Here's a little more info on several topics we discussed yesterday.

1. FICA taxes and student employment.

Service performed as an employee of a school, college, or university (whether or not exempt from income tax) is exempt from FICA taxes if performed by a student who is enrolled in and is regularly attending classes at the school, college or university. In these cases the employer (the college) does not pay the employer's FICA share. On-campus work-study students are regarded as employees of their schools. So, summer WS employees would be subject to FICA taxes unless concurrently enrolled.

This comes from an older (1987?) document that describes Rev. Rul. 78-17 (Revenue Ruling?) which references section 3121(b)(10) of the Federal Insurance Contribution Act (IRC chapter 21, subtitle C). This provision has been around a while. A Congressional committee report states that the intent is "to exclude those persons and organizations in which the employment is part-time or intermittent and the total amount of earnings is only nominal and the payment of the tax is inconsequential and a nuisance." [S. Rep. No. 734, 76th Congress, 1st Session (1939)]

2. JLD and institutional "in kind" share.

Section 675.33 of the FWS regulation permits institutions to contribute their (minimum) 20% share of JLD allowable program costs by means of cash or "in kind" payments. In the opinion of the student aid program staff, "allowable costs" could not be construed to include institutionally-provided training opportunities. That is, the "in kind" services refer to activities that develop the job rather than activities that prepare a person to perform that job. Therefore, a school's provision of "training" could not be used to satisfy its JLD matching requirement.

3. ED's general guidance for JLD is contained in our student financial

SECTION 6: JOB LOCATION AND DEVELOPMENT

PROGRAM PURPOSE

[[Financial need not a requirement for JLD jobs--34 CFR 675.31]]
The Job Location and Development (JLD) Program expands off-campus job opportunities for students who are enrolled in eligible institutions of higher education and who want jobs **REGARDLESS OF FINANCIAL NEED** (unlike regular Federal Work-Study [FWS] jobs). JLD also encourages students to participate in community service activities. A student employed in a job developed by the JLD Program must be currently enrolled, but, as no federal funds are used to pay his or her wages, the student is **NOT** required to meet the other standard FWS student eligibility criteria.

[[Purpose of JLD community service jobs]]
JLD community service jobs are designed to improve the quality of life for community residents, particularly low-income individuals, or to solve particular problems related to the needs of community residents. Community services are those the school has identified by working with local nonprofit, governmental, and community-based organizations. Appropriate jobs are those in fields such as health care; child care; literacy training; education (including tutorial services); housing and neighborhood improvement; rural development; and community improvement and jobs that provide supportive services to students with disabilities. Schools must inform all eligible students of the opportunity to perform community services and must develop and make available information about community service opportunities.

USE OF FWS ALLOCATION FOR JLD PROGRAM

A school may use up to 10% of its FWS allocation and reallocation--or a maximum of \$50,000, whichever is less--to establish or expand a program to locate and develop off-campus jobs, **INCLUDING COMMUNITY SERVICE JOBS**. Jobs located or developed under the program may be for either a profit or nonprofit employer.

USE OF JLD PROGRAM FUNDS

[[Paying the student]]
The off-campus employer, rather than the school, pays a student whose job was located or developed through the JLD Program. Federal JLD funds are used to pay the school's costs of establishing and

administering the JLD Program; the funds are NOT used to pay students whose jobs were located or developed through the program. A school is required, however, to keep a record of total earnings of students employed in these jobs. If the school fails to do so, it will not be in compliance with its participation agreement, which states that total wages of students (for whom jobs were located or developed) are expected to exceed the amount of federal funds spent on the JLD Program. (The school reports in Part V, Section G, of the Fiscal Operations Report and Application to Participate (FISAP) the federal funds used for JLD and the total earnings of students for whom jobs were located or developed.)

[[Federal share]]

[[Institutional share]]

The federal funds that a school sets aside from its FWS allocation to be used for JLD activities may be used to pay up to 80% of the allowable costs (listed below). The school must provide the remaining 20% of allowable costs either in cash or in services. This requirement, unlike the institutional share requirement for FWS earnings, cannot be waived. The school must maintain records that indicate the amount and sources of its matching share. Procedures and records requirements for JLD are the same as those for all campus-based programs. (See Chapter 5, Section 3.)

When a school signs its JLD Participation Agreement with the U.S. Department of Education (ED), the school must agree that it will not use its JLD allocation to locate or develop jobs at its own school or other eligible schools.

ALLOWABLE PROGRAM COSTS

Allowable costs of carrying out the JLD Program include

- staff salaries (and fringe benefits, if they are the same as those paid to other institutional employees in comparable positions and are not paid to a student employed through the FWS Program);
- travel expenses related to JLD activities;
- printing and mailing costs for brochures about the JLD Program;
- JLD telephone charges, including installation of a separate line for off-campus employers;
- JLD costs for supplies, equipment, and furniture;
- newspaper or other types of advertising that inform potential employers of the services JLD offers; and
- JLD workshops for students and employers.

[[Costs not allowed]]

Costs that are not allowable are costs related to purchasing, constructing, or altering the facilities that house a JLD project. Indirect administrative costs also are not allowable. One example of an indirect administrative cost is a portion of the salary of someone who is not directly involved in the program--the JLD director's supervisor, for example.

MULTI-INSTITUTIONAL JLD PROGRAMS

[[Agreement with other eligible schools--34CFR 675.34]]

A school that is participating in FWS may enter a written agreement with other eligible schools to establish and to operate a JLD Program for its students. The agreement must designate the administrator of the program and must specify the terms, conditions, and performance standards of the program. Each school that is part of the agreement retains responsibility for properly disbursing and accounting for the federal funds it contributes under the agreement.

The participation agreement requires the school to provide satisfactory assurances that, if the school uses federal funds to contract with another school, suitable performance standards will be part of that contract.

PROGRAM PARTICIPATION AGREEMENT

A school that wants to participate in the JLD Program checks the appropriate box or boxes on its Program Participation Agreement when it first applies for FWS funds. If a school does not decide until later that it wants to participate, it should send a request to

The school will receive a photocopy of its original Program Participation Agreement, initialed by a member of the IPD staff, authorizing the school's participation.

The Program Participation Agreement must provide that

- the school will administer the program in accordance with the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended, and current JLD regulations;
- the school will submit to ED an annual report on the use of JLD funds and an evaluation of the program's effectiveness (this requirement is satisfied simply by reporting wages earned under Section G of the FWS Electronic Fiscal Operations Report);

- the school will provide satisfactory assurances that it will not use its JLD allocation to locate or develop jobs at its own school or other eligible schools;
- the school will not develop jobs on campus under the JLD Program;
- the program will be used for jobs while students are in school and between periods of enrollment, but not for job placement upon graduation;
- the program will not displace employees or impair existing service contracts;
- the school expects total student wages to exceed the amount of federal funds spent on the program; and
- if the school uses federal funds to contract with another school to administer the program, suitable performance standards will be part of that contract.

[[Termination and suspension]]

If ED terminates or suspends a school's eligibility to participate in the FWS Program, that action also applies to the school's JLD Program. Additional information about termination and suspension is included in 34CFR 675.37.

Dear Carol,

You may recall that at a meeting on June 11th we spoke briefly about the America Reads Challenge and particularly the policy that, in order to qualify for College-Work-Study funding support, tutors must work directly with children or, at least, with parents and children together. I expressed concern about this policy and am now responding to your request that I follow up in writing.

In 1989, Boston University and the community of Chelsea, MA collaborated to plan and implement an intergenerational literacy program where immigrant parents and College Work Study students worked together toward two goals: to improve the parents' English language and literacy and to help the parents support their children's success in American schools. The first three years of the program were made possible by funding from the Department of Education's FIRST Funding Initiative. Following the completion of that grant award, we sustained program activities through funding from the Annenberg Foundation and several smaller grant awards. During its eight-year history, the project has served over 1000 families and now maintains a waiting list of over 100 families for each instructional cycle. Data suggest that parents who participate in this project increase their own literacy abilities at rates significantly higher than do adults who participate in traditional adult literacy programs, and that their children experience high attendance and consistent success in school.

Unlike other programs that require parents and children to come together on-site in order to qualify for program support, we've taken a different direction. After examining research related to children who succeed in school, we concluded that it was rarely the case that such children benefited from a single, scheduled literacy event, no matter how routine or effectively implemented. Rather, children who came to school "ready to learn" had the benefit of being immersed in literacy and language throughout their early years: they had moms or dads or other caregivers who read to them, talked with them, asked and answered questions, engaged in language play, in short, caregivers who embedded literacy and language learning within the routines of daily living. After beginning schooling, they were consistently supported in their learning activities. This, then, became our goal. For two hours a day, four days each week, parents in our project meet in both large classes and small groups with College-Work-Study students trained as literacy tutors. They meet during regular school hours, when their preschool or school-aged children are in classrooms and no additional child care arrangements are necessary. Together they discuss ways parents and children might use literacy to "get things done" at home. As is the case in many family literacy programs, we introduce and help parents to practice effective storybook reading behaviors and to engaged in shared reading on a daily basis. In addition, we teach them about many other important learning practices: questions to ask children about their day at school; ways to help with and support their children's homework completion; ways to use television to enhance children's learning; ways to document the ways their children use literacy and language at home; ways to share information about their children with classroom teachers. We use

materials about parenting and schooling as class reading materials, giving parents a chance to develop and practice their own English literacy and language within the context of reading materials that convey important information about how they can serve as their children's first teachers.

The success of this program suggests that it could provide a fine model for communities seeking to meet the America Reads Challenge. Rather than using federal dollars to support tutors who will work with a child for one only semester or one academic year, this program trains tutors to work with parents who will then work with a child (or several children within a single family) for a lifetime. Unfortunately, current policy guidelines which require that tutors work directly with children do not permit dollars funded through the America Reads Challenge to be used in this way. And this, then, brings me finally to the point of this letter. What can be done to change this policy and allow dollars funded under the America Reads Challenge to be used directly to train parents to work with their children?

As you requested, I have included some information about our project. But my goal here is not to promote my own work or to suggest this project as a national or even local model. Rather it is to support the basic concept upon which the program is founded: over the long run, training parents to effectively support their children's academic success throughout their school years is better use of our educational dollar than training tutors to work with children for a period of one year. If our meeting together at any time could do anything to further this conversation, I would appreciate the opportunity.

**Expanding the America Reads Initiative and Local Tutoring Efforts to Help
All Children Read Independently and Meet High National Standards
DRAFT June 30, 1997**

Today President Clinton continued his campaign to help students reach national standards in reading, visiting an exemplary summer reading program in Boston, where college work-study students and Americorps members work with parents, teachers and others to help young children begin developing solid reading skills. [Third and Fourth] graders conducted a special "reading recital" for the President, who challenged every college and university to use newly available work study funds to place reading tutors in elementary schools and community centers throughout America, and announced that over [350] colleges have already pledged their support. President Clinton also called on Congress to follow through with the additional resources for America Reads included in the balanced budget agreement.

STATES, COMMUNITIES, AND SKILLED TUTORS WORKING TOGETHER TO HELP STUDENTS MEET THE PRESIDENT'S READING GOAL. President Clinton praised the Jump Start program, a part of the Read Boston initiative, for enabling college work study students and Americorps volunteers to work with the local community to help young children learn to read and get ready for school. The President congratulated Mayor Menino on recent test score improvements in Boston, and said that efforts like Read Boston, which unite parents, classroom teachers, business people and community volunteers, are needed in cities and towns across America as students prepare for the national test in 1999. The President also thanked Governor Weld for Massachusetts' commitment to high standards, noting that last month Weld announced that the Commonwealth would participate in the Voluntary National Tests in 4th Grade Reading and 8th Grade Math.] missy hard

One of the big things we are trying to highlight with the event is the availability of a large infusion of new federal work study dollars beginning July 1st. Therefore, our initial interest was in highlighting a JUMPSTART site because not only are they a part of America Reads (and Read Boston) but they involve lots of federal work study students (about 20 out of 60 Americorps volunteers), in early childhood literacy activities. We felt that we could hold the event at or near a JUMPSTART site, and use JUMPSTART as the chief example, but give the Mayor lots of credit for his overall Read Boston initiative, and perhaps acknowledge other reading programs as well.

However, one practical problem with this is that, after talking with Aaron Lieberman and others with JUMPSTART, the lion's share of the group's summer activity--in terms of actual classroom literacy activities-- will be taking place beginning after July 7th, as will be the case with most Read Boston activities. June 30 falls in something of a hiatus period, after the Boston schools have closed for the summer but before the JUMPSTART summer program fully kicks in. However, at some sites JUMPSTART will be conducting internship activities preparing their instructors for the remainder of the summer, with lots of kids and activity taking place; in other sites they will be registering kids and getting classrooms ready for post-July 7, and feel they could pull together the kids who will be participating later without too much trouble.

We have also been getting site ideas (one specific so far, more in the morning) from Margaret Williams of Read Boston, which is an umbrella group for the citywide reading effort run out of the Mayor's office. She is very supportive of JUMPSTART, and the city has provided funding to JUMPSTART, but she would prefer to do a more general event that also celebrates other groups that are a part of the Read Boston/America Reads effort (like City Year, Head Start, Girl Scouts). She feels that we could probably make many sites work to fit our needs simply by bringing in the right folks to whatever site we ultimately use. To an extent that may be right, but we are concerned that we could wind up with an event that celebrates Boston's citywide reading effort/participation in America reads without doing a strong enough job of highlighting the use of work study funds or that could feel too "staged."

For any of these places -- or other places that work better -- we could use as a backdrop one, two, or three of Read Boston's "storymobiles," large child-painted Winnebagos that go around promoting reading and giving books away to kids. Also, once we have a site chosen, Boston School Superintendent (and former ED Assistant Secretary) Tom Payzant's office is willing to help us locate some 3rd or 4th grade students who would make good participants in the "reading recital" part of the event (kids receiving JUMPSTART services would be too young, although JUMPSTART sites may be at or near elementary schools that could supply the right ages), if we can tell him exactly what we need.

List of site possibilities-- to be extended tomorrow:

1. NICE Day Care Center, Jamaica Plain

- Would have Jumpstart activity taking place on June 30 because its a year-round site
- Fairly diverse area, high limited-English proficient
- May lack sufficiently large indoor facilities because it is a child care center
- Supposedly fairly nice and maybe a little larger than some day care centers

2. Mather School, Dorchester

- Jumpstart site
- In high-need, predominantly African American Dorchester area (part of Boston "reading zone")
- Mather also operates an early literacy program for grade school kids involving Wellesley students, and providing an opportunity for continuation from JUMPSTART
- May be other summer activities going on, but on June 30 Jumpstart activity would ordinarily be limited to student registration and classroom preparation

3. Mason School, Roxbury

- Jumpstart site
- In high-need, predominantly African American area
- Located at a school that has gone through a substantial turnaround from very low performing to well-regarded
- May be other summer activities going on, but on June 30 Jumpstart activity would ordinarily be limited to student registration and classroom preparation

4. Blue Hill Avenue Boys and Girls Club, Dorchester

- In high-need, predominantly African American Dorchester area, part of Boston "reading zone."
- Suggested by Read Boston
- Not a Jumpstart site
- Summer camp, including a reading component, starts June 30, so kids would be there.
- Has a fairly sizable auditorium; we hear it was considered for a possible site during the President's last visit to Boston.

5. Jamaica Plain Associated Day Care

- Jump Start internship site
- May be fairly small
- May be located in a housing project

6. Ruggles Mission Hill Associated Day Care

- Jump Start internship site
- May be fairly small
- May be located in a housing project

Dear Mr. President:

We write in support of ReadBoston, a citywide initiative to ensure that every third grader can read at grade level. Founded in October 1995, ReadBoston has built a strong, broad-based coalition dedicated to achieving that goal. Many people have committed their skills, time, and resources to the effort. This is a priority for Boston and for its families and children.

We support ReadBoston and America Reads through the civic engagement of our college and university communities. Students will act as reading tutors to young children and conduct reading enhancement activities. When possible, we will also allocate work study funds to give students an opportunity to serve Boston-area children in a variety of settings. Our aim is to have one thousand students engaged in service to youth literacy by the end of 1997.

ReadBoston has outlined a worthy early childhood literacy goal for all children, and we pledge our continued commitment to the effort.

JUMPSTART has 2 main cycles: the school year cycle & the summer cycle.

The JUMPSUMMER cycle is broken down into two parts -- the internship period and the JUMPSUMMER period. Both of these are with the same 65 AmeriCorps members, 20 of which are also receiving Federal Work Study money. The two summer periods involve a different set of pre-school/daycare sites.

There are 6 school year sites, 5 internship sites, and 6 JUMPSUMMER sites. many of these overlap.

The President will be in Boston June 30th during the internship cycle (June 16th-July 3rd). During this time the following sites are up and running:

Internship Cycle Sites:

During the school year AmeriCorps members give one-on-one reading help and tutoring - mostly reading to children etc.

During the internship period (June 16-July 3) the AmeriCorps members do a lot of observing and learning and practicing how to run a pre-school class with the literacy emphasis. They work in teams of 3 plus a teach mentor. The classes they are in would happen with or without them. The AmeriCorps members use the experience to learn for themselves as well as to provide the kids with extra literacy tutoring.

During the JUMPSUMMER phase II period (July 7 - August 12) the AmeriCorps members teach the pre school classes (with the help of the mentor teacher). These classes are only in existence because of the JUMPSUMMER program and the kids would otherwise not be served in summer programming.

All JUMPSTART and JUMPSUMMER programs teach in pre-school, daycare or head start centers. The kids served range from ages 3-5.

JUMPSUMMER INFORMATION

There are six summer sites. Each site (except one) has 40 kids divided into two classrooms for a full day. The JUMPSUMMER members teach in teams of 3 AmeriCorps members with a teacher mentor and each team does a half day shift:

1. Jamaica Plains HSC - Hennigan school
2. Southend HSC
3. Sarah Greenwood School - Dorchester (Secretary Riley went last month)
4. Mather School - Dorchester (the Mather School also implemented a literacy initiative called the ELLI [Early Learning and Literacy Initiative] in conjunction with Wellesley College a couple of years ago. The ELLI program serves kids all through elementary school and incorporates tutoring and reading recovery. It is not a summer program)
5. Mason School - Roxbury (has summer programming thru 3rd grade but JUMPSTART just started working with Mason school so there wouldn't be alums in summer programming)
6. NICE DayCare Center - Jamaica Plains (20 kids and one team half day)

There are 65 JUMPSUMMER teachers (all AmeriCorps members that are enrolled in Boston areas colleges and universities). Approximately 20 of them are also getting FWS \$\$ as well. The FWS ones are intermingled with the non-FWS ones such that there are FWS ones at each of the 6 program sites during the summer.

The summer session runs from June 16th - August 12th, Monday-Friday, 8:15-5:00pm. The students are all there from 8:15-5:00pm. The JUMPSUMMER teams work in two shifts: 8:15-12:45 and 12:30-5:00pm.

They teach a pre-school curriculum (in conjunction with the mentor teacher) that uses literacy as a mechanism to develop learning skills. Activities include: Reading stories outloud, reading on-to-one, etc. At the end of the summer the AmeriCorps members are certified to teach pre-school.

The ages of the kids range from 3-5 years old.

JUMPSTART began in 1993 at Yale University so the only alums ages 8-9 live in New Haven, CT. These kids were part of the New Haven Ziegler Center and many have gone on to continue their tutoring through the LEAP program there (another AmeriCorps program).

In Boston there are approximately 90 alums ranging in age from about 5-7 years old -- the oldest -- just going into the 2nd grade. The Boston JUMPSTART program began 3 years ago.

There is no direct service but help them link up to other programs for older kids but much of that is done on an informal basis and through the programs that may exist at the child's elementary school (see the Mather school above).

In addition, 6 year olds that have completed the JUMPSTART program can come back for

JUMPSUMMER that year. There are five 6 year olds that are coming back for JUMPSUMMER at the Jamaica Plains Head Start Center site (out of 15 alums from that site) and there may be others at other sites.

There are opportunities for families to continue to be engaged with the program - such as Children Across Boston. There are periodic service days meant to engage alumni kids and their families.

Bill -

Below is the program description of JUMPSTART that we talked about. It is the only National Service program that I can find so far in BOSTON that uses FWS students as literacy tutors for the summer. Many of the FWS students in JUMPSTART have FWS awards for the summer as well as the school year.

In addition, there are a couple of other great projects that may not relate to the POTUS Boston trip for site visit purposes but may be good to know about for speech material etc. during his visit:

1. Massachusetts Campus Compact has 32 member schools throughout the state and beginning June 24th they will have 13 AmeriCorps*VISTA members at 13 colleges and universities throughout the state to work with all 32 Campus Compact colleges/universities on developing America Reads opportunities for students (both FWS and non-FWS). Campus Compact is a national organization with state chapters that is dedicated to bridging the gap between institutions of higher learning and community service. The Massachusetts chapter is based at Tufts University.

2. The AmeriCorps*VISTA Summer Associates SummerReads literacy program run by the Massachusetts Department of Education (Adult and Community Learning Services division) will have 10 year round and 25 summer AmeriCorps*VISTA members spread across seven sites throughout Massachusetts (including one in Boston) to work with families and children on improving their reading skills. The program will begin immediately after the 4 day training session of these VISTA's (June 24-28).

Building a million strong volunteer force will require a major new effort on college campuses. With their energy and commitment, college students represent a great pool of talent just waiting to be tapped. Jumpstart, an AmeriCorps program in Boston and New Haven, has pioneered a service model that allows college students to "serve" their way through college as reading tutors while helping children develop literacy skills.

Founded by two Yale undergraduates in 1993, Jumpstart has grown from 16 volunteers to over 150 corps members who work one-on-one **during the school year and in the summer with children in Head Start centers and other preschool programs**. In 1996, Jumpstart joined with Mayor Menino's Read Boston initiative to launch a city-wide literacy corps of AmeriCorps members who will spend over 72,000 hours in the next 20 months working with children to improve their reading skills.

A key to Jumpstart's growth and success is its use of work-study students. Jumpstart works with the financial aid offices of 13 colleges and universities in Boston and New Haven. These offices post job openings, arrange tracking and pay, and encourage students to work in the community. As a result of these efforts, more than half of Jumpstart's 150 corps members participate in work-study.

When given the chance, college students are eager to serve off-campus. "I'd much rather work to improve the life of a young child than shelve books in the library," said Shannon Bryant, a Harvard sophomore and Jumpstart team leader. Work-study makes it possible for a diverse group of students to give a substantial commitment to service who otherwise could not afford to. An added benefit is consistency -- over the past three years, nearly 75% of Jumpstart corps members have returned for a second year of service.

**GIVING CHILDREN THE HELP AND ENCOURAGEMENT THEY NEED TO MEET
HIGH NATIONAL STANDARDS IN READING
DRAFT June 30, 1997**

Continuing his campaign to help students reach national standards in reading and mathematics, today President Clinton visited a local Head Start center in Boston, Massachusetts, where college work-study students and Americorps volunteers are working alongside parents, teachers and others in the community to help young children build solid reading skills. At the center, 3rd and 4th graders from the neighborhood demonstrated their proficiency in a special "reading recital" for the President, Boston Mayor Thomas Menino, Massachusetts Governor William Weld, and Harvard University President Neil Rudenstine.

The President renewed his call for one million volunteer reading tutors to help meet the national goal of every child reading independently and well by the end of 3rd grade. Noting that over \$213 million dollars in additional work study funds will become available to colleges and universities beginning tomorrow, President Clinton challenged every institution to use the new funds to place work study tutors in elementary schools and community centers throughout America. The President announced that over [400] colleges have already answered this call, with more signing up every day, and called on Congress to deliver on the additional resources for America Reads which were included in the bipartisan budget agreement.

STATES AND COMMUNITIES COMING TOGETHER TO HELP KIDS MEET THE PRESIDENT'S READING GOAL. At the Head Start center, the President was greeted by Mayor Menino, whose Read Boston initiative is involving all facets of the local community, including classroom teachers, community volunteers, and businesspeople. The President was also welcomed by Governor William Weld, who last month announced that Massachusetts would participate in the Voluntary National Tests in 4th Grade Reading and 8th Grade Math in 1999.

NEW WORK STUDY RESOURCES TO SUPPORT READING TUTORS.

HUNDREDS OF COLLEGES HAVE SIGNED ON TO AMERICA READS. 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Payzant's first grades

The stains on the Boston public schools are most visible in June with the release of citywide scores on standardized tests. Rather than disguise the low scores, a practice of his predecessor, School Superintendent Thomas Payzant presses on with his five-year plan to improve the system.

On the plus side, Boston's middle school students show some improvement over last year, especially in reading. In 20 of 23 middle schools, fewer students scored in the lowest performance level this year than last. The system's yearlong concentration on reading skills is having a positive impact even in the middle grades, which educators find the hardest to teach.

Math scores, however, are deeply disappointing systemwide. In Grade 6, for example, 45 percent of students show little or no mastery of basic skills. And that figure rises to a troubling 79 percent by 11th grade. Boston has yet to reverse the axiom that the longer a student remains in the system, the greater his or her chance of failure. Payzant pledges to put as much emphasis on math

next year as he did this year on reading, a promise that must be kept if there is any hope for a majority of Boston's students to meet the state's exit standards for graduation in the year 2003.

The best news, perhaps, is the test itself. For a second year, Boston students have taken the challenging Stanford 9 Achievement Test, which most urban systems shun as too demanding. Payzant's expectations are high. He accepts that solid assessments drive good teaching and learning. That advantage, however, could be undone quickly if his administration fails to gain concessions from the Boston Teachers Union on scheduling, performance evaluation, and other issues that affect the quality of classrooms.

Boston students are still far from reaching the "solid academic performance" category that defines success on the Stanford 9. But this is just the end of the first year of Payzant's implementation of citywide learning standards. If the scores remain substantially the same two years hence, it will be cause for alarm. Now it's just time to toil.

Re: Harvard Land Buy in Allston, MA

What Happened:

- Over a nine year period Harvard University secretly bought 52 acres of land by using Beal Cos.
- The land is made up of 14 different pieces located near the Harvard Graduate School of Business.
- HU now owns 192 acres in Boston and 220 acres in Cambridge.
- HU finally announced that they owned the land when they felt they had all they needed. They said they kept it secret so people wouldn't raise the price when they knew it was Harvard.
- HU says it has no immediate plans for the land and will consult residents before any redevelopment.

Mayor Menino's Reaction:

- Mayor incensed and wants to know what Harvard plans to do with the land. Plans to create problems for HU through the Boston Redevelopment Authority if he doesn't like HU's redevelopment plans.

Tax Loss

- Boston Redevelopment Authority is worried about the lands going to non-profit status and being taken off the city's tax rolls.
- Currently the Allston property owned by HU generates \$1.5 million and year in taxes to the city of Boston.

Mayor's Expectations of Harvard

- He demands scholarships in exchange for HU's move to Boston
--Points out that other universities (Bentley and Simmons) already give more than Harvard in terms of scholarships for Boston residents.
- He says he wants HU to be more creative in the service they give to the city. Says HU doesn't give enough back in scholarships and service

Harvard's Reaction to Mayor

- HU says they are unlikely to heed Mayor's call for more scholarships because of their blind admissions policy which gives aid based on need rather than athletics, academics, or geography.
- HU says they do enough by making athletic facilities and museums available to the community. Also HU sponsors skating parties, youth hockey clinic, maintains 2 baseball diamonds, summer camp scholarships, financial support for local senior center and health center, and students participate in community service.
- Kevin McCluskey, Director of Community Relations at Harvard University, admitted HU was wrong in the way they bought the land. "For anyone to pretend there hasn't been a breach of trust, that's ridiculous. There has been."

Community Reaction (Columns and Editorials)

- "Harvard should also increase its current \$1.2 million payment in lieu of property taxes to Boston and its roughly \$1 million in scholarship aid to the city's public school students." --editorial Boston Globe
- "It wasn't fear of Allston's auto shop and asphalt company tycoons holding out for more money that made Harvard hide its hand....It was fear of being turned down flat." --Eileen McNamara, Boston Globe

Subject: work study

I just had a quick phone conversation with Maureen McLaughlin and Danny Madzelan from OPE. Madzelan is going to check on several items and get back to us.

1. In light of the guide on work study that we just released, it isn't clear whether it would make sense to do something specifically on summer work study. Janet, can you bring a copy of the new guide with you to the 2:30 meeting so we can all peruse and discuss this?

2. They aren't sure what proportion of FWS funds are used for summer activity now; we should probably figure out whether it's important to us to increase this as a strategy to promote use for reading activities. They wondered how much we had heard from the field that they were encountering difficulty in using FWS for summer activity.

3. Madzelan is going to get more info on how the reallocation provisions work. Sounds like there are two allocation provisions that are relevant:

a. One kicks in when approps run more than \$700-million; Sec can vary from basic formula to use 10% of funds to reward those schools that have large # of Pell Grant recipients who get degrees. This is set by statute.

b. The other kicks in when schools report what they will ultimately be reporting as unspent \$. Funds are redistributed on a pro-rata asis to schools that have spent at least 10% of funds on community service.

4. He is checking to see whether schools are benefited by turning back funds early, as we had heard.

5. He is investigating whether we could let schools keep unused funds that they have at the end of the year if they use 100% for community service/reading--instead of turning them back, where they might be used, say, 10 to 15% for community service. (Note that they already can carry forward/back 10% of funds year to year).

6. He is checking on whether schools can pay for travel time to high need areas.

William R. Kincaid

Jessica has suggested a few more ideas for policy announcements that we could do for a possible Reading/Work Study event. We think they are worth exploring further, and Bob has added another. Could folks put their heads together and work with the right people in OPE to flesh out what these might entail, whether they make sense policy-wise, and whether new legislation (say the HEA reauthorization) or regulations would be needed? There also may be other ideas that have already been developed in the HEA reauthorization process that would fit in well.

If any of these ideas make sense, and we could nail them down quickly, it would be good if we could add them into the revised scheduling request that Diane and others are working on. However, if this won't work timing-wise, then please go ahead and send us a revised scheduling proposal that reflects your best thinking on what we would do for a Boston event (we would really like to have something in hand) and then let us know as things develop with these or other policy ideas.

Thanks a lot.

Possibilities:

1. Figure out administratively how to make it easier for institutions and their community partners to do summer work study. (This is also something that Aaron Lieberman with Jumpstart mentioned when we met with him this week). Is this really necessary, would we have to make legislative changes? Should we recommend something for the reauthorization? Or do we just need to do more with TA--maybe we could issue a "how-to" guide? Bob says he thinks there is an issue about FICA and other expenses that don't apply during the school year--is this something that should be addressed?

2. Right now, apparently, schools that have leftover work study money towards the end of the year have incentives to de-obligate (right term?) the funds so as not to hurt their allocation for the next year. Would it make sense to provide some sort of avenue that would allow/encourage schools to retain unused FWS money later in the year, if they were to use it expressly for

[summer] reading? How would this differ from current law?

3. Reallocation provision--Apparently right now the reallocation provisions in FWS are not tied to reading (or community service, period). Would it make sense to target some of these funds toward [summer] reading? Would this require legislation?

4. Evidently current FWS provisions surrounding reimbursement for travel time may be a disincentive for students to travel far from campus, although some universities are located a fair distance from the communities that most need reading tutoring services. Should we explore making changes that would provide more incentives for students to engage in reading tutoring in low-income areas that may be distant from campus? Or would we lose too much in lost time-on-task to make this worthwhile? I think this is more of a school year issue than a summer issue.
