SUBJECT: Recent Information Items

We are forwarding the following recent information items:

(A) Rob Fersh
Let's discuss

Rob Fersh memo on after-school care initiative. Via Leon who says it is a great idea and possible proposal for your State of the Union. . Fersh suggests that the issue could take off with some strategic small investments, "an appropriate 'bully pulpit' sharing of model programs," rather than a large new federal program. He stresses the increased need for extended day care for children, especially given the strict work requirements of welfare reform. This care could be part of your "welfare to work" initiatives and would dovetail well with your literacy initiative. Fersh cites as an example, LA's BEST, a year-round, after-school program for 4500 inner city elementary school children. The program has resulted in reduced crime and enhanced school performance. *We have sent Fersh's memo to Bruce Reed.*

(B)

Ickes Inaugural memos. 1) The *planning and budget* basically are on track: estimated revenues of \$25.6 million for Gala, parade and 14 balls; total estimated revenues of \$30.4 million and total estimated expenses \$35.7 million. As of January 2: 6,620 of the 10,839 Gala tickets sold; 9,700 of the 36,600 Parade tickets sold; approximately 30,000 of the 67,000 ball tickets sold. McAuliffe is confident ticket sales will meet projections. Gary Smith reports Gala is in better shape now at this point than four years ago. Debbie Willhite reports the parade and the mall events are in good shape with the exception of the "talkers" tent. 2) The *Inaugural and Martin Luther King's birthday* are on January 20 this year. The Inaugural will pay tribute to Dr. King by staging a musical on Sunday, January 19 in one of the two tents on the Mall about Dr. King. The musical is by Maya Angelou, et al., and opened in London several years ago. According to Ann Jordan, Mrs. King is delighted. 3) The *PIC web site* is WWW.INAUGURAL97.COM.

(C) Rob Fersh

McCaffrey memo on response to Administration's position on Arizona and California drug initiatives. There has been wide print and TV coverage, mostly focused on the impact on doctors who recommend or prescribe marijuana or other Schedule I drugs. Both the AMA and the California Medical Association support your call for research on marijuana's medical effectiveness. The General thinks that "it[']s essential that we remain prepared to reschedule marijuana as a Schedule II drug if the medical evidence supports a conclusion that the drug does have effective therapeutic uses."

I appreciated the call the other night and wish you all the best. Here are a few thoughts, per your request, on after school care.

Carla Sanger is a former teacher who runs a year-round, after school hours program for 4500 inner city Los Angeles elementary school children. This past May, at our national conference, she described after school care as an idea whose time has come. She compared it to the movement that swept the country over a century ago to implement kindergarten programs.

For a whole variety of reasons, it makes sense to elevate after school care, or the somewhat broader concept of "school aged child care." I sense this issue could take off with some strategic small investments, rather than some large new federal program. With an appropriate "bully pulpit", sharing of model programs, and enrollment of key public and private partners, there could be tremendous movement on this issue.

Here's why it makes sense and fits with the President's priorities:

1. There is increased need for extended day care for children, especially given welfare reform and strict work requirements.
2. Providing this care also should be integral to the President's efforts on "welfare to work" initiatives. It is not only a matter of having the private sector find jobs. These programs can prepare youngsters for the world of work. Many of them are not job ready.
3. After school care would dovetail wonderfully with the President's initiative on literacy. It is an ideal time for mentors and volunteers to work with children.
4. After school programming works. Carla Sanger's program, LA's BEST, has been evaluated over and over again with findings ranging from reduced crime to enhanced school performance. Research on other programs had similar findings.
5. After school programming can be key to reducing teen-age pregnancy, in addition to providing a safe haven for children and deterring crime and gang involvement.
6. There are a variety of public and private partners and models that can be encouraged. The Urban League, the Boys and Girls Clubs, the Y's, 4-H Clubs--as well as school systems, recreation departments, housing authorities, and a variety of community based organizations view this as a priority.

The bottom line is that this makes sense--whether its for safety, mentoring, literacy, work preparation, child care, or compensating for what some families cannot provide on their own. The likely result is much deeper community involvement with these children, at the same time that

parents can be given some help or even included in parenting programs as well. I can see a wide variety of people endorsing this--ranging from police, to education, to community development, to child care, to business, to literacy, to mentoring, to nutrition, to pro-private charity groups.

I cannot tell you all the public policy elements/proposals that should be included. We have gotten involved because there is widespread agreement that feeding children is critical to the success of these programs. Food not only draws them in, but it contributes to better performance and attentiveness.

In the food area, there are some relatively low-cost proposals worth doing. The primary program utilized to feed children outside school hours is the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP). Here are some needed changes:

- The Reagan cuts of 1981 limited CACFP to children 12 and under. The age limit should be raised, preferably to 18.
- For schools that want to operate after school or summer programming, they must apply separately and keep different books from those kept for School Lunch and Breakfast. We should allow them to coordinate the paperwork.
- There are some unnecessarily strict licensing requirements that programs must meet to qualify as "a child care center" in order to get food reimbursements.

In addition to these changes, I would suggest an federal inter-agency task force be created to coordinate the work of all federal agencies with an interest--presumably USDA, HHS, Education, Labor, HUD, Justice, and perhaps others. A review should be made of existing education, child care, community development and other funding streams to see if promotion of after school programs can occur through them. Additional earmarked (possibly pilot project or model program) money should be considered.

In addition, all the public and private players on this issue should be convened so that successful models can be identified and effective grassroots strategies can be promoted. This clearly is an initiative that each community should tailor to its own needs. Often, though, people who should be talking with each other do not know of their mutual interests. Heightened Presidential interest, and at least a sprinkling of money, has a way of galvanizing communities.

I hope you find this of interest. I think an initial, small gathering of some key backers of this concept--such as Hugh Price, Marian Edelman, the CEO of Boys and Girls Clubs, one or more education leaders, myself and a few others (including a grassroots operator) could really move this initiative forward quickly. Also included might be a corporation that already supports this concept philanthropically -- perhaps IBM, a leader in education, or Monsanto, already deeply involved in the President's welfare to work initiative and a primary funder of the Urban League after school initiative.

Dear Erskine:

With the help of the National Association of Partners in Education, Inc. (NAPE), a provision was included in the National and Community Service Act in 1990 to involve Federal employees as volunteers in public schools. The provision, which I had originally drafted, directs the head of each Federal agency and department to design and implement a comprehensive strategy to involve their employees as partners in elementary and secondary schools. A copy of the provision is attached for your information.

The Federal government, under this provision, is required take a leadership role, by example, in encouraging citizens and businesses to volunteer in their communities. It was envisioned that federal employees, as volunteers, could assist in this effort by providing a rich resource of knowledge and skills for public school children and teachers while demonstrating first hand the importance of volunteerism and public service.

Harris Wofford at the Corporation for National Service and I have spoken about the upcoming Summit for America's Future and its compatibility with the school volunteer statute. We both agree that considering the President's current education and community service initiatives, it is particularly timely to re-energize our efforts to involve Federal employees as partners in public schools.

I strongly recommend that the President use this opportunity to redouble our Federal government's efforts by making the volunteer partnership program one of the Administration's major commitments announced at the Summit. I am encouraged to hear that the President's Domestic Policy Council has recently been made aware of the legislation and are considering it as part of the Federal government's commitment.

I look forward to working with the President and the Administration on this effort to help our Federal employees become volunteer partners in education with children in their communities. § 12642. Partnerships with schools**(a) Design of programs**

The head of each Federal agency and department shall design and implement a comprehensive strategy to involve employees of such agencies and departments in partnership programs with elementary schools and secondary schools. Such strategy shall include—

(1) a review of existing programs to identify and expand the opportunities for such employees to be adult volunteers in schools and for students and out-of-school youth;

(2) the designation of a senior official in each such agency and department who will be responsible for establishing partnership

and youth service programs in each such agency and department and for developing partnership and youth service programs.

(3) the encouragement of employees of such agencies and departments to participate in partnership programs and other service projects;

(4) the annual recognition of outstanding service programs operated by Federal agencies; and

(5) the encouragement of businesses and professional firms to include community service among the factors considered in making hiring, compensation, and promotion decisions.

(b) Report

Not later than 180 days after November 16, 1990, and on a regular basis thereafter, the head of each Federal agency and department shall prepare and submit, to the appropriate Committees of Congress, a report concerning the implementation of this section.

§ 12511. Definitions

for purposes of this subchapter:

(1) **Adult volunteer**

The term "adult volunteer" means an individual, such as an older adult, an individual with a disability, a parent, or an employee of a business or public or private nonprofit organization, who—

(A) works without financial remuneration in an educational institution to assist students or out-of-school youth; and

(B) is beyond the age of compulsory school attendance in the State in which the educational institution is located.

(2) **Approved national service position**

The term "approved national service position" means a national service position for which the Corporation has approved the provision of a national service educational award described in section 12603 of this title as one of the benefits to be provided for successful service in the position.

(3) **Carry out**

The term "carry out", when used in connection with a national service program described in section 12572 of this title, means the planning, establishment, operation, expansion, or replication of the program.

(4) **Chief Executive Officer**

The term "Chief Executive Officer", except when used to refer to the chief executive officer of a State, means the Chief Executive Officer of the Corporation appointed under section 12651c of this title.

(5) **Community-based agency**

The term "community-based agency" means a private nonprofit organization (including a church or other religious entity) that—

(A) is representative of a community or a significant segment of a community; and

(B) is engaged in meeting human, educational, environmental, or public safety community needs.

SUBJECT: Briefing for phone call to Senator Graham

SUMMARY:

On Wednesday, March 12, you received a phone call from Senator Graham regarding the issue of the Corporation's role on "school partnerships." The purpose of this memo is to give you background on the school partnership provision of our legislation, the history of the Corporation with regard to school partnerships, and options for future courses of action.

SCHOOL PARTNERSHIP PROVISION:

Subtitle F, Section 182 of our legislation requires the head of each Federal agency and department to design and implement a comprehensive strategy which will involve their agency employees in partnership programs with elementary and secondary schools. There are five components to the strategy:

1. Review of existing programs;
2. Designation of a senior official in each agency to be responsible for establishing the partnership programs;
3. Encouragement of employees to participate;
4. Annual recognition of outstanding programs;
5. Encouragement of private firms to include community service as a factor in employment decisions.

The legislation does not specify an overall role for the Corporation. The interpretation taken by NAPE and Senator Graham, but not stated in the legislation, is that the Corporation should play a central coordinating role in school partnerships across the federal government. This role would require the Corporation to ensure that each department and agency identify a contact person, encourage school partnerships, and report back on this activity to the Corporation. It could also require that the Corporation provide technical assistance to agencies seeking to develop their own programs. If this interpretation holds, it has substantial staff and budget implications for the Corporation.

The legislative history of the National and Community Service Act of 1990, P.L. 101-610, recognized the role of the President in providing leadership in national service and in encouraging federal employees to become involved in volunteer service. Senate Report No. 101-176 further stated that the President must design a comprehensive federal service strategy. However, the legislation that was passed by Congress included no requirement for the Corporation to coordinate the partnership programs. In fact, Congress stated that each federal

agency and department must report directly to the appropriate Committee of Congress (see attachment).

THE CORPORATION'S ROLE IN SCHOOL PARTNERSHIPS:

The school partnerships language was added to our legislation by Senator Graham at the behest of the National Association of Partners in Education (NAPE). In April, 1994, a group from the Corporation met with Senator Graham's staff and agreed to survey federal agencies on their school partnership activities and report back to him in August of 1994. The Corporation carried out a survey over the following four months of federal employee volunteer efforts (President Bush's Executive Order 12820—see attached) and added a request for information on school partnerships.

The Corporation heard back from 68 federal cabinet level and independent agencies. The survey revealed varying efforts, from collection of grocery receipts to buy computers for schools, to the Navy's well-established school partnership program. However, many agencies did not have school partnerships, and most did not have a central contact person to collect information and report back.

As a follow up to the survey, the Corporation, the Department of Education and NAPE held a workshop in November of 1994 for agency school partnership contacts about how best to develop and manage school partnerships. Since then, relatively little activity has been initiated by the Corporation on school partnerships.

ACTION:

The Corporation's role in helping federal agencies to develop school partnerships needs to be clarified. The two basic options are:

- 1) **Remove Section 182 from the legislation:** One course of action would be to remove this provision from our legislation, citing administrative burden and unclear reporting directives. NAPE clearly opposes this, and Senator Graham is likely to want the language to remain.
- 2) **Use the reauthorization process to clarify exactly what the Corporation's role is:** If we cannot remove Section 182 during reauthorization, we must try to make clear what the Corporation's role is in encouraging federal agencies to volunteer their employees in schools, collecting this information, and providing technical assistance. The Corporation could take on this role with adequate staff and administrative resources, but these resources are currently not available.

We are more than willing to work with Senator Graham and his staff to clarify our role.

SEC. 182. PARTNERSHIPS WITH SCHOOLS.

42 USC 12542.

(a) **DESIGN OF PROGRAMS.**—The head of each Federal agency and department shall design and implement a comprehensive strategy to involve employees of such agencies and departments in partnership programs with elementary schools and secondary schools. Such strategy shall include—

- (1) a review of existing programs to identify and expand the opportunities for such employees to be adult volunteers in schools and for students and out-of-school youth;
- (2) the designation of a senior official in each such agency and department who will be responsible for establishing adult volunteer and partnership and youth service programs in each such agency and department and for developing adult volunteer and partnership and youth service programs;
- (3) the encouragement of employees of such agencies and departments to participate in adult volunteer and partnership programs and other service projects;
- (4) the annual recognition of outstanding service programs operated by Federal agencies; and
- (5) the encouragement of businesses and professional firms to include community service among the factors considered in making hiring, compensation, and promotion decisions.

(b) **REPORT.**—Not later than 180 days after the date of enactment of this Act, and on a regular basis thereafter, the head of each Federal agency and department shall prepare and submit, to the appropriate Committees of Congress, a report concerning the implementation of this section.

SEC. 183. SERVICE AS TUTORS.

42 USC 12543.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act, a service opportunity through which a part-time participant serves as a classroom tutor under the supervision of a certified professional shall be considered an acceptable placement if the requirements of section 177(b) (1) and (2) and section 174 are met.

SEC. 184. DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE REQUIREMENTS.

42 USC 12544.

All programs receiving grants under this title shall be subject to the Drug-Free Workplace Requirements for Federal Grant Recipients under sections 5153 through 5158 of the Anti-Drug Abuse Act of 1988 (41 U.S.C. 702-707).

SEC. 185. CONFORMING AMENDMENTS.

The Higher Education Act of 1965 is amended—

- (1) in section 411F(9) (20 U.S.C. 1070a-6(9)), by adding at the end thereof the following new subparagraph:

“(F) Annual adjusted family income does not include any living allowance received by a participant in programs established under the National and Community Service Act of 1990.”;

The Committee on Labor and Human Resources to which was referred the bill (S. 1430) to enhance national and community service, and for other purposes, having considered the same, reports favorably thereon with an amendment in the nature of a substitute and recommends that the bill as amended do pass.

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LEGISLATIVE HISTORY
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[page 69]

The Board and Department of Education may decide to fund jointly a clearinghouse or clearinghouses that will assist programs under the jurisdiction of the Board and the Department. In such a case, the Board and Department of Education should give priority to organizations, such as Youth Service America, that have knowledge of and experience with each of the major streams of service funded under this Act, particularly student community service, college-based programs, and full-time youth service corps.

The Committee believes that one of the effects of this legislation will be to encourage millions of Americans to become engaged in service to their communities, whether or not they participate in a program funded under this Act. One way to encourage this result is to make clear the high value that the nation places on service. To this end, section 417 authorizes the President to make Presidential Awards for service to one individual and program in each Congressional district and each state. The Committee recognizes that there are many excellent service programs in existence that will not seek funding under this Act. Similarly, individuals may perform volunteer service without participating in a formal program. Therefore, individuals and programs receiving awards need not be participants in programs funded under this Act. Such individuals and programs could provide inspiration for others seeking to become involved in service. Therefore, the Committee requires that information about individuals and programs receiving should be widely disseminated.

Finally, the Committee recognizes the role of the President in providing leadership in the area of national service. One facet of that leadership is to encourage every agency of the federal government to provide opportunities for service. Therefore, section 418 requires the President to design a comprehensive Federal service strategy that shall include a review of existing programs to identify and expand opportunities for service; the designation of a senior official in each agency who will be responsible for developing service opportunities in existing program nationwide; the establishment of service projects in each agency; the designation of an executive branch official to coordinate the federal service strategy, and the annual recognition of outstanding service programs run by federal agencies. The Committee urges the President to encourage federal employees to become involved in volunteer service on a part-time basis, and to assist employees in finding service opportunities which they would be suited for.

TITLE V—EXPANSION OF VOLUNTEERS IN SERVICE TO AMERICA

Title V of the Act increases the authorization level for the VISTA program over the next four fiscal years to \$56,500,000 in FY1993. This would more than double the current authorization level and allow for the number of VISTA volunteers to grow from 2,600 in FY1989 to 4,800 in FY1993. The Committee strongly supports the expansion of VISTA, a successful anti-poverty program and one of our oldest surviving volunteer service programs, as an important component in our national service strategy.

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Section 418. Comprehensive service strategy

The President must design a comprehensive Federal service strategy that must include ideas for expanding opportunities for service for students and out-of-school youth, and providing for service opportunities within Federal agencies.

Section 419. Engagement of participants

States are prohibited from engaging participants until Federal funds have been appropriated for vouchers and other expenses.

TITLE V—EXPANSION OF VOLUNTEERS IN SERVICE TO AMERICA

Section 510. Short title

Title V is to be cited as the "VISTA Expansion Act of 1989."

Section 502. Authorization of appropriations

The authorization levels for VISTA are changed to \$30,600,000 for FY 1990; \$39,909,000 for FY 1991; \$47,800,900 for FY 1992; and \$56,500,000 for FY 1993.

TITLE VI—NATIONAL OLDER AMERICAN VOLUNTEER PROGRAMS

Section 601. Short title

Title VI is to be cited as the "National Older American Volunteer Program Expansion Act of 1989."

Section 602. Programs of national and local significance

The Older American Volunteer Programs within the Domestic Volunteer Service Act are amended by adding Section 225, "Programs of National and Local Significance." This section authorizes grants of up to \$150,000 each to support programs that address national problems at a local level such as helping those with chronic illnesses, decreasing drug and alcohol abuse, working with teenage parents or boarder babies, and providing child care, among other services.

Section 603. Authorization of appropriations

The authorization levels for the programs that comprise the Older American Volunteer Programs are set at the following: Retired Senior Volunteer Program—\$39,900,000 for FY 1990; \$43,900,000 for FY 1991; \$48,300,000 for FY 1992; and \$53,100,000 for FY 1993; Foster Grandparent Program—\$70,800,000 for FY 1990; \$80,900,000 for FY 1991; \$91,700,000 for FY 1992; and \$98,200,000 for FY 1993; and Senior Companion Program—\$36,600,000 for FY 1990; \$39,000,000 for FY 1991; \$44,700,000 for FY 1992; and \$48,700,000 for FY 1993.
