**Mr. President, Madam Secretary, Honorable members of Congress,
Distinguished Guests.**

United States government support for family planning makes a world of difference in the lives of women, children and communities in Nigeria.

The real human face of the social and economic crises in Nigeria is the face of *women*. In Kebbi in the north, Jamela aged 15, married at twelve, pregnant at thirteen. She was in labor for 4 days. The village barber cuts through her bladder and rectum. At fifteen she constantly leaks urine and faeces. She was lucky. Thousands die. Many more are permanently handicapped.

Maria lives in a community in Benue State where one out of every five people is HIV positive. Age 32, she has five children, 6 months ago her sister and brother in-law died of AIDS leaving 6 children. "God please bail me out..." She has an intra uterine contraceptive device and will benefit from USAID orphan care project.

In Imo state in the Southeast, a goat is slaughtered and there is a celebration when a woman delivers her 10th child. Chinyere aged 28, has seen many women die during childbirth. She has 3 children and determined not to have more. She has access to contraceptives. She says, "I am able to do things I could not do before. I run my business. My husband is happy." Her empowerment makes a world of difference in the lives of her three children.

With USAID support, we have family planning and democracy and governance programs linked. This has generated broader impact. For example, women networks mobilized 6.5 million women for national immunization and had 36,000 children immunized in 2 days. During Nigeria's last election, our family planning networks registered 2.3 million women as voters.

Rahab lives in Bauchi in the North. Her three sons go to school. Her daughters are kept at home. After attendance at a women's rights training. She decided to send her daughter Ruth to school. Ruth is twelve, her marriage will be delayed and a traumatic obstetric

experience prevented. In the same community, advocacy by women's networks doubled the enrollment of girls in primary school.

Dorcas' niece in Edo State bled and died after her genital was cut as a pre-marital ceremony. Dorcas is a member of women networks supported by USAID. Through their effort a bill was passed in Oct. 1999, which makes Female Genital Mutilation a criminal offence in Edo State.

Your support enables women to use newly created democratic space to transform their lives. I believe that the global gag rule imposed by the US Congress stifles robust debates on women's reproductive rights in developing countries. It is retrogressive. It is repressive. It is, indeed, undemocratic.

May I conclude with my favorite quote. On International Women's day 1997, the First Lady, Hilary Clinton says and I quote,

"... We may need to be reminded that democracy is not just about legally protected rights, elections, or free market economies. It is about the internalization of democratic values in people's hearts and minds... Democracy is rooted in people's everyday lives."

After 40 years of stricture, Nigerians are anxious to experience the dividends of democracy in their everyday lives. Your support resonates this aspiration in communities. Family planning has released the energies of women. It has catalyzed selfless contributions to communities. Families have prospered. Communities have been enriched as they created space for women. Thousands of civil society groups have been activated and are committed to the much-needed economic and social reforms.

I urge you to scale up your support and investment in family planning programs. We need you to stay the course of structure as we take tentative steps to nurture and sustain democracy in Nigeria.

Acknowledgements: Secretary Madeleine Albright, Secretary Donna Shalala; Dr. Enyantu Ifenne [en-YAN-too ee-FEN-nay] of Nigeria; and all the women's health advocates who are with us today. I want to thank Representatives Carolyn Maloney and Jim Greenwood, as well as Nita Lowey, Nancy Pelosi, and many others, for your leadership on family planning assistance. I also want to acknowledge the foundations and non-profits which have stepped up their own support for women's health and family planning around the world – and thank everyone who helped organize these two days of events on saving women's lives and protecting women's health.

This week Congress began a new budget debate – and we have a new chance to return America's support for family planning around the world to the level it ought to be. We have a new chance to lift the international family planning debate out of partisan politics and back to what it is really about -- human potential and human lives. I have proposed an increase of \$169 million in USAID's international family planning assistance this year, as well as \$25 million to support the United Nations Population Fund. Members of my Administration and I have made clear at every opportunity that we are ready to fight – and I know you are ready to help us win.

My wife Hillary, whose leadership on this issue has been so important, would have loved to be with us today – but she is fighting hard to join you in Congress, and help me join the Senate Spouses Club. So I want to quote something she said last year at The Hague Forum:

“[W]e now know that no nation can hope to succeed in the global economy of the 21st century . . . when its women and children are trapped in endless cycles of poverty; when they have inadequate health care, poor access to family planning, limited education, or when they are constrained inside social or cultural customs that impoverish their spirits and limit their dreams.”

Two weeks ago I was in a little village in India, a country with almost one billion people and a per capita income of \$450 a year. I met the women who, with the smallest amount of encouragement, had started the Women's Dairy Cooperative, and taken over the local milk business. And I saw their community center's computer that any village woman, poor or almost illiterate, can use to get the latest information on caring for a newborn baby.

Think about how life in that one village is changing for the better because women have access to education and health care. Hillary and I have seen again and again around the world how empowering women lifts the lives of individuals and transforms the future for whole communities. Family planning is a vital part of that empowerment – because it allows women and families to make their own choices, and plan their own futures. If you believe God created

women equal, if you believe every society needs women's contributions to succeed, then you ought to be in favor of returning decisions on family life to the hands of women and families.

Around the world, the complications of pregnancy kill 600,000 women every year. We all agree on fighting child and maternal mortality – just as we are working to eradicate polio and TB. But maternal mortality has been stuck at the same level for more than a decade – even though we know that family planning could help women bear healthier children, and save the lives of 150,000 women every year. If you're in favor of healthy mothers raising healthy babies, you ought to be in favor of family planning.

Around the world, 34 million people are now living with AIDS – and in the developing world, almost half are women. Last year, AIDS killed 1.1 million women, leaving broken communities, crippled economies, and millions of orphaned children. If you care about stopping the spread of AIDS, you ought to care about empowering women to make safe choices for themselves and for their children.

Around the world, more than one billion young people are entering their reproductive years. That is the largest generation in history, and the one behind it is two billion strong. More than 150 million women world-wide would like to limit or space their children, but have no access to contraception. The options these young people have, and the choices they make, will have vital consequences for every one of us. If you are concerned about the health of our planet, and about the health of everyone on it, you ought to support our family planning assistance overseas.

America has a profound interest in safe, voluntary family planning. We have a moral interest in saving human lives. We have a practical interest in building a world of healthy children and strong societies. And because we are a nation that believes in individual freedom and responsibility, we have every interest in supporting others around the world who seek the same rights and responsibilities we enjoy.

That is why we have consistently supported family planning since 1993. We do not fund abortion -- we fund family planning that we know reduces the demand for abortions. And I have asked Congress to return our support for international family planning to the level it reached in 1995 -- a level that serves our interests, keeps our promises, and leverages support from other donors around the world. I urge Congress to give us that money without restrictions that hamper the work of family planning organizations, and bar them from discussing or debating reproductive health policies.

Those Congressionally-sponsored restrictions impose a destructive double standard. When would we ever accept rules telling Americans at home not even to discuss women's health and women's choices? And how, in the name of democracy and freedom, can we impose those rules on others? That is not the American way.

We know Americans favor family planning at home, and voluntary family planning assistance abroad. And we should not cloud what is at stake: does the United States want to

save lives, promote mother and child health, and strengthen families and communities around the world?

Together, let's make sure the answer is yes.

Now let me turn to someone who has been a leader, in my Administration and around the world, in making the case for women's health and women's empowerment; who is herself a trail-blazer and a role model; and who has distinguished herself in America's service as an outstanding Secretary of State. Madeleine Albright.

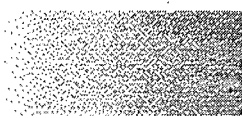

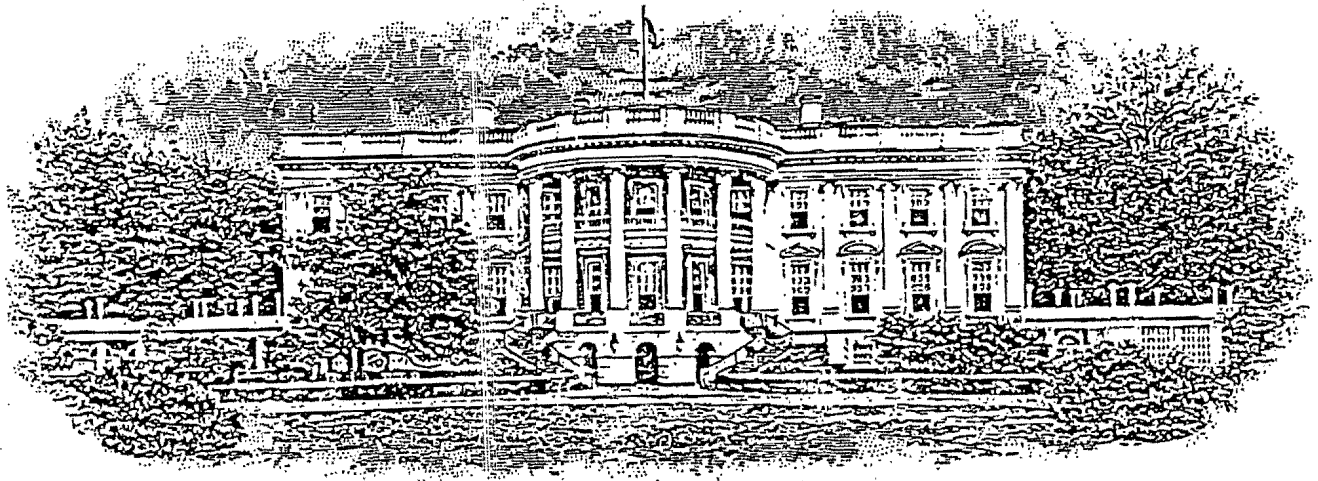

Dr. Arzu Rana-Deuba is the president of SAATHI, a non-governmental organization working in the area of violence against girls and women in Nepal. Recently, SAATHI worked with the Ministry of Women and Social Welfare to draft language for a bill in the Nepal Parliament that is for the protection of children against sexual exploitation.

She is also the executive director for SAMANTA Institute for Social and Gender Issues, a non-governmental organization working mainly in research and training on multi-sectoral issues pertaining to gender. Dr. Rana-Deuba is also the founder and chairperson of Rural Women's Development and Unity Centre, which has established a low-risk birthing center in far-western Nepal. This organization advocates for the reproductive health and rights for women.

Since 1996, Dr. Rana-Deuba has served as the honorary chairperson of the national Safe Motherhood Network in Nepal. This network comprises of more than 75 institutional members from the government, non-government, donor and private agencies and has received regional and international recognition.

Dr. Rana-Deuba has been working as a gender analyst, planner, trainer and training designer in Nepal since 1992. Her experience comprises of working with gender issues in areas as diverse as micro-enterprise, health, energy and water, environment, communications, empowerment, violence against women and training women and men at the grassroots level on gender issues. She has published a number of articles on development, political empowerment of women and violence against women in Nepal.
