Federal Resources to Tennessee

- ◆ **The FY95 S.T.O.P. Violence Against Women Grant Program (Services*Training*Officers*Prosecutors)** gave each state, territory, and Indian tribe \$426,326 to restructure the criminal justice system's response to crimes of violence against women.
- ◆ Tennessee made 4 subgrants with its FY95 STOP funds (see attached subgrant list).
- ◆ The S.T.O.P. program requires collaboration among victim advocates, prosecutors, and police. It also requires development of a comprehensive planning process, including goal setting, implementation steps, and solicitation of input from law enforcement, judges, victim advocates, health care providers, etc.
- ◆ \$130 million in FY96 STOP funding will be awarded nationwide. Tennessee will receive \$2,303,000.
- ◆ STOP '96 encourages states to follow through on the plans developed in FY95 and suggests focusing on several key areas: training and technical assistance, intra and interstate enforcement of protection orders, innovative programs addressing sexual assault and stalking, and judicial education and court-related projects.
- ◆ **\$28 million** is available in FY 96 for the **Grant Programs to Encourage Arrest Policies**. This discretionary grant program encourages states and localities to treat domestic violence as a serious violation of criminal law. Regulations were published in the *Federal Register*. Award announcements are forthcoming.
- ◆ **\$7 million** is available in FY96 for the **Rural Domestic Violence and Child Victimization Enforcement Grants**. This discretionary grant program supports cooperative efforts among law enforcement officers, prosecutors, victim advocates, and other criminal justice practitioners and service providers involved in the investigation and prosecution of domestic violence and child abuse in rural areas.

- ◆ President Clinton announced the National Domestic Violence Hotline on February 21, 1996.
- ◆ Since that time the Hotline has received 53,583 calls from victims, family members, service providers, and batterers, among others.
- ◆ 2,583 or 4.82 percent of these callers were from Tennessee.
- ◆ The voice number is 1-800-799-SAFE and the TDD number is 1-800-787-3224.
- ◆ The National Domestic Violence Hotline provides critical crisis assistance, counseling, and referrals to resources for victims of domestic violence, their family members and others across the country.
- ◆ The National Domestic Violence Hotline is a nationwide, 24-hour, toll free hotline offering service in Spanish as well as other languages.

TENNESSEE

Sexual Assault¹

FBI Uniform Crime Reports indicate over 2,500 forcible rapes reported in Tennessee in 1993. Sexual Assault Centers in Tennessee's three largest cities -Memphis, Knoxville, and Nashville- recorded over 2,338 rapes in their catchment areas alone in the same year. Since it is estimated that less than 16% of all rapes are reported, actual state figures could be as high as 15,900.

Domestic Violence¹

Tennessee has domestic violence shelters in 34 of its 95 counties providing services to over 46,000 women and children annually; however, victims in 64% of the state remain underserved.

SUBGRANTS

Law Enforcement

The Tennessee Law Enforcement Training Academy (TLETA) and the Tennessee Task Force Against Domestic Violence (TTFADV) were selected to receive \$100,000 to formulate plans and develop a curriculum for domestic violence/rape/sexual assault investigation courses. Also to be developed is a "Train the Trainer" curriculum for instructors.

Prosecution

The District Attorneys General Conference was selected to receive \$100,000 to develop two separate schools to instruct approximately 100 prosecutors each. Funds will support workshops to teach prosecutors how to better prosecute domestic violence cases. A statewide coordinator will be hired to assist the 31 judicial districts in providing training for prosecution of cases involving violence against women.

Victim Services

The Tennessee Department of Human Services was selected to receive \$100,000 to establish a computerized network linking all of the shelters and rape/sexual assault centers in the State. Shelters and crisis centers will be surveyed to identify those that can be linked immediately; those that have systems that must be upgraded in order to be linked; and those that have incompatible or no systems, for which equipment will be purchased. The network will enable victims who wish to relocate to ensure their safety, either temporarily or permanently, to immediately access information from a local shelter or crisis center about shelter bed space and services available in other parts of the State.

Discretionary

The Nashville Metropolitan Police Department was selected to receive \$6,000 to purchase 100 Polaroid cameras. The cameras were specifically developed for high-resolution photographs of victims injuries to be used in court. Each officer who receives a camera will be trained in its use by a Polaroid technician.

The Knox County District Attorney's Office was selected to receive \$3,956 to send six people to a two-and-a-half-day workshop in Dallas, Texas, entitled "The Developing Connections: Building Coordinated Approaches for Domestic Violence Cases" that was sponsored by the American Prosecutors Research Institute. Knox County attendees included a judge, a prosecutor, law enforcement officers, and YWCA Child and Family Services representatives.

Note: \$70,000 has been allocated to perform a statewide needs assessment of all programs that serve female victims of violent crimes and to develop a resource center to provide information to victims statewide; however, these funds have not yet been awarded.

"COMMUNITY POLICING TO COMBAT DOMESTIC VIOLENCE" PROGRAM OVERVIEW

GENERAL BACKGROUND

On June 12, 1995, the Department of Justice, Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) and the Violence Against Women Office sponsored a joint planning session to explore ways in which the Department components could promote the application of community policing to the problem of domestic violence. Experts from throughout the country were brought together to provide guidance on how the COPS Office should develop an ideal grant program that would promote the use of community policing to combat domestic violence. As a result of this session, the COPS grant program "Community Policing to Combat Domestic Violence" was announced by the Attorney General on September 7, 1995. The deadline to apply was November 17, 1995.

The purpose of the program is to provide federal assistance to law enforcement agencies to encourage and strengthen an innovative, progressive focus on domestic violence. Grant funds may be used for one of three separate categories:

- Training
- Problem Solving
- Organizational Change

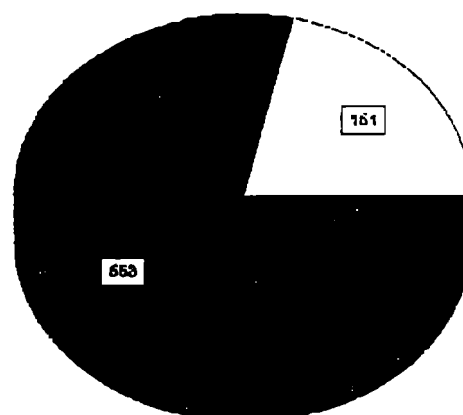
Eligibility requirements for this grant program include a demonstration that the applicant has successfully implemented community policing on at least a unit-wide basis for two years and a signed, detailed memorandum of understanding with a local, non-profit, non-governmental community service organization to form a working, equal partnership to solve the problem of domestic violence within their community. Applications without detailed memoranda of understanding were not considered for funding.

The program will provide funds to demonstrate productive partnerships between police and community service providers; to show how technology and analysis can assist in tracking and ending the repeat offender cycle; to demonstrate the effectiveness of problem solving; to provide model training curricula for advocates and officers; and, to provide the problem solving tools for law enforcement agencies to ensure the safety of citizens within their community.

APPLICATIONS AND AWARDS

Seven hundred and four (704) applications requesting \$88,393,947 were received by the COPS Office. The COPS Office plans to fund 336 jurisdictions (48% of applications submitted) in the amount of \$46,848,028.

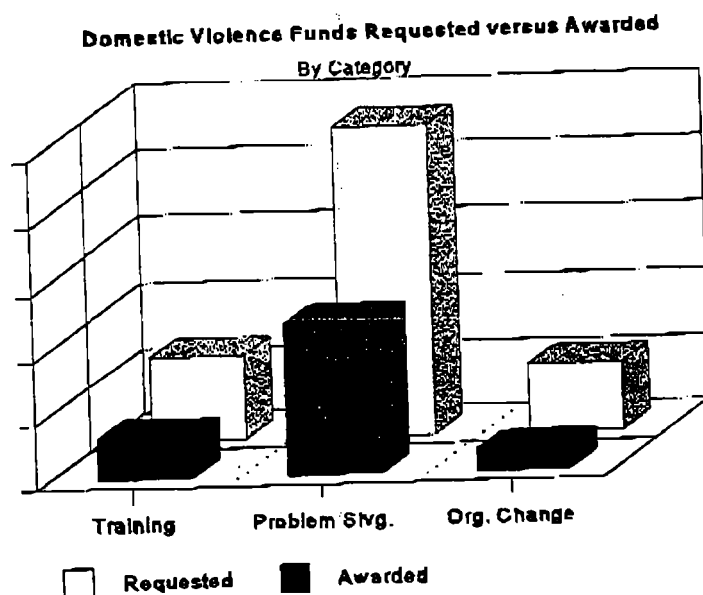
Community Policing to Combat Domestic Violence

Of the 704 applications received, 130 applications were submitted under the Training category or 18%, 469 were submitted under the Problem Solving category or 67%, and 105 or 15% were submitted under the Organizational Change category.

Of the 336 grants that will be awarded under this program, 65 will be under the Training category, 238 will be under the Problem Solving category, and, 33 will be under the Organizational Change Category.



Departments serving populations with greater than 150,000 residents will receive \$19,051,948 or nearly 41% of the COPS domestic violence funding. Departments serving populations less than 150,000 will receive \$27,796,080 or 59% of the funding.

AGENCY TYPES

Of the 336 grants to be awarded: 248 are Municipal departments; 41 are Sheriff's departments; 12 are Law Enforcement consortia; 11 are Tribal departments; 10 are County Police departments; 6 are "other" (D.A., Parole and Probation) departments; 5 are State Criminal Justice agencies; 4 are University departments; and 2 are Public Housing departments.

TRIBAL DEPARTMENTS

Under this program, 27 tribal departments applied for \$3,978,563. 11 will be funded at \$1,477,448 (37% of the applications submitted). Under the training category, 5 applied and 2 will be funded. Under the problem solving category, 17 applied and 7 will be funded. Under the organizational change category, 5 applied and 2 will be funded.

PARTNERSHIPS

An important goal of the Community Policing to Combat Domestic Violence program is to assist law enforcement agencies in creating vehicles for various participants in the criminal justice system to work together. As a result, in addition to providing funding for new officer salaries and technology, the COPS Office will provide funding for local shelters, counseling centers, advocacy organizations and medical centers. The funding will go directly to the law enforcement agency and will be distributed to the partner through the terms in the memorandum of understanding. The YWCA, Salvation Army and Legal Services were among the some of the partners selected by law enforcement agencies.

- The Los Angeles Police Department has received \$127,104,085 to hire or redeploy 2,269 officers. This includes a Community Policing to Combat Domestic Violence grant for \$200,000. *This also includes 710 officers that the LAPD received under the Universal Hiring Program on May 15, 1996. Presently, there is some uncertainty as to whether or not LA will accept the full award amount. The city council passed a final budget for only 450 new hires. Mayor Riordan vetoed this, but the council met on June 4 to successfully override the veto. The mayor and the city council currently are negotiating.
- The Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department has received \$10,158,378 to hire or redeploy 152 deputies. This includes a Community Policing to Combat Domestic Violence grant for \$250,000.
- A consortium of the LA County Sheriff and Police Departments has received \$1,000,000 for an Anti-Gang Initiative grant.
- The LA County Metro Transit Police have received \$3,805,503 to hire or redeploy 48 officers.
- The LA County Parks & Recreation Department has received \$3,446,076 to hire or redeploy 46 officers.
- The LA Community College has received \$1,500,000 to hire or redeploy 20 officers.
- The LA Unified School District has received \$810,000 to hire or redeploy 30 officers.

COPS Facts

Accomplishments and Initiatives

During his 1994 State of the Union address, President Clinton pledged to put 100,000 additional police officers and sheriffs' deputies on America's neighborhood streets. On September 13, 1994, with bipartisan support, President Clinton signed into law the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994 — popularly known as the "Crime Act" — that authorized \$8.8 billion over six years to add 100,000 officers and promote community policing.

Officers funded under the Crime Act are paid for through the Violent Crime Reduction Trust Fund. Created by Congress, the trust fund is a promise to the American people to take the money saved by cutting the level of the Federal workforce by 270,000 and invest the savings into proven, effective crime-fighting programs.

To implement the new law, Attorney General Janet Reno created the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) in the U.S. Department of Justice to be responsible for putting the additional officers on the streets and promoting community policing strategies.

Accomplishments

Hiring Goals Exceeded: By the Crime Act's first anniversary, grants were authorized to add more than 25,000 officers — a quarter of the final goal, only one year into the six-year program. By May 1996, more than \$2.2 billion in grants had been approved to hire or redeploy more than 43,000 officers.

Widespread Impact: COPS grants have been awarded to more than half the policing agencies in the country. As a result, these officers will join agencies that serve more than 87 percent of the American public.

Customer Service: Under COPS, each grant

recipient is assigned a grant advisor and direct-dial phone number to assist in filling out applications and answer questions. A toll-free Response Center was established so citizens can call for information about COPS and other Crime Act programs. (1-800-421-6770)

Easy Applications: COPS grants make it easy for policing agencies to apply for grants. For example, a grant application last year for smaller communities was just one page. Rather than continually re-apply, communities that already have received COPS hiring grants and are seeking additional officers simply confirm the number of officers originally requested with the COPS Office.

Initiatives

Hiring Grants: To put 100,000 officers on America's streets as quickly as possible, COPS created a series of hiring grants that feature streamlined applications. For qualifying agencies, COPS pays 75 percent of the salaries and benefits for new officers for three years, up to a maximum of \$75,000 per officer. By law, half of the funds are granted to jurisdictions with populations

under 150,000. Currently, local policing agencies apply for funds to hire new officers under the COPS Universal Hiring Program (UHP).

Equipment, Technology, and More: COPS

(Over)

What is Community Policing?

Community policing is a policing philosophy that promotes and supports organizational strategies to address the causes and reduce the fear of crime and social disorder through problem-solving tactics and community-police partnerships.

MORE (Making Officer Redeployment Effective) provides funds to acquire new technologies and equipment, hire civilians for administrative tasks, and pay for officer overtime. This allows local policing agencies to redeploy officers so more of their time is spent on the streets solving problems instead of at the station completing paperwork.

Promoting Innovation: The *COPS Youth Firearms Violence Initiative* supports innovative community policing approaches to fight firearm violence among young people. Working with the Justice Department's Violence Against Women Office, COPS funds *Community Policing to Combat Domestic Violence* grants to local communities. The *COPS Anti-Gang Initiative* brings effective community policing strategies to 15 communities on the front lines in the battle against gangs. *Innovative Community Policing* grants will assist police and sheriffs' departments with training and

changing organizational structures, and support co-operation between law enforcement and community-based organizations.

Training and Technical Assistance: COPS is dedicated to providing training and technical assistance for agencies receiving COPS grants. COPS funds training programs at police academies, law enforcement agencies, and universities across the country. The Community Policing Consortium, funded by COPS, pools the expertise of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives, National Sheriffs' Association, Police Executive Research Forum, and the Police Foundation to provide training and technical assistance to practitioners across the country.

COPS Grant Programs

UHP (Universal Hiring Program): Assists law enforcement agencies in hiring additional community policing officers. This program supersedes FAST, AHEAD, and Phase I.

MORE (Making Officer Redeployment Effective): Provides funds to acquire new technologies and equipment, pay overtime for existing officers, and hire civilians for administrative and support tasks. These grants allow officers and deputies to spend more time on the street solving problems instead of filling out paperwork.

Problem-Solving Partnerships: Funds problem solving and developing partnerships between law enforcement agencies and community organizations.

Community Policing to Combat Domestic Violence: Funds innovative community policing efforts to curb domestic violence.

Anti-Gang Initiative: Brings effective community policing strategies to the front line in the battle against gangs in 15 communities.

YFVI (Youth Firearms Violence Initiative): Funds innovative community policing efforts in ten cities to curb the rise in violence associated with young people and firearms.

Troops to COPS: Joint program with the Defense Department that provides incentives for COPS grantees to hire recently separated members of the armed services, by providing up to \$5,000 per officer for training costs.

Evaluation and Research Grants: Provide funding to policing agencies, universities and criminal justice facilities to evaluate community policing.

Training Grants: Provide funding for community policing training to public safety, educational and research organizations, as well as projects administered by U.S. Attorneys' offices.

Police Corps: Pilot program planned for 1996 that provides tuition assistance for college students who agree to serve as a police officer or sheriff's deputy during the first years of their career.

COPS Grant Programs

Hiring & Redeployment Grants

- UHP** (Universal Hiring Program) COPS grant program to assist police departments in hiring additional community policing officers. This COPS hiring program supersedes FAST, AHEAD, PHASE I. It is expected that all future COPS hiring grants will be awarded through UHP.
- MORE** (Making Officer Redeployment Effective) COPS grant program which provides grants to police departments for the purpose of hiring civilians, purchasing equipment or paying overtime in order to redeploy officers from behind desks back out into neighborhoods.
- AHEAD** (Accelerated Hiring, Education & Deployment) Expedited COPS hiring grant program for communities with populations of 50,000 or more. Superseded by UHP.
- FAST** (Funding Accelerated for Smaller Towns) Expedited COPS hiring grant for communities with populations under 50,000. Superseded by UHP.
- Phase I** Phase I - First COPS hiring grants to be awarded as a result of the 1994 VCCA. The Commerce, Justice, State Appropriations Act for FY '95 specified that the first \$200 million of COPS grant funds should be used to fund additional PHS applications that were not yet funded.
- PHS** (Police Hiring Supplement) Precursor to the COPS hiring grants, originally administered by BJA. Funds were made available under the 1993 Emergency Supplemental Appropriations Act (prior to the passage of the 1994 VCCA) for local police departments to hire officers for the purpose of community policing. Only 9% of the applications were funded - hence Congress required Phase I.

Non-Hiring Grants

- ICOP** (Innovative Community Oriented Policing) COPS grant program to fund proposals on problem solving, developing partnerships with community organizations, and institutionalizing community policing through training and organizational change.
- Community Policing to Combat Domestic Violence** COPS grant program to employ community policing to address the crime of domestic violence.
- COPS Gang Initiative** COPS grant program to provide select communities of varying sizes with resources to address gang violence and the fear of gang violence.
- YFVI** (Youth Firearms Violence Initiative) COPS grant program to support targeted law enforcement efforts directed at combating the rise of youth firearms violence in 10 cities.
- Evaluation Grants** COPS funds awarded through NIJ to evaluate the effectiveness of COPS programs.
- Technology Grants** COPS grants for the purpose of developing technologies that will further community policing.
- Training Grants**
- LECC** Training funds managed through the individual offices of the US Attorneys for the purpose of addressing community policing training needs of those communities.
 - Targeted** Training grants awarded to selected organizations for the purpose of addressing the need for training in community policing.
 - Troops to COPS** Training grants to encourage the hiring of recently separated members of the armed services as community policing officers. Joint program by COPS and Dept. of Defense.

Important Points about the COPS Program

- ♦ As of July 10, 1996, over 44,000 officers, serving 87% of the American public, had been authorized by COPS. Furthermore, the COPS Office has outstanding requests from more than 4,000 law enforcement agencies for over 20,000 additional community policing officers.
- ♦ COPS funds small towns and rural areas; half of all COPS funding goes to agencies serving jurisdictions of under 150,000.
- ♦ COPS is non-bureaucratic and provides streamlined application processes, allowing the funding to quickly flow directly to police, sheriffs, and state police agencies.
- ♦ COPS has funded not only the hiring of officers, but also the purchase of equipment and technology, the hiring of civilians, and the payment of overtime. COPS has provided training to thousands of grantees through the Community Policing Consortium, U.S. Attorney Law Enforcement Coordinating Committees, and grants directly to police departments, universities and non-profit organizations with expertise in community policing.

In addition, COPS has already announced targeted programs such as the COPS Youth Firearms Violence Initiative, the COPS Anti-Gang Initiative, and the COPS Community Policing to Combat Domestic Violence grant program. The COPS Office recently announced the Problem-Solving Partnerships grant program, an innovative community policing program (ICOP) that will provide policing agencies and community-based entities with a unique opportunity to work together to identify and analyze persistent crime and disorder problems.

- ♦ The Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994 was drafted with a extensive input from the law enforcement community. Law enforcement officers across the country -- chiefs, sheriffs, line officers and deputies -- as well as the U.S. Conference of Mayors, support the COPS Program.
