of the total amount of funding available, or \$1,060,000, we applied a proportionate reduction to States originally exceeding that amount to provide the minimum for those states whose initial allocation fell below.

To determine the awards for the local units of government, BJA compared each eligible jurisdiction's Part I UCR Violent Crime total to its respective State's total. As required by the legislation, all jurisdictions receiving \$10,000 or more will be funded directly by BJA. The remaining funds will be administered through the States. We contacted each Governor's office informing them that unless they provided an alternative designation, we would assume that the State Administrative Agency currently responsible for the Edward Byrne Memorial State and Local Law Enforcement Assistance Formula Grant Program would also administer the Local Law Enforcement Block Grants Program. To date, we have not received an alternative designation from any State.

A Fact Sheet (copy attached) containing general summary information on the program, the basic requirements as delineated in the statute, the eligible applicants with a description of the formula, and application submission dates, has been distributed widely. In addition, interested parties can access this information on the Internet.

Application kits including instructions describing how to apply through several media, i.e., paper, fax, disk or modem, have been prepared for both the direct local applicants and for the States. We will mail the kits out to the eligible applicants not later than June 15, 1996, with a submission deadline to BJA of August 9, 1996. The applicant jurisdictions must submit their applications to the Governor for review and comment at least 20 days prior to submission to

BJA. We plan to make all awards by September 30, 1996. Grant payments will be made once jurisdictions receiving awards provide certification that all statutory requirements, e.g., establishment of a local advisory board, have been met.

Disparate Fund Allocation Issue

The legislation prescribes circumstances under which a State Attorney General may make a certification regarding disparate allocations. If such certification is made, the affected jurisdictions must then submit a joint funding plan to BJA before grant payments can be made. All State Attorney General certifications must be received by BJA by September 20, 1996.

- Application Processing / Grants Managements System

Processing the anticipated number of applications by September 30, 1996, requires the development of a stand-alone automated system and the addition of staff. The system is beyond the design stage and is currently being built. This system will accept the one-page application forms developed for each set of applicants, local and state, in hard-copy format, via fax, on disk or via modem. Technical support will be available to eligible applicants as they prepare their applications, through a toll free number. Program reporting will be handled similarly.

Additionally, Department of Justice Response Center staff have been trained in order to answer general inquiries on the Local Law Enforcement Block Grants Program. The Response Center is currently responding to over 300 calls per day on the LLEBGP.

- Outreach Activities

An extensive outreach plan has been developed and implemented for this program as a means both of providing information to affected groups and jurisdictions, and receiving suggestions on how BJA might assist applicants in understanding the program's parameters. Groups whose members are the primary applicant and likely implementing organizations whose members will be most directly involved in this program have met individually with the BJA Director and senior program staff. Among the groups briefed to date are the National League of Cities; the National Association of Counties; the National Governors Association, the International Association of Chiefs of Police; the National Sheriffs Association; the National Association of Towns and Townships; the National District Attorneys Association; the National Association of Attorneys General; and the U.S. Conference of Mayors.

Local Law Enforcement Block Grants Program

The Omnibus Fiscal Year 1996 Appropriations Act, Public Law 104-134, provides \$503 million for the implementation of the *Local Law Enforcement Block Grants Program*, to be administered by the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), U.S. Department of Justice. The purpose of the Local Law Enforcement Block Grants Program is to provide units of local government with funds to underwrite projects to reduce crime and improve public safety. These projects must be funded in accordance with the seven purpose areas described below.

Program Purpose Areas

Local Law Enforcement Block Grants Program funds may be used for one or more of the following seven purpose areas:

- ☐ Hiring, training, and employing on a continuing basis new, additional law enforcement officers and necessary support personnel (if funds are used for hiring law enforcement officers, there must be a net gain over the unit of local government's current appropriated budget, in the number of law enforcement officers who perform nonadministrative public safety service); paying overtime to presently employed law enforcement officers and necessary support personnel for the purpose of increasing the number of hours worked by such personnel; and/or procuring equipment, technology, and other material directly related to basic law enforcement functions.
- ☐ Enhancing security measures in and around schools, and in and around any other facility or location that the unit of local government considers a special risk for incidents of crime.
- ☐ Establishing or supporting drug courts. To be eligible for funding, a drug court program must include the following:
 - Continuing judicial supervision over offenders with substance abuse problems, but who are not violent offenders.
 - Integrating the administration of other sanctions and services, which shall include: (i) mandatory periodic testing of each participant for the use of controlled substances or other addictive substances during any period of supervised release or probation; (ii) substance abuse treatment for each participant; (iii) probation or other supervised release involving possible prosecution, confinement, or incarceration because of noncompliance with program requirements or failure to show satisfactory progress; and (iv) programmatic, offender management and aftercare services such as relapse prevention, vocational job training, and job and housing placement.
- ☐ Enhancing the adjudication of cases involving violent offenders, including cases involving violent juvenile offenders. For the purposes of this program, violent offender means a person charged with committing a Part 1 violent crime under the Uniform Crime Reports.

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Program Requirements

Overview

The Omnibus FY 1996 Appropriations Act, (Public Law 104-134), authorizes the Director of the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) to make funds available to units of local government under the Local Law Enforcement Assistance Program, herein also referred to as Block Grants Program or Block Grants, for the purposes of reducing crime and improving public safety. BJA will make direct awards to units of local government individually that are eligible to receive \$10,000 or more. BJA will also make awards to States based on the allocation formula specified in the legislation.

This application kit provides program and application guidelines for State-administered FY 1996 Local Law Enforcement Block Grants.

Program Purpose Areas

Local Law Enforcement Block Grants Program funds may be used for one or more of the following seven purpose areas:

- Law enforcement support for:
 - ☐ Hiring, training, and employing on a continuing basis new, additional law enforcement officers and necessary support personnel (if funds are used for hiring law enforcement officers, there must be a net gain over the unit of local government's current appropriated budget, in the number of law enforcement officers who perform nonadministrative public safety service).
 - ☐ Paying overtime to presently employed law enforcement officers and necessary support personnel for the purpose of increasing the number of hours worked by such personnel.
 - ☐ Procuring equipment, technology, and other material directly related to basic law enforcement functions.
- Enhancing security measures in and around schools, and in and around any other facility or location that the unit of local government considers a special risk for incidents of crime.
- Establishing or supporting drug courts. To be eligible for funding, a drug court program must include the following:

- ☐ Continuing judicial supervision over offenders with substance abuse problems, but who are not violent offenders.

- ☐ Integrating administration of other sanctions and services, which shall include:

(I) mandatory periodic testing of each participant for the use of controlled substances or other addictive substances during any period of supervised release or probation; (ii) substance abuse treatment for each participant; (iii) probation or other supervised release involving the possible prosecution, confinement, or incarceration because of noncompliance with program requirements or failure to show satisfactory progress; and (iv) programmatic, offender management and aftercare services such as relapse prevention, vocational job training, and job and housing placement.

- Enhancing the adjudication of cases involving violent offenders, including cases involving violent juvenile offenders. For the purposes of this program, violent offender means a person charged with committing a Part I violent crime under the Uniform Crime Reports.
- Establishing a multijurisdictional task force, particularly in rural areas, composed of law enforcement officials representing units of local government; this task force will work with Federal law enforcement officials to prevent and control crime.
- Establishing crime prevention programs involving cooperation between community residents and law enforcement personnel to control, detect, or investigate crime or the prosecution of criminals.
- Defraying the cost of indemnification insurance for law enforcement officers.

Funds or a portion of funds allocated under this title may be used to contract with private, nonprofit entities or community-based organizations to carry out the purposes of this Block Grants Program.

Prohibition on Use of Funds

Units of local government may not expend funds provided under the Local Law Enforcement Block Grants Program to purchase, lease, rent or acquire any of the following:

- Tanks or armored vehicles.
- Fixed-wing aircraft.
- Limousines.
- Real estate.
- Yachts.
- Consultants.
- Vehicles not primarily used for law enforcement.

In addition, Federal funds cannot be used to supplant State or local funds, but instead to increase the amount of funds that would be available otherwise from State and local sources.

Eligibility For Program Funds and Distribution of Awards

The Director of BJA will set aside funds for units of local government within a State. The amounts will be proportionate to the State's average annual amount of Part I violent crimes, compared to that for all other States for the three most recent calendar years of data from the Federal Bureau of Investigation. However, each State will receive a minimum award of 0.25 percent of the total amount available for formula distribution under the Local Law Enforcement Block Grants Program.

Awards to units of local government will be proportionate to each local jurisdiction's average annual amount of Part I violent crimes compared to all other local jurisdictions in the State for the three most recent calendar years.

- BJA will make awards directly to units of local government when award amounts are at least \$10,000. Each unit of local government eligible to apply for an award of \$10,000 or more will be notified by BJA.
- Each State will receive the remainder of the State's allocation for local applicants whose award amounts are less than \$10,000. BJA will make one aggregate award directly to the State. The State will distribute such funds among State police departments that provide law enforcement services to units of local government and units of local government whose allotment is less than such amount in a manner which reduces crime and improves public safety.

Awards must be based on one or more of the allowable seven purpose areas. For the purposes of this program, a *unit of local government* is a town or township, village, city, or county or recognized governing body of an Indian tribe or Alaskan Native village that carries out substantial governmental duties and powers. Further, for the purposes of this Block Grants Program the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico shall be considered a unit of local government as well as a State.

Trust Fund

Each State and unit of local government must establish a trust fund to deposit all Federal payments received under the Block Grants Program.

Administration

The State Administrative Agency (SAA) may use up to 3 percent of the total State award to pay for costs incurred in administering the Block Grants Program. The SAA should employ personnel (or acquire equivalent contractual or State-supplied resources) to perform the functions of overall management and policymaking, data collection and analysis, and administrative and fiscal oversight. Prior to using any Block Grants Program funds for administration, the SAA must receive approval from BJA for the amount requested.

Matching Funds Requirement

The Federal funds provided under a grant for the Block Grants Program may not exceed 90 percent of the total costs of a program. The applicant's matching share must be in the form of cash. The match may be provided on an individual or aggregate basis. An aggregate match is commonly referred to as a "statewide match" and allows the match to be made entirely at the State level, on a project-by-project basis, or some combination of the two.

The amount of the required match can be computed by calculating one-ninth of the Federal portion of program costs. For example, if \$90,000 of Federal funds is requested, this amount multiplied by 1/9th requires a State or local entity to match it with \$10,000. The Federal amount (\$90,000) plus the match (\$10,000) should be combined to equal the total program cost.

Federal

Amount

Match

\$90,000 x 1/9 = \$10,000

Total Program Cost \$90,000 + \$10,000 = \$100,000

The matching requirement is only applicable to the amount of the Federal award, not any interest or income derived therefrom. Any interest gained from the trust fund cannot be used to match the Federal award but must be used to add to the Federal award amount.

The SAA is responsible for ensuring that the subrecipient has available matching funds prior to submitting an application. As part of its award application, the subrecipient must certify that the funds required to pay the non-Federal portion of the cost of each program proposal will be made available for expenditure during the award period. This certification is made by including the total match amount on the application form and signing the certified assurances document. Regardless of the source of match, it must be expended during the period of the award.

The SAA and all subrecipients must maintain records that clearly show the source, the amount, and the timing of all matching contributions. **There is no waiver provision for the match.**

Any funds expended by SAA for administrative purposes are also subject to the 90/10 match requirement.

Allowable sources of the match include funds from the following:

- States and units of local government.
- Housing and Community Development Act of 1974.
- Appalachian Regional Development Act.
- Equitable Sharing Program (Federal assets forfeiture distributions to State and local officials).
- Private funds.

Award Period

Block Grants funds and any interest deriving therefrom must obligate and expend within 24 months of the date of the initial payment. The date of the initial payment is the date upon which BJA makes the award to the State and the resulting award period end date cannot be extended under any circumstance. Any Block Grants Program funds and interest that remain unobligated or unexpended at the end of 24 months from the date of the initial payment shall be returned to BJA within 27 months of the initial payment.

General Requirements

Single Point of Contact Review

Executive Order 12372 requires applicants from State and local units of government, or other organizations providing services within a State, to submit a copy of the application to the State Single Point of Contact (SPOC), if one exists, and if this Block Grants Program has been selected for review by the State. The State SPOCs are listed in the Appendix of this application kit. Applicants must contact their State SPOC to determine whether the Block Grants Program has been selected for State review. The date that the application was sent to the State SPOC or the reason such submission is not required should be entered on the application form.

If the State SPOC requires a copy of the application, the applicant must still send the original application to BJA.

Civil Rights

All recipients of Federal grants funds are required to comply with nondiscrimination requirements contained in various Federal laws. Specifically, the statute that governs programs or activities funded by the Office of Justice Programs (OJP) (Section 809(c), Omnibus Crime Control & Safe Streets Act of 1968, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 3789d, prohibits such discrimination, as follows:

No person in any State shall on the grounds of race, color, religion, national origin, sex [or disability]* be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under, or denied employment in connection with any program or activity funded in whole or in part with funds made available under this title.

** Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 prohibits identical discrimination on the basis of disability.*

If funded, grantees must acknowledge that failure to submit an acceptable Equal Employment Opportunity Plan approved by the Office for Civil Rights (if grantee is required to submit one pursuant to 28 CFR 42.302), is a violation of its certified assurances and may result in the suspension of funding obligation authority.

If any court or administrative agency makes a finding of discrimination on the grounds of race, color, religion, national origin, gender, disability, or age against a recipient of funds, the recipient must agree to forward a copy of the findings to the OJP Office for Civil Rights.

Eligibility for Employment in the United States

Organizations funded under this Block Grants Program must agree to complete and keep on file, as appropriate, the Immigration and Naturalization Service Employment Eligibility Form (I-9). This form is to be used by the recipient of Federal funds to verify that persons employed by the recipient, are eligible to work in the United States.

Employment Preference for Former Members of the Armed Forces

Units of local government shall give suitable preference in the employment of persons as additional law enforcement officers or support personnel to members of the Armed Forces who were separated or retired involuntarily due to the reductions in the Department of Defense.

Financial Requirements

Grant Funds Must Supplement and Not Supplant

An assurance that Block Grants funds will not be used to supplant local funding must be included in the application submitted to BJA. This certification attests that Federal funds will be used to supplement existing funds for program activities, not replace funds already appropriated for the same purpose. Potential supplanting will be the subject of postaward monitoring and audit. If there is a potential presence of supplanting, the applicant or grantee will be required to supply documentation demonstrating that the reduction in non-Federal resources occurred for reasons other than the receipt or expected receipt of federal funds. Signing the *Assurances* commits the applicant to compliance with the coordination and nonsupplanting requirements in the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, as amended. Violations can result in a range of penalties, including suspension of future funds under this Block Grants Program, suspension or debarment from Federal grants, and recoupment of monies provided under this grant in addition to possible civil and/or criminal penalties.

Audits

State and local governments are subject to the Single Audit Act of 1984 and OMB Circular A-128, "Audits of State and Local Governments."

Applicants are required to provide the period of their fiscal year and the name of their cognizant Federal agency on the application. The cognizant Federal agency is generally the agency that provides the preponderance of Federal dollars received by the grantee.

Certifications Regarding Lobbying; Debarment, Suspension, and Other Responsibility Matters; and Drug-free Workplace

After carefully reading the instructions provided with the form, applicants should review and sign the certification form included in this application kit. Signing this form commits the applicant to compliance with the certification requirements under 28 CFR Part 69, "New Restrictions on Lobbying," and 28 CFR Part 67, "Government-Wide Debarment and Suspension (Nonprocurement) and Government-Wide Requirements for Drug-Free Workplace (Grants)." The certification will be treated as a material representation of the fact upon which reliance will be placed by the U.S. Department of Justice in awarding grants.

Suspension or Termination of Funding

BJA may suspend, in whole or in part, terminate funding for or impose another sanction on a grantee for any of the following reasons:

- Failure to comply substantially with the requirements or statutory objectives of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, as amended, Block Grants Program guidelines issued thereunder, or other provisions of Federal law.
- Failure to adhere to the requirements, standard conditions, or special conditions.
- Proposing or implementing substantial program changes to the extent that, if originally submitted, the application would not have been approved for funding.
- Failure to submit reports.
- Filing a false certification in this application or other report or document.
- Other good cause shown.

Before imposing sanctions, BJA will provide reasonable notice to the grantee of its intent to impose sanctions and will attempt informally to resolve the problem. Hearing and appeal procedures will follow 28 CFR Part 18 of Department of Justice regulations.

Reporting Requirements

Progress Reports

Recipients of funding are required to submit an initial quarterly progress report for the first full calendar quarter, followed by semi-annual progress reports for the remainder of the grant period. The progress reports describe activities during the reporting period and the status or accomplishment of objectives as set forth in the approved grant application. Progress reports are due on the 30th day following the end of the reporting period. Examples follow:

- If the grant award date is October 1, the first report which would cover the period from October through December, would be due January 30. The next report would cover the period from January through June and would be due July 30.
- If the grant award date is November 1, the first report which would cover the period of November through March (January through March being the first full quarter the grant is operational), and would be due April 30. The next report would cover the period from April through September and would be due October 30. Subsequent reports are due every 6 months.

A final report, which provides a summary of activities and significant results from this Block Grants Program, is due 90 days after the end date of the grant. BJA will provide report forms to the grantee.

Financial Status Reports

Required financial status reports (SF 269A) are due quarterly on the 45th day following the end of each calendar quarter. A report must be submitted for every quarter the award is active. The Office of the Comptroller will provide a copy of this form in the initial award package.

Submission Requirements

The process for submission of applications under the Block Grants Program is described in detail in the instructions form included as part of this application kit.

Application Deadline

The deadline for submission of application under this Block Grants Program is **August 9, 1996**.

(b) Enter the full names of the individual(s) performing services, and include full address if different from 10 (a). Enter Last Name, First Name, and Middle Initial (MI).
11. The certifying official shall sign and date the form, print his/her name, title, and telephone number.

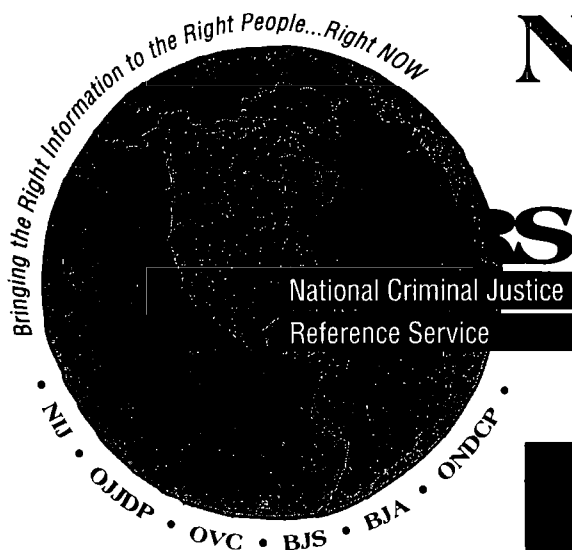

Local Law Enforcement Block Grants Program



The Local Law Enforcement Block Grants Program's (LLEBG) application process has been designed with you in mind. The LLEBG Application Tracking and Award System will function in a fully automated capacity. The Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) is implementing this system to better serve you. It is BJA's goal to operate this Program in a "paperless" environment. In order to accomplish this goal, we need your help.

Attached is a detailed set of instructions for the LLEBG application submission. **It is extremely important that you read this document carefully prior to beginning the application process.** Your careful attention to detail will facilitate the processing of your grant award. In reviewing the application form, you will notice that it is only one page. Only the information needed to process your application, make the award, and initialize your payment has been requested. **It is critical that all fields are completed.** Failure to complete the required fields will delay the processing of your application. Any outstanding issues will have to be resolved prior to our issuing an award. To this end, BJA has provided direction, suggestions, and pick-lists in the instructions as well as on the electronic formats. We are also available to answer any questions, including technical questions, related to the use of the electronic formats by calling the U.S. Department of Justice Response Center at 1-800-421-6770.

Applications may be submitted in several ways. BJA has established an 800 number dial-in via computer modem which will allow you to submit your application directly into our application tracking system. We have also included a formatted disk version of the application form which can be filled out and sent back to us in the return disk mailer (included in your package). **Both of the electronic formats have been designed to print a copy of your application for you to forward to the designated State agency for their review.** As always, you may fill out the application (using a typewriter) and either send it back to BJA in the return envelope (also included in your package) or, fax it to BJA using our dedicated 800 number for faxes.

It will be useful to gather all information needed to fill out the application before you begin completing it. If you choose to use the dial-in method, it will be "real time" connection to the server at BJA. Having the required information up-front will expedite your submission. Two of the required fields you may not be familiar with are the jurisdiction's "Fiscal Year" and the "Cognizant Federal Agency." The definitions of these fields are in the instructions on page 4 and 5. You may find it helpful to check with your jurisdiction's Fiscal Officer or your State Auditor's Office to determine this information. In identifying which purpose areas you will be funding, we ask you to indicate the amount that will be set-aside for each. Again, you may find it helpful to calculate these allocations prior to completing the application. In each of the electronic versions, these fields are required, and the system will not let you move on until they are completed.

We look forward to working with you on this Program. Should you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact us.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Please use the application form provided in your Local Law Enforcement Block Grants (LLEBG) Program application kit. The Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) has designed the LLEBG application to be compatible with an automated tracking and award system. The application form has been designed to maximize the ability to scan the document into the tracking system. Your careful attention to detail in filing the application will minimize any delay in processing your application. Applications for funding under the LLEBG Program may be submitted to BJA in one of three formats:

1. Hard-copy. The applicant may submit an application in paper format by mail or by fax using **ONLY** the forms provided by BJA. When mailing, use the provided envelope. The fax number is 1-888-627-9484. **DO NOT** fold, bend, date stamp, or provide extraneous comments on the application form. **DO** provide signature and date. You may use correction fluid as needed, and you may make a photocopy of the original for your records. You must submit a clean original form only. If you are submitting an application in one of these two formats, you must also sign, date and return the Assurances and Certifications forms included in your application package.
2. Computer-diskette. BJA will provide a formatted diskette (3½" high density or 5¼" high density) for the applicant to complete and submit. Use either the 5¼" high density diskette or the 3½" high density diskette. **DO NOT** use both diskettes. The data on the completed disk application should be submitted by mail. A return disk mailer has been provided in the application kit.
3. Dial-in. The applicant may submit an electronic application by modem. Dial-in communications software and instructions are included in the application kit. You may keep the communications software.

EQUIPMENT NEEDED

You must have at least a 286 computer that can read either a 3½" or 5¼" high density diskette. If your machine cannot run the software, you must use a typewriter. The application must be typed using **UPPERCASE** letters in one of the following type fonts: pica, 10pt: courier, 10 or 12pt: or elite, 12pt.

Reminder: You will need your ID number and password from the transmittal letter. If you do not have the letter, you may call the Response Center at 1-800-421-6770 and they will provide you the ID number and password.

COMPLETING THE LOCAL APPLICATION FORM

When completing the application diskette or application form follow the instructions listed below.

FOR ELECTRONIC SUBMISSION: Turn on the computer. Choose the diskette size (either 5¼" or 3½") that fits your computer. At the A:\ or B:\ prompt, type "APPLY" and press enter. This will bring the program. A Main Menu screen will appear. There are four parts to the application form: Application Information, Payment Information, Purposes Areas, and Certification. As you complete each section, a small check-mark will appear in the Completed Column. When all the sections have a check-mark next to their section, you have completed the application form. <F7> will allow you to print a copy of your application. <F1> is for general Help screens and <F4> exits the system.

- Select the Applicant Information section from the Main Menu.
- You will be asked to enter your ID number.
- **IF** you are submitting via computer modem, you will also need to enter your password.
- The name of your organization will appear.
- You must confirm that this is the name of your organization.
- Once you confirm that the correct organization is displayed, the application information screen will appear and display your agency's name and address. Please correct any information that is listed inaccurately.
- Proceed with the application form program.
- **If you are applying through electronic format (diskette or computer modem), press <Enter> to access each field.**

PART 1. APPLICANT INFORMATION

 4. Name of Organization Enter the name of your unit of local government. For electronic submission: If the name displayed is correct, continue to the next field. For electronic submission: If the information is missing or displayed incorrectly, please fill in or correct this field.
 5. County Enter the name of your county. For electronic submission: If the information is missing or displayed incorrectly, please fill in or correct this field.
 - 6–10. Address Use the same address printed on the mailing label. If the mailing label is incorrect, enter the correct address of the applying local government entity.
 11. Grantee Type If you are currently a direct grantee of OJP or COPS, check appropriate box. Both boxes may be checked. If you are submitting electronically press <Enter> for a picklist. Select the one that applies to your current grantee status.

Chief Executive Officer Information

12. Prefix Select the appropriate prefix for your Chief Executive Officer.
- 13–15. CEO Name Enter the name of your Chief Executive Officer who has official signature authority to make financial and programmatic commitments on behalf of the applicant jurisdiction.
16. CEO Title Enter the official position of your Chief Executive Officer.
- 17–18. CEO Phone/Fax Enter the direct line numbers for the Chief Executive Officer.

PART 2. PAYMENT INFORMATION

Contact Information

19. LOCES Number If you are a current user of OJP's Letter of Credit Electronic System (LOCES), you have a LOCES number. Enter that number. If you are not currently a LOCES user, DO NOT enter a number.
20. Prefix Select the appropriate prefix for the contact person.
- 21-23. Contact Name Enter the name of the person with administrative responsibility for the application. This person will be our primary contact for your jurisdiction on matters regarding this program.
24. Contact Phone Enter the telephone number of the contact person.
25. Contact Fax Enter the Fax number of the contact person.

Payment Information

26. Payment Contact Enter the name of the person responsible for determining in what form the payment should be made. This person may be the same as the contact person designated with administrative responsibility for the application.
27. Payment Code Choose form of payment: treasury check or direct deposit. You may elect to receive your block grant payment by electronic fund transfer (direct deposit) or by U.S. Treasury check. Additional information regarding payment will be forwarded to you.
28. Federal Cognizant Agency Select the name of the Federal cognizant agency for your jurisdiction. This agency is generally determined based on the preponderance of direct Federal dollars received by your jurisdiction. **This will always be a Federal agency, not a State-level agency.** A list of cognizant federal agencies is included as an Appendix. (Federal Register, Vol. 51, No. 3, January 6, 1986.)

29. Federal Award Amount Enter the amount for which you are applying, up to the maximum amount available. There is a cash match requirement of 10% of amount applied for. If you are submitting electronically, the amount you are eligible for will appear on the Purpose Area section screen. The system will calculate the amount for you as you enter in the amount(s) of the purpose area(s) selected. The system will not allow you to exceed your eligibility amount.
- 29B. Match Amount Enter the amount of match your jurisdiction is committing to this project. The amount must be at least 1/9 of the Federal Award Amount. If you are submitting electronically, DO NOT ENTER any amount. The cash match will be automatically calculated at 1/9 of the Federal Award Amount.
30. Date Sent to State Enter the date the application was provided to the designated State agency. A list is provided in Appendix A. For electronic submission: once you have completed the application, press <F7> and the system will generate a form for you. This form is acceptable to forward to the appropriate State agency.
31. Date Sent to SPOC Enter the date the application was provided to the designated State Single Point of Contact (SPOC) for review. Executive Order 12372 requires applicants from State and local units of government or other organizations providing services within a State to submit a copy of the application to the SPOC, if one exists, and if this program has been selected for review by the State. A list of SPOCs is included in your application kit.

PART 3. PURPOSE AREAS

For electronic submission: The maximum award amount your jurisdiction is eligible to apply for will appear on the Purpose Areas screen. Make a note of the total dollar amount for which you are eligible to apply. Your request for funding may not exceed this amount.

Purpose Areas for Requested Funds

32. Purpose Areas Provide the requested information regarding the local distribution of funds. This information is intended to be a best estimate based on preliminary planning.

A through *G*..... Check at least one box and enter the amount.

- 32A. If you check *a*..... Enter the amount. You must check *d*. and either or both *e*. and *f*. If you select *f*, you must select either or both (1) and (2).

If you check *b*..... Enter the amount.

If you check *c*..... Enter the amount.

- 32B. If you check *B*, you must enter the amount.

- 32C. If you check *C*, you must enter the amount and select at least (1) or (2).

FOR ELECTRONIC SUBMISSION: This portion of the application must be read by the authorizing official. Only the authorizing official may complete the certification section of the application.

The authorizing official should read the two forms included in your application package: *Assurances*, OJP Form 4000/3 and *Certification Regarding Lobbying; Debarment, Suspension and Other Responsibility Matters; and Drug-Free Workplace Requirements*, OJP Form 4061/6. Both of these forms must be signed and dated by the authorizing official and returned to BJA with the original LLEBG Application Form.

Regardless of how you make your application to BJA, if there are lobbying activities to disclose, please fill out and return the *Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying*, Standard Form-LLL. You may fax the form to BJA at 1-888-627-9484.

34. Authorized Signature

For paper submission: the person authorized must sign COMPLETELY WITHIN the lines of the box provided for signature. The person authorized must also sign the certifications and assurances which are included in the application kit.

For electronic submission: type the name of the person authorized to "sign" the application.

34B. Date

Enter the date the application was submitted.

JUST A REMINDER: Please use the provided return envelope or disk mailer when forwarding your application to BJA.

A copy of your application must be sent to the applicable State agency at least 20 days prior to submitting your application to BJA. A list of the designated State agencies can be found in Appendix A of the Local Application Kit. **FOR ELECTRONIC SUBMISSION:** Once you have completed the application, press the <F7> key and a copy of the application will print on your local printer. The print-out will not look exactly like the hard copy form, but it will have all the data from your application. This print-out is to be forwarded to the appropriate State agency for their review.

If you are submitting a hard copy of the application to BJA, please return the Identification Number (ID) page with your application. We will be using your ID number to track your application, so it is critical that you return that page to us.

Communications Software Instructions

TECHNICAL INFORMATION FOR DIAL-IN ACCESS TO THE OFFICE OF JUSTICE PROGRAMS

NOTE: Save this information. You may use this technical information and the communications software for subsequent communication with the host server at the Office of Justice Programs.

The Communications (Remote Link) software included in your application kit will enable you to communicate with the host server located at the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ), Office of Justice Programs (OJP), using our FTS 1-800 numbers.

The first step is to create a directory called "**RLINK23**" on the root directory of your hard drive and copy the contents of the diskette into it, (e.g. c:\RLINK23). If you do not have a hard drive, you can still use this software using your floppy drive.

This software is already generically configured and hopefully will need no further modification. However, before dialing to the OJP Host for the first time, you may want to verify many of the parameters.

To check/verify the parameters:

Type RLINK from your newly created "RLINK23" directory or your floppy drive (e.g. A: or B:) and then press <ENTER>. This will bring up the **REMOTE LINK Main Menu**. From this menu, arrow over to SETUP and select the **AppServer List** and press <ENTER>. There will be two selections available to be edited. The only difference between the two will be the FTS 800 number used to access the OJP network. Press <ENTER> on the first (Primary) label and check the following entries:

- 1. PHONE NO.** The FTS phone numbers for the OJP Host are 1(888) 627-9483 (Primary) and 1(800) 838-0106 (Secondary). These numbers are already entered for you, but if additional digits are needed in order to dial-out or make long distance calls, make your changes here.
- 2. MODEM TYPE** It is highly recommended that you use a high-speed (up to 28.8) modem and have the actual modem (brand name) type selected for this entry. Press <Enter> or <F6> to get a list of modems. If for any reason your modem is not listed, or you do not know what type it is, use the "Generic" setting. This will not guarantee a connection with OJP Host. If initialization does not work, obtain the modem's specific initialization string from the modem manual or from the vendor and add it to the modem list. The modem list can be accessed from the main menu.
- 3. DEVICE NAME** This is the communication or COMM port designated for your modem. Make changes here when necessary.

Once you complete your changes or modifications, press F4 to save and exit. Press F3 to return to the main menu.

To Dial-in to the OJP Network:

From the Main menu, select the **Dial/Connect to a Server** option and press <ENTER> on the Primary label. This will initiate a remote connection to the OJP network. After the connection is established, you will automatically be brought into the Bureau of Justice Assistance, Local Law Enforcement Block Grants Application System. Follow the directions in the packet titled "Application Instructions".

If you are not automatically brought into the application system and receive the message "Enter Username", type CITRIX1 and under "Enter Selection" type 1. If a connection is not made with the Primary FTS number, return to the **Dial/Connect to a Server** option and select the Secondary FTS number.

If for any reason you cannot connect with the OJP Host, please call the **DOJ Response Center** at (800) 421-6770 and ask to be connected to the **OJP HelpDesk** or, call the **OJP HelpDesk** directly at (202) 307-0627 between the hours of 7:30 AM - 7:30 PM EDT, Monday through Friday and ask for Mr. Haile Abraham or leave a message and you will receive a return phone call as soon as possible.

Note for Network Users:

If you want to use the modem pool at your site, your program should be NASI compatible. At the DEVICE NAME entry include your NASI port name (e.g ANY_PORT) and at the MODEM TYPE entry, enter your modem brand name.
