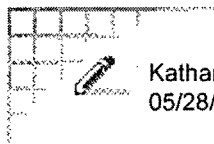

In July and August, an estimated 20,000 students with low test scores will participate in the D.C. Public Schools summer program. The program, designed to give children the extra help they need to rise to the next grade level, is part of the District's ambitious plan to end social promotion in all its schools.

In order to reach as many children as possible, the D.C. Public Schools and the organization known as DC Reads have asked for our help. They are in need of more than a

thousand reading tutors to work with children one-on-one.

The President has asked all Federal agencies and their employees to consider adopting a D.C. school this summer. Here at the White House, we can rise to this challenge, too. Francis Junior High School is within walking distance of the White House (24th and N Streets, N.W.), and it is in great need of volunteer tutors with or without previous tutoring experience. Although the site is a junior high school, most of the children in the summer program are first- to sixth-graders. Many are or have been homeless. Some are currently living with foster families.

The time commitment for tutors is modest: a maximum of 14 hours over the course of the summer. Tutors are asked to attend a two-hour training and orientation session on June 28 or 29. Then they will work with students once a week, for six weeks, starting July 6. Tutors are needed Mondays, from 6:15 p.m. to 8:15 p.m. or Tuesdays, from 6:15 to 8:15. If you are unable to attend on a given evening, the coordinators just ask that you give them a few hours' notice.
