January 1995, found that 53 percent of 118 respondents had assisted in a patient's suicide. Assisting in suicide was defined as "prescription of a lethal dose of narcotics to a patient." The results appear in an article written by five San Francisco medical professionals in today's issue of the New England Journal of Medicine.

"Plan's Options Unclear to AIDS Patients"

Philadelphia Inquirer (02/06/97) P. B1; Collins, Huntly

Although Pennsylvania's plan to begin moving AIDS patients on Medicaid into health maintenance organizations (HMOs) is slated to begin in eight days, patients have not yet been given a list of AIDS doctors from which to choose. About 100 AIDS activists gathered in South Philadelphia on Monday to protest the state's failure to provide doctor lists as it initiates its HealthChoices plan. The Welfare Department has thus agreed to publish a partial list of AIDS doctors, but Ronda Goldfein, an attorney with the AIDS Law Project of Pennsylvania, said that "without a comprehensive list, there is really no way for a client to compare the different HMOs and to know which one to go to." The variety of new treatment options available and the difficulty of treatment decisions makes an experienced doctor very important to a patient's health, noted Robert T. Schooley, of the University of Colorado.

"AIDS Patient's Right to Die in Limbo"

Miami Herald (02/05/97) P. 5B; Rozsa, Lori

Although AIDS patient Charles Hall won the right to an assisted suicide from Florida last week, the ruling has been appealed by state attorneys, preventing Hall from legally taking action. Lawyers for Hall and his doctor, Cecil McIver, have asked Palm Beach County Circuit Judge Lucy Brown to end the stay. Her decision is expected within a week. Hall is very ill, enduring his third bout of AIDS-related pneumonia, and says he just wants the decision about when to end his life to be his. However, the state attorneys argue that allowing Hall's assisted suicide would give other patients the same opportunity.

"Acquiring, Upgrading Plasma Collection Centers"

Investor's Business Daily (02/06/97) P. A4; Zmirak, John

Serologicals, a pharmaceutical company which collects antibodies from human blood plasma for other companies to use in the diagnosis and treatment of diseases like AIDS, rabies, and hepatitis, is thriving as the industry is placed under increased regulatory pressure. The firm locates, tests, and pays plasma donors in 42 centers across the country, searching primarily for "women with roots in the community," according to Serologicals CEO Harold Tenoso. In the last decade, the Food and Drug Administration has developed stricter regulations for the plasma and blood collection industry due to the risk of AIDS. "The mom-and-pop plasma facilities are finding it prohibitive to keep up with new regulations. Many of them are going up for sale--and Serological is buying," notes analyst David Steinberg of Volpe, Welty, and Co. The company added 16 new centers in 1994, three

in 1995, and 11 in 1996. For the third quarter ending Sept. 29, revenue was up to \$15.8 million from \$13.6 million the year before.

"AIDS and Blacks the Topic for Town Meeting Saturday"
Philadelphia Inquirer (02/06/97) P. B2

A town meeting to be held in North Philadelphia on Saturday will address the impact of AIDS on the African American community. The meeting, to be held at Deliverance Evangelist Church, will be cosponsored by Blacks Educating Blacks About Sexual Health Issues and radio station WDAS-AM, which will broadcast the discussion live. The meeting will include presentations about new AIDS treatments and services and will be followed by a candlelight procession.

"Immune Discovery Sheds Light on AIDS"
United Press International (02/05/97); Wasowicz, Lidia

A gene responsible for activating the immune system, which may also play a role in HIV infection, has been discovered and cloned by researchers at the Weizmann Institute of Science in Israel. The findings were reported in Wednesday's issue of the journal Nature. Drugs to block the gene, called NIK, may be able to inhibit unwanted immune responses. Lead study author David Wallach noted, "NIK activation is a crucial first step in triggering the immune response."

"Calif. Legislator Proposes Marijuana Research Center"
Reuters (02/05/97)

Democratic California state Senator John Vasconcellos plans to introduce a bill that will establish a state-funded research center to study the medical uses of marijuana and create a task force charged with developing a plan to provide the drug to those who need it for medical reasons. "If the federal government is unwilling to conduct real research to benefit sick and dying people, then California will," he said, citing the Clinton administration's opposition to the state's new medical marijuana law. Under the proposed legislation, a research center would be set up to conduct clinical trials of the drug as a treatment for chronic pain, nausea caused by chemotherapy, and other conditions.

"Testing of AIDS Drug Banned in S. Africa"
Xinhua News Agency (02/06/97)

The controversial anti-HIV drug Virodene P058 has been banned by South Africa's Medicines Control Council, according to a local paper in Johannesburg. The drug was found to contain the highly toxic industrial solvent dimethylformamide, which can cause deadly liver damage and cancer. Three researchers had told the cabinet two weeks ago that the drug had shown promise for curing AIDS.

"Whey to Go"
POZ (02/97) P. 102; Burroughs, Carola

Whey, a component of milk, is a popular diet supplement

among AIDS patients because it improves weight gain and provides a protein-rich energy boost while containing little lactose. Laboratory studies have shown that a new whey protein concentrate, called Immunocal, can inhibit HIV replication while also stimulating the production of glutathione, an amino acid that helps control progression of the virus. Small trials of the treatment in HIV-positive children and adults have demonstrated its benefit.

"Rapid Self Testing for HIV Infection"

Lancet (02/01/97) Vol. 349, No. 9048, P. 352; Merson, Michael H.; Feldman, Eric A.; Bayer, Ronald; et al.

The advent of HIV home test kits raised many complex issues recently, but the concept of a true self test for HIV raises even more. The implications of HIV self-testing at home (independent of an outside laboratory) for both individuals and public health must be considered before it is introduced, contend Dr. Michael H. Merson, of Yale University's medical school, and colleagues, in a Lancet commentary. A rapid self-test could largely increase access to HIV testing, the authors say, noting that survey results show that 30 percent of people would choose a home test, including 60 percent who have not been tested. Because such tests would be conducted separate from counseling services, which the Food and Drug Administration required for current home HIV tests, their benefits must be balanced against concerns about quality, use, and impact. The tests would have to be accurate, easy to administer, safe, and easy to read. The psychological responses to both positive and negative test results would also have to be better understood before a self-test is made available. The potential for misuse of rapid self tests--such as for forced testing or discrimination--must also be considered, as should the ethical concerns of cost and access to HIV treatment, the authors conclude.

treatments to patients with HIV. Hoping to gain a better understanding of HIV's ability to develop drug resistance, the project will involve collecting and analyzing the DNA of mutated HIV strains from thousands of patients and trying to link the efficacy of current drugs to the variations of the virus. The results would be entered in a database, which physicians could use to plan antiviral treatment for their patients. Glaxo's leading position in the AIDS market is threatened by Merck, which makes the protease inhibitor Crixivan, as well as Roche Holding and Abbott Laboratories, which market packages of protease inhibitors and diagnostic tests to monitor treatment progress.

"FY 1998: Winners and Losers: HHS"

Under the President's proposed budget for fiscal 1998, funding for the Department of Health and Human Services would increase 7 percent from \$351 billion in fiscal 1997 to \$376 billion. Medicare funding would increase about 8 percent to \$207.7 billion, while Medicaid would rise 7.4 percent to \$105.8 billion. The budget for the National Institutes of Health, moreover, would increase 2.6 percent to \$13.1 billion. Funding for the Ryan White AIDS assistance program, credited with helping lower AIDS-related deaths in New York, would increase \$40 million to more than \$1 billion.

"Fear of Disease Has Consumers Resorting to Germ Warfare"

Wall Street Journal (02/07/97) P. A1; Parker-Pope, Tara

To ease society's rising anxiety about disease, a plethora of new products claiming to offer protection from bacteria and germs is being developed. Antibacterial toys, soaps, cleaning products, and cat litter are finding a receptive market in fearful consumers. "The soap kills bacteria, things that cause flu, maybe AIDS," says Manhattan resident Rozalia Racek of Palmolive Ultra antibacterial dish soap. Health officials note, however, that antibacterial products are only effective against bacteria and do not protect against HIV. News of outbreaks of tuberculosis, cholera, and E. coli have increased consumer awareness and fear. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention warned in Science magazine in April 1994 that the country was not properly prepared to detect and monitor infectious diseases. The popularity of "antibacterial" products has some experts concerned that the use of such products could result in a strain of resistant bacteria.

"Pot as Medicine"

Washington Post (02/07/97) P. A23; Krauthammer, Charles

The California initiative to legalize marijuana for medical uses was promoted as an effort to help the terminally ill, but it is being used by others to allow the recreational use of the drug, contends Charles Krauthammer in a Washington Post commentary. He cites clients at cannabis buyers' clubs who are not terminally ill but say they have been diagnosed with other less serious ailments, including migraines, insomnia, and stress. Krauthammer also casts doubt on the medical benefits of the drug,

even for the terminally ill, suggesting that the high provided by marijuana is its only unique effect. He argues that better and safer drugs are available for patients with glaucoma, AIDS, and cancer, but he concedes that terminally ill patients should be able to use any drug they wish, but in supervised medical settings only.

"Across the USA: Illinois"

USA Today (02/07/97) P. 10A

The number of AIDS cases in Illinois increased slightly in 1996, after decreasing for two consecutive years, health officials report. Last year, 2,212 people were diagnosed with AIDS in the state.

"Mississippi Widow Urges AIDS Disclosure Law"

Journal of Commerce (02/07/97) P. 8A

The widow of a man who had HIV but was not told why a Mississippi life insurance company denied him coverage urged lawmakers on Wednesday to pass a bill requiring such disclosures. Although tests ordered by Jackson National Life Insurance showed that Frank Deramus was infected with HIV in 1988, the company did not disclose the result until nine days before his death in 1991, Judy Deramus said. However, according to a federal judge's ruling, the company was not legally bound to reveal why it found him medically unsuitable for coverage. The proposed legislation would require companies to reveal certain results to the "applicant, client, or other such person who the insurance company knows to have the disease."

"Digest: Medimmune"

Washington Post (02/07/97) P. G2

Medimmune, a Gaithersburg, MD, company that develops and markets treatments for infectious diseases, reported a \$10.7 million loss for the fourth quarter compared to a \$8.6 million loss a year earlier. The loss was attributed to increased sales costs and increased spending on research and development.

"Brazil Records 50,000 AIDS Cases"

Xinhua News Agency (02/06/97)

As of December 1996, Brazil had recorded 50,000 AIDS cases, a much higher figure than expected, the Health Ministry said Thursday. Not included in the number were patients seeking care from private doctors who did not report all cases to health officials. The Health Ministry pledged to spend \$240 million this year in the fight against AIDS.

"No Will, No Way"

POZ (02/97) P. 25

Donna Shalala, secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services, has been criticized by leading AIDS researchers for misrepresenting the results of six studies which revealed that needle exchange programs are effective. The ban on such programs remains, Shalala explains, due to the high standard set by Congress for lifting it. The requirements say that needle

exchanges must reduce both HIV transmission and drug abuse. Needle-exchange researcher Peter Lurie of the University of California points out that the two restrictions are made in two different laws and that Shalala could release the funds governed by the less restrictive language--the 1992 Labor/Health and Human Services Act, which requires needle exchanges to be shown only to "not increase" the amount of drug use. Lurie suggests that Shalala could "fund needle exchanges through the community mental-health block grants or any other program governed by the less restrictive appropriations act language." He claims, however, that "she does not have the will."

"New Weapons Against AIDS--At a Price"

Kiplinger's Personal Finance (02/97) Vol. 51, No. 2, P. 102;

Clark, Jane Bennett

Jacques Chambers, a benefits advisor to AIDS patients at AIDS Project Los Angeles, reports that an increasing number of patients are seeking information about going off disability and returning to work--a movement attributed to the benefits of protease inhibitors. Although the new drugs are not effective for everyone and are also very costly, their dramatic results for many are creating a sense of optimism in the AIDS community. The best insurance coverage for the drugs is provided by fee-for-service plans or preferred-provider plans with a prescription plan, according to John Fortin of Foster Higgins, a benefits consulting firm in New York City. Medicaid and state drug-assistance programs provide alternatives, but they also impose income and other restrictions. Meanwhile, although returning to work may offer the best way for AIDS patients to secure affordable health insurance coverage, concerns about losing benefits and having outdated job skills still plague many people making this decision. These worries, however, are still considered a vast improvement over their outlook before taking the drugs.

"H.I.V. Testing for Newborns Debated Anew"

New York hospitals had been testing newborns for HIV anonymously for several years, but starting this month, the test

results will be disclosed to their mothers, reopening the long debate over the practice. The new mandatory disclosure policy means that hospitals are required to locate and counsel the mothers weeks after they leave the hospital. The issue is especially sensitive because a newborn's positive HIV test also reveals the mother's infection. Because test results take weeks, hospitals now are concerned with informing mothers that the tests are being conducted. The law aims to identify infected newborns and offer early treatment to enhance their chances for survival.

"Medical Researchers Hope to See Funding Figures Rise"

Washington Post (02/10/97) P. A17; Weiss, Rick

Health and Human Services Secretary Donna E. Shalala presented a proposed FY 1998 budget of \$375.8 billion last week, and an analysis by Washington Post staff writer Rick Weiss says that the upcoming fiscal year promises to be reasonably fruitful for those who work in the biomedical sciences. That sense comes not from the budget figures, but from an awareness that biomedical research enjoys enormous respect in Congress, Weiss wrote. President Clinton can lowball his requests in this area, knowing Congress will increase the figures in the process of finalizing the budget, according to the article. The budget proposal includes a 2.6 overall increase in the National Institutes of Health budget, to \$13.1 billion, and a corresponding 2.6 increase in its AIDS funding to \$1.54 billion. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention budget request is for \$2.3 billion, a \$14 million increase. This figure includes \$634 million for HIV prevention, a \$17 million increase. Funds will target HIV prevention for intravenous drug users, who account for 25 percent of all new AIDS cases each year.

"Florida Board Votes to Oppose Physician-Assisted Suicide"

Following a Florida circuit court ruling that last week cleared the way for a doctor to assist in the suicide of AIDS patient Charles E. Hall, the state's Board of Medicine voted against the practice on Saturday. The panel's decision means that Hall's doctor, Cecil McIver, could face medical disciplinary action even though he would be free from criminal prosecution.

"Nationline: Medical Marijuana"

An offer by California physicians to settle a suit filed against the federal government in order to avoid punishment for recommending marijuana to patients with cancer and AIDS has been rejected. Federal officials have opposed a new state law permitting the medical use of the drug and have threatened to sanction doctors who prescribe it.

"Chemist Is USA's Guardian of Grass"

On a seven-acre site at the University of Mississippi, chemistry professor Mahmoud ElSohly directs the U.S. government's only legal marijuana farm, which produces the crop for research and for distribution to eight chronically ill patients across the country. ElSohly, who has studied the drug extensively, says he opposes the medical use of marijuana. The farm illustrates how marijuana might be supplied for distribution to patients who qualify under new state medical marijuana laws, but the federal government has opposed such policies.

"Illinois AIDS Cases Edge Upward; African-Americans Hit Hardest"

Chicago Tribune (02/07/97) P. 1-7; Pearson, Rick

The number of new AIDS cases in Illinois rose 1 percent in 1996, bringing the total number of reported cases in the state over the last 15 years to 18,528, the sixth highest in the country. New AIDS cases among African Americans and Hispanics, who make up 25 percent of the state's population, accounted for 68 percent of the 2,212 new cases reported. In 1995, a slight decrease in new AIDS cases was reported in the state, leading health officials to suspect the AIDS rate was leveling off.

"Red Cross Says Public Paid Legal Fees"

Toronto Globe and Mail (02/07/97) P. A4; McIlroy, Anne

The Canadian Blood Agency, which provides funding to the Red Cross each year on behalf of the provinces, claims that the charity used the money to defend itself in the federal inquiry into the country's tainted-blood tragedy. The Red Cross says that taxpayers are paying the organization's legal fees. Groups representing those who contracted HIV from infected blood products say the debate raises serious questions of responsibility and fairness. The Red Cross has reported spending C\$10.5 million on court challenges to stop the federal inquiry placing blame for the tragedy.

"Panels to Develop Standards for Antiviral Therapy, Viral-Load Testing"

AIDS Alert (02/97) Vol. 12, No. 2, P. 13

Aiming to reduce the confusion surrounding AIDS therapy, two government panels are working on establishing the first government-approved guidelines for antiviral therapy and viral-load testing. One panel, established by the U.S. Public Health Service and chaired by Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute for Allergy and Infectious Diseases, and Johns Hopkins University researcher Dr. John Bartlett, will develop standards for antiviral therapy based on the viral load testing standards developed by the second panel. The second group was created by the National Institutes of Health and is chaired by Dr. Charles Carpenter of Brown University. The recommendations of both groups are expected to be published by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's

Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report in February. With new AIDS drugs available, adding to the number of possible combination therapies, AIDS organizations have been calling for the guidelines to be released as soon as possible.

"The Outsiders"

Spin (02/97) Vol. 12, No. 11, P. 76; Green, Frank

On the perimeter of the AIDS community, the Health Education AIDS Liaison, or HEAL, has grown from an information source on alternative therapies into an anti-establishment AIDS organization, challenging most accepted beliefs about AIDS and the efforts of other AIDS groups. Founded in New York in 1982, HEAL chapters have since been established around the globe. The group advocates minimal treatment for HIV infection, arguing that AIDS is the result of the "psychological terrorism" created by the AIDS community, according to HEAL's science advisor Frank Buianouckas. Therapist Michael Ellner, who helped develop HEAL's philosophy in the 1980s, says the psychological patterns he saw in HIV patients led him to believe that AIDS is caused by "a positive test result." Bob Lederer, senior editor of Poz, a magazine for people affected by HIV and AIDS, claims that HEAL may be undermining safer sex education by arguing that HIV is not transmitted sexually. Ellner counters that HEAL is not "against safe sex, we're against the impression that everybody is at risk for AIDS." HEAL is gaining acceptance outside the United States, but the group's ideas are seen as dangerous among most Americans. "They call us fanatics," says Brooklyn HEAL chapter founder Orville Nelson, "but when you learn the facts, you start to wonder who the real fanatics are."

"American Home Unit Gets Approval to Sell Clot Drug"
Wall Street Journal (02/13/97) P. B2

The Food and Drug Administration has approved the first hemophilia B clotting factor that is not derived from human blood, a product developed by American Home Products' Genetics Institute. Because it is made without blood products, the new treatment, BeneFix, eliminates the risk of patients contracting viruses and other pathogens. The conventional treatment for hemophilia B, a rare inherited disease, is infusions of Factor

IX, a blood-clotting protein made from human blood and treated to reduce the risk of disease. BeneFix will cost about 7 percent more than Factor IX, or an average of \$20,000 to \$25,000 per patient per year.

"Band Still Plays on in Gay Community"

Wall Street Journal (02/13/97) P. A19; Socarides, Charles W.

In a Wall Street Journal letter to the editor, Dr. Charles W. Socarides reiterates his claim, made in a previous commentary in the newspaper, that the spread of HIV among young gay men can be curbed by treating homosexuality with psychotherapy. The author cites the high-risk behavior of young homosexual men, as well as the report in Clinical Psychiatry News that an estimated "30 percent of all 20-year-old gay men will be HIV-positive or dead of AIDS by the time they are age 30." Socarides contends that psychotherapy can help men who experience unwanted homosexual attraction, thus protecting them from possible infection. People who advocate gay rights undermine efforts to provide this life-saving treatment, he concludes.

"Panel Votes for Extension of Drug-Needle Program"

Washington Times--Metropolitan Times (02/12/97) P. C4; Scully, Sean

An experimental needle-exchange program in Baltimore, which costs the state \$320,000 a year, should be continued indefinitely, a state Senate committee voted on Tuesday. The three-year-old program offers clean needles to illegal drug users in an attempt to curb the spread of AIDS. Advocates of the program say it has prevented 84 people from contracting HIV over the past three years, based on lower transmission rates among drug users in the program. State Sen. Paula Hollinger, a Democrat representing Baltimore, noted that the state was saved \$120,000 a year in AIDS care costs for each person. The bill, which will soon be considered by both the House and the Senate, is likely to face a heated debate.

"AIDS-Causing Virus Not Only One to Lurk for Years Before Striking"

Richmond Times-Dispatch (02/13/97) P. E3; Brody, Jane

The hepatitis C virus (HCV), like HIV, can cause serious damage to the body for years before patients know they are infected. While lurking in the body, before symptoms are shown, hepatitis C can disrupt liver functions, leading to serious damage, organ failure, and even cancer. The virus, spread mostly through blood, claims more lives than hepatitis A and B combined. No cure exists for HCV, and even if it is treated soon after infection, it is still likely to cause chronic liver damage. HCV is most commonly transmitted through intravenous drug needles. Needle exchange programs could help reduce the spread of the hepatitis C as well as HIV. However, HCV can also be spread through sexual contact, and people with multiple sex partners are at especially high risk. People who know they are infected are thus advised to use condoms, avoid sharing toothbrushes, or razors, and keep cuts covered.

"Dr. Burzynski and His Patients"

Washington Post (02/13/97) P. A24; Childers, Gloria B.

In response to a Washington Post article about Dr. Stanislaw Burzynski, who provides controversial antineoplastic drugs to terminally ill patients, Gloria B. Childers defends his methods in a letter to the editors of the Post. She points out that while Burzynski has been the subject of four grand jury investigations, he has never been indicted. She also contends that the standards set by the Food and Drug Administration for clinical trials of the treatment are unreasonable. Childers emphasizes that, while the FDA allows patients with cancer and AIDS to obtain unapproved drugs from other countries, the agency will not allow Burzynski's drug to be distributed beyond the state of Texas, where the FDA lacks jurisdiction.

"New Clues to Cause of Dementia in AIDS Sufferers"

Reuters (02/12/97); Bremer, Catherine

Researchers at the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute have reported findings that help to explain how HIV infects the brain and causes AIDS-related dementia. Between 20 percent and 30 percent of AIDS patients develop some type of brain disease, causing symptoms like memory loss and loss of bodily function. The researchers, led by Dana Gabuzda, reported in the journal Nature that the CCR3 and CCR5 receptors in the brain could enhance HIV's ability to infect the central nervous system. The researchers found that patients with defective CCR5 showed resistance to HIV-1, suggesting that this receptor is important in HIV infection. The study identified CCR3's role in HIV infection for the first time, which could lead to new treatment strategies.

"Science & Health Bulletin: Zimbabwe--AIDS"

Zimbabwe's government is establishing a national code of practice on AIDS to make AIDS discrimination illegal. Under the new policy, employees with HIV or AIDS would be protected from job discrimination. "We know some people have lost their jobs because they were HIV-positive and we want to put a stop to this," said the National Employment Council for the Transport Operators Industry. Over 1 million people in the country of 11.5 million are estimated to be infected with HIV.

"Science & Health Bulletin: Mozambique--AIDS"

Recent statistics about the HIV epidemic in Mozambique disprove the claim of a Muslim cleric who said AIDS was God's punishment for homosexuality. New reports that for the period up to November 1996 show that most HIV cases in the country were contracted through heterosexual contact. A total of 3,635 AIDS cases had been recorded up to that time, including 1,853 males, 1,519 females, and 263 cases in which the sex was not identified.

"Politics Polarizing Issues in Needle-Exchange Study"

Scientist (02/03/97) Vol. 11, No. 3, P. 1; Benowitz, Steven

Despite numerous studies that show the effectiveness of needle-exchange programs for reducing the spread of disease and estimated public support of such programs, the U.S. government refuses to lift a ban on federal funding for the programs. The government contends that there is no conclusive evidence that needle exchanges both reduce incidence of disease and do not promote drug use. However, a controversial trial in Alaska, which would compare the efficacy of providing access to syringes through needle exchanges and at pharmacies, would also attempt to determine if access to clean needles encourages drug use. Ethical and scientific concerns have been raised about the University of Alaska, Anchorage study, which was allowed to continue with the December approval of a federally-appointed panel of scientists. The three-year trial will compare the rates of hepatitis B virus among participants who use clean needles through exchange programs to those who obtain them at pharmacies. But bioethicist Arthur Caplan, of the University of Pennsylvania, says the study is a "\$2.4 million waste," and that Congress is using it as a way to put off the issue, rather than deal with it. For many scientists, the study illustrates the problems that arise when politics is involved in the funding of scientific studies. According to Robert Heimer of Yale University's medical school, the federal ban represents a "blatant example of science not being able to change policy and of policy made without consideration of science."

"Down But Not Out"

Village Voice (02/04/97) Vol. 42, No. 5, P. 44; Schoofs, Mark

Research presented at the recent AIDS meeting in Washington, D.C., gave new promise to the possibility that the immune system may be able to renew itself after HIV infection. French researcher Brigitte Autran reported results of her study of eight patients who exhibited a critical third phase of immune response. Although researchers had suspected that HIV could kill all the T cells generated by the immune system for certain diseases, leaving the body defenseless against opportunistic infections, Autran found that, after at least six months of therapy, levels of these cells increased dramatically. Other research presented at the meeting suggested that, while drug therapy is only effective for a short time after a patient's lymph tissue has been seriously damaged, some damage may be reversed if the therapy is started while the lymph tissue is still relatively healthy. The immune system may not need to recover completely, researchers noted, pointing out that new drug therapy has had dramatic results, even in patients with PML, which causes lesions in the brain and is incurable.

"Panel Asserts Politics Hurts AIDS Fight"

Effective initiatives against AIDS--including needle exchange

programs, explicit safer sex education for teens, and drug treatment programs--are often blocked by misguided political and social objections, a panel of experts chosen by a National Institutes of Health (NIH) panel reported Thursday. After reviewing the scientific findings on various behavioral strategies, the 12-member group concluded that "the behavior placing the public health at greatest risk may be occurring in legislative and other decision-making bodies." The panel's criticism of sex education programs that focus only on abstinence brought disagreement from some legislators and conservative organizations. "The reasons why kids become sexually active and why HIV is a problem now ... have to do with our cultural atmosphere of saying sex within the teenage years is not just permissible but absolutely normal," said Gracie Hsu of the Family Research Council.

"HIV-Resistant Kenyans Spur Vaccine Hopes"

Washington Times (02/14/97) P. A13; Orr, David

A group of about 40 prostitutes in Majengo, Kenya, who are apparently resistant to HIV infection, are providing clues to researchers hoping to develop an AIDS vaccine. Researchers from the University of Nairobi, the University of Washington, the University of Manitoba in Canada, and Oxford University are collaborating to map the women's genes in an attempt to uncover what offers them protection from the virus. "We are taking blood from the HIV-negative women and their relatives, as well as from some women who have tested positive," says Dr. Ephantus Njagi of Majengo's clinic for sex workers. He explained that the researchers "believe some women have a genetic makeup which enables them to produce something which kills off the virus. Eventually we hope it will be possible to produce a vaccine which will immunize people against AIDS." Of the nearly 1,900 sex workers treated at the clinic over the past 10 years, some 400 have died of AIDS and more than 90 percent are infected with HIV. Although condoms are provided for free, only an estimated 70 percent of the prostitutes use them.

"Obituary: Thomas Stoddard, 48, Dies; An Advocate of Gay Rights"

Thomas Stoddard, a lawyer who battled discrimination against gay men, lesbians, and people with AIDS, died of AIDS Wednesday at age 48. He had served as executive director of the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund in New York, seeking equal rights for homosexuals and AIDS patients in employment, housing, health care, insurance, family law, and military service. AIDS cases made up one-fifth of those handled by Lambda when Stoddard took over in 1986, and grew to nearly 50 percent in 1988. Stoddard learned that he had Kaposi's sarcoma, an AIDS-related cancer, in 1989. He later joined the board of the American Foundation for AIDS Research, and attended the first White House AIDS conference in December 1995, as well as the 11th International AIDS conference in Vancouver, British Columbia, last year.

"Used-Needle Exchange Gets House Support"

The Maryland House of Delegates voted Thursday to extend indefinitely a three-year-old needle-exchange program in Baltimore aiming to curb the spread of HIV among injection drug users. While opponents of the measure argued that the program condones illegal drug use, supporters noted that the exchange had been more successful than expected in reducing HIV transmission and helping drug users seek treatment. The state Senate has given preliminary approval to its version of the bill.

"Across the USA: Florida, Missouri"

AIDS-related deaths in Florida decreased for the first time last year, falling from 4,381 in 1995 to 3,296 in 1996. The decline was reported across all ethnic groups and in both sexes. Meanwhile, in Missouri, the state AIDS program has a \$700,000 surplus that it is unable to spend by the end of the fiscal year on March 31. AIDS advocates say officials have not spent the money because they overspent by \$1.6 million in 1995.

"Policy Paper, Califano Speech at Odds"

In a recent speech at the Heritage Foundation, Joseph A. Califano Jr., director of the National Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse at Columbia University, called for a "move, front and center, to combat substance abuse and addiction." He estimated that substance abuse and addiction cost society \$400 billion a year by contributing to such problems as crime, violence, welfare dependency, and the spread of HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases. Meanwhile, a draft copy of the Clinton administration's 1997 drug strategy suggested that the government's war on drugs approach was no longer effective and that drug use should be treated as a chronic problem rather than one that can be ultimately defeated. Robert S. Weiner, spokesman for the National Drug Control Policy, said the draft was outdated and that the portrayal of the war on drugs as "unwinnable" has been dropped. Philanthropist George Soros has supported an end to the war on drugs, claiming in a recent Washington Post commentary that it is "doing more harm to our society than drug abuse itself." Soros has also advocated programs to make drug treatment and sterile needles available to addicts.

"House Committee OKs Needles-For-Addicts Bill"

A House panel in Colorado has voted in favor of a controversial bill that would aim to curb the spread of HIV by giving drug addicts in the state legal access to clean needles. Health officials supported the measure, citing the success of similar programs in other states. "Over three-fourths of the HIV-infected children in the state are infected as a result of injection drug users," Dr. Ellen Mangione of Colorado's Department of Public Health told the committee. Denver police spokesman Tony Lombard voiced his opposition to the bill, but Mangione and others cited five national studies of 100 needle exchanges in 20 states which have shown that the programs reduce

HIV transmission among injection drug users but do not cause a significant rise in drug use.

"Editorial: Needle Exchanges Save Lives"

A bill before the Colorado legislature to allow needle exchange programs would save both lives and money, according to a Denver Post editorial. The editors point out that injection drug users reportedly account for half of all new HIV cases and that an additional 20 percent of new cases are linked to the sex partners of drug users. The bill, sponsored by state Sen. Joan Johnson and Rep. Alice Nichol, both Democrats from Adams County, would allow free needle exchanges in the state. The authors cite five national studies, including those by the National Academy of Sciences and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, which have shown that needle exchanges reduce HIV transmission but do not increase drug use. Additionally, the state could save \$119,000 per patient in Medicaid costs for each person who does not contract HIV, the editors note. In conclusion, the authors applaud the Colorado House Judiciary Committee for passing the measure, and they encourage the full legislature to do the same.

"A Mother's Agony"

Janet Conners, of Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, lost her husband, a hemophiliac, to AIDS three years ago, after he contracted HIV through a tainted blood transfusion in 1986. After intense lobbying by Conners and her husband, the Nova Scotia government agreed in 1993 to financially compensate hemophiliacs who contracted HIV from tainted blood products. Although she is now ill with the disease herself, Conners continues to pursue the truth behind the Canadian tainted blood tragedy. "Nobody has taken any accountability through any of this," she said, commenting specifically on the news that federal health officials had destroyed documentation of the Canadian Blood Committee. While trying to maintain her vigilance, Conners is also trying to maintain her health. She has added a protease inhibitor to her drug treatment. She is also raising her 16-year-old son, which she says involves "trying to cram in a lot of mothering in the time I have left."

"Physician-Assisted Suicide and Patients With Human Immunodeficiency Virus Disease"

Researchers conducted a survey of AIDS specialists in San Francisco to assess both attitudes about physician-assisted suicide for AIDS patients and the prevalence of the practice. (Participation in a physician-assisted suicide was defined as prescribing a lethal dose of narcotics.) Between November 1994 and January 1995, Lee R. Slome, a private practitioner in San Francisco, and colleagues, surveyed 118 doctors in the Community Consortium, an association of health care providers for HIV

patients in the area. In response to a sample case, 48 percent of the respondents said they would be likely or very likely to assist in an AIDS patient's suicide, compared to just 28 percent in 1990. Fifty-three percent of the respondents said they had granted the request of an AIDS patient for suicide assistance on at least one occasion. The authors noted that selection bias may have influenced the study, as physicians who had more interest or experience with assisted suicide were more likely to respond.
