They were told, "Don't let it get too high and don't let it get too low." Then, in 1993, the NIH issued the results of a 10-year study that looked more closely at diabetes management.

And what these researchers discovered was that intensive management -- that is, keeping an individual's blood glucose level as close to normal as possible -- significantly lowers the rates and severity of eye, kidney and nerve complications.

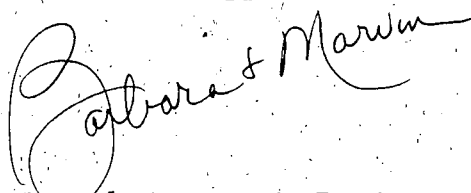

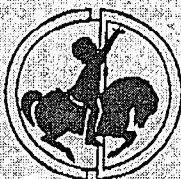

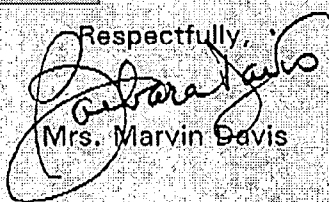

Carousel of Hope

The "Carousel of Hope" is a black-tie fundraising ball that Marvin and Barbara Davis hold biannually to benefit the Barbara Davis Center for Childhood Diabetes. This year's Carousel of Hope, billed as "A Night to Fight Diabetes", is expected to raise \$5 million in one evening for the Barbara Davis Center in Colorado and the Los Angeles chapters of the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation and the American Diabetes Association. Since its inception in 1978, the Carousel of Hope has raised approximately \$35 million. This is the 11th Carousel of Hope -- the event was held in Denver from 1978 to 1985, and has been held in Los Angeles since 1990.

You are the Honorary Chair of this year's event, and President and Mrs. Reagan and President and Mrs. Ford (not attending) are the Honorary Co-Chairs. Jay Leno will act as emcee, and Merv Griffin will host. The Carousel of Hope traditionally attracts some of the biggest names in Hollywood -- this year's 1,300 guests will include representatives from the major studios, networks, and talent agencies, celebrities, and corporate executives (see attached guest list). Tickets were sold on an invitation-only basis, and tables ran from \$10,000 to \$50,000.

Research

The Davis Center has a strong focus on basic research, and has received \$10 million in grants from NIH since 1980. In February, the Davis Center was selected by NIH to participate in the "NIH Diabetes Prevention Trial," the first large-scale study focusing on the prevention of juvenile diabetes. The Davis Center will help evaluate whether Type I diabetes can be prevented or delayed by giving small doses of insulin to high-risk candidates before they develop the disease. The Barbara Davis Center and nine other centers around the country are participating in the study.

Treatment

The Davis Center's treatment program focuses on preventing diabetic patients from developing complications from the disease -- like blindness, kidney failure, loss of limb, heart disease and stroke. The Davis Center treats approximately 2,000 patients a year, one in five of whom come from outside Colorado. The Children's Diabetes Foundation, which serves as the Davis Center's fundraising arm, subsidizes 50% of patients' care at the Center.

Type I Diabetes

Of the approximately 14 million Americans with diabetes, an estimated 500,000 to 750,000 have insulin-dependent diabetes, the most severe form of the disease (the exact number is unknown -- these figures come from NIH). Insulin-dependent diabetes, also known as juvenile-onset or Type I diabetes, is usually diagnosed in childhood or young adulthood and progresses rapidly. The disease causes the body's immune system to destroy the insulin-producing cells of the pancreas, requiring people with Type 1 diabetes to take one to four injections of insulin daily.

The mortality rate of patients with insulin-dependent diabetes increases dramatically after 15 years of disease duration. Complications from the disease include blindness, kidney failure, heart disease, stroke, amputation of extremities, loss of nerve sensation, high-risk pregnancies and babies born with birth defects.

The majority of diabetes cases are adult-onset (Type II) diabetes, which is usually treated through oral medication and strict diet. Diabetes is the third leading cause of death in the U.S., and NIH estimates that the disease costs this country \$92.6 billion a year.

Federal Involvement

According to NIH, enormous strides in combatting diabetes have been made in recent years through a strong public/private research effort between the federal government and private organizations like the Barbara Davis Center. Federal funding for diabetes programs will exceed \$300 million in FY 1994, the major portion of which will support diabetes research efforts at the NIH, led by the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases (NIDDK).

One of the most important strides in diabetes research is a long-term clinical trial sponsored by the NIDDK called the "Diabetes Control and Complications Trial." The results of that trial, announced last June (?), showed that maintaining blood glucose levels as close to normal as possible can prevent the delay and onset of diabetic complications (this is new because...). Intensive therapy (?) reduced the risks of eye disease by 76%, of nerve disease by 60%, of kidney disease by 50%, and of cholesterol elevation by 35%.
