Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service Master of Science in Foreign Service

Program of Study

The Master of Science in Foreign Service program (M.S.F.S.) is a professionally oriented, full-time, two-year program consisting of required courses and electives in functional and regional areas. The objective of the program is to train generalists in developing analytical skills and area knowledge essential for positions of leadership in international affairs in the public, private, and nonprofit sectors.

The M.S.F.S. degree requires 48 semester hours of study. The first year consists of an elective and a required curriculum. Offerings combine the development of analytic skills with advanced study in international economics and analysis, applied history, quantitative methods in foreign policy and business, international relations theory and practice, and electives in a designated program concentration. Suggested concentrations include foreign policy/national security, international finance and commerce, international business/government relations, international development, and self-designed concentrations (regional studies and others).

In the second year, students choose one of seven semester-long workshops, which complete course requirements in their concentration. Foreign policy practitioners from government and business teach the workshops. Activities include in-depth analysis of current international policy issues from operational perspectives.

In conjunction with the School of Foreign Service (SFS), the Graduate School, Georgetown University Law Center, and the School of Business, the program offers the following joint degrees: Juris Doctor/Master of Science in Foreign Service (J.D./M.S.F.S.); Master of Science in Foreign Service/Master of Business Administration (M.S.F.S./M.B.A.); Master of Science in Foreign Service/Master of Arts in economics (M.S.F.S./M.A. in economics); and Master of Science in Foreign Service/Master of Arts in history (M.S.F.S./M.A. in history).

SFS sponsors an honors certificate program in international business diplomacy and regional certificates in Arab/Middle East studies; German and European studies; and Eurasian, East European, and Russian area studies. In addition, area studies in Africa, Asia, and Latin America sponsor a wide variety of courses, symposia, seminars, and cocurricular events for students.

Research Facilities

The Lauinger Library houses more than 2 million resource materials. The library is a federal depository that makes federal government publications and databases readily available. The George C. McGhee Library houses an additional 10,000 volumes on international affairs. The Institute for the Study of Diplomacy (ISD) undertakes research on and publication of the diplomatic process. ISD sponsors symposia, seminars, and special events for international policymakers and students.

Financial Aid

In addition to federal loan and work-study programs, the M.S.F.S. program offers a limited number of merit-based scholarships. Matriculated students are eligible to apply for numerous teaching and research assistantships on a competitive basis. The M.S.F.S. staff aid placement in internship opportunities with government, research, and private organizations during the academic year and summer.

Cost of Study

Tuition in 1998-99 is \$19,128.

Living and Housing Costs

Most graduate students live in nearby neighborhoods in the Metropolitan Washington, D.C., area. Georgetown operates a bus service to and from selected Metro stops in Washington and Virginia. Students should estimate at least \$1000 per month for living costs such as room, board, books, and personal expenses.

Student Group

The M.S.F.S. annually enrolls approximately 80 M.S.F.S. students and 10 J.D./M.S.F.S. students. The 1997 entering class was composed of 32 percent international students and 17 percent members of U.S. minority groups. The ratio of men to women is approximately 50:50. In addition to University-wide activities, M.S.F.S. students publish their own international affairs journal, sponsor social and professional activities, and participate in community service projects.

Student Outcomes

The M.S.F.S. program continues to have one of the highest career placement records among international affairs schools. Within three months of graduation, 95 percent of the class is employed. The program's graduates find employment in international banking, consulting, and business; public interest and research institutes; lobbying and trade associations; congressional offices; and federal agencies such as the Departments of State, Commerce, the Treasury, and Defense and the Intelligence community. In 1997, more than 50 percent of the graduating class pursued careers in the private sector.

Location

The stimulating life of the nation's capital—and the historic Georgetown area of Washington, D.C.—add to the University's varied academic, professional, and cultural programs. Throughout the year, the School of Foreign Service hosts many symposia, conferences, and special events that bring leading international policymakers to the campus.

The School

Founded in 1919, the School of Foreign Service is the oldest and largest school of international relations in the U.S. In addition to its academic degree programs, SFS is home to regional studies centers, specialized research facilities and institutes, and training programs for officials from developing countries. Faculty members are vitally involved in the foreign policy issues of the day.

Applying

The M.S.F.S. program seeks students with diverse academic and professional backgrounds. Admissions requirements include two courses in economics (micro and macro principles), prior knowledge of at least one modern foreign language, satisfactory performance on the GRE General Test, three letters of reference, a resume, and a statement of purpose. The TOEFL and an English proficiency evaluation are required for non-native English speakers who have not received a degree in the United States. A minimum score of 600 is required on the TOEFL. The application deadline for September admission (there are no spring admissions) is February 1. All standardized tests must be completed by February 1. Georgetown University does not discriminate on the basis of age, sex, race, religion, color, disability, or national policies.

Operation Day's Work-USA: YEAR ONE

Students participating in the pilot program have selected Haiti as the focus country for the first year of ODW-USA. Applications for ODW-USA funds have been received from non-governmental organizations working to improve the lives of children in Haiti. In mid-February, the pilot schools will hold a vote, choosing the development project in Haiti that will be funded by ODW-USA.

Students from the pilot schools traveled to Norway in October to observe the Norwegian Operasjon Dagsverk campaign and brought home ideas for adapting the program in the United States. Pilot school students communicate via E-mail and teleconferences to design the program for ODW-USA and adapt it to meet the needs of their schools and communities. Each school is also working on getting their message out by designing websites on the Internet. More information on student activities, and links to different sites, can be found by visiting:

Each school is learning about Haiti and planning their own day of work. The workdays will take place between mid-April and mid-May, 1999. Based on their successes, pilot schools are creating the model for implementation of the program. The goal is to have Operation Day's Work- USA become a nationwide, annual event, with each program being designed and implemented by students at the local level.

We hope that this program inspires the students to assume the leadership roles of ODW-USA, and that they begin to recognize their ability to contribute to the global community. Embarking on this journey will undoubtedly foster international partnerships and friendships cultivated in the U.S., Norway, and beyond.

SUMMARY

Operation Day's Work creates a framework to expose students to the dynamic and diverse world around them and learn about the importance of volunteerism and community building. It empowers young people to show the world that they can be real leaders, and that a good idea can make a powerful difference in helping people improve their own lives.

For over 30 years, young people in secondary schools in Norway, Denmark, Sweden and Finland have devoted one day in each school year working in their communities to earn money that is donated to educational projects in the developing world. Operation Day's Work is a highly successful program that has created a culture of global awareness and generosity among generations of Scandinavians.

With the help of students from the Norwegian Operation Day's Work, USAID and several other organizations are working with the Norwegian government to adapt Operation Day's Work here in the United States. Operation Day's Work-USA will ultimately be implemented by schools and students themselves, working with local officials, non-governmental organizations (NGOs), and the private sector.

Annually, students will select a developing country in which to fund a project related to education, for example, school construction or repair, school supplies and textbooks, scholarships and vocational training, and so on. As part of the year's curriculum, "International Week," will be designated for students to learn about the pre-selected developing country, to become fully immersed in all aspects of the country they have chosen. The program raises student awareness about global economic issues, the importance of preventing wars, the impact of disease on populations and the necessity of democracy building.

At the end of "International Week," students will spend one day working and volunteering in the community to raise funds. Individual schools and students will choose what the work day will entail, from mowing lawns, working in factories or offices in the community, car washes and bake sales and other odd jobs. Proceeds earned by the students are donated to the development assistance project that the students have chosen.

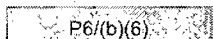

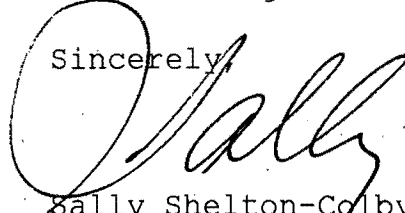

I. Scene Setting

USAID has mounted a major effort to reduce vitamin A deficiency in children under 5 years old in developing countries. This is a priority within the Agency's child survival program. We anticipate up to a 30 percent reduction in child mortality in targeted countries by the year 2002.

The ability to reach these goals will require more resources and greater avenues for child survival interventions than those available from USAID alone. For this reason, there are important partners in this effort -- other donors, multilaterals and now the private sector and civic organizations.

II. The White House Event

The purpose of the event is to officially launch the U.S.'s commitment to this major vitamin A effort in a highly visible and engaging manner. The involvement of the First Lady will help mobilize and solidify the support and commitment to this collaborative effort.

The event will provide a forum for:

- The First Lady to demonstrate U.S. leadership in vitamin A and child survival efforts worldwide.
- Congressional members supporting child survival to demonstrate their commitment to the cause.
- UNICEF and CIDA to attest to their on-going commitment and collaboration with USAID
- The private sector and other leaders to proclaim their commitment to the bridging of a impressive and innovative public - private partnership to save the lives of millions of children.

Anticipated Outcomes

Provide public statements and commitments to achieve a reduction in vitamin A deficiency.

Officially launch the VITA Alliance and establish a common goal.

Provide photo opportunities for each of the partners that can be used as advocacy tools for policy makers and government officials.

Attached are two proposals outlining events that Mrs. Clinton agreed to participate in during the July 10 briefing on Vitamin A and related USAID activities.

I gave this to Path [The first proposal is for a White House event to announce USAID's public-private partnership to combat Vitamin A deficiency. The First Lady would join members of VITA Alliance in signing a declaration of intent.

The second proposal is a back-to-school event to launch USAID's Operation Day's Work-USA (ODW-USA) program. This event would take place at one of our five pilot schools, the McFarland Middle School, located here in the District. This year students from pilot schools across the nation chose Haiti as the ODW focus country. The McFarland event would be an opportunity for the First Lady to share some of her impressions from her upcoming trip to Haiti and to discuss with students the challenges facing children in developing countries.

I understand your office is working closely with our Latin America Bureau to plan Mrs. Clinton's itinerary for her trip to Haiti. The attached events proposals provide domestic follow-up to many programs the First Lady could visit on her trip. Haiti site visits which highlight USAID's Vitamin A and youth programs would provide a compelling illustration of our VITA and ODW-USA efforts. I hope the First Lady will have time in her hectic schedule to visit one of our sites.

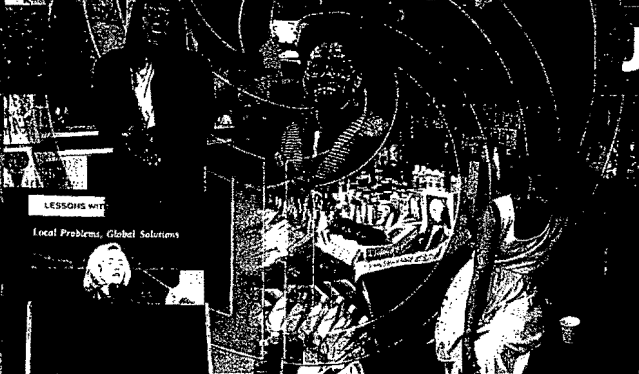
