Draft Statement by The President
on Receiving the National AIDS Strategy

PRINTER FONT 12_POINT_ROMAN

I am pleased today to receive the first

-ever National AIDS

Strategy. In the fifteen years of this epidemic, we have never had such a unified strategy. This Strategy represents an important milestone in the history of the fight to defeat this epidemic.

The National Strategy reiterates our administration's and our nation's commitment to winning the battle against AIDS. It establishes six major goals for our national efforts: to find a cure and a vaccine; to reduce new HIV infections; to assure people living with HIV and AIDS access to high

-quality care; to fight AIDS

-related discrimination at every turn; to lead the global fight to end AIDS; and to translate our research advances into treatment as quickly as possible.

These goals will help to guide our work in the coming term, and more specifically in the coming year. We have made significant progress in the last four years. Researchers working toward a cure and a vaccine are reporting encouraging news and giving us hope. New treatments, approved by the FDA in record time, are producing some very encouraging results in terms of the quality of people's lives and the potential for extending the length of life.

This progress results from more than a decade of investment in AIDS research, prevention, and care. I am very proud that in the four budgets my Administration has produced, funding for AIDS programs has increased by 55 percent. We have also strengthened the Office of AIDS Research at NIH and tripled funding for AIDS drug assistance programs.

Despite this progress, we must recognize that the AIDS epidemic is not over. Far too many of our sons and daughters are losing their lives to this terrible epidemic every day. AIDS is a disease, and we have conquered diseases before. We will win the battle against HIV and AIDS, but doing so requires an alliance of the heart and mind that brings together all Americans in a common goal. I know the hearts and minds of this nation are prepared to win this fight. I believe we have taken yet another step forward in that battle today.

As part of a study to determine whether the new AIDS drugs can rid the body of HIV, 21 subjects in a study led by Dr. David Ho are being asked to stop taking the drugs that have helped them fight off disease. Critics say the move is an attempt by Ho to generate publicity for himself and the Aaron Diamond AIDS Research Center which he heads. The experiment could also threaten the health of his patients and falsely raise hopes of others with HIV. Ho defends himself, noting, "We are asking critical questions that need to be asked, pushing the virus as hard as we can, probably harder than anyone else." Many of the patients involved in the trial have gone a whole year without detectable virus in their blood. None have agreed to go off the therapy yet, but the researchers will continue to ask them periodically. Ho argues that if the virus reappears the patients can resume drug therapy.

"Gays' Cases Help to Explain Immigration Rights"

The expansion of asylum conditions to include homosexuality and HIV infection as grounds for approval has spurred controversy and debate. Since 1994, more than 60 foreigners have been given asylum based on persecution because of their homosexuality and at least two heterosexuals have also been granted asylum based on persecution because they were HIV-positive. Critics of the new conditions argue that they go against the original intent of the system, which was to give temporary refuge to people who were in the United States when it was too dangerous for them to return to their native country. A decision by the Clinton administration to consider HIV infection as a possible condition for asylum is especially controversial, because a 1993 law banned the immigration of anyone with HIV or AIDS. "We're telling HIV-positive people that you're not allowed to come to the United States, but if you manage to sneak in, we'll give you asylum based on the characteristic that would have made you excludable," commented Mark Krikorian, director of the Center for Immigration Studies.

"President's AIDS 'Strategy' Offers Call to Arms, Few New Weapons"

The first national strategy against AIDS will be released by President Clinton today, calling for continued research funding and better cooperation among anti-AIDS programs. Detractors say the plan is only a restating of old ideas, and lacks dramatic proposals for change. The report does not address the controversial ban of federal funding for needle-exchange programs, for example. However, the plan does call for stronger federal support of new drugs, an AIDS vaccine, prevention efforts, patient care, and protection against discrimination.

"AIDS Fears Prompt 'Sex Strike' in Brazil"

The women of Palestina, a small town in Brazil, have begun a "sex strike" to combat the spread of HIV. The women promised to stop having sex with their husbands and boyfriends until their partners take an HIV test. The movement was sparked after a 30-year-old man with HIV was found to have had unprotected sex with at least two women in the town.

William Calvert, the public health worker in Florida who admitted using a government database of HIV-infected people for the purpose of screening his dates, will be allowed to resign. Calvert was fired in October, but appealed his firing. Health officials note, however, that the appeal process would have been expensive.

Faye and Dave Chitty, of St. Charles, Miss., cared for Faye's brother Mike Sohn for the last three months of his life before he died of AIDS. Moved by his brother-in-law's illness and death, Dave Chitty has since become certified as a massage therapist and has so far provided free therapy to four AIDS patients. The Chittys have also become active in AIDS support groups and serve as co-sponsors of the AIDS Family Group, which serves families who have lost loved ones to the disease.

"Beyond the Birds and Bees"

"Sex and Other Matters of Life and Death," a documentary to be aired tonight on PBS, traces a year in the life of a group of teen-age actors who visit schools and community groups to provide sex education in the form of drama. The program, called Star Theater, was founded by Dr. Cydelle Berlin and is part of the Adolescent AIDS Program at Mount Sinai Hospital. The program includes a session with the actors, who remain in character and answer questions from the audience. Some of the actors are HIV-positive themselves, including Berlin's daughter, who has AIDS.

"Earth Week: Deep-Sea Cures"

Houston Chronicle (12/16/96) P. 7C

Researchers in search of new drug candidates to treat AIDS, cancer, Alzheimer's, and other disorders have begun exploring the oceans near the Bahamas. Using a high-tech submersible from Florida's Harbor Beach Oceanographic Institute, the scientists are collecting algae and other organisms that may produce unique chemical compounds. Previously, researchers isolated a group of compounds called topsentins from sea organisms that may be useful as a treatment for arthritis.

"Randomized Trial of MNrgp120 HIV-1 Vaccine in Symptomless HIV-1 Infection"

Lancet (12/07/96) Vol. 348, No. 9041, P. 1547; Eron, Joseph J., Jr.; Ashby, Mark A.; Giordano, Michael F.; et al.

Disease progression varies among HIV-infected patients, possibly because of differences in immune response. Previous research has suggested that a vaccine based on the recombinant envelope glycoprotein 120 (rgp 120) may have the potential to elicit antibodies capable of neutralizing HIV-1. Dr. Joseph J. Eron, Jr., of the University of North Carolina's AIDS Clinical Trial Unit, and colleagues, tested an envelope subcomponent vaccine (MNrgp120) in asymptomatic HIV-positive patients to determine if the vaccine could slow disease progression. Among the 573 patients enrolled in the study, 89 percent had detectable HIV RNA at the start. After 15 months, no significant difference in CD4 decline or viral load was found between the vaccine recipients and placebo recipients. The incidence of HIV-related clinical events was also similar for the two groups. The researchers concluded that the vaccine did not affect disease progression in infected individuals.

"No Stones Unturned in Major Push to Develop Microbicides"
AIDS Alert (12/96) Vol. 11, No. 12, P. 133

The U.S. government has pledged to spend \$100 million over the next four years on the development of anti-HIV microbicides, which will give women more options to protect themselves from the virus that causes AIDS. The female condom is the only such product now available, and, while new alternatives are in the research pipeline, they could take years to reach the market. New diaphragms and cervical caps are in development at the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, but these methods are not expected to provide complete protection against viral infections. Chemical barriers are more attractive than physical barriers because they are easy to use and unobtrusive, and non-contraceptive types can protect women from disease while allowing them to become pregnant. As preliminary research, government scientists are studying whether spermicides, which have shown anti-HIV activity in laboratory tests, can protect women from the virus. Acid-buffering agents, which alter the pH level of the vagina, are also promising because HIV does not survive as long when pH levels are lowered. Daily vaginal suppositories, designed to lower pH by raising levels of natural vaginal microflora, are also under development.

"Entertainer, Denied Job Because He Had H.I.V., Settles Case"

A man who was hired to entertain for a cruise line, but was rejected after he tested positive for HIV, will receive a \$90,000 settlement in the case. A condition of the settlement also prevents the employer from screening for the virus. The suit, filed by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, argued that the Americans with Disabilities Act bars discrimination based on a disability. Dolphin Cruise Line and American Entertainment Productions, a company that recruits entertainers, claimed, however, that the worker was a threat to the ship's passengers and crew because he would be in close contact with them. A Federal District Court ruled that the defendants did not show that "the health risk posed in the particular work environment is significant."

"Charities Debate Strategy of a Limited Time Span for Gifts"
New York Times (12/19/96) P. B12; Tollerson, Ernest

Many U.S. charities, including New York's Aaron Diamond Foundation, plan from the beginning to reduce their assets each year for a scheduled number of years. This strategy has, in turn, spurred public debate about the most effective use of charitable spending. The Aaron Diamond Foundation will expire at the end of this year, keeping with its plan to spend its more than \$200 million within 10 years on projects that include a leading AIDS research center. The foundation, established by real estate developer Aaron Diamond and his wife Irene, was created with "a feeling if we stuck with our priorities and really hit hard with money, we would probably be able to make a difference," Irene said. The Aaron Diamond AIDS Research Center was created with a \$25 million investment from the foundation. However, if a more conservative amount had been invested, such as \$6.5 million to \$7 million annually, the center's leading research would have been delayed while it searched for other sources of support.

"Blood Center Provided HIV-Tainted Blood"
Washington Times (12/19/96) P. A9

A Milwaukee blood center admitted Wednesday that it provided HIV-tainted blood for a transfusion, and it blamed a blood donor for not revealing his high-risk behavior. The center called the failure of its screening process a "terrible tragedy."

"In N.J., People With AIDS Are Offered Free Legal Help"
Philadelphia Inquirer (12/19/96) P. B5; Lowe, Herbert

For people with HIV and AIDS who live in four South New Jersey counties, free legal services will be provided by the South Jersey HIV Law Project, a new partnership of three advocacy groups. "We finally will have dedicated services in New Jersey," said Ronda B. Goldfein, a staff attorney for the AIDS Law Project of Pennsylvania. The organization currently offers free legal service to 1,500 Philadelphia clients with AIDS or HIV each year. A grant for the new project will expire on April 1, but the group hopes to develop a network of lawyers in the area to provide continued legal services.

"Tainted-Blood Inquiry Ends After Three Years"

Toronto Globe and Mail (12/18/96) P. A12; McIlroy, Anne

The public hearings in Canada's inquiry into the country's tainted-blood tragedy ended Tuesday after three years. Many of the final submissions to the inquiry criticized the Canadian Red Cross Society, which has had nearly complete authority over the blood system since 1939. Speakers also questioned the potential role of the organization in the new blood system being designed by the government. Justice Horace Krever's report on the inquiry is due April 30.

"Science & Health Bulletin: Zimbabwe--Mortality Rises [Among Infants]"

PANA Wire Service (12/18/96)

The infant mortality rate in Zimbabwe is expected to increase by five times by the year 2005, while population growth is expected to drop by about 1.5 percent due to the spread of AIDS. A new report from the Zimbabwe National Family Planning Council attributed the dramatic increase in infant mortality to HIV infections. A total of 150,000 orphans are expected in the country by the year 2000. The fertility rate is also expected to decline as a result of AIDS.

"Science & Health Bulletin: Zambia--AIDS Call For [Cooperation in AIDS Battle]"

PANA Wire Service (12/18/96); Mulenga, Mildred

A coordinated approach to fighting AIDS is needed in Zambia, the country's deputy health minister Nkandu Luo recently announced. At a youth conference on peer education training, Luo said anti-AIDS efforts must include skills training and campaigns to fight poverty. "Even if people have [the] best information on AIDS, but they don't have food to eat or they are not involved in anything to bring them income, then we are not going to succeed in our efforts to prevent AIDS," she said.

"Lymph Node Cytokine Activity in HIV-1 Infection Described"

Reuters (12/18/96)

The lymph nodes are a site of immune activity during very early HIV-1 infection, researchers at Stanford University report in the journal AIDS. Clive M. Gray and colleagues evaluated the B- and T-cell phenotypes found in the lymph nodes of HIV-positive patients and found that these cells were prevalent in the lymph nodes. Gray suggested that the findings "underscore the role of B cells as antigen-presenting and their involvement in initiating primary immune responses to HIV-1."

"HIV Poised to Ravage Asia"

Journal of the American Medical Association (12/11/96) Vol. 276, No. 22, P. 1790

HIV is spreading at a rapid rate in Asia, and the continent could have up to 10 million HIV cases by 2000, the World Health Organization reports. If the number of infections in India reaches the 5 million expected by then, it would have the highest HIV incidence of any country worldwide. The WHO estimates that

around the world some 25.5 million adults and 2.4 million children are infected. Among them, 19 million are in sub-Saharan Africa, 5 million are in South and Southeast Asia, and 1.6 million are in Latin America. The number of infections in Africa is expected to peak by the end of this year, though WHO officials note that high-risk sexual behavior and a population larger than Africa's will fuel the epidemic in Asia.

"I'm OK, You're Not"

U.S. News & World Report (12/16/96) Vol. 121, No. 24, P. 24;
Whitman, David

Americans widely believe that while their own lives and communities are successful, the rest of the country is failing. This view that "we" are doing well, while "they" are not is "the most important and least comprehended aspect of public opinion," claims U.S. News & World Report pollster Ed Goeas. Such a perception causes voters to exaggerate national problems while overlooking local ones, creating a complacent society. In turn, this helps to explain why people continue to participate in risky behaviors like unsafe sex, smoking, and alcohol use despite pervasive warnings. Basketball star Earvin "Magic" Johnson writes in his autobiography, for example, that "when it came to denial, I was an expert. The information I needed to protect myself [from HIV] had been all around me. But I didn't pay attention. I didn't think it could happen to me." Furthermore, David McKirnan, a psychologist at the University of Illinois-Chicago, notes that, although AIDS awareness is high among gay men, high-risk behavior remains prevalent, especially among young gay men and minorities.

of each separate extramural grant, award, contract, or intramural project or activity by each involved agency under this initiative for the current fiscal year 1997 ('line by line and dime by dime'), and planned budget expenditure categories projected for the remaining years. "

PS. FYI, below is a news summary on the topic which appeared in the AIDS Daily Summary:

"No Stones Unturned in Major Push to Develop Microbicides"
AIDS Alert (12/96) Vol. 11, No. 12, P. 133

The U.S. government has pledged to spend \$100 million over the next four years on the development of anti-HIV microbicides, which will give women more options to protect themselves from the virus that causes AIDS. The female condom is the only such product now available, and, while new alternatives are in the research pipeline, they could take years to reach the market. New diaphragms and cervical caps are in development at the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, but these methods are not expected to provide complete protection against viral infections. Chemical barriers are more attractive than physical barriers because they are easy to use and unobtrusive, and non-contraceptive types can protect women from disease while allowing them to become pregnant. As preliminary research, government scientists are studying whether spermicides, which have shown anti-HIV activity in laboratory tests, can protect women from the virus. Acid-buffering agents, which alter the pH level of the vagina, are also promising because HIV does not survive as long when pH levels are lowered. Daily vaginal suppositories, designed to lower pH by raising levels of natural vaginal microflora, are also under development.

Coccidioidomycosis -- Arizona, 1990-1995

Coccidioidomycosis is a systemic infection caused by the inhalation of airborne arthroconidia from *Coccidioides immitis*, a soil-dwelling fungus found in the southwestern United States, parts of Mexico, and Central and South America (1). Clinical manifestations occur in approximately 40% of infected persons and may include mild influenza-like illness; severe pneumonia; and rarely, disseminated disease and death (2). During 1990-1995, the number of reported cases of coccidioidomycosis in Arizona increased by 144%. To characterize trends in and the impact of coccidioidomycosis in Arizona, the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS) analyzed surveillance, death-certificate, and hospital discharge data. This report summarizes the findings, which indicate that, during 1990-1995, coccidioidomycosis in Arizona disproportionately affected persons aged greater than or equal to 65 years and persons with human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection.

Surveillance

Surveillance data were compiled from the ADHS' General Communicable Disease Reporting System. In 1994, ADHS adopted the surveillance case definition for coccidioidomycosis proposed by the Council of State and Territorial Epidemiologists, which requires the presence of clinically compatible symptoms and laboratory evidence of infection* (3). Before 1994, ADHS relied solely on physician diagnosis of coccidioidomycosis and did not require laboratory confirmation. Incidence rates were calculated using 1990 census data adjusted to reflect Arizona's estimated annual population growth.

During 1980-1989, the annual number of reported cases of coccidioidomycosis in Arizona remained relatively stable (median: 211, range: 191-342) (Figure 1). During 1990-1995, a total of 2762 cases of coccidioidomycosis were reported to ADHS, and the annual number of reported cases increased from 255 (7.0 cases per 100,000 population) in 1990 to 623 (14.9 cases per 100,000 population) in 1995. The median age of case-patients was 51 years (range: less than 1 year-100 years), and most (1731 [63%]) occurred among males. Of the 2762 total cases, 1101 (40%) had pulmonary disease; 96 (3%), disseminated disease; and 1565 (57%), other or unspecified disease.

During 1990-1995, annual incidence rates for coccidioidomycosis were highest among males (range: 8.2-19.3 per 100,000 population) and persons aged greater than or equal to 65 years (range: 14.6-35.0 per 100,000). During this period, annual rates increased within each age group. Mean annual rates increased from 1.8 per 100,000 population for persons aged 0-4 years to 28.0 per 100,000 for persons aged greater than or equal to 65 years (Figure 2). Three counties (Maricopa, Pima, and Pinal) located in the Sonora Desert accounted for approximately 79% of Arizona's population and 93% of all cases statewide; the highest annual rates in these counties were 16.4, 23.6, and 30.1, respectively.

Because surveillance data did not indicate disease outcome, death certificates were reviewed to determine mortality from coccidioidomycosis. During 1990-1994 (the latest year for which death-certificate data were available), coccidioidomycosis was listed as the underlying cause of death for 134 persons, and the annual number of deaths increased from 21 in 1990 to 37 in 1994.

Hospitalizations

Data from the Arizona Hospital Discharge Database (AHDDDB) were used to determine the impact of coccidioidomycosis-related hospital admissions in 1993. The AHDDDB documents the first five discharge diagnoses for persons admitted to nonfederal hospitals in Arizona. The AHDDDB was reviewed to identify patients with a discharge diagnosis of coccidioidomycosis (International Classification of Diseases, Ninth Revision, Clinical Modification [ICD-9-CM], codes 114.0-114.3 and 114.9). Because unique patient identifiers were not available, patients were identified by date of birth, sex, and zip code.

During 1993, a total of 659 patients had coccidioidomycosis among their first five discharge diagnoses; for 415 (63%), coccidioidomycosis was listed as the principal diagnosis. The discharge diagnoses for these 659 patients included primary pulmonary coccidioidomycosis (66%), progressive coccidioidomycosis (20%), coccidioidal meningitis (6%), unspecified coccidioidomycosis (6%), and primary extrapulmonary coccidioidomycosis (0.1%); 1% of patients were discharged with multiple coccidioidomycosis diagnoses; and 72 (11%) died. Comorbid conditions in these 72 patients included HIV infection (32 [44%]), chronic lung disease (13 [18%]), allogeneic organ transplantation (four [6%]), and other conditions (23 [32%]). Although the hospitalization rate was highest among persons aged greater than or equal to 60 years (39 per 100,000 population),

the case-fatality rate was highest among patients aged 30-39 years (17%).

During 1993, direct hospital costs for all coccidioidomycosis-related admissions for the 659 patients totaled approximately \$19 million, with an average cost per hospitalization of \$23,889 and an average length of stay of 10 days (range: 1-125 days).

In 1993, a total of 973 patients had a discharge diagnosis of HIV infection; of these, 98 (10%) also had a discharge diagnosis of coccidioidomycosis, and 32 (33%) of these 98 patients died. In comparison, of patients with a discharge diagnosis of HIV infection but without coccidioidomycosis, 15% died, and of patients with a discharge diagnosis of coccidioidomycosis without known HIV infection, 7% died.

Editorial Note: The findings in this report indicate that the incidence of coccidioidomycosis in Arizona increased substantially during 1990-1995; in addition, coccidioidomycosis disproportionately affected persons aged greater than or equal to 65 years and persons with HIV infection. The increase in incidence may have reflected, in part, an increase in Arizona in the number of older residents, an increase in the number of HIV-infected persons with AIDS, and weather conditions.

During 1990-1995, the number of Arizona residents aged greater than or equal to 65 years increased by 22%. Many of these persons may have moved to the state from areas where coccidioidomycosis is not endemic and, therefore, were more susceptible to infection than those who had been long-term residents of Arizona. In addition, older adults may be at increased risk for developing symptomatic illness following infection with *C. immitis* (4) because of host factors (e.g., chronic lung disease and other underlying medical conditions) and may be more likely to seek medical attention following onset of respiratory symptoms. Because the denominator does not include persons who temporarily move to Arizona during the winter, incidence rates in this report for persons aged greater than or equal to 65 years probably were slightly overestimated.

During 1990-1995, the prevalence of AIDS in Arizona increased by at least 79%, from 938 to 1683 (1995 data are provisional). The high prevalence of coccidioidomycosis among HIV-infected persons is consistent with previous reports documenting severe coccidioidomycosis as a common opportunistic infection among HIV-infected populations in areas where coccidioidomycosis is endemic (5-7).

Severe drought followed by heavy rainfall was identified as a factor possibly associated with the recent epidemic of

coccidioidomycosis in California (8); this weather pattern may be important in facilitating the growth of *C. immitis* and the airborne spread of arthroconidia to humans. Although meteorologic data have not been analyzed, climatic factors also may have played an important role in the recent increase in coccidioidomycosis in Arizona.

Although coccidioidomycosis cannot be readily prevented (8), improved understanding of the epidemiology of this disease can assist in developing more effective prevention strategies. Efforts should include 1) increasing awareness of this disease among clinicians and the public, especially visitors to Arizona (and other areas where coccidioidomycosis is endemic) from areas where coccidioidomycosis is not endemic; 2) promoting more complete reporting of coccidioidomycosis cases by encouraging clinical laboratories to report all specimens positive for *C. immitis*; 3) better characterizing the environmental and host factors for acquiring infection, especially for older persons and HIV-infected persons; 4) conducting studies to evaluate the effectiveness of chemoprophylaxis for preventing coccidioidomycosis in persons with AIDS or other immunosuppressive conditions who live in areas where coccidioidomycosis is endemic; and 5) developing an effective vaccine that confers lasting immunity against *C. immitis*.

"NIH Director Endorses Needle Exchange Research"

A controversial needle exchange study has been approved by

the director of the National Institutes of Health, despite charges from a health industry watchdog group that it is "immoral and unethical." NIH Director Harold Varmus said that the \$2.4 million study, which would compare the impact of two methods of needle distribution on the rate of infectious disease among injection drug users, could be initiated as long as the participants are offered shots against hepatitis B. Half of the participants will be allowed to exchange used needles for clean ones, while the other half will be told how and where they can buy needles from drugstores. Current and former drug users are participating, so the study will not only assess impact of the two methods on disease, but also determine if the former users would be more likely to relapse to drug use if clean needles were available. The Public Citizens' Health Research Group contends that the study would increase the disease risk among those drug users who will not receive free needles.

"Powerful Treatments Create Growing Rift Among AIDS Groups"

The recent successes of new AIDS drugs have driven some patient advocates to call for a shift of funding away from social services toward drugs and treatment. The providers of these services, including transportation, housing, and counseling, are now desperate to maintain funding for their programs as a result. James Loyce Jr., director of AIDS Project Los Angeles, comments, "You can have the best medicines and medical services in the world, but if people can't get to the appointment, what good does it do to have a doctor sitting there someplace?" Providers also note that their services are still important, because the new drugs do not work for everyone and they might not have lasting efficacy. In explaining their position, advocates of increased funding for treatments say the service organizations have grown into massive bureaucracies that seek to perpetuate themselves.

"AIDS Advances Called Top 1996 Scientific Breakthrough"
Baltimore Sun (12/20/96) P. 24A

Research into HIV, which resulted in new AIDS drugs and a greater understanding of the virus' function, was named the "Breakthrough of the Year" for 1996 by the journal Science. The research, which identified three natural chemokines that suppress HIV, was published by scientists in Milan, Italy and Robert Gallo, and researchers at the U.S. Cancer Institute. Science reported that the findings "may one day blossom into new treatments or even vaccines."

"Donor May Be Charged After Patient Is Infected With HIV"
Richmond Times-Dispatch (12/20/96) P. A11

A blood donor whose HIV-tainted blood infected a transplant patient may face criminal charges, Milwaukee County officials report. Under Wisconsin's HIV confidentiality law, the name of the infected man cannot be released, though authorities hope to contact him through the hospital. Officials at the blood center where the donation was made said the donor lied on a screening survey about his high-risk sexual behavior. The donated blood

tested negative for HIV, because a test used at the time could not detect the infection for three to six weeks after the man was infected.

"Adolescent Drug Use Continues to Rise"

New York Times (12/20/96) P. B12; Wren, Christopher S.

A new survey has found that drug use continued to increase among adolescents this year, raising concerns about the efficacy of drug prevention programs. Marijuana was the most prevalent of the drugs used, accounting for 90 percent, but alcohol was found to be much more widely used than illegal drugs. Lloyd D. Johnston, who led the annual survey at the University of Michigan's Institute for Social Research, said the results show that "we're clearly moving in the wrong direction and continuing to do so." The level of marijuana use has not reached the level of 1978, when 11 percent of high school seniors said they used it daily. The recent survey found that 5 percent use the substance every day.

"Market Place: A Broad Patent Is Spurring the Shares of Protein Design Lab"

Wall Street Journal (12/20/96) P. D6; Fisher, Lawrence M.

Protein Design Lab, which announced on Monday that it had received a patent covering the production of humanized antibodies in mice, saw its shares rise 25 percent this week. The patent could create royalties for the company, whose product pipeline is also promising, analysts say. Oppenheimer analyst Matthew Geller notes Protein Design Labs benefits from broad enabling technology that could lead to the development of drugs for many different diseases as well as a solid business strategy. Among the drugs in the company's pipeline are Kanebo, a possible treatment for cytomegalovirus in transplant and AIDS patients, and a drug for chronic hepatitis B and liver transplants.

Researchers at Neurobiological Technologies of Richmond, Calif., are initiating a trial of the drug Memantine, a potential treatment for AIDS-related dementia and nerve damage. No treatments are currently available for these conditions. About one-third of all AIDS patients develop neurological problems, including loss of cognition, movement, and sensation, and up to 40 percent report neuropathic pain.

"Medical Education Gets Wired: Interactive Media Laboratory Targets Patients and Physicians"

Journal of the American Medical Association (12/11/96) Vol. 276,

No. 22, P. 1788; Stephenson, Joan

Among the multimedia programs developed at Dartmouth's Interactive Media Laboratory to help health care professionals, students, and patients deal with particular health issues, is a project on treating HIV and AIDS. "HIV and AIDS: An Interactive Curriculum," developed jointly by the Columbia University School of Nursing and Dartmouth Medical School, is designed to provide information about HIV to students pursuing health-related professions. Topics covered in the six-hour program include the virus' cycle, risk factors, prevention, diagnosis, treatment, and psychosocial issues. The program combines video, text, music, charts, graphs, and other graphics, including an animated demonstration of how HIV attacks a cell. The personal experiences of four HIV patients are incorporated into the program, and viewers have four interactions with a simulated patient, a 20-year-old college student. A second version of the program for doctors and nurse practitioners is being developed.

"Citizen Koch's Condom Campaign"

New York City Mayor Edward I. Koch is promoting a plan to show public-service announcements that encourage safer sex in place of the trivia quizzes shown at city movie theaters before films. The mayor had also sought help from dozens of Hollywood sources, but no one accepted. Koch proceeded to personally lobby movie theaters in the city, but he was largely unsuccessful. "Celebrities Caught on Both Sides of AIDS Animal Research"

AIDS activists confronted numerous Hollywood stars on their way to the Animal's Ball and Humanitarian Awards gala, which was hosted by People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA). The protesters accused the celebrities of hypocrisy, saying that they cannot support both animal rights groups and AIDS research, which uses animals for testing. Some of the stars reportedly looked away uncomfortably when accused. Peter Cashman, a former radio personality who has tested HIV-positive, noted, "The PETA attacks, the terrorism, harassment, and lies [are] destroying AIDS research projects, and that has to stop." PETA officials, however, say that there are other ways to conduct AIDS testing, including the use of computers that can simulate biological

conditions. Other PETA backers, meanwhile, claimed that animal research has not proven useful to AIDS research. "All major breakthroughs in AIDS research have come about through studying the [virus'] interaction with human cells, not those of other species," said ACT UP co-founder Peter Tatchell.

"Managed Health Care in Prisons Gains Favor, but Draws Concern"
New York Times (12/26/97); Petersen, Melody

Bloating U.S. prison populations and a concomitant rise in the cost of medical care for inmates are prompting more U.S. prisons to bring in private companies to manage prison health care. However, although the shift to managed care seems to be saving taxpayers' money, inmate advocates fear the move may compromise health care in jails, noting that it has brought an increase in complaints about prison health services. A surge in the last decade in the number of inmates in U.S. jails, primarily because of mandatory drug sentencing, has left more people who require more expensive medical care behind bars, including many drug users infected with HIV. While some prisons laud the health care that private companies are providing, complaints are growing in other cases, such as in New Jersey, where HIV-infected inmates have said they no longer get regular doses of certain costly drugs which can help them live longer.

"A Year of Tangible Medical Advances"
USA Today (12/26/96) P. 1D; Peterson, Karen S.

Health magazine reports that this year's major medical advances are already helping to increase longevity in the United States. The magazine's selections for 1996's leading discoveries include protease inhibitors, new AIDS drugs that, when used in combination with older drugs, could increase the lifespan of many HIV-infected individuals. Other advances include new drugs for osteoporosis and diabetes, and new or improved tests for ulcers and prostate cancer.

"Iran to Impose AIDS Test on Foreign Travelers"
Xinhua News Agency (12/25/96)

Visitors to Iran will now be tested for HIV, according to health officials in the country. The testing, which will be conducted at clinical facilities at the ports of entry, is intended to stem the spread of the virus, Deputy Health Minister Mohammad Esma'eel Akbari explained. The official noted that "specific information about the place where [foreign travelers] would reside is registered and if need be they would be contacted later." Iranians who leave the country for at least three months would also be screened for HIV. Some 260 AIDS patients live in Iran, but the nationalities of these patients were not revealed.

"Science & Health Bulletin: Zimbabwe--Deaths [From] AIDS"
PANA Wire Service (12/25/96); Amath, Mamadou

New statistics show that HIV and problems in Zimbabwe's health sector resulted in 94,352 deaths in the country between January and December 1996. The figure is about a 20 percent increase over 1995's total, when 71,758 deaths were reported in

the 11.2 million strong nation.

"Selenium May Reduce Risk of Some Cancers"

Washington Post (12/25/96) P. A4

A new study, led by University of Arizona epidemiologist Larry Clark, shows that selenium, which is currently being trumpeted as being a treatment for everything from dandruff to AIDS, could reduce the risk for certain types of cancer, including prostate, colon, rectal, and lung. Selenium is a mineral found in seafood, liver, and vegetables grown in selenium-rich soil. The research indicated that, when compared with participants who received a placebo, patients who took daily doses of selenium had 63 percent fewer cases of prostate cancer, 58 percent less colon or rectal cancers, and a 45 percent reduction in lung cancer. However, researchers warned in the Journal of the American Medical Association that the results need to be repeated since the study was originally created to monitor whether selenium could prevent skin cancer--which it did not--and because 75 percent of the participants were men.

"Agouron Says JT Is Partner in HIV Research"

Reuters (12/24/96)

Agouron Pharmaceuticals and Japan Tobacco report that they are co-developing the HIV drug Viracept, a synthetic chemical compound designed to inhibit the HIV protease. Agouron also noted that it has submitted a new drug application for Viracept to the U.S. Food And Drug Administration.

Funding for the HIV/AIDS Information Center on the World Wide Web, produced and maintained by the editors of the Journal of the American Medical Association, has been renewed by Glaxo Wellcome. The site, which began in December 1995, "uses up-to-the-minute scientific reporting and postpublication peer review to assure the timeliness and validity of clinical, scientific, and other information in this rapidly changing field," said Dr. George D. Lundberg, editor-in-chief of the American Medical Association's Scientific Information and Multimedia Group. Included at the site, located at <http://www.ama-assn.org/aids>, are clinical updates, daily news reports, information on social and political issues related to HIV and AIDS, and services for AIDS patients. Visitors to the Web page can also search the National Library of Medicine's AIDS databases and BIOETHICSLINE, a reference collection on the ethical, legal, and political aspects of health care.

"Rapid HIV Testing"

AIDS Clinical Care (12/96) Vol. 8, No. 12, P. 103; Sax, Paul E.

The most commonly-used HIV antibody tests are sent to laboratories and can require one to two weeks for results, even though the test can be completed in 24 hours. A rapid test offers the advantage of one-stop testing, outcome, and counseling; provides immediate results for women in labor; and

can guide postexposure prophylaxis decisions in health care settings. Researchers at the Bronx-Lebanon Hospital in New York City evaluated the accuracy of a rapid assay which takes 10 minutes and requires no special equipment. Using standard tests to confirm the findings of the rapid assay, they found that the rapid test had a sensitivity of 1.00 and a specificity of 0.991. The researchers also reported that about half of the study participants did not return for the results of their standard tests, including more than one-third of the infected patients. The patients could not be informed of the results of the rapid test because it is not approved by the Food and Drug Administration. An editorial accompanying the study strongly encourages the development and use of the rapid test in the United States, where two such tests are currently approved and are not widely used.

"Doctors Are Focus of Plan to Fight New Drug Laws"

Federal drug officials say they will restrict the impact of new state laws allowing the medical use of marijuana by prosecuting doctors who provide the drug to patients and revoking their prescription licenses. The Justice Department has decided not to take legal action against the measures, which were passed by voters in California and Arizona. The Clinton administration will counter the measures by launching a public relations campaign against the use of illegal drugs, as federal officials target doctors who provide the drugs and state and local police focus on the drug users. While some doctors recommend marijuana for patients with AIDS and other illnesses, national medical and health organizations generally reject its use.

"Staying On: The Cabinet"

Among the seven members of President Clinton's cabinet who will remain in office for his second term is Donna E. Shalala, secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services. During the past term, Shalala was instrumental in securing additional funding for AIDS research at the National Institutes of Health. During the coming term, she will likely be involved in efforts to control the financial problems of the Medicare trust fund. She may also focus on reducing teen age pregnancy and reducing cigarette and drug use among teens.

"Dow Ends Up 11 as Expiration Boost Volume; Gainers Ahead 5 to 3; Oil, Financial Issue Lead"

In trading Friday, Bristol-Myers Squibb increased 3.25 points to 112.5, following the announcement that its anti-HIV drug Zerit will be covered by the Ontario government's drug benefit program. Bristol-Myers and Warner-Lambert were also thought to be potential bidders for the French drug company Sanofi.

"Man With HIV Guilty of Raping Young Boy"

Miami Herald (12/21/96) P. 1B; Driscoll, Amy

A Miami man with HIV was convicted Friday in a retrial on charges of kidnapping an 11-year-old boy and raping him. Ignacio Perea was convicted in the case, and two similar attacks two years ago; but an appeals court overturned the verdicts due to improper jury selection. In the first trial, prosecutors charged Perea with attempted murder because he was aware he was HIV-positive. An appeals court ruled against those charges. Perea, who may receive five life sentences plus 15 years in the first case, is being tried separately for two other cases.

"Doctor Quit Over Blood Safety"

Toronto Globe and Mail (12/20/96) P. A1; McIlroy, Anne

Dr. Bert Aye, former head of the Canadian Red Cross Society, now says he resigned in September because he believed the safety of the blood system was jeopardized by the replacement of doctors with lay people. Aye noted that nine doctors involved in the Red Cross program quit in the past year. Aye also said senior officials ignored his arguments about the need to have doctors in charge of the blood system. The Red Cross replaced the medical directors at its 17 regional blood centers with lay workers a year ago.

"AIDS Seen as Serious Problem by Most"

Although a new poll shows that most Americans think AIDS is a serious problem, it also found that most people are not concerned that they will become infected. The poll, which was commissioned by Time magazine and CNN, also found that less than half of the respondents have been tested.

"Cuba Starts Testing Anti-AIDS Vaccine on Humans"

Reuters (12/22/96)

An experimental AIDS vaccine developed by Cuban scientists is being tested on 24 volunteers, President Fidel Castro announced Saturday. Through widespread HIV testing and the isolation of many AIDS patients, Cuba has curbed the spread of HIV. Authorities are concerned, however, that the rise in tourism and an increase in sexually transmitted diseases will spur the epidemic in coming years. So far, 1,408 HIV infections have been reported in Cuba, and 524 people have developed AIDS.

"Host Factors and the Pathogenesis of HIV-Induced Disease"

Nature (12/12/96) Vol. 384, No. 6609, P. 529; Fauci, Anthony S.

A variety of host and viral factors effect HIV infection and disease progression. In a review of the research on these factors, Anthony S. Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, focuses on the balance between host factors that stimulate HIV and those that suppress the virus. This balance determines the net level of viral replication and the consequent course of disease. Activation of the immune system by opportunistic pathogens like *Mycobacterium tuberculosis* result in increased HIV replication and accelerated disease progression. Furthermore, cellular activation and the expression of HIV-inducing cytokines are also associated with an immune response. HIV-suppressing cytokines have also been identified, as well as chemokine receptors used by HIV as co-receptors. A genetic defect in one of HIV's co-receptor, found in 20 percent of western European Caucasians, was found to offer limited protection against HIV infection. These findings have important implications for potential treatment and prevention strategies, Fauci concludes.

"Category of Exposure to HIV and Age in the Progression to AIDS: Longitudinal Study of 1,199 People With Known Dates of

Seroconversion"

Journal of the American Medical Association (12/11/96) Vol. 276,
No. 22, P. 1782; Pezzotti, Patrizio

Italian researchers seeking to determine whether the
progression of AIDS is linked to age or the method of HIV
infection, evaluated the cases of 1,199 people with known dates
of seroconversion. During the median study period of 5.8 years,
18.8 percent of the patients progressed to AIDS. Older subjects
were more likely to develop AIDS than younger subjects, but no
significant difference was linked to the method of exposure.

In Africa, where the promising protease inhibitor combinations are far out of reach, health workers are putting new faith in a stalwart medicine--the antibiotic. Scientists have

found that by using antibiotics to limit the proliferation of conventional sexually transmitted bacterial diseases, they can dramatically reduce the spread of HIV. Initial studies that reduced new HIV infections in specific regions around Lake Victoria by as much as 40 percent have inspired the U.S. Agency for International Development and the World Bank to spend some \$16 million in efforts to expand the antibiotic treatments throughout Tanzania and Uganda. While experts believe the program could ultimately save thousands of lives, there are significant hurdles, including doubts about whether similar success rates can be achieved on a broader scale, the prohibitive cost of even-conventional medicines in Africa, and concerns regarding widespread antibiotic distribution and resistant strains of diseases.

"U.S. to Limit HMO Incentives Linked to Curbs on Medicare, Medicaid Treatment"

New federal rules to be instituted next week address the health care industry's dilemma of trying to contain costs while also easing fears that patients will not receive necessary care. The new regulations from the Health Care Financing Administration will restrict the financial penalties which may be assessed against Medicare and Medicaid providers who order referrals or expensive procedures. Health maintenance organizations (HMOs) will still be able to link physicians' pay to their abilities to keep costs down, though financial losses for doctors who refer patients to specialists or prescribe elaborate tests and treatments more often than an HMO prefers will be limited. Industry leaders appear content with the new rules. Industry officials and federal officials both say they are not aware of any specific evidence of problems stemming from an HMO's financial incentives, but rather they note both the public's concern about the issue and the need to reassure it.

"Health Aides Push Condoms for Prisons"

Boston Globe (12/26/96) P. B9; Dowdy, Zachary R.

Massachusetts public health officials and correctional officers are debating the state's longtime policy of prohibiting condom distribution inside prisons, where AIDS is six times more prevalent than in society at large. Health officials say that, despite rules to the contrary, sex and rape will continue to occur inside prisons, and that Massachusetts should follow the model of prisons in Canada, Vermont, and Mississippi, which already distribute condoms to inmates. Massachusetts prison officials say that condoms provide containers for contraband, and that they would encourage inmates to have sex, an activity that is illegal and punishable. To bolster their argument, AIDS experts cite a rising occurrence of disease in prisons: whereas roughly 3,430 U.S. inmates had AIDS in 1992, the figure rose to 5,279 in 1994.

"87 Ohio Counties Report AIDS Cases"

United Press International (12/26/96)

According to a recently released report from the Ohio Department of Health, 87 of the state's 88 counties have reported at least one case of AIDS. Of the reported cases, 10 percent were among the 57 counties with fewer than 500,000 residents. Moreover, rural Ohio counties have an annual AIDS rate of 3.2 per 100,000 residents--just one-third of the annual rate in urban areas. Cuyahoga County has the greatest number of AIDS cases per 100,000 residents--18.2; Hamilton County has a 15.43 rate; and Franklin County's rate is 14.3 per 100,000. Noble County is the only Ohio region not report a case of AIDS since 1981, but officials note that some residents with AIDS may have moved into the county after being diagnosed. Some 65 percent of reported AIDS cases have resulted in death, and officials estimate that some 16,000 to 18,000 Ohio residents are HIV positive. The Department of Health based its report on HIV and AIDS data collected over a 15-year period.

"Russian Karelia's AIDS Toll Up From Zero to Ten"
Itar Wire Service (12/26/96)

Karelia, an autonomy in Russia's European north, has reported 10 new cases of HIV in two months. Until November, the Karelia region was considered free of the virus. Karelia health care minister Anatoly Artyomiyev, who revealed the HIV data at a recent news conference, noted that the region lacks funds to maintain clinics or to pay the \$4.3 million in wages it owes to medical personnel. Artyomiyev also noted that residents' vulnerability to diseases is on the rise.

"Chronicle: For Steve Ross, Showtime Is Charity Time"
New York Times (12/27/96) P. B6; Brozan, Nadine

In an effort to raise money for the fight against AIDS, cabaret performer Steve Ross will perform songs by request before each show and during intermission for a donation of \$100. Ross, who is making his Broadway debut in Noel Coward's "Present Laughter," explained that other charity work he does inspired him "to give music to the cause." If Ross plays just two requests during each performance of the show, \$1,600 could be raised each week.

"California's Agouron Pharmaceuticals Applies to Produce Anti-HIV Drug"
Knight-Ridder/Tribune Business News (12/24/96); Aguilera, Mario C.

Agouron Pharmaceuticals has filed a new drug application with the Food and Drug Administration for its Viracept anti-HIV drug, marking the first time a company has petitioned the FDA for a new class of protease inhibitor drugs for both adults and children. Analysts say the market potential for such a drug is tremendous. The FDA has already approved three drugs that fall under the same classification as Viracept: Merck & Co.'s Crixivan, Abbott's Norvir, and Roche Holding's Invirase. A price has not yet been set for the new Agouron drug.

"Coping With AIDS: Together, Online"

Yahoo! Internet Life (12/96) Vol. 2, No. 7, P. 24; Gensler, Howard

Internet newsgroups provide an important means for the exchange of HIV and AIDS information, on topics ranging from research and treatment advances to political movements and service organizations. On sci.med.aids, users can access daily AIDS news updates, detailed scientific information about drug therapies, and debates about different AIDS drugs. Due to the occasional censorship of posts on sci.med.aids, James Scutero founded misc.health.aids which includes more controversial information. While the dialogue can become extreme, "whatever goes in is going to be tried by fire. It's going to be ground up, analyzed, and reanalyzed. And whatever's true is going to stick," Scutero says. At alt.hemp-tokers, the legalization of marijuana is advocated, especially for people with AIDS and other illnesses. Another group, rec.pets.dogs.rescue, posts information about organizations that help AIDS patients care for their pets. AIDS information can also be found on many web sites, including those developed by AEGIS (AIDS Education Global Information System) at www.aegis.com, the New York Academy of Medicine at www.nyam.org, and Medline at www.healthgate.com.

"Medicine Men"

Advocate (12/24/96) No. 723, P. 31; Gallagher, John

The biotech company CytoDyn has produced a new HIV therapy called Cytolin. The company is dedicated primarily to treating HIV; financial concerns are secondary. Unlike any other HIV therapy, Cytolin is an antibody designed to bolster the immune system. Allen D. Allen, the Los Angeles physicist who developed the idea for Cytolin, explains that the drug is designed to block the region of the CD8 cell that is responsible for killing the body's infection-fighting CD4 cells. CytoDyn medical director David Hart says, "Most researchers and doctors practicing HIV medicine believe we will never poison the virus out of existence," but he notes that by targeting the mechanism that destroys the immune system, anti-viral treatments could be more effective. The Food and Drug Administration approved a preliminary clinical trial of the drug in October, and if it is successful, Cytolin could be on the market in two years.

"Marijuana for the Sick"

The U.S. government's plan to fight state laws legalizing the use of marijuana for medical purposes is reasonable, but the value of such therapy should be considered, says the editors of the New York Times. The authors agree with the Clinton administration's plan to prosecute doctors who prescribe the drug, but they say that more research is needed on the value of marijuana for treating AIDS-related wasting, nausea in cancer

patients, and glaucoma. Supporters of medical-marijuana use claim that drug enforcement officials have restricted such research for fear that marijuana use and abuse would become more widespread.

"Animals Suffer, to No Benefit"

In response to a Wall Street Journal article in which Dr. Michael DeBakey criticized animal rights groups for harming AIDS research, several animal rights supporters argue in letters to the editor of the Wall Street Journal that AIDS research does not depend on animal research. Kathy Guillermo of People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals notes, for example, that animal research has not produced a single drug or vaccine against AIDS and that the most promising treatment now available for HIV was first tried on humans. ACT-UP London's Peter Tatchell, meanwhile, cites various AIDS researchers who say animal research is not useful for the study of HIV, because the virus is specific to humans.

"U.S. Will Encourage Doctors Not to Dispense Medical Pot"

The federal plan to enforce anti-drug laws in Arizona and California, where the medical use of marijuana has been legalized, will focus on education rather than prosecution, U.S. drug chief Gen. Barry R. McCaffrey said Sunday. Under the White House's plan, to be released today, groups other than doctors, such as transportation workers and nuclear power plant operators, will be addressed. Federal officials will lead campaigns to inform "educators, parents, community coalitions and others" about the dangers of marijuana and other drugs. The American Medical Association, for its part, has called for more research into the medical benefits of marijuana. McCaffrey said, "We will open the door to examine any medicine, certainly to include marijuana, to see if it can demonstrate effectiveness."

"Fighting a 'Hidden Epidemic'"

New York Times (12/28/96) P. 26

Citing the recent Institute of Medicine report on the high rate of sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) in the United States, a New York Times editorial supports new recommendations for a public education and awareness campaign against these diseases. The panel reported that for every \$1 in government spending on prevention of STDs, \$43 is spent on treatment. New prevention efforts targeted at teen-agers and women are needed, the report said, including open discussions with doctors. The editors also note the greater need for open discussion of sexual activity and its possible repercussions.

"Number of People With HIV Reaches 466 in Indonesia"

Xinhua News Agency (12/28/96)

The number of HIV infections in Indonesia has reached 466, and 112 people have developed AIDS. A total of 128 foreigners

were reported to have HIV or AIDS. Approximately 63 percent of the HIV cases were transmitted through heterosexual contact, and women were found to be more likely than men to contract HIV through sex with different partners. A majority of the infected individuals are between the ages of 15 and 59.

"Women Overrepresented Among Young Persons With AIDS"
Reuters (12/27/96)

An analysis of the more than 37,000 AIDS cases diagnosed in New York City between 1984 and 1993 found that most of the young people diagnosed with AIDS were women and that women developed AIDS at a higher rate than young heterosexual men. Dr. Marcelo Pagano and colleagues at Harvard's School of Public Health reported that by 1993 the majority of AIDS patients under 30 were women, and that most of these young women had contracted the disease heterosexually. The researcher also noted a "youth-gender effect among black persons with AIDS," leading him to conclude that "women are overrepresented among younger persons with AIDS, particularly persons of color."

"Health Notes: Contraceptives and Low-Income Women"
United Press International (12/30/96)

Although 80 percent of sexually-active, low-income women in the United States use contraceptives, they may not fully benefit from the methods they choose, a new report says. A survey by the Alan Guttmacher Institute found that 75 percent of pregnancies in lower-income women are unplanned. Factors that improved the success of contraceptives in these women included an organized, courteous, and respectful clinic; a belief that women do not need permission from their partner to use contraception; and friends who share that concept.

"Piloting the Meanders of AIDS Research"
Journal of the International Association of Physicians in AIDS Care (12/96) Vol. 2, No. 12, P. 9; Mascolini, Mark

At the 36th International Conference on Antimicrobial Agents and Chemotherapy, updates on trials of protease inhibitors were presented as well as data on even newer treatment options. Among the research topics covered were non-nucleoside reverse transcriptase inhibitors, a fusion inhibitor, and several new protease inhibitors. Researchers warned that clinicians should expect surprises as they treat patients with new, stronger antiretrovirals. As new research provides clinicians with a better understanding of HIV's pathogenesis, new drugs, and new ways to monitor drug efficacy, they should consequently be better prepared to treat the disease more strategically, noted Dr. Michael Saag of the University of Alabama at Birmingham. Clinical trials, however, only provide information on how a therapy works in a controlled situation. "Real-world" answers to questions about efficacy, resistance, and side effects must be discovered through clinical practice.

"Standards for Disease Control--Part 1"
EDI World (12/96) Vol. 6, No. 12, P. 14; Engel, Wilson F. III

EDI, or electronic data standards that are used for disease control, are essential in the battle against the worldwide spread of infectious diseases, according to Wilson F. Engel, III. The commercial development of EDI has recently gained momentum and has sparked conferences on electronic resources for disease control. Electronic standards for disease control will likely emerge within the next three to five years, and will combine the many different existing sets of public and private data. An appropriate place for this integration of information to begin would be the databases at the federal agencies that deal with disease information, including the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the National Institutes of Health.

"U.S. Will Issue Warnings on Medical Marijuana Laws"

Letters warning of sanctions will be sent to doctors, federal contractors, and others who invoke new laws in California and Arizona that permit the use of marijuana for medical purposes, the Clinton administration announced Monday. The plan calls for publicizing federal drug laws but does not propose any

new legislation, deployments of law enforcement officers, or a legal challenge of the new laws. The administration warned that doctors who prescribe the drug risk losing their federal registration that allows them to write prescriptions. The administration contends that no scientific evidence has shown the benefit of marijuana, but Secretary of Health and Human Services Donna E. Shalala said, "The National Institutes of Health will continue to review the claims about the possible benefit of smoke marijuana for a small number of indications." The AIDS advocacy group ACT-UP has filed a ballot initiative in Washington, D.C., that is similar to the California measure.

"Doctors Criticize Move Against State Measures"

The Clinton administration's decision to target doctors who prescribe marijuana under two new state laws brought criticism from several doctors who say the action violates their right to decide what is best for their patients. "Now the federal government is entering the practice of medicine, placing itself in the physician's office between the doctor and patient," said David C. Lewis, director of the Center for Alcohol and Addiction Studies at Brown University. Other physicians say the administration's actions block any hope for research into the medical benefits of marijuana. White House drug chief Gen. Barry R. McCaffrey, however, said that "without question, the door is open to examine any drug" including marijuana, that would benefit American medicine. He added that such research must meet scientific standards.

"AIDS Alert Posted for Nicaragua"

The relatively low rate of AIDS in Nicaragua may be increasing, as prostitution rises amid widespread ignorance about the disease, AIDS activists warn. "Nobody here thinks of AIDS prevention, and that is dangerous. The numbers could rise very soon, very rapidly," said Dr. Alejandro Sanchez of the United Nations Development Program in Nicaragua.

"Straight Talk for Survival"

In Uganda, where an estimated one in 10 people are infected with HIV, a campaign of openness against the disease has led to dramatic declines in new infections. Condoms are distributed freely and testing is available at no charge. Sex and AIDS are discussed in newspapers, on billboards, and in other media. The decline in HIV first became evident in 1993, and has continued. The HIV rate among women aged 15 to 19, for example, fell from 16.9 percent in 1991-1992 to 11.3 percent in 1993-1995. Studies show a radical change in sexual behavior, with people having fewer casual partners, using condoms, and delaying the start of sexual activity.

"AIDS and Comfort"

In Broward County, Fla, grandmothers who are called on to care for their grandchildren after their children die of AIDS have formed the Family CARES Network. Members meet once a month for support, as well as to share food, clothing, and medical supplies. They also organize picnics, trips to the zoo, and other events for the children. Moreover, some of the group members take in children of members who have died. "I really consider them crusaders, taking on this incredible challenge," commented Stormy Schevis, coordinator at the Children's Diagnostic Center of the North Broward Hospital District.

The first bloodless surgery program in the St. Louis, Mo. area will open next spring at Barnes-Jewish Hospital. The majority of patients are expected to be Jehovah's Witnesses, who do not believe in transfusions. In Vermont, meanwhile, despite criticism of a condom distribution program for prison inmates in the state, officials say the policy helps reduce the rate of AIDS.

"With New Drugs, Hope Finally Dawns"
Philadelphia Inquirer (12/29/96) P. A1; Collins, Huntly

While powerful new anti-HIV drugs have given many patients renewed health and hope, most people with HIV cannot benefit from the advanced treatment. The drugs are too costly for people in Third World countries and too complex for Americans with unstable lives. For David L. McColgin, a Philadelphia lawyer who has been fighting HIV for 15 years, the new medicines are covered by his health insurance. He started therapy with the protease inhibitor Crixivan last April, following a strict regimen which increased his annual drug costs \$10,000, to about \$22,000. By September, McColgin's viral load had decreased to the point where no virus could be detected in his blood.

"Health Notes: Controversial AIDS Vaccine"
United Press International (12/31/96)

An experimental AIDS vaccine that had been shelved merits further study, says Harvard Medical School researcher Ronald Desrosiers. A weakened live virus was used in a monkey version of the vaccine that had failed to protect newborns. The vaccine worked well in older monkeys, however, and upon closer scrutiny, was found to cause disease in newborns only in extreme cases.

"Cambodian Blood Supply Tainted by Demand"
Nature Medicine (12/96) Vol. 2, No. 12, P. 1289; Marcus, Adam

Due to an aversion among Cambodians to the practice of donating blood, donors in Phnom Penh are sometimes paid by desperate blood centers--despite a law against it. The practice concerns health officials who fear that paid donors are threatening the safety of the blood supply. A pint of blood sells for between \$50 and \$200, which is several times more than the average monthly salary. Workers at the blood center are paid off to protect the center from prosecution. The people who sell

blood, often prostitutes or intravenous drug users, are 10 times more likely to have HIV, syphilis, and other sexually transmitted diseases than other donors, according to Dr. Monique Gue Guen, who operates the National Transfusion Center in Cambodia. About 6.5 percent of blood donations at the center tested positive for HIV last year, a higher rate than any other Asian country has reported. In Thailand, where screening procedures are especially good, the rate of HIV-positive donations was 0.3 percent. An estimated 30 percent of the blood units collected at the Cambodian center come from paid donors. Health officials are seeking safer donors, but the need for paid donors is expected to continue.

"Health Emergency 1997: The Spread of Drug-Related AIDS Among African Americans and Latinos"

The Dogwood Center, Princeton, NJ (11/5/96); Day, Dawn

HIV is a serious risk for injection-drug users and could be reduced with government-supported needle-exchange programs, claims Dawn Day, director of Dogwood Center, a New Jersey-based independent research organization, in a new report. Among injection drug users (IDUs), African-Americans and Latinos are especially vulnerable to AIDS, with African-American IDUs four times as likely to have AIDS as white IDUs, and Latinos at least one and a half times as likely. African-Americans have more than four times the risk of getting AIDS than of dying from an overdose, Day reports. Moreover, the risk of AIDS among Latinos is more than three times greater than the risk of dying from an overdose. Over the past five years, 70 percent of all injection-drug related AIDS cases among African-Americans and Latinos were reported. To curb injection-related HIV infections, Day concludes, all levels of government must support needle-exchange programs, including allowing the possession of sterile needles, the sale of syringes without prescriptions, and the operation of needle-exchange programs.

"FDA Approves Anemia Therapy"

A drug that stimulates red blood cell production in anemic patients before surgery and decreases the likelihood that a transfusion will be needed has been approved by the Food and Drug Administration. Procit, sold by Ortho Biotech, had previously been approved as a treatment for anemia related to chemotherapy

and has been used for anemia resulting from the use of AZT by patients with HIV. The drug will be especially beneficial to patients undergoing orthopedic procedures, which put a high demand on the blood supply.

"Federal Warning on Medical Marijuana Leaves Physicians Feeling Intimidated"

Washington Post (01/01/97) P. A6; Claiborne, William

Following the Clinton administration's warning Monday that doctors who prescribe marijuana to patients may face sanctions, physicians who supported the new law in California and Arizona say they will not jeopardize their careers. Possible penalties include the loss of licenses to write prescriptions or the exclusion from Medicare and Medicaid programs. "There's no way I can recommend it now without risking my livelihood. It's a threat to my license to write prescriptions, and if I can't write prescriptions, I'm out of business," said San Francisco's Dr. Richard Cohen, who had previously supported the ballot initiative to allow the use of marijuana for medical purposes. In addition, Dr. Victor Beer, who runs a clinic for patients with HIV and AIDS in Los Angeles, said only one of his patients has asked for a recommendation to use marijuana. He said it would be "irresponsible" for him to risk his license for the patient.

"Book Review: Gay and Conservative: It Can Be Done"

In "Life Is Not a Rehearsal," author David Brudnoy tells of how he was supported by kind people after he revealed that he was gay and had AIDS. Reviewer Richard Bernstein says the book illustrates the niceness of Americans, as well as the tolerance and sympathy felt for Brudnoy, a conservative radio talk show host in Boston. Bernstein applauds the book's honesty and inspiration.

According to erroneous conventional thinking, Brudnoy was not supposed to be homosexual, since he was an outspoken conservative in liberal Boston. In his new book, Brudnoy writes about his teenage years and his emerging sexuality and recognition of his homosexuality. He also describes his illness and his acceptance of the disease.

"Abstinence Is Best Advice, But It's Just Not That Simple"

Richmond Times-Dispatch (01/02/97) P. E6; Graedon, Joe; Graedon, Teresa

While abstinence is the only way to be completely safe from sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) and unwanted pregnancy, most American teenagers are sexually active. A recent Institute of Medicine report revealed that STDs are an epidemic in the United States, and that one-quarter of the 12 million cases reported each year are among adolescents. Countries with more open sex education have lower rates of STDs and unwanted pregnancy. Prevention methods, especially condom use, are less costly than treatment, and should be advocated.

"Workplace Attitudes Toward Those With HIV Improve Fitfully"

Boston Globe (12/31/96) P. D6; Lewis, Diane E.

While most companies now have policies to protect HIV-positive employees from discrimination and guarantee complete medical coverage, many also require AIDS training programs to combat stereotyping and fears about the disease. Paul A. Ross, worldwide manager of the HIV/AIDS program at Digital Equipment, also offers AIDS training to other companies as a consultant. During the program, Ross explains how HIV is transmitted and how much it costs to treat, while also trying to help improve attitudes about the disease.

"Federal Court Ruling: Infection With the AIDS Virus Not a Disability"

Reuters (01/01/97)

A federal court in North Carolina recently rejected the employment discrimination claim made by an asymptomatic HIV-positive man. The case marks the first time a court has ruled that HIV infection is not a disability. Fernando J. Cortes had sued a McDonald's restaurant, but the court ruled that he had not proved his claim that "he had a physical impairment that substantially limited a major life activity."

"Science & Health Bulletin: Zimbabwe--Healers"

PANA Wire Service (01/01/97)

An organization representing traditional healers in Zimbabwe has threatened to levy sanctions against those who prescribe incest as an AIDS treatment. The president of the Zimbabwe National Traditional Healers Association said that members are encouraged to research AIDS cures, but that they should not make public claims that could be misleading. Despite warnings, some healers claim they have a cure and charge high fees to patients.

"Nitric Oxide Link to AIDS Dementia"

Lancet (12/21/96-12/28/96) Vol. 348, No. 9042, P. 1725; Aldridge, Susan

AIDS dementia, which affects between 20 percent and 30 percent of all advanced AIDS patients, may be linked to an overproduction of nitric oxide. Valina Dawson and colleagues at Johns Hopkins University found that the brain tissue from patients who had AIDS dementia had eight times more nitric oxide synthase activity than HIV-1 negative controls. High levels of HIV-1's coat protein gp41 were also found in the patients with dementia, and animal research has shown that gp41 can induce nitric oxide synthase activity. Dawson said the findings could be applied to find a way to reduce AIDS dementia by blocking nitric oxide production.

"Desert Flora Has Anti-HIV Aura"

POZ (12/96-1/97) No. 19, P. 28

The creosote bush, used by Native Americans to treat maladies ranging from rheumatism to diarrhea, is being studied as a potential AIDS therapy by researchers at Johns Hopkins University. The desert plant grows in the southwestern United States and Mexico. Researcher Fu Chih Huang discovered that a

molecule in a chemical compound in the plant stopped the replication of HIV and herpes. In 1992, the compound disappeared from most drug stores after the Food and Drug Administration warned that the capsule form was associated with six cases of acute toxic hepatitis. A new leaf-resin concentrate of the plant, made by Western Biotech, is reportedly safer and more effective.

AIDS researcher Dr. David Dai-i Ho is cited by the editors of the Wall Street Journal as an example of the benefits that immigrants bring to the United States. Ho, who immigrated with

his family from Taiwan in 1956, was named Time magazine's 1996 Man of the Year for his contribution to new AIDS treatments. The editors suggest that such an example be considered in future debates about the value of immigration.

"Is Marijuana Good Medicine?"

USA Today (01/03/97) P. 8D

USA Today sought answers from the experts on the issue of whether the medical use of marijuana can alleviate AIDS-related wasting, nausea for those undergoing chemotherapy for cancer, and symptoms of glaucoma. Paul Consroe of the University of Arizona has studied the medical benefits of marijuana for 24 years. He advocates the drug for certain uses, including epilepsy patients who cannot be treated with other drugs, and for certain kinds of pain that are otherwise untreatable. Another researcher, Reese T. Jones, says research on medical marijuana declined in the early 1980s because the drug was not proving beneficial. While he says the drug is not a good choice for treatment because it impacts a variety of systems in the body, Jones concludes that it should be available for those it can help.

"Across the USA: Vermont"

USA Today (01/03/97) P. 9A

Vermont officials report that requests for condoms by inmates total fewer than 10 a month, even in larger prisons. Only Vermont and Mississippi provide condoms to inmates as part of an effort to curb the spread of HIV.

"Law Eases Use of Life Cover for Medical Bills"

Journal of Commerce (01/03/97) P. 8A

A new federal tax law allows people with chronic or terminal illnesses to sell their life insurance to cover medical bills, without paying income tax on the benefits. Payments made after Dec. 31, 1996, through "accelerated benefits" from an insurance company or a payment by a viatical settlement company, are not subject to income tax. "Taxing the benefits substantially reduced the amount of money available to the insured. The new law will help allow the individual to die with dignity," said Mandell Winter Jr. of the College for Financial Planning.

"HHS Reviews 1996 Achievements"

U.S. Newswire (01/02/97)

Among the achievements reported by the Department of Health and Human Services for 1996 are the approval of the anti-HIV protease inhibitor drugs by the Food and Drug Administration. The agency also approved the first home HIV test kit. HHS reported that the death rate from AIDS did not increase for the first time in 1995, and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said that the number of infants born with HIV declined 27 percent between 1992 and 1995. The CDC attributed this drop to the increased use of AZT therapy by pregnant women with HIV. Funding for the Ryan White CARE Act has increased 158 percent since President Clinton took office, and a five-year reauthorization of the act was passed in 1996. Last year also saw

the award by HHS of \$7.1 million to community-based AIDS service programs. Moreover, the agency worked with the Department of Housing and Urban Development to award grants totaling \$227.7 million to 20 states to provide assistance to people with HIV or AIDS and to award \$3.35 million in grants to support the continuation of nine projects in six states that provide health care and services for HIV-infected and at-risk adolescents. A commitment to the development of HIV-fighting microbicides was also announced in 1996.

"High Heterogeneity of HIV-1 Subtypes in Russia" Reuters (01/02/97)

Six subtypes of HIV-1 have been found in infected individuals in Russia, researchers report in the current issue of AIDS Research and Human Retroviruses. Aleksei Bobkov of the D.I. Ivanosky Institute of Virology and colleagues evaluated the viral subtype in 130 patients and identified subtypes A, B, C, D, G, and H. Strain B was most common among homosexual men, while A was found most often in intravenous drug users. Overall, subtypes B and G are most common in Russia.

"U.S. Court of Appeals Foils S.E.C. Bid to Regulate Viaticals" HealthWire (01/02/97)

The Securities and Exchange Commission's request for an appeal of its case against the viatical settlement company Life Partners was denied in late December by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia. The court had earlier upheld Life Partners' claim that its business was not subject to SEC regulation. Life Partners' chairman Brian D. Pardo called the decision "a victory for the terminally ill, for small, individual investors, and for private enterprise, and for taxpayers and consumers." The SEC may not seek an appeal from the Supreme Court, according to Life Partners' attorneys.

"Prostitution in Ethiopia" Africa News Service (01/02/97)

In the Ethiopian city of Addis Ababa, prostitution is growing rapidly, and is impacting both society and the participating individuals. While the number of prostitutes is growing, the age of girls joining the business is declining. Among the effects of the increase are the spread of sexually transmitted diseases, including AIDS, and rising drug use.

"Turning the Tide" Time (12/30/96-1/06/97) Vol. 148, No. 29, P. 54; Elmer-DeWitt, Philip

During 1996, a glimmer of hope was revealed for the first time in the 15-year-old fight against AIDS. Clinical trials led by Dr. David Ho of the Aaron Diamond AIDS Research Center showed that a new combination of anti-HIV drugs could effectively keep viral levels down. The treatment is too costly for most HIV patients, however, and is most beneficial in the newly infected. Ho's work stands out among that of many AIDS researchers who have advanced knowledge of the disease. He was among those who first

recognized AIDS as an infectious disease, and was influential in shifting the focus of treatment to the early stages of infection.

"AMA: Mandatory HIV Testing in Pregnancy"
American Medical News (12/23/96-12/30/96) Vol. 39, No. 48, P. 6;
Kent, Christina

While members of the American Medical Association agreed by a close vote in June to support mandatory HIV testing for pregnant women, the group reaffirmed the decision by a wider margin at a recent meeting. A committee of the AMA wanted to reverse the decision, on the grounds that the group's general policy holds that a patient is entitled to consider a doctor's recommended care, but that "patients may accept or refuse any recommended treatment." Voluntary HIV testing of pregnant women continues to be supported by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and other medical groups. Dr. William R. Jones pointed out that the AMA also supports mandatory testing for people who donate blood, breast milk, organs, semen and ova, as well as for immigrants and military personnel, noting that HIV should be "depoliticized" and treated like other infectious diseases.

Governor of California to propose increase in AIDS spending

SACRAMENTO (Jan 6, 1997 2:54 p.m. EST) -- Gov. Wilson will propose a dramatic
increase in
AIDS spending in his new state budget, said senior administration officials
Monday.

The governor will ask for \$178.8 million for various AIDS programs, an increase
of more than 40
percent over current spending, in the budget he will present to the Legislature

Thursday, officials told
The Examiner.

"It is a comprehensive approach to the epidemic, from new research to education and prevention to care and treatment," said one top health agency official.

As of Nov. 30, there were 34,627 Californians living with AIDS, according to state health officials.

Wilson also will ask the Legislature for immediate approval of a shift of \$18 million in federal funds into a program to provide drugs to low-income people living with HIV, the officials said. The program, the Aids Drug Assistance Program, is facing a shortfall this year.

In one controversial element of the plan for the next fiscal year, the Wilson administration for the first time will ask California cities to transfer some of their own federal AIDS funds back to the state to help support ADAP.

Specifically, the state is asking the cities to give up a \$12.9 million augmentation in federal AIDS funds they are expected to receive later this year.

The two cities that would be most affected would be San Francisco and Los Angeles, which receive the majority of federal AIDS funds in California.

"New York already does this," said one top administration official. "We feel California cities have really lagged behind in this area.

"The key thing to remember here is we're expanding this program."

Current ADAP spending in California totals about \$55.7 million. Wilson is proposing an increase to \$100.2 million, with the money coming from both state and federal sources.

Besides putting more money into ADAP, the new budget also will include more money for targeted education and for research in conjunction with the University of California, according to documents provided by the administration.

The education element will target intravenous drug users, who are experiencing an unexplainable increase in HIV infection, officials said.

The \$2.1 million education program will include expansion of street outreach programs, mobile vans and HIV testing.

Two major research projects, at a cost of about \$500,000 each, will be undertaken, according to officials. One would conduct a study of the effect of antiretroviral drugs on HIV transmission, and the other into research for a new test for HIV infection.

The budget also calls for \$3.8 million to initiate viral load testing, which doctors say is the most effective way to monitor progression of the disease.

Overall, current spending on various AIDS-related programs in California totals about \$125 million in state and federal funds. In the 1995-96 fiscal year, it was \$117 million.

News of the increase in AIDS spending was just the latest in a series of leaks from the administration on new or expanded programs in Wilson's proposed state budget for the 1997-98 fiscal year.

There will be more money for the environment and education, including expansion of the governor's class-size reduction plan up to and including the third grade.

The economy has rebounded, tax revenues are up, and the administration is predicting creation of another 300,000 high-paying jobs in California during the next year.

The state can probably afford a tax cut.

But this is not the first year the Republican governor has released selective "good news" from his budget before the actual document was delivered to the Legislature.

Those positive leaks can be followed by bad news in the actual document, such as welfare cuts and reductions in aid to the poor, blind and disabled.

"I think the budget is a chance for any governor to put the best face forward," said Elizabeth Hill, the Legislature's nonpartisan budget analyst.

"The positive spin comes first, and a lot of the more difficult areas are not highlighted until later, if at all," she said.

Governor of California to propose increase in AIDS spending

SACRAMENTO (Jan 6, 1997 2:54 p.m. EST) -- Gov. Wilson will propose a dramatic increase in AIDS spending in his new state budget, said senior administration officials Monday.

The governor will ask for \$178.8 million for various AIDS programs, an increase of more than 40 percent over current spending, in the budget he will present to the Legislature Thursday, officials told The Examiner.

"It is a comprehensive approach to the epidemic, from new research to education and prevention to care and treatment," said one top health agency official.

As of Nov. 30, there were 34,627 Californians living with AIDS, according to state health officials.

Wilson also will ask the Legislature for immediate approval of a shift of \$18 million in federal funds into a program to provide drugs to low-income people living with HIV, the officials said. The program, the Aids Drug Assistance Program, is facing a shortfall this year.

In one controversial element of the plan for the next fiscal year, the Wilson administration for the first time will ask California cities to transfer some of their own federal AIDS funds back to the state to help support ADAP.

Specifically, the state is asking the cities to give up a \$12.9 million augmentation in federal AIDS funds they are expected to receive later this year.

The two cities that would be most affected would be San Francisco and Los Angeles, which receive the majority of federal AIDS funds in California.

"New York already does this," said one top administration official. "We feel California cities have really lagged behind in this area.

"The key thing to remember here is we're expanding this program."

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\$100.2 million, with the money coming from both state and federal sources.

Besides putting more money into ADAP, the new budget also will include more money for targeted education and for research in conjunction with the University of California, according to documents provided by the administration.

The education element will target intravenous drug users, who are experiencing an unexplainable increase in HIV infection, officials said.

The \$2.1 million education program will include expansion of street outreach programs, mobile vans and HIV testing.

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The budget also calls for \$3.8 million to initiate viral load testing, which doctors say is the most effective way to monitor progression of the disease.

Overall, current spending on various AIDS-related programs in California totals about \$125 million in state and federal funds. In the 1995-96 fiscal year, it was \$117 million.

News of the increase in AIDS spending was just the latest in a series of leaks from the administration on new or expanded programs in Wilson's proposed state budget for the 1997-98 fiscal year.

There will be more money for the environment and education, including expansion of the governor's class-size reduction plan up to and including the third grade.

The economy has rebounded, tax revenues are up, and the administration is predicting creation of another 300,000 high-paying jobs in California during the next year.

The state can probably afford a tax cut.

But this is not the first year the Republican governor has released selective "good news" from his budget before the actual document was delivered to the Legislature.

Those positive leaks can be followed by bad news in the actual document, such as welfare cuts and reductions in aid to the poor, blind and disabled.

"I think the budget is a chance for any governor to put the best face forward,"

said Elizabeth Hill, the
Legislature's nonpartisan budget analyst.

"The positive spin comes first, and a lot of the more difficult areas are not
highlighted until later, if at
all," she said.

A new protease inhibitor, the first one to be formulated for and tested in children, will become available free of charge for children age 2 to 13 via a program offered by Agouron Pharmaceuticals. Agouron has submitted its drug, Viracept, to the Food and Drug Administration for approval, seeking to market both a tablet for adults and a pediatric powder for children. Early trials of Viracept in children have suggested that the drug offers benefits similar to those seen in adults. The three protease inhibitors being sold now have shown great benefit for adults, but have not been approved for children.

"Drug Cleared for Trial With HIV Patients"

The Food and Drug Administration has approved the trial of an experimental immune therapy made by Cel-Sci in HIV-infected patients, the company announced. Cel-Sci said that its Multikine product, a combination of cytokines, will be evaluated for safety and positive immune response in a trial of 14 HIV-positive patients. The trial, to start late this month or early next, will be conducted by the non-profit AIDS Research Alliance of West Hollywood, CA.

"Estimated Number of Children Born With AIDS Transmitted by Mothers"

Over the last few years, the number of children born in the United States with HIV has declined dramatically, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports. The agency said that about 90 percent of the children with AIDS were infected by their mothers, who were HIV-positive. The number of children infected by their mothers was highest in 1992, when it reached 905, and has since decreased 27 percent. The U.S. Public Health Service has issued recommendations to reduce perinatal transmission, including encouraging pregnant women to seek HIV counseling and testing as well as treatment with the drug AZT.

"The Painful Truth About Euthanasia"

Wall Street Journal (01/07/97) P. A16; Emanuel, Ezekiel J.

Unlike the popular image of euthanasia, which suggests that the patient is experiencing severe pain, studies show that most patients in this situation cite psychological reasons for wanting to die, according to Ezekiel J. Emanuel, an associate professor of medicine and social medicine at Harvard Medical School. In a Wall Street Journal commentary, Emanuel cites a study of AIDS patients at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Hospital which found that patients experiencing pain were less interested in euthanasia compared to those showing depression and hopelessness. Emanuel argues that the legalization of physician assisted-suicide would not help the majority of patients who die each year and would only provide a way for health-care professionals to avoid the difficulty of helping dying patients receive dignified care.

"FDA Concedes Conflict in Policy"

Officials at the Food and Drug Administration acknowledged that an agency program, which provides marijuana to medical patients, is inconsistent with the federal stance against new state laws that permit the use of the drug for medical purposes. Each month, eight patients with various medical conditions receive marijuana, grown at a federally funded facility at the University of Mississippi, through the FDA's "compassionate-use Investigative New Drug" program. Meanwhile, the federal Office of Drug Control Policy, the Department of Health and Human Services, and the Justice Department are involved in a debate over the legality of medical-marijuana initiatives in Arizona and California, and they have said they will impose sanctions on doctors who prescribe the drug. Expansion of the government's marijuana program was cut off in 1992, when 13 patients were enrolled. Since then, the five AIDS patients in the program have died.

An appeals court in Trenton, NJ, has awarded Frank and Debra Juliano \$150,000 for their claim that they had experienced anxiety while waiting to determine if Frank had been infected with HIV by a hospital needle at Monmouth Medical Center. In Madison, WI, meanwhile, state legislators will likely deal with the issue of medical use of marijuana this session. Rep. Tammy Baldwin plans to introduce a bill allowing doctors to prescribe the drug in some cases.

"Opinion: Clearing the Way for an AIDS Vaccine"

The recent appointment of Nobel laureate Dr. David Baltimore to head the United States' AIDS vaccine effort is not likely to solve the problems stalling this program, claim Bruce G. Weniger and Max Essex in a New York Times commentary. Weniger sits on the Presidential Advisory Council on HIV and AIDS, and Essex is chairman of the Harvard AIDS Institute. The authors point out that AIDS vaccine research receives less than 10 percent of the National Institutes of Health's AIDS budget and that the vaccine effort lacks an experienced senior official whose job is dedicated to vaccine development. Furthermore, they claim that the government's decision not to conduct human vaccine trials in 1994, despite approval from the NIH's vaccine advisory panel and \$100 million of industry investment over eight years, virtually halted vaccine research in the industry. A single-purpose organization, led by an experienced vaccine scientist in close contact with industry, should lead the vaccine effort, Weniger and Essex contend.

"Interferon Sciences Raises \$9.1 Million in Private Placement"

Interferon Sciences said Monday that it has raised nearly \$9.1 million in a private placement. The funds will be used to increase the company's inventory of its Alferon N Injection

product, a treatment for certain types of genital warts. The additional funding will also be used to expand Interferon Science's manufacturing facility to increase production capacity in hopes that Alferon N Injection is granted FDA approval for the treatment of HIV and hepatitis C.

"Ignoring the Solution. Jury's in: Needle Exchanges Slow the Spread of AIDS"

U.S. News & World Report (12/30/96-01/06/97) Vol. 121, No. 26, P. 55; Shenk, Joshua Wolf

Needle exchange programs, which aim to protect injection drug users from HIV by offering addicts sterile syringes in exchange for used ones, have been shown to work in numerous studies. The Clinton administration supports a ban on federal spending for the programs, but the National Academy of Sciences, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and the General Accounting Office have all endorsed needle exchanges and are calling for increased government support of the programs. Studies show that the exchanges do not result in increased drug use, a concern cited by opponents. Besides reducing the spread of HIV and other bloodborne diseases, the programs also help addicts seek drug therapy. University of California researcher Peter Lurie estimates that nearly 10,000 lives could have been saved in the past few years had needle exchanges gained wider support.

"A Team Effort"

Many researchers have contributed to the advances in AIDS research over the last 15 years, and Time magazine profiles just a few in a special section on AIDS. Two of perhaps the most well-known scientists are Luc Montagnier and Robert Gallo, who entered a legal battle in 1984 over who had discovered HIV. Montagnier is now promoting AIDS research and treatment centers in Africa, while Gallo has launched his own virology institute at the University of Maryland. Other stand-out researchers include Mary Guinan, an epidemiologist for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; Dr. Paul Volberding, director of the Center for AIDS Research at the University of California, San Francisco, and the AIDS Program at San Francisco General Hospital; and Dr. Peter Piot, now head of UNAIDS. Guinan was among the first to sound the HIV awareness alarm, after having discovered through interviews with HIV-infected patients that the virus was transmitted both sexually and intravenously. Dr. Volberding, meanwhile, led important trials that demonstrated the benefits of AZT. He also was one of the first to call attention to the fact that gay men were increasingly coming down with Kaposi's sarcoma. The United Nation's Piot, for his part, is credited with, among other things, alerting researchers to HIV's spread through Africa's heterosexual population in the early 1980s.
