Thank you, Jann [Yahn], for that warm introduction. I'm so sorry I can't be with you in person for this wonderful occasion, which is not only a celebration of a great new magazine, but also a celebration of your efforts as members of the Board of Advisors, as editorial staffers, and as advocates and opinion makers to help us restore and strengthen families across America.

Parenting is a challenge for every generation, and in every society, but I believe the challenges for parents in America today are more difficult and more complex than ever before. There are so many influences outside the family that affect our children. There are so many different kinds of pressures on parents themselves. And there is a well-documented, and very troubling, erosion of institutions that, in the past, provided support for families in crisis or transition.

If you believe, as the President does, that we cannot afford to waste a single person in this country -- and especially not a child -- then you appreciate the importance of investing in children and families.

One of the President's highest priorities since taking office has been to help strengthen families. To help parents be good parents. To help children get the right start in life so that they grow up into happy, productive, fulfilled adults.

In the past 22 months, we've made extraordinary progress on behalf of children and families. Think about it. Today we have a Family and Medical Leave law. We have millions more children participating in Head Start and federal nutrition programs. We have more low-income working parents qualifying for tax breaks to make their earnings go further. Talking points for the First Lady for the forum: Meeting the Challenge Health, Safety, and Food for America November 21-22, 1994

- I am pleased to be here today, in spirit if not in person, to join your efforts to meet the challenges of improving quality of life for all Americans. Like most worthy goals, these challenges are not simple ones — they are complex -- involving such basic human behavior patterns as diet and nutrition, personal and community security and practicing healthy life styles.
- Larger institutional challenges include ensuring a safe and adequate food supply and access to high quality, affordable health care.
- As participants in this forum, you have the opportunity to provide insight into the research we will need to meet these challenges in the coming years -- defining specific goals and the key barriers preventing us from achieving them, as well as the means for getting over such hurdles.
- I applaud your commitment to this important agenda and look forward to learning the outcome of your deliberations.
- To meet the challenge of improving health, safety, and food for our future, we need a healthy and productive research base.
- We cannot hope to move forward without innovative means for treating, curing and preventing disease or detecting contamination in our food supply and creating clean and sustainable methods of food production. To do that we must also focus on the new questions that research and development efforts will need to address.
- This meeting represents one of the next steps that allows us to confer with you, our outstanding scientists to help connect the research we need with the continuing important goals with improving the health, safety, and food security.
- This Administration is committed to sustaining our research enterprise, which is the envy of the world. In our recent statement of science policy, "Science in the National Interest," the President said,

"Through scientific discovery and technological innovation, we enlist the forces of the natural world to solve many of the uniquely human problems we face -- feeding and providing energy to a growing population, improving human health, taking responsibility for protecting the environment and the global ecosystem, and ensuring our own nation's security. Scientific discoveries inspire and enrich us, teaching us about the mysteries of life and the nature of the world."
- When we invest in science, we are investing in people and in our future and our

children's future. In keeping with the commitment that is verbalized in "Science in the National Interest," the President and Vice President have made support for fundamental science an important priority, even in this era of fiscal restraint.

- During this forum you are considering a specific set of multidisciplinary, multi-agency opportunities to move us forward. The forum provides a unique opportunity to connect the science base of the country to new models of regulatory reform, improved nutrition, health promotion and disease prevention through the interaction of health researchers and research on human safety, and on the Nation's capacity to set the pace of scientific discovery to improve food, environmental responsibility and the health of our people.
- As we move forward in our continued effort to provide new models of health care and access, the research effort you refine at this meeting will help us to hone and evaluate our progress and will leave a legacy for tomorrow that we badly need even today.
- Some illustrations of the critical areas your work will touch upon include:
 - Biomedical and sociocultural research conducted in our academic health centers and universities The Clinton Administration's National Health Security Act provided for support for academic health centers; the institutions that perform the bulk of biomedical research and research training in this country. These centers advance our knowledge and comprehension of the life processes leading to methods for halting or, better still, avoiding the pain and suffering of disease. Other research that allows us to compare and assess the relative performance of various forms of treatment -- outcomes research -- points to the most effective therapies at the optimal cost. We cannot expect to enjoy the benefits of a health care system that offers quality, prevention and saving without continuing and strengthening our research efforts in this area.
 - Good science in support of good regulation Good science is also necessary to ensure an efficient and thorough regulatory system. Unfortunately, it often takes a crisis to focus attention and resources on particular needs, including research needs. The dreadful deaths and illness associated with contaminated beef has given rise to an inspection system that might otherwise never have been established. More importantly, this incident serves to steer funds toward research on new methods for detecting bacterial contamination and preventing disease-causing agents from entering the food supply in the first place. Similarly, guidelines for food processing techniques that focus on the points at which contamination is most likely to occur are in place or will be introduced in the near future. But the power of these measures can be amplified with more precise and easy to use methods for pathogen detection and prevention.
 - Ensuring an adequate food supply Obviously, we need both a safe food supply and one that is adequate to meet the needs of a growing population. Recent research in agricultural biotechnology, for example, is aimed at improving crop

yields through the development of hardier, pest and disease resistant plants while diminishing our reliance on toxic chemicals. Biotechnology also offers the means to boost the nutritional characteristics of common foods and enhance flavor and shelf life.

- These examples illustrate the value and public benefits that we can attain through investments in research and I am certain that I have only barely scratched the surface. The advances of tomorrow are unimaginable today. It is our role to make sure that our nation continues to profit and grow through realizing the promise of a strong scientific research enterprise.

FORUM ON MEETING THE CHALLENGE: HEALTH, SAFETY, AND FOOD FOR AMERICA

November 21-22, 1994, National Academy of Sciences, Washington, DC

The purpose of this Forum, *Meeting the Challenge: Health, Safety, and Food for America*, is to bring together approximately 200 public and private sector leaders to address critical research and development issues that affect our nation's health, safety, and food security.

On November 23, 1993, President Clinton signed an Executive Order to establish the National Science and Technology Council (NSTC) to coordinate Federal science and technology programs. Nine NSTC Committees were formed to focus on key Administration priorities. The Committee on Health, Safety, and Food R&D is charged with improving the effectiveness of Federal R&D efforts in the health, safety, food, and agricultural sciences. In order to clearly identify and address our country's short and long term objectives in health, safety, and food R&D, the Office of Science and Technology Policy, in conjunction with this Committee, is coordinating a national Forum.

This Forum will be held on November 21 and 22, 1994, at the National Academy of Sciences. It will comprise individuals representing diverse stakeholders in the health, safety, and food arenas. In order to implement Forum activities, we will seek co sponsorship by a variety of organizations and participation by leaders from academia, private industry, consumer groups, State and Federal agencies, and Congress.

The stakes of meeting the challenges of health, safety, and food security are high. Successful and well-focused research and development within these areas affect all Americans. The Forum will consist of several plenary sessions as well as smaller breakout groups for open discussion of critical issues in health, safety, and food that are related to the following primary themes:

- Biomedical and Socio-Cultural and Behavioral Research
- Health Promotion and Disease and Injury Prevention Research (including environmental and occupational health and safety)
- Food Safety, Security and Production Research
- Health Systems and Services Research
- Human Nutrition Research

In advance of the meeting, all participants of the Forum will be asked to prepare a brief 1-2 page paper addressing one of the themes listed above. These papers will represent companion pieces to interagency documents being prepared by the respective subcommittees falling under the auspices of the Committee on Health, Safety, and Food R&D.

We expect that the findings of this Forum will provide the Administration with a clear vision for health, safety, and food R&D in the future, and the basis for a national strategy addressing these critical issues.

And it's in that context that your forum, "Meeting the Challenge of Health, Safety, and Food For America," takes on such importance and such urgency. This forum is a first -- a critical first step in allowing members of the Clinton Administration to learn from leading scientists about the links between the research we need and our goals of improving health, safety, and food security.

So on behalf of the President, let me thank you for your ongoing contributions to this process throughout the year -- and also for your participation in this important meeting this week.

The President believes very strongly that ^{behavioral} we must sustain and strengthen our scientific and biomedical research base, which is the envy of the world.

In his recent statement of science policy, the President said: "Through scientific discovery and technological innovation, we enlist the forces of the natural world to solve many of the uniquely human problems we face -- feeding and providing energy to a growing population, improving human health, taking responsibility for protecting the environment and the global ecosystem, and ensuring our own nation's security. Scientific discoveries inspire and enrich us, teaching us about the mysteries of life and the nature of the world."

That's one reason the President included support of academic health centers as part of his vision of health care reform. These institutions perform the bulk of biomedical research and training in this country. They advance our knowledge and understanding of

disease. ~~They~~ help us discover the most effective treatments and
the optimal cost. And ~~they must be supported.~~

Good science is also necessary to ensure an efficient and thorough regulatory system. Unfortunately, it often takes a crisis to focus attention and resources on particular needs, including research needs. The tragic deaths and illnesses associated with contaminated beef have given rise to an *proposed* inspection system that might otherwise have never been established. More importantly, this incident boosted research of new methods for detecting bacterial contamination and preventing disease-causing agents from entering the food supply in the first place. And we can make more progress still -- we can create easier, more precise methods for pathogen detection and prevention, for example -- if we remain committed to our research enterprise.

Research also will help us ensure that we have an adequate food supply. Recent research in agricultural biotechnology is aimed at improving crop yields through the development of hardier plants and more pest- and disease-resistant plants -- while diminishing our reliance on toxic chemicals.

These are but a few ways that we can make progress in this vital health area through the work you do. I'm sure some advances we make in the years and decades ahead are unimaginable today. That's what makes your work so exciting, and so hopeful for all Americans.

Because ultimately, whether we are talking about improving our health care system or ensuring safety in our food supply, research is the foundation for progress. When we invest in science, we are investing in people. We are investing in our future and in our children's futures. And nothing is more important than that.

Thank you for helping us make the future brighter for all Americans.

Thank you, Jann [Yahn], for that warm introduction. I'm so sorry I can't be with you in person for this wonderful occasion, which is not only a celebration of a great new magazine, but also a celebration of your efforts as members of the Board of Advisors, as editorial staffers, and as advocates and opinion makers to help us restore and strengthen families across America.

Parenting is a challenge for every generation, and in every society, but I believe the challenges for parents in America today are more difficult and more complex than ever before. There are so many influences outside the family that affect our children. There are so many different kinds of pressures on parents themselves. And there is a well-documented, and very troubling, erosion of institutions that, in the past, we could ~~always rely on to help support families in crisis or transition.~~ *provided (far)* ~~we~~ *there*

If you believe, as the President does, that we cannot afford to waste a single person in this country -- and especially not a child -- then you appreciate the importance of investing in children and families.

One of the President's highest priorities since taking office has been to help strengthen families. To help parents be good parents. To help children get the right start in life so that they grow up into happy, productive, fulfilled adults.

In the past 22 months, we've made extraordinary progress on behalf of children and families. Think about it. Today we have a Family and Medical Leave law. We have millions more children participating in Head Start and federal nutrition programs. We have more low-income working parents qualifying for tax breaks to make their earnings go further. We have a revamped college loan system. We're on our way to higher academic standards. We have a crime bill that will make our streets and schools safer. And we are committed to continuing the fight for health care reform so that every American has access to the health care they deserve.

But government is not a panacea. Most of what we do to renew the family, to restore our communities, to build up our *co-workers,* institutions, must come from parents, relatives, neighbors, and friends.

I'm reminded of a pastoral letter issued in 1992 by The National Conference of Catholic Bishops that said: "No government can love a child, and no policy can substitute for a family's care. . . . The undeniable fact is that our children's future is

shaped both by the values of their parents and the policies of our nation."

That's why Family Life magazine, now 1 year old, is so important. It is helping guide parents through a thicket of issues, many of which weren't even around a generation ago: How to use computers, how to explain the violence and suffering our children see on the news, what kind of schools work best for students, and lots of other valuable ideas that can give parents reassurance and confidence as they raise their children in a fast-changing, high-paced world.

Today's Family Life Awards honorees -- Senator Bill Bradley, Sara Bullard, Linda Ellerbee, John Foster, Elinor Guggenheimer, and Eddie Staton [pronounced Statton] -- all have worked tirelessly to help children and families, and they have done so in a range of fields. Their examples are not only an inspiration to all of us to do more on behalf of children and families, but are a reminder that we can all play a role no matter what profession or avocation we choose, no matter where we live, and no matter our station in life.

To the honorees, let me say congratulations and thank you. And to all of you, thank you for helping us recognize the fundamental truth that every parent and every family has to assume the responsibility for the most sacred trust they are given: the nurturing and care of the next generation.

Your presence would make the event especially meaningful.

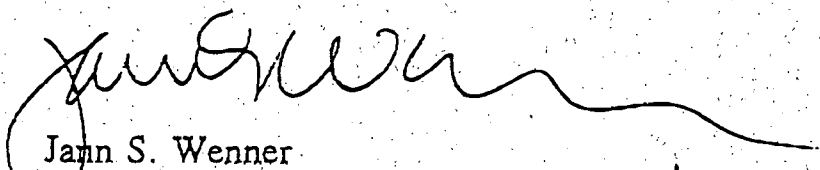

FOSTER - (Omaha, Nebraska) -- For taking to the streets to reclaim our youth, through a community program that brings kids and parents closer together, and which has been replicated in over thirty cities across the country. Mad Dads (Men Against Destruction, Defending Against Drugs and Social Disorder) have shown that we have a parenting crisis as much as a youth crisis.

The *Annual Family Life Awards* was established to draw attention to the critical nature of family issues in America and to recognize individuals whose positive efforts are making a difference and inspiring others.

In his 15 years in the Senate, Bill Bradley has consistently worked in support of legislation affecting children and the family. A long-time proponent of higher education and worker retraining, Senator Bradley devised a new way to pay for higher education in 1991 through Self-Reliance Loans which make higher education affordable for all Americans regardless of family income. He has also worked to improve elementary and secondary education through various initiatives, including the Family-School Partnership Act and expanded gifted and talented programs. Bradley believes that parents have an obligation to support their children; he has written laws to expand and improve maternal and child health care programs and shown unwavering support to fund fully the successful Head Start program and the Women, Infants, and Children feeding programs.

LINDA ELLERBEE**President, Lucky Duck Productions**

Since 1991, Linda Ellerbee and her company Lucky Duck Productions has been producing award-winning children's programming for Nickelodeon, which began with a series of news specials devoted to topics like the Gulf War, the environment and the L.A. riots. The now famous program for children about AIDS, A Conversation with Magic, which featured Magic Johnson, was awarded the CableAce for best news special of 1992. These specials have helped educate children and parents on important issues and have done so with a respect for children's concerns and intelligence.

ELINOR GUGGENHEIMER**Founding President, Child Care Action Campaign**

The Child Care Action (CCAC) is a national non-profit membership organization whose goal is to improve the lives of children and their families by expanding the supply of quality, affordable child care. Since its founding in 1983, CCAC has been a convener, catalyst creator of media message, and resource for parents, policymakers and child care providers. CCAC has taken the lead in making quality child care both a bottom line economic issue and a fundamental component of education reform.

MAD DADS**Eddie Staton and John L. Foster, Founders**

In 1989, John L. Foster's son was attacked and beaten. Filled with rage and fed up with the violence on the streets, he chose to fight back and organized MAD DADS -- "Men Against Destruction-Defending Against Drugs and Social (disorder)." Together with Eddie Staton, the two set out and enlisted "strong black men who were willing to stand up and fight this thing". Their mission is simple: to save their community one individual at a time. Since its founding, MAD DADS membership has swelled to nearly 900 men and 250 moms. Staton and Foster believe that their greatest accomplishment has been to show what it means to be righteous man and a responsible father.

TEACHING TOLERANCE**Sara Bullard, Director**

Teaching tolerance was founded in 1991 by the Southern Poverty Law Center to provide teachers at all levels with resources and ideas for promoting interracial and intercultural understanding in the classroom. Their objectives are to educate students about the harm that prejudice and hatred can do; to demonstrate to educators, through concrete examples, the ways in which understanding and tolerance can be achieved; and to provide teachers with comprehensive resources, models and guidelines for implementing programs and activities in their own classrooms. All of this is accomplished through their magazine, Teaching Tolerance, and a series of video and text packages which are offered at no cost to schools across the country.

SOSAD provides counseling and training in violence prevention, crisis intervention, multicultural conflict resolution, gang redirection, peer and bereavement support.

Fred Brown

President, NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PRINCIPALS (NAESP)

As president of the NAESP, a professional association serving more than 26,000 elementary and middle school educators in the United States, Canada and overseas, Brown has been a principal for 20 years and an advocate for early childhood education. He is co-author of NAESP's widely acclaimed publication, Early Childhood Education and the Elementary School Principal: Standards for Quality Programs for Young Children, and has testified before the state legislature on educational issues.

Gretchen Buchenholz

Founder and Executive Director, ASSOCIATION TO BENEFIT CHILDREN (ABC)

In 1986, Gretchen Buchenholz founded the Association to Benefit Children. By doing so, she has helped thousands of needy children and their families with programs and services designed to permanently break the destructive cycles of abuse, sickness, neglect and homelessness. Each model program while centered around enriched day care, extends far beyond the nursery to include housing, health care, counseling and legal advocacy. Ms. Buchenholz has received countless awards for her efforts and is also the author of Empty Promises Empty Plates and Teach Your Children Through Games.

Robert Coles, M.D.

Professor of Psychiatry and Medical Humanities, HARVARD MEDICAL SCHOOL

A Family Life Contributing Editor, Dr. Coles is a Pulitzer Prize winning author of more than 50 books, among them Erik H. Erikson: The Growth of His Work, Women of Crisis (with Jane Coles), The Political Life of Children, The Call of Stories: Teaching and the Moral Imagination, and the Children of Crisis series for which he won the 1973 Pulitzer Prize. Coles has worked with and studied the psyches of children for over 30 years.

Marva N. Collins**Founder and Director, WESTSIDE PREPARATORY SCHOOL**

Marva Collins founded Westside Preparatory School in 1975 with \$5,000 from Chicago Public School Pension Fund. Today the school has grown from six to 250 students with hundreds on the waiting list and has been replicated in three other locations, including the Ida B. Wells housing development where Ms. Collins runs a school for the Department of Justice. Preaching to her students that excellence is a lifetime habit, not a single act, her school produces children with comparatively higher levels of education and no discipline problems. Her methodology of excellence is recognized and exercised around the world and used in training some of the Fortune 500 Corporations. Ms. Collins is the recipient of 89 honorary doctoral degrees and has turned down two presidential offers to become Secretary of Education. She is the author of Marva Collins Way and Extraordinary Teachers, Ordinary Children.

Marian Wright Edelman**Founder and President, CHILDREN'S DEFENSE FUND (CDF)**

Marian Wright Edelman has been an advocate for disadvantaged Americans for her entire professional career and through CDF, has become a strong national voice for children and families. CDF's mission is to educate the nation about the needs of children and encourage preventive investment in children before they get sick, drop out of school, suffer too early pregnancy or family breakdowns or get into trouble. Mrs. Edelman has received many honorary degrees and awards including the Albert Schweitzer Humanitarian Prize and was a MacArthur Foundation Prize Fellow. She is the author of several books, including Families in Peril: An Agenda for Social Change and The Measure of Our Success: A Letter to My Children and Yours.

David Elkind, Ph.D.**Professor of Child Study, TUFTS UNIVERSITY**

Best known for his three most recent books, The Hurried Child, All Grown Up and No Place to Go and Miseducation, Professor Elkind is a consultant to state education departments, clinics and mental health centers as well as to government agencies and private foundations.

Ellen Galinsky**Co-President, FAMILIES AND WORK INSTITUTE**

The Families and Work Institute is a national non-profit center for policy research on issues of the changing workforce and changing family life. As Co-President, Ellen Galinsky directs a nationally representative longitudinal study of the U.S. workforce, a cost/benefit analysis of Johnson & Johnson's work-family program, a Department of Labor study of work-family productivity, a study of the quality of family child care, and a series of studies on how quality improvements affect the early childhood marketplace. Galinsky is the author of 13 books and has published over 70 articles in academic journals and magazines.

Keith Geiger**President, NATIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATION (NEA)**

As president of the NEA, the nation's largest professional organization and labor union, Keith Geiger is an active leader in campaigns to reorder federal spending priorities and to restructure American education. He co-chairs the Martin Luther King, Jr. National Education Committee, and serves on the Executive Committees of Education International, the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education and on the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards.

Wendy Gordon**Co-Founder and Program Director, MOTHERS & OTHERS (M&O)**

Weedy Gordon, a former staff scientist with the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC), helped found Mothers & Others in 1989 with other parents concerned that the American public has lost its influence over the decisions that affect the production and safety of the food we feed our families. Since then, M&O has grown into a fully independent non-profit organization with thousands of members around the country working to harness consumer demand for healthier choices in the marketplace. Mothers & Others put out two books: the best-selling consumer guide, For Kid's Sake: How to Protect Your Child Against Pesticides in Food and The Way We Grow: Good-Sense Solutions for Protecting Our Families from Pesticides in Food.

Fred M. Hechinger has devoted much of his career as a reporter, columnist, editor, author, and foundation executive to issues of education and policies affecting children and society. During his 30+ years with The New York Times, Mr. Hechinger served as education editor, deputy editor of the editorial page, president of The New York Times Company Foundation, and of The New York Times Neediest Cases Fund and began the widely read weekly column, "About Education." He is the author of seven books of which Higher Education in the Nation's Service (written with Ernest L. Boyer) is his most recent. Mr. Hechinger served on the President's Commission on Foreign Language and International Studies and hold honorary doctorates from fifteen colleges and universities including the Distinguished Service Medal from Teachers College, Columbia University.

Alex Kotlowitz**Author, THERE ARE NO CHILDREN HERE: The Story of Two Boys Growing in the Other America**

Mr. Kotlowitz's best selling book which was published in 1991 was the recipient of numerous awards including the Helen B. Ms. Laybourne is also responsible for the expansion of Nickelodeon to twenty-four hours by founding Nick at Nite; a line-up which consists of shows that younger Nickelodeon viewers can enjoy watching with their parents.

Dr. James Oleske is one of the nation's foremost Pediatric AIDS specialists and has been a strong advocate for children, adolescents and women with HIV infection, testifying before Congress on issues affecting AIDS education, prevention, research and treatment. In 1990, Dr. Oleske was officially installed as the Francois-Xavier Bagnoud Chair of Pediatric Allergy, Immunology and Infectious Disease. The Endowed Chair funded the first international program to train health-care professionals to diagnose and treat children with AIDS as well as benefitting Pediatric AIDS research in Newark.

Kathryn Whitfill
President, THE NATIONAL PTA

Ms. Whitfill has been active in the PTA for many years. She has served a variety of positions on the local, state, council and national levels. Among them, she served as First Vice President of the National PTA, President of the Texas PTA, National PTA Treasurer and Chairman of the National PTA's Budget and Resolutions Committees. The theme of Whitfill's administration is "PTA Puts Children First."

Governor Christie Whitman**Governor of New Jersey**

Christine Todd Whitman was elected the 50th Governor of New Jersey on November 2, 1993, becoming the first woman in the state's history to win its highest elective office. During her years in public life, she served on a variety of boards, commissions and other volunteer bodies including the Community Foundation of New Jersey, the National Council on Crime and Delinquency, the Somerset County Board of Social Services and the Somerset County Youth Services Coordinating Commission. Early in her career, Whitman worked for the U.S. Office of Economic Opportunity and the Republican National Committee where she developed the "Listening Program" which reached out to groups not traditionally associated with the Republican Party. As part of that program she met with minorities, students, senior citizens and gang members in the East Ward of Chicago. Throughout her five years as a member and director of the Somerset County Board of Chosen Freeholders, Ms. Whitman was instrumental in the opening of the county's first homeless shelter and first halfway house for alcoholic male teenagers.

Edward Zigler, Ph.D.

Director of the Bush Center in Child Development and Social Policy and Sterling Professor of Psychology, YALE UNIVERSITY

Co-Founder, HEAD START

At Yale Professor Zigler directs a large and distinguished laboratory engaged in a variety of basic and applied studies of child development and family functioning. His scholarly work cuts across the fields of mental retardation, psychopathology, intervention programs for economically disadvantaged children, and the effects of out-of-home care on the children of working parents. He headed a national committee of distinguished Americans charged with examining the possibility of making infant care leaves a reality in America, work that inspired the Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993. He has written 25 books and has produced over 500 scholarly articles. In 1970, he was named by President Nixon to become the first Director of the Office of Child Development (now the Administration for Children, Youth and Families) and Chief of the U.S. Children's Bureau. Dr. Zigler appears with regularity as an expert witness before many congressional committees and is frequently called upon by the media to comment on social policy issues concerning our nation's children and families.

Nancy Evans
Editor-in-Chief

Nancy Evans has spent her professional life combining a passion for magazines and books. Each medium requires differing sensibilities, but the common threads -- literary excellence, quality presentation and popular appeal -- are expertly woven by Evans. As Editor-in-Chief of *Family Life* she extends her passion and skill to a family magazine that speaks for a new generation.

Evans began her career in 1974 as an editor on the launch of *Harper's Weekly*. She subsequently co-authored *How to get Happily Published* -- a 250,000 copy, best-seller and a children's book, *Goodbye, House*. Evans was also a regular contributor to *Publisher's Weekly*.

In 1978 she became a Contributing Editor for *Glamour* and handled the book review column and special editorial sections until 1985. She started *Glamour's* book department where she negotiated book serializations and continued to contribute to a variety of magazines: *Ms.*, *The New York Times Book Review*, *Crawdaddy* and *Family Circle*.

Evans took her love of books to the airwaves as the co-host of "First Edition," which aired from 1983-1985. "First Edition" was a weekly PBS author interview show, underwritten by the Book-of-the-Month Club and Evans interviewed such notable authors as Norman Mailer, Toni Morrison and Saul Bellow. In 1985 Evans became Editor-in-Chief of the Book-of-the-Month Club.

In 1987 she left Book-of-the-Month Club to become President and Publisher of Doubleday. Bill Moyers' *The Power Myth* and *The World of Ideas*, Michael Jackson's *Moonwalk* and *Spy* magazine's *Separated at Birth* were among the best sellers released during Evans' tenure. While at Doubleday, she won the 1989 Women in Communications Matrix Award for Excellence in Book Publishing.

In 1990 Evans left Doubleday to spend more time with her young daughter and pursue her vision of a publication that addressed family issues seriously, intelligently and with humor.

Evans conceived the idea for *Family Life* and took the concept to Jann Wenner in 1991. He immediately supported the vision and Evans joined Straight Arrow in 1992 to develop the magazine. Evans has the vision, passion and depth of experience necessary to lead *Family Life* in a direction no other family magazine has ever gone.

Evans is a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Skidmore College with a B.A. in English literature. She was also a graduate fellow at Columbia University studying 17th century literature. A native of [REDACTED] she resides with her husband and daughter in New York City.
