GOAL 2000 FUNDS IN WYOMING

Like many other States, Wyoming had made progress toward the development of State and local comprehensive reform plans prior to its participation in Goals 2000. The State identified technology as being a major missing component of those plans and has used most, if not all, of its Goals 2000 funds for technology components of State and local reform plans. Implementation of these components includes purchase of needed technology, preparing teachers to use it, and evaluating how well students are learning basic skills through the use of technology as well as other means of instruction. The applications from Wyoming for the first two years of Goals 2000 reflect the State's priority for technology and its intent to use Goals 2000 funds for that purpose

At the local level, 19 Wyoming school districts and communities are using Goals 2000 funds to develop their own technology plans aimed at helping students reach high academic standards. For example, Laramie County School District — in partnership with other districts and Laramie Community College — created a plan to use technology for individualized instruction, teacher learning, and better governance and management of schools.

Of course, the purpose of Goals 2000 is to support comprehensive reform at State, local, and school levels. The State and local school districts retain flexibility to use Goals 2000 funds for any activity related to their overall reform plans.

The final appropriations bill for Fiscal Year 1996 contains a little known provision which grants the states far greater flexibility over the use of Goals 2000 funds. Schools may now spend up to 100% of their Goals 2000 funds to purchase computers or other technologies, so long as they promote the school's education improvement goals.

RILEY CALLS HOUSE ACTION ON EDUCATION BUDGET "CLEARLY UNACCEPTABLE"

U. S. Secretary of Education Richard W. Riley today called a congressional subcommittee's education budget "clearly unacceptable."

The Labor, Health & Human Services and Education Subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee voted last week to cut President Clinton's 1997 education budget request by \$2.8 billion, failing, Riley said, to keep up with America's education needs.

"The subcommittee's bill is a stand-still budget just when American education needs to be moving ahead," Riley said. "More students than ever before will be in our nation's classrooms this fall -- nearly 52 million. We need a budget that is in touch with reality and the growing educational needs of our students."

Riley called upon the full Appropriations Committee, which is expected to take up the bill Thursday, to protect the nation's investment in education and support the president's full request.

"I hope the committee will not return to the failed policies of the 1996 budget fight, which paralyzed the government, spread fear and confusion in our schools and colleges, and angered the American people," Riley said. "If that struggle taught us anything, it is that the American people overwhelmingly support the President's approach, which is to increase investments in better education within a balanced-budget plan. A bipartisan majority in the Congress ultimately supported him, and I hope the committee will return to the bipartisan approach."

Riley cited the following subcommittee actions as examples:

- o Goals 2000. The subcommittee zeroed it out. The president's balanced-budget proposal for Goals 2000 would support better education for six million children in 12,000 schools. "At a time when the Goals 2000: Educate America initiative is supporting local school improvement in more communities than ever before, the subcommittee has tragically walked away from this critically important effort to raise academic standards," Riley said.
- o Safe and Drug-Free Schools. "Drug use among young people is growing and the American people have consistently cited violence as the biggest problem in our schools," Riley said. "Safety must be job one." Nonetheless, the subcommittee cuts the president's request by 18 percent, denying assistance to millions of children.
- o Reading. The subcommittee voted to freeze funding for Title I, which helps seven million children to learn basic reading, writing and math skills. A freeze actually translates into less real dollars for services, given inflation. The subcommittee's bill would mean serving over 150,000 fewer children than in 1996 and nearly 450,000 fewer children than the president's budget.
- O Technology. To succeed in today's economy, students must be computer literate. Yet the subcommittee has refused to provide funding for the administration's proposed technology initiative -- the Technology Literacy Challenge Fund. The fund would help every classroom in America to connect to the Information Superhighway with computers, good software and well-trained teachers.
- o Higher education. The subcommittee moved to support the president's request for increased funding for college work-study programs. But its plan to increase the maximum Pell Grant award by only \$30 is "totally inadequate," Riley said, and would aid approximately 100,000 fewer students than the president's balanced budget.

"A mere \$30 hardly meets the needs of today's working families and students," Riley said. "The president has called for a \$230 increase, to \$2,700 for 1997 (and ultimately to \$3,128 in five years). This is an increase that can really make a difference to college students."

- o Direct Lending. The subcommittee's cut in administrative funds for students loans would undermine the operations of all student loan programs. It would also effectively cap the volume of Direct Lending, denying colleges the right to choose the lending program that works best for them.

Riley also cited the president's new HOPE Scholarship and tuition tax deduction proposals as two more important steps that would open the doors of college and opportunity for many more Americans.

"HOPE Scholarships would guarantee that most Americans could get a tax credit that would make up to two years of college tuition-free or almost tuition-free," Riley said. "Students could choose this credit or a \$10,000 tax deduction at any time in their lives. Let's remember that our students may be only 20 percent of our population, but they are 100 percent of our future."

IMPACT OF HOUSE COMMITTEE'S 1997 APPROPRIATIONS BILL ON MAJOR EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Overall Department Budget: The House Committee version of the 1997 appropriations bill would reduce the President's discretionary spending request for Department of Education programs by \$2.8 billion, or 11 percent—from \$25.6 billion to \$22.8 billion. At a time of record high enrollments nationwide, a reduction of this magnitude can be seen only as an attempt to seriously undermine an effective Federal partnership with States and communities in such vital areas as reforming teaching and learning in the Nation's schools, improving the quality of its teachers, creating safer school environments, and providing innovative technology in classrooms.

Goals 2000: (-\$491 million from the President's \$491 million request) The House would end Federal support for efforts underway in nearly all States and thousands of communities to raise academic standards and encourage students to work hard to meet them. Nationwide, the House would eliminate funds that would, under the President's 1997 request, help more than 12,000 schools annually to better use resources to improve teaching and learning and to increase parents' involvement in their children's education. In addition, a program of assistance for 42 parent information and resource centers would be terminated. These centers hold great promise for supporting the new National Education Goal on parental involvement and helping to bring parents together as full partners in State and local education reform efforts.

School-to-Work: (-\$50 million from the President's \$400 million request for the Departments of Education and Labor) The House would fund no new State implementation grants. As a result, the number of States receiving grants would remain at 38, instead of increasing to the planned 49. In addition, 10 new urban/rural opportunity grants would not be awarded to local partnerships in high-poverty areas.

Title I Grants to LEAs: (-\$435 million from the President's \$7.2 billion request) Title I, which currently provides supplemental funding to help 6.8 million disadvantaged children learn to the same high standards as other children, would reach 6 percent (433,000) fewer disadvantaged children than would the President's 1997 budget request.

Eisenhower Professional Development: (-\$610 million from the President's \$610 million request) The House would prevent an estimated 750,000 teachers and other educators from receiving professional development to teach to new standards in the core academic subjects—a critical need if education reform is to succeed.

Safe and Drug-Free Schools: (-\$74 million from the President's \$515 million request) Despite the rising incidence of student drug use and violence in schools, the House is proposing to level-fund Federal support for drug and violence prevention programs that serve about 40 million students in 97 percent of the Nation's school districts. The level of services would be 14 percent below the level provided for in the President's budget.

Bilingual Education: (-\$40 million from the President's \$157 million request) Compared to the President's 1997 request, the House would eliminate: (1) grants to State educational agencies to improve instructional services for limited English proficient students; (2) the National Clearinghouse for Bilingual Education, which responds to 42,000 requests for information from teachers each year; (3) dissemination of information on

effective bilingual education models; and (4) a major research study of trends and improvement in bilingual education. Despite a major shortage of trained bilingual teachers, the House would also eliminate professional development for 6,000 bilingual educators.

Immigrant Education: (-\$50 million from the President's \$100 million request) The House would freeze assistance that helps school districts enrolling large numbers of immigrant students pay the costs of educating over 800,000 immigrant students annually. The President's proposal would double these payments, from \$61 to \$122 per student.

Special Education: (-\$279 million from the President's \$2.6 billion request) States are required to provide free appropriate public education to all children with disabilities regardless of the amount of the Federal contribution toward meeting the excess cost of their services. Because of increases in the number of children requiring services and inflation, a freeze on funding for Grants to States would result in a drop in the Federal contribution from 7 percent to 6 percent of the excess cost for about 5.8 million children with disabilities who will need services in 1997. This reduction would significantly impede State efforts to improve academic achievement for children with disabilities.

Charter Schools: (-\$22 million from the President's \$40 million request) The House would support about 300 fewer charter schools compared to the more than 600 schools that would be funded by the President's request. This program, which supports parental choice in public education, would be restricted just when additional States are enacting charter schools legislation and more communities need planning and start-up costs for new schools.

Educational Technology: (-\$309 million from the President's request of \$357 million) Much greater investment in technology for schools is needed to provide all students the knowledge and skills essential for further learning and work in the 21st century. (1) Despite evidence that only 9 percent of elementary and secondary classrooms are connected to the Internet, the House would include no funding for the President's \$250 million initiative, the **Technology Literacy Challenge Fund**. This program would provide formula grants to States to stimulate State, local, and private sector partnerships focused on providing school districts with funds for hardware, software, connections, and teacher training needed to fully integrate technology into teaching and learning. The initiative would also address the persistent inequities that must be eliminated in the distribution of up-to-date technology to schools if poor students are to be afforded the same educational opportunities as more advantaged students. (2) The House would reduce by \$22 million the President's \$60 million request for the **Local Innovation Challenge Fund** which provides competitive awards to consortia that include poor school districts to develop innovative applications of technology. No new awards would be made, including those for using technology to expand learning opportunities for adults. (3) The House would terminate funding for **Star Schools** (-\$25 million), which is currently providing distance learning to tens of thousands of students and teachers in poor and isolated schools in over 40 States who otherwise might not have access to high quality instruction or professional development.

Educational Equity Programs: (WEEA and Title IV, Civil Rights Act; -\$10.7 million from the President's \$18 million request) The Nation will not achieve the National Education Goals unless all children have the opportunity to achieve to high standards. But the House would not fund programs that help ensure educational equity for women and minorities. It includes no funding for the Women's Educational Equity Act, the only Federal program

designed specifically to encourage gender equity in the classroom. And it includes a 48 percent cut in the request for Title IV, effectively ending the civil rights and desegregation activities of State educational agencies.

Vocational Education: (-\$44 million from the President's \$1.1 billion request) Basic State Grant funds support services to approximately 12.4 million students per year. With the proposed House freeze, States and communities would not have the resources needed to prepare additional numbers of youth and adults for productive careers in a changing economy.

Adult Education: (-\$46 million from the President's \$300 million request) Despite the fact that there is a literacy crisis in this country, and that Federal funds provide only about \$70 per adult learner, the House would level-fund Adult Education State Grants. States' efforts to help 4 million adults develop basic skills, including literacy, and achieve certification of high school equivalency would be seriously hindered.

Pell Grants: (-\$577 million from the President's \$5.9 billion request) The maximum award of \$2,500 provided by the House is increased by \$30 over 1996, but is still \$200 below the President's request of \$2,700. Some 108,000 fewer needy students would be served than the 3.8 million that would receive grants under the President's request.

Perkins Loans: (-\$158 million from the President's \$158 million request) The House would not provide a new Federal Capital Contribution appropriation for this need-based postsecondary student loan program that makes low-interest loans to more than 700,000 college students per year. The House action would eliminate some 151,000 loan recipients.

Presidential Honors Scholarships: (-\$130 million from the President's \$130 million request) The House would provide no support for this Administration initiative to reward the excellence and achievement of the top 5 percent of graduating high school students. In 1997, some 130,000 high school graduates would not receive these proposed \$1,000 college scholarships.

Direct Student Loans: (-\$175 million from the permanent appropriation of \$595 million) The House proposal would reduce mandatory spending for the administration of the Direct Loan program, making it impossible for the Department to ensure the integrity of its student loan programs, and effectively capping the volume of direct lending. The Direct Loan program provides more efficient loan deliveries and flexible, long-term repayment options for 2.6 million borrowers at over 1,700 schools nationwide.

Department Discretionary Programs: The House would continue its overall policy of providing no funding for discretionary grant programs that support research, demonstration, training, technical assistance, and evaluation activities that help States, communities, and schools improve education at all levels. The bill would eliminate approximately \$100 million for such activities as Eisenhower Professional Development national activities, Bilingual Education support services, and Safe and Drug-Free Schools national programs, while providing only an \$18 million increase in Education Research that might be used for similar projects. This approach greatly restricts one of the oldest, most efficient, and cost-effective Federal roles in education: supporting State and local development and dissemination of effective educational practices throughout the Nation.
