Job Training Workforce Commission Convenes, Mulls Options for IT Employment

The 21st Century Workforce Commission Nov. 16 said it will hold hearings in various part of the country, in part, to examine ways to increase the number of skilled IT workers available to U.S. employers.

Some commission members also discussed training the existing U.S. workforce to resolve the shortage of information technology workers instead of relying increasingly on visas to export workers from other countries.

The meetings tentatively are being planned for five regions experiencing IT-related employment problems, according to recently elected commission Chairman Lawrence Perlman, chief executive officer of Minneapolis-based Ceridian Corp. These meetings will include three in areas experiencing chronic IT labor shortages, most likely northern Virginia; California; and the area surrounding Austin, Texas.

The commission then intends to hold meetings in one inner-city area and one rural agricultural region where economically disadvantaged workers may be retrained for high technology jobs, Perlman said.

The panel was established by the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 to study matters relating to IT employment and report by May 16, 2000, to Congress and the president with legislative and administrative policy recommendations, according to Susan Green, acting assistant secretary for the Office of Policy at the Department of Labor.

In examining ways to increase the number of skilled IT workers for U.S. employers, the commission will consider the skills necessary to obtain IT employment, IT training and education options, and immigration visas for technology workers. For policy ideas, the commission is also charged with considering comparative international approaches to IT training.

Issue of Training v. Visas

Among committee members, differences surfaced over how U.S. policy should address the IT worker shortage, particularly with respect to immigration visas for high technology workers.

Organized labor's representative on the commission, Morton Bahr, president of the Communications Workers of America, pointed to IT worker training programs in the collective bargaining agreement his union negotiated with AT&T. Bahr called these programs models for legislative initiatives and alternatives to increased immigration quotas.

"I am hopeful that the commission's work will make it possible for us to persuade more of corporate America to train our American workers for advancement in information technology jobs, as opposed to the knee-jerk reaction of increasing H-1B visa quotas," Bahr told BNA.

Several other members of the committee, however, favored increases in H-1B quotas as part of the solution to labor shortages.

Committee Vice Chairwoman Katherine K. Clark, chief executive officer of Virginia-based

Landmark Systems Corp., said although the focus should be on retraining existing workers, filling labor needs from outside the country should be pursued if necessary.

The Workforce Commission includes 17 members, eight from business and industry, three from education, three from state and local governments, one from a labor union, one from DOL, and one from the Department of Education.

The commission plans to meet next in early December to appoint an executive director, Perlman said.

Morton Bahr, President, Communications Workers of America, AFL-CIO, CLC

Morton Bahr became CWA's third president with his election on July 16, 1985. Since then he has guided the 630,000-member union through its most challenging era since its founding in 1938 and has made CWA the leading voice for professional, technical and information-age workers.

Prior to accepting the top post, Bahr served for 16 years as CWA vice president and head of District 1, the union's largest district covering New York, New Jersey and New England.

Wide Ranging Activities

One of the most influential figures in American labor, Bahr serves as a vice president of the AFL-CIO. He was a member of the Labor Advisory Committee on Trade Negotiations and also served on the Labor Advisory Committee to the National Administrative Office, which oversees the NAITA labor side agreement.

He heads the AFL-CIO's Department for Professional Employees and also serves as co-chairman of the Collective Bargaining Forum, a group of business and union leaders committed to improving the collective bargaining process.

Bahr is active in international labor circles and serves as vice president of the world executive committee of the Communications International,

representing 4.5 million telecommunications, information and postal workers in 115 countries.

He is a key leader in the area of communications policy, having served on the U.S. Advisory Council on National Information Infrastructure, and is now a member of the FCC's Network Reliability Council for telecommunications.

Bahr's long-standing involvement in community service and political action has included past service as vice chair of the United Way Board of Governors; board member of the Families and Work Institute; and board member of the Points of Light Foundation.

He chairs the Commission for a Nation of Lifelong Learners, serves on the board of the Cornell University/ Foundation House Experiments in Distance Learning and is a member of the Democratic National Committee.

Building and Broadening CWA

Bahr assumed the presidency of CWA only one year after the historic break-up of AT&T's Bell System, which at one time employed 90 percent of the union's members. Under his leadership, CWA has grown and broadened its membership to reflect the convergence of telecommunications with broadcast, cable, newspaper and publishing, entertainment and computer fields into one vast information industry.

Within CWA, Bahr has brought about a growing customer service sector, with 10,000 USAirways passenger service professionals joining the union in 1997; and a public safety sector, which includes as new members some 18,000 Florida corrections and probation officers.

In addition to boosting CWA's organizing successes in these areas,

Bahr has pursued a strategy of reaching out to unions in other segments of the information industry to join forces in dealing with the multi-media corporations. The result so far has been affiliation with CWA by the International Typographical Union in 1987, the National Association of Broadcast Employees and Technicians in 1994 and The Newspaper Guild in 1997.

Under Bahr's leadership, CWA has emphasized organizing public and health care workers, who now comprise a 100,000-member sector of the union, including medical and scientific research professionals and law enforcement officers.

CWA also is the largest union for customer service professionals, with 140,000 members in this field.

In the Bargaining Arena

As vice president of District 1, Bahr led the historic 218-day strike against New York Telephone in 1971 that paved the way to CWA's long-sought goal — national bargaining with the Bell System, achieved in 1974.

When Bahr assumed the presidency of CWA in 1985, the Bell System had been shattered. CWA's challenge was to deal with the disruption to the industry and the lives of thousands of CWA members in the new competitive era of communications.

Under his leadership in collective bargaining, CWA has focused on winning access for union members to new jobs in the deregulated communications industry, and in expanding educational and training opportunities for CWA members.

In 1986, CWA won a major breakthrough at AT&T with the first jointly owned, non-profit educational organi-

zation, the Alliance for Employee Growth and Development. This led to other outstanding educational programs throughout the telecommunications industry, such as the program negotiated with NYNEX in 1994. Members achieve an Associate Degree in Applied Science, attending school one day a week, with full pay.

Personal Background

Bahr began his union activism in 1947, following wartime service in the Merchant Marine, when he hired

on as a radio operator at Mackay Radio & Telegraph Company (later to become ITT World Communications). He was a leader in the organizing drive at Mackay, which culminated in a successful representation election in 1954, and became president of CWA Local 1172.

Bahr joined the international union staff as an organizer in 1957 and led an organizing drive that brought 24,000 members of New York Telephone Co. into CWA. He went on to become CWA's New York director in 1961,

and then assistant to the vice president of District 1 two years later. He was elected District 1 vice president in 1969.

Bahr's deep interest in lifelong learning partly stems from his own experience. His education had been interrupted by World War II, and later, as a CWA vice president, he resumed studies at night and finally completed his B.S. at Empire State College in New York City in 1983.

A native New Yorker, Bahr and his wife, Florence, now live in Washington, D.C.

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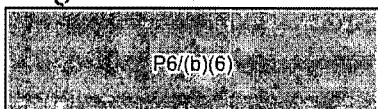

Mayor Marc H. Morial

Biography

Mayor Marc H. Morial continues his mission of rebuilding New Orleans in his second term. His reputation of tireless energy and commitment has endured since 1994 when he was elected Mayor of the City of New Orleans at age 35.

Morial bases his leadership on a "Gumbo Coalition," highlighting the principal that richness lies in diversity. His innovative ideas, groundbreaking programs and unprecedented coalitions have caused a renewed public confidence in city government.

Community Restoration

Today, first-time homebuyers and moderate to low-income residents are reclaiming the city's historic housing stock. Since 1994, over 10,000 new homeowners have been added to the New Orleans market.

Thomas J. Murrin was named Dean of Duquesne University's A. J. Palumbo School of Business Administration, effective January 1991 -- after serving for 18 months as Deputy Secretary of the U.S. Department of Commerce; nominated by President George Bush and confirmed by the U.S. Senate.

Over the next 36 years, he served in various positions with Westinghouse -- including European Manufacturing Representative based in Geneva, Switzerland; Corporate Vice President of Manufacturing; Senior Vice President of the Defense and Public Systems Group, and President of the Public Systems Company. Murrin retired in 1987 as President of the firm's highly regarded Energy and Advanced Technology Group -- an organization with nearly \$5 billion in annual sales. As a member of the Westinghouse Management Committee from 1974 until his retirement, Quality and Productivity Improvement were elevated to key corporate initiatives under his guidance. During his Westinghouse career, he traveled to more than 40 countries.

Building on his extensive foreign travel and study of industrial operations, Murrin served on the Defense Policy Advisory Committee on Trade of the Department of Defense and was chairman of DPACT's Subcommittee on Trade Relations with Japan. He was the first Chairman of two prestigious Advisory Committees to the Federal Government; i.e., the Board of Overseers of the Commerce Department's Malcolm Baldrige National Quality Award, and DoD's Defense Manufacturing Board. Murrin was a member of the President's Commission on Industrial Competitiveness -- and Chairman of the Board of Governors of the Aerospace Industries Association.

Representative Frank D. Riggs

United States Congressman Frank Riggs has distinguished himself through both his public service and his private sector career. Having pledged to limit his service in Congress to six years, Representative Riggs is nearing completion of his third and final term representing Northwest California's First Congressional District (the North Coast and Northern San Francisco Bay Area of California).

Representative Riggs is a successful small businessman with an extensive record of public and community service. He is the owner of his own business, a real estate investment company. He has also been the Vice President and General Manager of two small businesses that grew and prospered substantially under his leadership.

Representative Riggs was first elected to Congress in 1990 (102nd Congress, 1991-1993) when he defeated a Democrat incumbent. Frank Roberts has the distinction of being the City of Lancaster's first directly elected Mayor. He was elected in April 1996 and re-elected in April 1998. While the City never before had an elected mayor, this is the third term as Mayor for Roberts. A member of the City Council since April 1992, he previously served for a year as Mayor, from 1994 to 1995, at a time when that office was rotated among council members.

Roberts has lived in Lancaster for 50 years and he and his wife, Gail, a Lancaster native, have been married for 48 years. For 37 years, Roberts was a teacher and dean at Antelope Valley College. He served as teacher of math, engineering and technologies for 15 years. For 16 years, he was Dean of Applied Academics and Technologies. Concurrently, he worked at UCLA as a professor of vocational education for 12 years. Concerned about the availability of education for all and the development of a four year college in the Antelope Valley, Roberts is a member of Career Prep Committee at AVHS/AVCC.

A Senior Member of the AIAA, Roberts' professional accomplishments were recognized in 1998 when he was awarded the Golden Apple Award by the AVACSA (Antelope Valley Association of California School Administrators).

Roberts was elected in April 1999 to serve the Northern Corridor Cities on the Board of the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transit Authority (MTA). In addition, he has demonstrated his commitment to job development as the President of the Employers Advisory Committee, as a member of the Lancaster Chamber of Commerce, the Palmdale Chamber of Commerce, and as Chairperson of the Board of Directors for the Milestones of Flight Museum. He served as a director of the Lancaster Economic Development Agency from 1990-1992, was President of the Antelope Valley Board of Trade from 1990 to 1991, and served on the Antelope Valley Business Industry Council from 1977 to 1988. He is presently director of the Los Angeles County Private Industry Council and has worked for over seven years to establish the Antelope Valley's One Stop Job Center.

Promoting recreation to insure a quality of life in our community, Roberts was instrumental in the development of the baseball stadium and is a backer of softball, soccer, parks and arts facilities.

As the former owner of a radio-television repair shop, he was involved in the development and installation of TV cable systems. This experience led to his operating a multi-community TV cable system corporation.

Frank and Gail Roberts have a son, Dan, and a granddaughter, Carson Jean Roberts, 12 years old.
