"Panel to Review AZT Use During Pregnancy"

New evidence that the offspring of mice given high doses of AZT during pregnancy are at risk for cancer has raised concerns

among federal health officials about the use of the drug for HIV-infected pregnant women. The National Institutes of Health will thus assemble a panel of AIDS and cancer experts next week to develop guidelines on the use of AZT during pregnancy. Health officials say that for now, pregnant women infected with HIV should continue taking the drug, which has been shown to significantly reduce the transmission of HIV to infants. High doses of the drug caused cancer in the baby mice, and pregnant women take much lower doses, said a spokesman for the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases. No cases of cancer have been found in the children of women who took AZT during pregnancy.

"Don't Forsake Homosexuals Who Want Help"

Although treatment is available for men who experience an unwanted sexual attraction to other men, it is denied to many potential patients because of political pressure, claim the writers of an Wall Street Journal commentary. Charles Socarides, a clinical professor of psychiatry at Albert Einstein College of Medicine, and colleagues, contend that, without treatment, men with unwanted homosexual inclinations become depressed and turn to unprotected sex, increasing their risk for HIV infection. The authors cite as an example a study that found that 38 percent of homosexual adolescents had engaged in unprotected sex in the previous six months. Socarides et al. conclude that the lives of many men who died of AIDS could have been saved had their attempts to seek treatment for homosexuality been successful.

"High Court Hears 2 Cases Involving Assisted Suicide"

After hearing debates for and against the constitutional right to physician-assisted suicide on Wednesday, the Supreme Court Justices seemed reluctant to take on the issue. "Why shouldn't we conclude that as an institution, we are not in a position to make the judgment you want us to make?" Justice David H. Souter asked attorney Kathryn L. Tucker. The Seattle lawyer had argued that Washington state's law against physician-assisted suicide violates the rights of dying patients who seek a doctor's help in dying in a "humane and dignified manner." The Justices are expected to rule on the matter before the term ends in late June or early July.

A California judge has ruled that San Francisco's Cannabis Buyers' Club was not unlawful in providing marijuana to terminally ill patients. Dennis Peron, the founder of the club, says it will reopen next week.

"Science & Health Bulletin: Africa-Disease [Malaria, Ebola, and AIDS Pose Serious Threats]"

Malaria, Ebola, and AIDS pose serious threats in Africa, warns David Satcher, director of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, in the most recent issue of "Washington Line," a State Department publication. The malaria threat is especially serious, he said, because the traditional cure is not effective. Africa has been the region hardest-hit by AIDS so far, but the disease is now spreading at the most dramatic rate in Southeast Asia and India, according to the World Health Organization. The agency estimates that 40 million people worldwide will be affected by AIDS by the year 2000.

"Florida Will Provide Protease Inhibitors to AIDS Patients"

Protease inhibitors will be made available to Florida's low-income HIV patients in April, under the state's AIDS Drug Assistance Program. Florida expanded the program after the federal government said that it would double its \$13 million allocation to the state. Florida is one of the last states in the nation to make the drugs available through the program.

"Zambian AIDS Scourge Worries Policy Experts"
Africa News Online (01/08/97)

The loss of intellectual minds to AIDS is a growing concern in Zambia, as an increasing number of people involved in policy-making contract HIV. Some fear that the funds used to educate young people could be wasted if they die too young to use their training. The life expectancy in Zambia is expected to decrease from 51 to 45 by 2002, due to the spread of HIV.

"New AIDS Drugs Cut Death Rate Sharply, Data Show"

The death rate among AIDS patients in British Columbia has decreased dramatically due to the use of new AIDS drugs. The death rate dropped from 70 individuals per 1,000 in 1994 to 23 per 1,000 at the end of 1996, officials announced. The success is attributed to new combination therapies that include protease inhibitors.

"Collaboration Needed for HIV Vaccine Success"
Journal of the American Medical Association (01/01/97) Vol. 277,

Cooperation between government and private industry is critical to the development of a safe and effective vaccine against HIV, according to a report from the AIDS Vaccine Advocacy Coalition. Government leadership is the "key ingredient" needed to advance the effort, the report said. "We were surprised to learn that, in most cases, government is the engine that drives industry and that industry research depends on government financing, government leadership, and government support," noted Chris Collins, one of the report's authors. The research, titled "Industry Investment in HIV Vaccine Research," is based on interviews with HIV vaccine researchers at 23 pharmaceutical and biotechnology firms. In the study, some researchers blamed government bureaucracy and cumbersome regulations for blocking

collaborations. The report calls for increased funding for HIV vaccine research at the National Institutes of Health, as well as targeted funding toward answering scientific questions that could point to the most promising approaches. Determining the best approaches and focusing research efforts there could spur private-sector investment, the authors concluded.

"Culture, Media, and HIV/AIDS in Asia"

Lancet (01/04/97) Vol. 349, No. 9044, P. 52; Wolffers, Ivan

Widespread HIV education is critical in Asia, where 42 percent of the world's estimated 40 million HIV-infected people are expected to live by the year 2000. HIV is most widely transmitted in Asia via heterosexual sex, but cultural constraints limit sex education in most Asian countries. In the past three years, researchers held a series of workshops in several Asian cities to evaluate the role of the media in HIV/AIDS awareness and education. The media was found to contribute to the public's misinformation about HIV prevention, in part by including the claim that HIV can only be transmitted through contaminated blood, or that HIV usually infects only injection drug users. The Asian culture, in which frank discussions of sex are taboo, was also found to pose a major problem for comprehensive HIV education. Dr. Ivan Wolffers of VU-University in the Netherlands analyzed the cultural factors and media influences blocking HIV education in Asia, and has concluded that the HIV epidemic requires societal change. Wolffers suggests that the media coordinate with grass-roots groups, politicians, and religious leaders to spark this difficult, yet critical, movement.

As you will remember, during practically the entirety of the last Congress, I was working with the American Academy of Pediatrics (and, at least in name and full support, with the National Association of Children's Hospitals and David Harvey's AIDS Policy Center, and others) on the Kassebaum legislation about pediatric drugs that was one small section of the FDA bill. (It got confused since the Pediatric AIDS Foundation (PAF) was part of the Patient's Coalition that opposed the overall bill, but we usually kept it parsed out, with only the occasional threat from the Hill that they would kill the ped section unless PAF supported the overall bill; no deal.)

Anyway, that bill would have given the companies 6 months of extended market exclusivity if they did the pediatric research. By the end of the session, PhARMA and some individual companies were supporting the bill with us, but it was too late to do this at the last minute--even as a Kassebaum/Kennedy/Greenwood/Waxman bill.

I did, however, go into each meeting with industry, the Hill, or the Administration with the opening line that the bill was my second choice. My first choice was for the FDA to enforce what I believed (and still believe) is current law: The Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act (FDCA) says that the Commissioner cannot approve a drug unless it is "safe and effective," not "safe and effective for adults only." I believe that current FDCA requires the Commissioner to get ped data if children are a foreseeable user of the drug, and the legislative history in both the 30's and the 60's is filled with statements about the need to protect infants and children. Nobody thought that the argument could fly, although nobody could tell me why. So we kept working on exclusivity.

FDA always told me to try the exclusivity legislation first and to come back to this Administration approach only if the legislation failed. Well, it failed, and in the meanwhile, I think Chai and Sharon and I convinced some of the originally skeptical FDA lawyers that we were either right or at least had a good case. (I should note that we're talking about ALL drugs here, not just AIDS drugs. FDA says that 80% of all drugs have no ped data on them.)

Obviously, none of this was shared with pharmaceutical industry types, most of whom would oppose the argument because it would require them to do some extra work before licensure (although only a very modest amount, since FDA only requires safety trials for kids, not efficacy trials, so we're talking about 30 kids for 6 months) and it would limit their ability to get the extended exclusivity of the Kassebaum bill (which is worth a lot of money to them).

Anyway, we were exploring the possibility of our asking the Administration for this, when we realized that almost any action that was generated by us would be subject to endless rounds of review, Congressional oversight, and possible countersuit. We believe that having the Administration stake out a strong first line will limit the ability of the manufacturers to oppose the policy: It's too hard to fight pediatric access, especially when it's stated as a simple and straightforward goal. Even our talking about it has generated very sympathetic press stories--from the Wall Street Journal to NPR.

After talking with PAF, Daschle's staff sent over the proposal you've seen to have an Executive Order on the point. It's my understanding that Rahm Emmanuel (before he was promoted) expressed support for this.

So, that's where it stands now. I did talk with Jeff and Richard about the development of an Administrative approach in lieu of the Kassebaum bill, and I am very sorry if I didn't convey this to you directly. (I know I talked to you briefly about the Kassebaum bill and you were helpful on that, but that doesn't take the place of my telling you personally about the regulatory approach. I'm sorry.) Anyway, Chai and Sharon know this issue and this approach inside and out. They should be able to explain the legal arguments and answer any and all questions. If not--or if you need more--I am in ready reach via phone, fax, e-mail, and FedEx--all directly to me, surrounded by Kleenex.

Thanks for your attention. Let me know how things progress. I will be back on January 30.

Panel discussions considered the merit of AIDS literature as a separate genre, the advocacy role of AIDS writing, and the impact of AIDS writing on American literature.

"Survey Finds '90s College Freshmen More Conservative Than Predecessors"

Compared to college freshmen in the mid-1970s and 1980s, those interviewed in a 1996 survey were more conservative--giving less approval to casual sex and showing more concern about paying for their education. Researchers at the University of California at Los Angeles reported the findings, from a survey of 354,853 college freshmen at 494 institutions. The researchers noted that growing AIDS awareness among college students has contributed to the more conservative sexual attitudes.

"AZT May Mute Benefits of New AIDS Therapy"

Los Angeles Times--Washington Edition (01/13/97) P. A3; Colker, David

New research suggests that AIDS patients who took long courses of the drug AZT may have hurt their chances of being treated effectively with the new protease inhibitors. Some experts say that AZT effectively encouraged HIV to mutate in these patients, leaving them with a virus that is resistant to the new drugs. "The irony is that what we as physicians did a few years ago in trying to fight the disease has left a number of patients with fewer options," said Daniel Kuritzakes, an AIDS researcher at the University of Colorado. An estimated 5 percent to 30 percent of patients now being treated for HIV are in this situation, researchers say.

"Are Needle Exchanges a Forgotten Weapon in the War Against AIDS?"

Los Angeles Times--Washington Edition (01/13/97) P. A11; Kilmer, Beau G.; Farah, Joseph

The ban on federal funding for needle exchange programs should be lifted, argues Beau G. Kilmer, of the Center for Strategic and International Studies, in a commentary in the Los Angeles Times, Washington edition. However, Joseph Farah, of the Western Journalism Center in Sacramento, contends in an opposing commentary that the programs do not save lives and that they encourage drug use. Both writers point to the recommendations and findings of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the National Research Council. Kilmer notes that the CDC has endorsed lifting the ban, while an NRC and Institute of Medicine report concluded that needle exchanges would save the

government money. Farah, meanwhile, claims that both the CDC and the NRC found no empirical proof to suggest that the programs will save lives.

"With Judge's Approval, Marijuana Club Is Set to Bloom Again"

San Francisco's Cannabis Buyers' Club, closed since a raid by state drug officials last August, is being allowed to re-open. Judge David A. Garcia of San Francisco Superior Court ruled that the club could provide marijuana to patients with serious illnesses under the state's new medical marijuana law. The judge said the club could not make a profit and that members would have to have their medical conditions documented by a doctor.

"Across the USA: Tennessee"
USA Today (01/13/97) P. 8A

A Tennessee pathologist told CBS' "60 Minutes" that he contracted HIV in 1992 after an accident during an autopsy of an AIDS patient. Mahlon Johnson, a pathologist at Vanderbilt University, said he has been taking drug therapy which has kept the virus down to undetectable levels.

"Quiet Gains for Health"

Among the encouraging health-related reports for 1996 is that, for the first time, the death rate from AIDS-related causes did not increase from the previous year. The disease, however, is still the leading cause of death among American males aged 25 to 44. Advances in drug treatments have buoyed the hopes of those infected with HIV by suggesting that the disease could be managed as a long-term illness.

"Police Halt Condom Protest at Vatican"

A group of student demonstrators were stopped from distributing condoms in St. Peter's Square in Vatican City on Sunday. The 15 students were protesting the Catholic Church's ban on the use of condoms to stop the spread of HIV. Later, the group gave condoms and literature to people on the streets just outside the square, which is on Vatican sovereign territory.

"Early Tests May Indicate Rate of Progression to AIDS"
Lancet (01/04/97) Vol. 349, No. 9044, P. 33; McCarthy, Michael

Testing HIV-infected individuals for various health factors just after seroconversion may provide insight into how quickly AIDS is likely to develop, new research suggests. Homayoon Farzadegan of Johns Hopkins University, and colleagues, evaluated the serological, virological, and epidemiological factors for two groups of homosexual men with approximated seroconversion dates. At their first seropositive visit, men who were rapid progressors had "significantly higher concentrations of plasma HIV-1 RNA and prevalence of p24 antigenemia and significantly lower amounts of antibodies to the HIV-1 gag proteins p17 and p24," compared to the non-rapid progressors, the researchers reported. They

suggest that the early development of an anti-gag immune response may play an important role in preventing rapid progression, and that a potential approach for a vaccine could be to generate an immune response to gag-proteins.

"Partner Notification Law Opens Prevention Door"
AIDS Alert (1/97) Vol. 12, No. 1, P. 1

An amendment to the Ryan White CARE Reauthorization Act, requiring spousal notification, has been criticized for pertaining to spouses only, but promises to renew interest in partner notification efforts. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Advisory Committee for HIV/STD Prevention discussed the new law at its November meeting. "The reality is someone felt strongly enough about it that it got passed, and we have an obligation to comply with it," said the CDC's Dr. Helene Gayle. "Our feeling is, that being the case, let's look more broadly in this area and see if we can't make policies that do have public health impact given that this one probably doesn't." Because it applies only to people who are or were legally married, the law exempts most couples at highest risk for HIV transmission. Partner notification efforts receive the largest portion of federal funds for HIV counseling and testing, but no national standard exists for how it should be practiced. The CDC has created a working group to research partner notification practices and develop policy guidelines.

A Florida AIDS patient who is involved in a lawsuit to end the state's ban on assisted suicide was in too much pain to attend court Monday and may die before he could benefit from a favorable ruling. Charles Hall testified when the trial opened last year in West Palm Beach, but has returned to his home in Beverly to wait for a decision in the case. His physician, Dr. Cecil McIver, said he did not think Hall would survive long enough to benefit if the court overturned the ban.

"Clinton to Seek Curb on Medicaid"

New York Times (01/14/97) P. A1; Pear, Robert

In an attempt to help balance the federal budget by 2002, President Clinton has proposed limiting Medicaid spending, despite criticism from Democrats. Clinton's plan would allow Medicaid, which increased an average of 7.9 percent per year from 1992 to 1996, to grow 4 percent to 5 percent each year. Clinton would request additional funding for AIDS care and other federal health services, according to the newsletter Community Health Funding Report. Spending on HIV prevention would be increased \$20 million to \$637 million, with extra funding targeted to HIV prevention for drug users.

"Avid Corp. Licenses HIV Inhibitor From DuPont Merck"

Philadelphia Inquirer (01/14/97) P. C3

Under an agreement with DuPont Merck, Avid received the license for an HIV protease inhibitor known as DMP450. Avid acquired the worldwide marketing rights to the drug, while DuPont Merck was paid an undisclosed sum and is eligible for future milestone and royalty payments. Human testing of the drug is expected to begin in the coming months, Avid said.

"Cell Genesys Inc."

Wall Street Journal (01/14/97) P. B6

Cell Genesys announced on Monday that it will acquire Somatix Therapy for stock valued at \$86 million, or \$3.51 per share. The deal will enable the two companies to combine their research efforts on gene therapy for cancer, AIDS, and other diseases. Neither Cell Genesys nor Somatix currently has a product on the market, and one is not expected until the year 2000 at the earliest. Somatix shares fell 16 percent in Monday's composite trading on the Nasdaq Stock Market, while Cell Genesys closed at \$8.813, down 31.25 cents.

"Vaccinations Against Future Loose Living"

Wall Street Journal (01/14/97) P. A21; Severyn, Kristine M.

Vaccines for sexually transmitted diseases should not be required for children and teenagers, contends Kristine M. Severyn, director of Ohio Parents for Vaccine Safety, in a Wall Street Journal letter to the editor. She says the vaccine industry is now targeting these diseases, evidenced by a Wall Street Journal article which reported that two companies are testing vaccines for the virus that causes genital warts. She points out that the vaccine for hepatitis B, which is transmitted

both sexually and through tainted drug-injection equipment, is being given to babies at birth and is recommended for teenagers. In conclusion, Severyn notes that speakers at a recent Centers for Disease Control and Prevention public meeting recommended that all 11- and 12-year-olds receive vaccines against sexually transmitted diseases, including AIDS, and she claims that "vaccine policy has gone too far."

"AIDS Drug Cocktail Finds Growing Role in Preventing Infection"
Boston Globe (01/13/97) P. C1; Emery, Theo

When health care workers are accidentally exposed to HIV on the job, they are increasingly prescribed a cocktail of drugs similar to that used to treat infected patients and, at least in the short term, often saved from infection. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that the combination of drugs is effective as a so-called postexposure prophylaxis in 79 percent of such cases if it is started within one or two hours of exposure. The agency has recommended that the treatment be given all health workers exposed to HIV on the job. Other uses of the treatment are being considered, such as HIV prevention for rape victims and intravenous drug users who have been exposed to the virus. However, the CDC is reluctant to extend the PCP recommendations due to gaps in understanding how HIV is transmitted and the side effects of the drugs.

"Volunteers Help AIDS Patients Tend Pet Pals"
USA Today (01/14/97) P. 4D; Ashley, Beth

Pets Are Wonderful Support, or PAWS, an organization that helps people with HIV and AIDS care for their pets, began in San Francisco in 1988 and spurred the creation of 30 similar organizations in major U.S. cities. Volunteers for the group help patients keep their pets at home by walking dogs, delivering pet food, changing litter boxes, taking pets to be groomed, and other services.

"Eye-Opening News About Teens and Sex"
American Health (1/97-2/97) Vol. 16, No. 1, P. 22

Half of the high school students participating in a recent survey said their doctors had never broached the topics of AIDS or safer sex with them, the Santa Monica, CA public policy organization Rand reports. Teenagers questioned in another study, conducted by researchers at Indiana University in Bloomington, said that they thought peers were more sexually active and less likely to practice safer sex than they actually were, possibly causing them to feel pressure to have unsafe sex themselves.

"Perinatal Transmission and Sex Practices During Pregnancy"
AIDS Clinical Care (01/97) Vol. 9, No. 1, P. 9; Sax, Paul E.

Mother-to-child HIV transmission is known to be affected by factors other than maternal viral load. An analysis of the impact of sex practices during pregnancy, published in the journal AIDS by P. B. Matheson and colleagues, found that heterosexual behavior was significantly linked to an increased risk of perinatal transmission. The study evaluated the reports from 75 pregnant

women on the frequency of heterosexual sex and condom use during pregnancy. Frequency of unprotected sex during pregnancy was associated with transmission of HIV to the infant. The researchers suggest that unprotected intercourse could expose the fetus to HIV, as well as increase both the likelihood of placental membranes being disrupted and the risk of chorioamnionitis.

"Resistance of Neonatal Monkeys to Live Attenuated Vaccine Strains of Simian Immunodeficiency Virus"

Nature Medicine (01/97) Vol. 3, No. 1, P. 32; Wyand, Michael S.; Manson, Kelledy H.; Lackner, Andrew A.; et al.

Macaque monkeys infected with SIV, the simian immunodeficiency virus, provide valuable models for research toward a human HIV vaccine. Live-attenuated vaccines using SIV have demonstrated strong protection against infection in juvenile and adult rhesus monkeys. This strategy raises safety concerns, however, about the potential exposure of fetuses and neonates to the virus. Ronald C. Desrosiers of the New England Regional Primate Research Center at Harvard Medical School and colleagues found that among 18 neonatal monkeys who were inoculated just after birth, only the two that had been given an especially high dose showed high viral loads or disease symptoms. The researchers also report that mothers vaccinated during pregnancy did not transmit the virus to the fetus and that vaccination of the infants was needed to provide protective immunity. The authors conclude that the live-attenuated vaccine approach should be considered a potential option for a human HIV vaccine.

"Clinton Drafts Budget on Familiar Lines"

President Clinton's budget proposal for fiscal year 1998 is similar to his request last year, with added funding for welfare and reductions in Medicare and Medicaid spending. The plan includes a \$40 million increase in spending for the Ryan White Care Act, which provides medical assistance and services to AIDS patients. Patient advocates, however, will likely be disappointed, having demanded even more funding for the program to cover the high cost of new AIDS drugs. Clinton, meanwhile, is also hoping to secure an additional \$20 million in funding for HIV prevention efforts, and a 4 percent increase in the budget of the National Institutes of Health.

"Whitman-Walker Adopts Oral HIV Test Before Other Big AIDS Clinics"

Washington, D.C.'s Whitman-Walker Clinic has become the first major U.S. AIDS clinic to announce that it is switching from the standard blood test for HIV to a new test that uses oral fluid. Officials announced Wednesday that as of Feb. 1, only the new test, called OraSure, will be offered. The hope is that more people at risk for HIV will come to the clinic to get tested because it does not involve a needle and because it can be taken into the community, not performed only in medical settings. Studies have shown that OraSure, which was approved by the Food and Drug Administration in June, is as accurate as the traditional blood test.

"Around the Nation: Addenda"

San Francisco's Cannabis Cultivators Club reopened Wednesday, allowing members to use marijuana legally for the first time since the 1930s. The club was permitted to reopen under the state's new medical marijuana law and a judge's order to sell the drug to patients with prescriptions.

"Search Begins for 'Say No' Programs"

Questions are being raised about a provision in the new welfare law that allocates \$50 million for sex-education programs which advocate only abstinence. The funds--to be matched by state, local, and private sources--will be distributed by the Department of Health and Human Services, which recently met to discuss the program. Health officials say that because such programs are rare, guidelines are needed to meet the requirements.

Studies show that over 80 percent of Americans have had sex by age 19. Most Americans favor safer sex education to abstinence-only education to help protect teens from pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases. However, studies show that safer sex education/condom distribution programs do not always result in a decline in pregnancy or sexual activity. Studies of abstinence-only programs, though, have not been able to

demonstrate that they "work" any better. Some officials, meanwhile, are also questioning the definition of "abstinence-only," asking whether "abstinence from sexual activity" means no kissing as well.

"HIV-Positive Prostitute Faces Quarantine"

An HIV-positive Florida prostitute has been sentenced to a two-year quarantine in her home after pleading no contest to criminal transmission of HIV. Joann Moorehouse Guzman was arrested in August for propositioning an undercover officer; she later told police she had HIV.

"UPI Science News: [Hepatitis B Transmission]"

United Press International (01/15/97)

Four British women contracted hepatitis B from their surgeons, even though the doctors tested negative for the disease. According to a report in today's New England Journal of Medicine, not everyone with the disease carries the marker. Those without the marker are thought to be less likely to transmit the disease. Researcher Julia Heptonstall says the policy should be reviewed in light of the new cases.

"French Surgeon Infected Patient With AIDS"

An HIV-positive French woman most likely contracted the infection from her doctor during surgery, the French Health Ministry said Wednesday. The surgeon reportedly did not know he had HIV when he performed the operation five years ago. Out of 1,000 patients tested for HIV, only the woman was found to be infected.

"Pakistan to Deport Spanish Woman AIDS Sufferer"

A Spanish woman with AIDS, who was arrested in Pakistan for drug-smuggling a year ago, has been acquitted of the charges and will be deported to Spain on Sunday. Police say Luisa Maria Martin is being deported because she lacks travel documents.

"Russian Records Rise in HIV"

Nature (01/09/97) Vol. 385, No. 6612, P. 108

The number of HIV-infected people in Russia nearly doubled in 1996, when 1,031 new infections were reported. The Interfax news agency said that a total of 2,316 infections have been registered since 1987. Most new infections are attributed to shared injection drug needles. A health ministry official warned that AIDS education efforts are impaired by insufficient funds. In Hungary, meanwhile, 606 new HIV cases were reported in 1996, bringing the country's total number of AIDS cases to 4,000.

"Investigators Seeking New Ways to Stem Rising Tide of Resistant Fungi"

Journal of the American Medical Association (01/01/97) Vol. 277, No. 1, P. 5; Stephenson, Joan

Researchers are concerned about the increasing resistance of certain fungi to existing drugs. Fungal infections, including life-threatening ones once viewed as rare, are on the rise, due in part to the AIDS epidemic and advances in medical technology. "While we've become accustomed to appreciating the problems of antibacterial resistance, this level of resistance [by fungi] to antifungal drugs is historically unprecedented," notes Thomas J. Walsh, head of the immunocompromised host division of the National Cancer Institute. The number of drugs currently on the market for the treatment of fungal infections is small, primarily because of a perception once held by drug makers that life-threatening fungal infections were too rare to be profitable. Another obstacle in the development of new drugs is that fungi are eukaryotes, which makes it hard to develop medications that inhibit fungal growth without being too toxic. Now that the need for new drugs has become apparent, however, researchers are seeking to gain a better understanding of resistance and find new ways to attack and possibly kill, instead of merely inhibit, the microbes. Several drug makers--including Merck, Eli Lilly, Schering-Plough, Pfizer, Janssen Pharmaceutica, and NeXstar Pharmaceuticals--are working on new agents, including a number of compounds aimed at the fungal cell wall.

AIDS experts agree that an AIDS vaccine is critical for ending the epidemic, but concerns about safety and liability have stalled human testing of viable vaccines. The argument is

divided between those who favor going ahead with human tests despite a lack of confidence and those who say such tests would be unethical and wasteful. One key reason for the lack of confidence in the vaccines available is that the pharmaceutical companies have shown little interest in the effort. Some firms say their apparent lack of commitment to an AIDS vaccine is due to the lack of basic research. "We may have appeared to slow down," said Merck's Emilio Emini, "but that's because we're groping around in the dark."

"French Doctor With AIDS Reportedly Infected Patient in Surgery"
New York Times (01/17/97) P. A5; Simons, Marlise

A French woman almost certainly contracted HIV from her doctor during surgery at a hospital near Paris, the French Health Ministry reports. If proven, it would mark the second time a patient was thought to be infected by a doctor through a medical procedure. The surgeon, Dr. Patrick Cohen, who claims he was infected by a patient he operated on in 1983, was not tested for HIV until 1994. The ministry has contacted 5,000 patients Cohen had operated on since 1983, and out of 986 former patients who were tested for HIV, only this woman was found to be infected. Dr. Luc Montagnier, director of the National Center of Virology and a co-discoverer of HIV, says that tests indicate it was "highly probable" that the virus was passed on from the doctor to his patient. The incident has renewed the debate over whether both doctors and patients should be screened for HIV before surgery.

"Roche's Sales Rose 11 Percent in 1996"

The Swiss pharmaceutical firm Roche Holding reported Thursday that its 1996 sales were up 11 percent, to \$11.6 billion, and profits are expected to increase again. The company attributed the increase to sales of its leading products, such as the injectable antibiotic Rocephin, and the success of new drugs like the AIDS drug Invirase.

"Sheathed Needles Safer for Health Workers"
Philadelphia Inquirer (01/17/97) P. A18

Two government studies found that needles with safety sheaths or blunt tips may be the best tools to reduce healthcare workers' risk of contracting HIV and other diseases. Among the 51 documented cases of HIV infection among U.S. healthcare workers, 20 were caused by needlestick injuries while drawing blood. The first study found that the workers' risk of being pricked was reduced 76 percent by using hypodermic needles with plastic sheaths or small metal tubes that protect the needle tip as it is withdrawn. The second study showed that blunt suturing needles caused no injuries, compared to 56 injuries caused by sharp needles. The studies were conducted by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention at several hospitals in major U.S. cities.

"Hopkins to Offer HMO for AIDS"

In an effort to improve the efficiency of AIDS care without sacrificing quality, Baltimore's Johns Hopkins Hospital is planning to offer a managed care plan for AIDS patients only. In one of the first programs of its kind, the plan will involve the hospital's experienced AIDS specialists, who have a proven record of providing better care to AIDS patients at a lower cost than other Maryland hospitals. The program, which will start in March, will first enroll people in the state's Medicaid program.

Tests for hepatitis and HIV are being given to 11 ninth graders in Concord, N.H., who pricked themselves with a lancet brought to school.

"Red Cross Could Still Collect Blood"

Despite its involvement in Canada's tainted blood tragedy on the 1980s, the Canadian Red Cross Society may be contracted by the federal government to continue collecting and distributing blood for up to three more years. The government previously announced that a National Blood Authority would be created to take over the blood system by September, but the agency may involve the Red Cross in the system. The Red Cross, however, would be required to separate blood collecting from its other operations and establish a separate board of directors. Ontario has opposed the plan and is calling for the Red Cross to have a much more limited role.

"One Gala's Purpose Is to Frustrate Dornan"

Washington Times (01/17/97) P. A11; Bedard, Paul

Among the inaugural balls being held this weekend is the controversial Red Ribbon Inaugural Gala, organized by AIDS lobbyist Tom Sheridan to raise money to help a freshman congresswoman from California combat efforts by former Rep. Robert K. Dornan to reclaim his seat. The event is being hosted by the American AIDS Political Committee to support Rep. Loretta Sanchez (D-Calif.). However, other AIDS groups, such as ACT UP, have criticized Sheridan for not adequately supporting AIDS candidates in 1995 and 1996. "It's inauguration week and he's trying to get a piece of the action and profit," said ACT UP's Steve Michael, who suggests that people just send their money directly to Sanchez. Sheridan says the money used by his political action campaign in previous years went toward a direct mail fund-raising plan, voter education, and organizational help for candidates.

"This Doctor Wants to Help You Die"

New York (01/13/97) Vol. 30, No. 1, P. 25; France, David

Dr. Howard Grossman, a New York physician who joined a lawsuit two years ago to overturn the state's ban on physician-assisted suicide, says he never expected the case to reach the Supreme Court. Grossman, along with two other doctors, filed the suit on

behalf of one of his AIDS patients who did not want to face a slow, painful death. The doctor later gave him a large dose of morphine, a practice which is legal under a technicality of state law. A recent survey of 69 AIDS doctors showed that one-third admitted to actively helping administer a lethal drug--either in the form of pills or injections. Grossman notes, "AIDS docs are a different breed, we have dealt with a lot more death in a lot more intense way." Doubts about physician-assisted suicide may be increasing in the AIDS community, however, as new therapies improve survival among such patients. "I very much support this right," said Sean Strub, the founder and editor of Poz magazine, who has seen his health improve dramatically with new drugs. "But if this was a common, everyday practice and socially acceptable, it is something I would have seriously considered a year ago, when I was failing very substantially."

"Is Death Inevitable With Multiresistant TB Plus HIV Infection?"
Lancet (01/11/97) Vol. 349, No. 9045, P. 71; Drobniewski, Francis

Patients infected with both HIV and multidrug-resistant tuberculosis (MDRTB) are more likely to survive if TB is diagnosed quickly and drug resistance is detected early, says Francis Drobniewski of King's College School of Medicine in a commentary in the Lancet. MDRTB is on the rise, due to poor patient compliance and inadequately supervised treatment, which usually includes isoniazid and rifampicin. Rapid progression from Mycobacterium tuberculosis infection to TB disease is more likely in HIV-positive individuals, as is the development of extrapulmonary disease. As evidence, Drobniewski cites a retrospective study of TB patients at a New York hospital. The research found that, of 38 patients with MDRTB, all but four were HIV-positive. Half of the patients responded to treatment, with an average survival time of 315 days. A second study showed improved survival when MDRTB was detected early and therapy was used. Response and survival in both studies were more likely if at least two treatments to which the isolate was susceptible in in vitro testing were used. In conclusion, Drobniewski urges the use of rapid tests for all major anti-TB drugs, the identification of new drug targets, and the development of new treatment strategies. She also notes the importance of advanced planning, close surveillance for nosocomial TB, and a high suspicion for the disease.

Evaluation of Safety Devices for Preventing Percutaneous Injuries
Among Health-Care Workers During Phlebotomy Procedures --
Minneapolis-St. Paul, New York City, and San Francisco, 1993-1995

Health-care workers (HCWs) are at risk for infections with bloodborne pathogens resulting from occupational exposures to blood through percutaneous injuries (PIs). Phlebotomy, one of the most commonly performed medical procedures, has been associated with 13%-62% of injuries reported to hospital occupational health services (1,2) and with 20 (39%) of the 51 documented episodes of occupationally acquired human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection reported in the United States (CDC, unpublished data, 1996). Although safety devices designed to prevent PIs associated with phlebotomy have been available for use in the United States, clinical evaluation of these devices has been difficult because 1) ascertainment of PIs is difficult (many injuries are unreported [2,3], and observation of all procedures is impractical because phlebotomy is performed throughout the hospital by different groups of HCWs at all hours), 2) data to calculate PI rates (i.e., the number of phlebotomies performed and devices used) are not routinely available, 3) a large number of phlebotomies must be evaluated because of the low rates of phlebotomy-related PI, and 4) rates of safety-feature activation are difficult to assess. This report summarizes a collaborative study by CDC and six hospitals to evaluate safety devices for phlebotomy. The findings indicate that use of safety devices

significantly reduced phlebotomy-related PI rates while having minimal clinically apparent adverse effects on patient care.*

The study was conducted in two phases during 1993-1995 at six university-affiliated hospitals in Minneapolis-St. Paul, Minnesota (three hospitals), New York, New York (one hospital), and San Francisco, California (two hospitals). Each hospital selected the products to be evaluated (vacuum-tube blood-collection devices and/or winged steel needles with safety features). The assessment was restricted to a comparison of safety devices with conventional devices, not with other safety devices. Products evaluated included a resheathable winged steel needle (Safety-Lok[trademark] [Becton Dickinson, Franklin Lakes, New Jersey]** [six hospitals]); a blunable vacuum-tube blood-collection needle activated while in the patient's vein (Punctur-Guard[trademark] [Bio-Plexus, Inc., Tolland, Connecticut] [three hospitals]); and a vacuum-tube blood-collection needle with a hinged recapping sheath (Venipuncture Needle-Pro[trademark] [Smith Industries (Concord Portex), Keene, New Hampshire] [four hospitals]). Each product requires the HCW to activate the safety feature during or after phlebotomy. Before introducing safety devices, each hospital conducted a comprehensive training program for HCWs that included "hands-on" experience with the equipment.

During phase I (mean duration among the hospitals: 10 months; range: 9-12 months), hospitals used conventional phlebotomy devices and conducted enhanced surveillance for injuries (e.g., encouraging reporting, publishing notices in the hospital newsletter, posting educational materials, and/or providing inservice training for staff). An anonymous survey was distributed to four groups of HCWs who routinely perform phlebotomies*** to estimate their rates of underreporting of PIs to hospital surveillance systems and to determine the average number of phlebotomies performed each day and average number of days worked each week. The rates of PIs associated with phlebotomy devices for HCWs in each of these four groups were estimated by dividing the number of phlebotomy-related PIs reported to the hospital's surveillance system during the study period (adjusted for underreporting by occupation) by the total number of phlebotomies performed (estimated from the daily average number of phlebotomies performed by each HCW, the number of HCWs in each of the four groups, and the duration of the study period).

During phase II (mean duration among the hospitals: 12 months; range: 6-15 months), investigators replaced conventional phlebotomy devices with safety devices hospitalwide, monitored supplies of phlebotomy equipment to attempt to ensure that only safety devices were available, continued enhanced surveillance for injuries, and inventoried the autoclaved contents of a representative sample of disposal containers for sharp instruments to determine rates of use of safety devices and conventional devices and rates of activation of safety features.

The HCW survey was repeated 1-2 months before the end of phase II, and the estimated PI rates for safety and conventional devices were compared. The second HCW survey also included questions to assess HCW satisfaction with safety devices and to determine the occurrence of adverse effects in patients that were apparent at the time of the phlebotomy****.

The overall response rate for each of the two HCW surveys was approximately 75%, based on estimates of the number of HCWs who received survey forms; 1699 HCWs responded in phase I and 1421 in phase II. Overall, respondents acknowledged reporting 302 (54%) of 563 needlestick injuries they had sustained from all types of needles during the previous year. Reporting rates varied by occupation: 91% of injuries among phlebotomists were reported, as were 68% among nurses, 35% among medical students, and 31% among residents. Within occupations, reporting rates were similar among hospitals and between the two surveys. Because estimated rates of phlebotomy-related PI by device and occupation were similar for each hospital in which a particular device was used, data were aggregated among hospitals to permit comparison of PI rates for safety and conventional phlebotomy devices. Compared with conventional devices, PI rates were lower for safety devices (Table 1).

Of 41 PIs associated with safety devices, 34 (83%) involved winged steel needles and seven (17%) involved vacuum-tube blood-collection needles (Table 1). Twenty-five (61%) involved an injury before activation of the safety feature was appropriate or possible (e.g., within seconds after the device was removed from the vein); six (15%) occurred during activation of the safety feature (all with Safety-Lok[®]). For eight (20%), the safety feature had not been activated, and for two (5%), the mechanism of injury was unknown. Safety devices constituted 12,681 (89%) of the 14,261 phlebotomy devices in autoclaved sharps-disposal containers. In the phase II HCW survey, HCWs were asked "Do you prefer the safety device over conventional equipment?" Among 1108 HCWs, 1879 responses were related to one or more of the three devices; 822 (44%) responded yes; 622 (33%), no; and 435 (23%), unsure. Editorial Note: The findings in this report suggest that safety devices for phlebotomy can reduce the risk for occupational PIs among HCWs. In particular, there was a significant reduction in phlebotomy-related PIs associated with use of each of the vacuum-tube blood-collection devices and a reduction in PIs associated with use of the winged steel needles. Further decreases in phlebotomy-related PIs might have been possible with increased use of safety devices and/or increased

activation of safety features by HCWs. Experts have recommended that safety devices include safety features that activate automatically and do not rely on activation by HCWs (4,5). Although the assessment of potential patient complications in this study was limited, short-term complications were clinically minimal, and although patients were not systematically monitored for long-term follow-up, phlebotomy needles are not indwelling devices and long-term complications of phlebotomy are rare.

Results of this study also suggest that safety devices for phlebotomy may be generally acceptable to users. Activation rates of safety features and user acceptability may be influenced by factors such as the perceived risk for occupational infection by the HCW, design of the device, training provided before and after introduction of the device, length of time needed to become adept at using the device, ease of use, necessary changes in technique, and previous experience with safety devices (5). Further analyses will assess whether safety-feature activation rates and user acceptability in this study varied by hospital, city, occupation, or device used. Acceptability of a device to an institution may be influenced by cost.

In this study, only 54% of PIs were reported to hospital surveillance systems--a rate consistent with those documented in previous studies (range: 5%-60% [2,3]). Failure to report PIs may compromise appropriate postexposure management, including postexposure prophylaxis for HIV and hepatitis B virus, and assessment of occupational hazards and preventive interventions (6,7). Health-care institutions and HCWs must further assess reasons for underreporting and improve reporting of all occupational blood exposures.

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration requires that primary methods to reduce occupational PIs include engineering controls (8), and the Food and Drug Administration has urged that needleless or recessed needle systems be used to replace hypodermic needles for accessing intravenous administration sets (9). Some manufacturers are continuing efforts to develop and refine safety devices to improve the effectiveness and acceptability of products. The findings in this report and in a companion report evaluating blunt suture needles (10) suggest that safety devices can be an effective component in a needlestick-prevention program. The Public Health Service is evaluating the implications of these and other data in assessing the possible need for further guidance on selection, implementation, and evaluation of safety devices in health-care settings.

"Evaluation of a System Using Oral Mucosal Transudate for HIV-1 Antibody Screening and Confirmatory Testing"

A test to detect HIV-1 antibodies in saliva has several advantages over the standard blood test, including increased safety for collection and handling of samples, increased patient compliance, and an alternative for patients in which blood sampling is difficult. The accuracy of such tests has been questioned, however, due to conflicting reports. Epitome's Dr. John H. Fitchen and colleagues thus tested the company's OraSure HIV-1 antibody test in 3,570 subjects to determine its accuracy. The test, approved by the Food and Drug Administration, is designed to collect oral mucosal transudate, an oral fluid with concentrated levels of HIV antibodies. The researchers concluded that OraSure was as accurate as serum testing. They also suggest that the saliva test would be well-suited for use in a home HIV test kit, in large part because it does not involve the use of a needle, which is both safer and more advantageous to individuals with compromised venous access. Moreover, they note, the collection device is easy to use and portable; the samples remain stable for at least three weeks, which makes the test useful in outreach and Third World settings; and because training related to saliva testing is minimal, the device reduces the personnel costs associated with gathering samples for HIV testing.

New York restaurant owner Florent, who regularly offers counsel to people seeking assisted suicide, says he does not regret his involvement in the practice. Florent began supporting assisted suicide for dying AIDS patients in 1986, after seeing a friend die slowly in a hospital. Now, in addition to his advice in the restaurant, he is a member of the board of Choice in Dying, a New York organization that advocates the use of living wills for dying patients to refuse life-supporting medical care. He says that although his actions could be interpreted as

"promoting a suicide attempt" and be considered a felony, he is not worried about prosecution.

"French Group Appeals to H.I.V.-Positive Doctors to Halt Surgery"

A physicians' group in France plans to ask HIV-positive doctors to stop performing surgery, following last week's announcement by the French Health Ministry that a surgeon had infected a patient with HIV during an operation. The French Order of Doctors, with 210,000 members, sets standards for the medical profession in France. "We believe that it is the moral duty of a doctor infected by HIV to stop operating in the interest of his patients," said Dr. John Langlois, a representative of the group. Langlois noted that although a law would be required to prevent an infected doctor from performing surgery, the organization would issue "a very firm recommendation" against the practice.

"Personal Health: There Is Bad News and Good About a Hidden Viral Epidemic: Hepatitis C"

Like HIV, hepatitis C can infect a person without causing immediate symptoms and it cannot be eradicated from the body. Even with drug treatment soon after infection, hepatitis C infection is likely to cause chronic liver infection, causing cirrhosis, organ failure, and cancer in some cases. Almost 1.5 percent of the population is infected with hepatitis C, which is mostly transmitted through blood. Blood-screening has dramatically reduced the risk of infection from transfusions, but intravenous drug use has become the most frequent route of transmission. Needle exchange programs could possibly reduce this risk while also reducing HIV transmission among drug users. Sexual transmission is thought to be responsible for about one case in 20.

"Across the USA: Maine, North Dakota"

A poll of Maine residents revealed that 64 percent support physician-assisted suicide and 52 percent favor the legalization of medical marijuana. Under a bill being considered in North Dakota, meanwhile, the state would cover the insurance costs for HIV-infected people who lose their group insurance if they become too ill to work.

"Stronger Pneumonia on Rise Across U.S."
Washington Times (01/22/97) P. A1; Price, Joyce

Pneumonia has become the most deadly infectious disease in the United States, due to an increase in the micro-organisms that cause the disease and a rise in the population most susceptible to it, according to a new study in the journal *Infectious Disease in Clinical Practice*. Deaths from pneumonia among those most at risk--children, the elderly, and the seriously ill or immunocompromised--peak during the flu season. Dr. John G. Bartlett, of Johns Hopkins Medical Institutions, describes the current season "worse than most in recent years." Bartlett also

noted that community-acquired pneumonia, or CAP, which is caused by common bacterial agents, is the leading cause of death in AIDS patients.

"Dangerous Epidemic Hidden From View"

The serious threat of sexually transmitted diseases among U.S. teenagers, reported recently by the Institute of Medicine, did not receive proper coverage in the media, contend Reed Irvine and Joseph Goulden of Accuracy in Media in a Washington Times commentary. The authors point out that, although the report said that "STDs represent a growing threat to the nation's health, and national action is urgently needed," and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said the report was a "call to arms," the news did not seem to merit much media attention. The authors note that the New York Times printed the story on the obituary page, while the Washington Post put it in its weekly health section and the Washington Times did not print anything. The major television networks did not cover the story either, Irvine and Goulden add.

"New Drug Mixture for AIDS Tested"

A combination of two AIDS drugs may provide better treatment than the three-drug cocktail previously recommended, AIDS researchers report. The two drug treatment consists of two protease inhibitors, while the triple combination uses three different kinds of drugs.

"BioChem Pharma's Bellini: CEO's Tenacity Pays Off With Top-Selling AIDS Drug"

Investor's Business Daily (01/21/97) P. A1; Benko, Laura B.

Francesco Bellini--co-founder, president, and CEO of the Quebec-based drug-maker BioChem Pharma--attributes his success to persistence. The company's AIDS drug 3TC, which is licensed to Glaxo Wellcome, became the top-selling AIDS drug last year, earning more than \$300 million in first-year sales. BioChem Pharma was founded in 1986 by Bellini and four other scientists, selling mostly diagnostic test kits. Now, however, the company's emphasis has shifted more to therapeutics and its pipeline includes the hepatitis B drug Lamivudine, as well as potential vaccines for bacterial meningitis, pneumonia, and the flu.

"Life-Prolonging Strategies for AIDS Patients Can Be Cost Effective"

Aggressive treatment for AIDS patients can be cost-effective by prolonging life, an official from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said. Dr. Jonathan E. Kaplan, of the agency's Division of HIV/AIDS Prevention, reported that HIV infection is often not detected early enough to treat properly. He suggested that all primary healthcare facilities offer AIDS counseling and testing to patients with tuberculosis, sexually transmitted diseases, and all pregnant women. Kaplan also recommended that certain measures be taken for patients suspected

of having AIDS, including assessment of HIV risk behavior, a chest x-ray, and tuberculin skin test, as well as tests for sexually transmitted diseases.

"AIDS Update"

Insight (01/20/97) Vol. 13, No. 2, P. 43; Berardelli, Phil

Researchers at the University of California at Los Angeles, in an attempt to learn more about the body's relationship to HIV, are focusing on the VH3 family of antibodies which bind easily to the virus. A study conducted in 250 high-risk homosexuals revealed a link between VH3 levels and susceptibility to HIV. Individuals with low levels of VH3 were more likely to be infected with HIV, while those with high levels of the protein were more likely to resist infection, explained researcher Lee Goodglick. If VH3 does provide HIV resistance, more research will be needed to determine whether levels of the natural protein can be manipulated enough to offer protection from the virus, Goodglick said.

"Propagation of a Human Herpesvirus From AIDS-Associated Kaposi's Sarcoma"

New England Journal of Medicine (01/16/97) Vol. 336, No. 3, P. 163; Foreman, Kimberly E.; Friborg, Jacques, Jr.; Kong, Wing-Pui; et al.

Data suggests that Kaposi's sarcoma, the most common cancer in AIDS patients, may be transmitted sexually, but an infectious agent has not been confirmed. A virus, named Kaposi's sarcoma-associated herpesvirus (KSHV), or human herpesvirus 8, has been found in patients with four types of Kaposi's sarcoma. It is unknown, though, if the virus can be replicated or propagated in the lab. Researchers now report, however, that they were able to propagate a herpes-like virus with DNA sequences identical to KSHV from skin lesions of patients with AIDS-related Kaposi's sarcoma. The authors note that the possible causal role of KSHV in Kaposi's sarcoma has not been confirmed by their work. They say that the findings should advance the development of diagnostic reagents for the disease, as well as allow more detailed study of the link between the virus and Kaposi's sarcoma.

Correction: On January 21, the AIDS Daily Summary incorrectly reported that the OraSure Oral HIV-1 Antibody Testing System is a saliva test. The OraSure sample is extracted from the oral mucosal transudate (OMT) of the mouth. OMT has a higher concentration of HIV antibodies and is free of most contaminants found in saliva. Also, Dr. John H. Fitchen is Chief Operating Officer of Medical Products at Epitope, Inc., not Epitome.

A Closely watched attempt to cure AIDS will take longer than hoped

WASHINGTON (AP) Despite researchers' high hopes, one year of drug therapy has failed to rid newly infected men of HIV, so a highly publicized attempt at an AIDS cure will have to continue for at least another year.

The doctors have found evidence that the virus remains hidden in the lymph glands after they had hoped it would be gone.

"Has HIV been eradicated from any of our patients? The answer is unequivocally no," Dr. David Ho of the Aaron Diamond AIDS Research Center in New York said Wednesday night.

The experiment has produced more promising evidence that the AIDS virus can be vastly knocked down by aggressive treatment, but the researchers say it is too soon to know whether an AIDS cure is even possible.

The research is being led by Ho, who galvanized the international AIDS meeting last summer in Vancouver, British Columbia, by announcing the ambitious effort to wipe out AIDS. His research brought him widespread praise that included being named Time magazine's 1996 Man of the Year.

The experiment was intended to see whether it was possible to eliminate every last trace of the AIDS virus effectively curing it if treatment began soon after people caught the virus.

Combinations of drugs that include medicines called protease inhibitors can stop the AIDS virus from making new copies of itself. The researchers theorized that after a year, all infected cells would have died off, leaving the body completely free of HIV.

However, they worried that infected cells might remain hidden,

perhaps in the lymph nodes or the brain.

The experiment involved 24 volunteers who began receiving the drugs within three months of catching HIV. The plan was to treat them for one year, then stop the drugs and check their lymph nodes for the virus.

Ho outlined the results so far at the opening session of the annual Conference on Retroviruses and Opportunistic Infections.

Four patients have dropped out of the study, and the rest have taken the drugs for periods ranging from seven to 16 months.

All signs of HIV have disappeared from the patients' bloodstreams, even using the most sensitive tests that can detect as few as 25 copies of the virus in each milliliter of blood.

The virus has also vanished from the men's semen, raising the possibility that they may not be able to spread the disease sexually.

However, tissue samples removed from five of the patients' digestive tracts turned up evidence of viral genes still hiding inside lymph cells of three of them. Ho said these copies of the virus may be defective and unable to reproduce.

Nonetheless, the doctors will continue the treatment for at least another year to allow more time for infected cells in the lymph system to slowly die off.

Doctors worry that otherwise these remnants of the virus might be able to reignite the disease if the protease inhibitors and other drugs are stopped.

"We don't see the virus DNA fading away. That may be enough to restart the process," said Dr. Calvin Cohen of the Harvard Community Health Plan in Boston.

Ho said he now thinks it may take two to 2 1/2 years for all the HIV-infected cells in the body to die, so treatment will have to continue for at least that long before doctors consider stopping it.

"Can HIV be eradicated from an infected individual? The answer is clearly we don't know, but it is important to find out," Ho said.
