GUIDELINES for Chairs of Orals SESSIONS

1. Definition

Concurrent Abstract Sessions, Roundtables, and Debates constitute the main body of the XI International Conference on AIDS. Twelve sessions (three per track) will be presented at one time. Typically, six abstracts will be presented in each session. Questions from the audience will be moderated by the session Chairs.

Please refer to the attached detailed outline for a complete description of the session you will be co-chairing.

2. Role of Chairs

The role of the chair is to introduce speakers, maintain the punctuality of each presentation and, in concluding remarks, put the information presented in the abstracts into context for the audience.

3. Briefing Session for Chairs

In order to familiarise yourself with your responsibilities, a briefing for Chairs has been scheduled on the day of your session. The briefing will take place at 12:30 pm in the Speakers' Centre (Harbourview Room) at the Vancouver Trade and Convention Centre (VTCC). Refreshments and a light lunch will be served.

4. Division of Responsibilities

Each session has two Chairs. We suggest that the responsibilities be shared as follows:

- the first Chair opens the session with a general Introduction, welcoming delegates to the session and introduces the first half of the speakers;
- the second Chair introduces the last half of the speakers and makes concluding remarks.

Chairs should introduce each presentation by abstract title, name of presenter, and affiliation (as listed in the *Final Program*).

5. Punctuality

As the program is tightly scheduled, it is imperative that sessions begin and end on time. It is your responsibility to ensure fair and equal time for all presenters.

A speaker timing device will be provided to Chairs. The indicators are as follows:

- an amber light indicates a two-minute warning;
- a red light indicates that the speaker's time has elapsed.

6. Chair/Speaker Meeting before Session

Chairs should meet with speakers on the stage area inside the session room 15 minutes before the session begins.

7. Cancellations/Changes in Speakers

You should announce changes in speakers at the beginning of the session. In the event that a presentation is cancelled and no other presentation has been scheduled to replace it, the extra time may be used for a longer discussion period at the end of the session. The use of this time is at the Co-Chairs' discretion.

There will be a Conference-employed room attendant in all meeting rooms to assist with crowd control and to check badges, as well as a technician to show slides.

Th.D.256**AIDS SURVIVOR SYNDROME AND GERMAN GAY MEN: A NATIONAL EXPLORATORY STUDY**

Wright, Michael T. Deutsche AIDS-Hilfe, Berlin, Germany

Objective: An exploratory study to test the effects of the AIDS epidemic on the gay community in Germany, with particular attention to the existence of an AIDS survivor syndrome (ASS). A primary goal of the research is for the first time to quantitatively define and test for the existence of this syndrome.

Methods: Two hour long interviews were conducted with sixty-four gay-identified men from various regions in Germany, using a largely quantitative research instrument with qualitative components. The instrument and formulation of hypotheses were conceived as a result of an exhaustive search of the American and German literature. The instrument is composed of twenty dimensions, including demographic information; information concerning living situation, personal traits and sexual behavior (e.g. HIV status, partner status, sexual practices, number of people with HIV/AIDS known); and potential effects of HIV/AIDS (e.g. PTSD, depression, demoralization). Correlations between variables were tested to determine (a) the cluster of variables forming a potential syndrome and (b) the predictors for such a syndrome among gay German men.

Results: Initial analysis indicates that a potential AIDS survivor syndrome (ASS) may be composed of PTSD symptoms, demoralization, psychosomatic symptoms, guilt, sleep disturbance, lack of energy, sexual problems, and problems with drugs/alcohol. ASS is positively correlated with social need, perceived stigma as a homosexual internalized homophobia, and denial as a coping strategy. It is negatively correlated with age, avoidance as a coping strategy, number of people known with HIV/AIDS, loss of a significant other due to HIV/AIDS, and partner status.

Conclusion: Final analysis will be presented at the conference. Initial findings indicate the existence of an AIDS Survivor Syndrome consistent with survivor syndromes seen among other populations which have been exposed to serious trauma. Interventions which have been applied effectively to other traumatized groups need to be adapted to the needs of gay men affected by HIV/AIDS

Th.D.350**AIDS AND THE FUTURE OF PUBLIC HEALTH**

Mann, Jonathan M. Harvard School of Public Health, Boston, MA, USA

The expanding and intensifying HIV/AIDS pandemic challenges several fundamental assumptions of traditional public health and its approach to behavior-centered health problems. Traditional public health relies upon epidemiology to identify individual risk behaviors, then used to define the behavioral locus and nature of the problem. Such risk factor analyses - considering behavior to be individual, linear and logical - are then translated into prevention activities. Public health efforts focus on providing support to the supposed processes of individual behavior change (risk reduction), through educational/informational activities and health and/or social services. The societal context is acknowledged but not acted upon. In short, traditional public health sees the disease as dynamic within a static society; the problem becomes "how to control the disease without directly acting upon the society". HIV/AIDS is forcing us to see the inherent limits of this approach, for it is clearly necessary and also inherently insufficient to control the pandemic. Meta-analyses of more mature HIV epidemics and thorough analysis of existing prevention approaches suggests that public health's ability to analyze and respond to important societal-level determinants of vulnerability to HIV/AIDS must be re-examined and strengthened. The new public health states: as the disease and society are inextricably connected, both must be directly addressed. A new public health requires a coherent conceptual framework for analysis of societal preconditions for vulnerability to HIV, a vocabulary for identifying commonalities among superficially diverse populations, and guidance regarding the direction of societal change needed to promote and protect health.

Ultimately, as public health seeks to ensure the underlying conditions in which people can be healthy, and since these conditions are, above all, societal, public health work requires work to transform society. The modern human rights movement offers public health a previously unavailable instrument and approach for analyzing and responding to the societal dimensions of vulnerability to HIV/AIDS, as to other causes of preventable disease, disability and premature death. A public health renaissance - through linking health and human rights - is both required by HIV/AIDS and vital for the future of global health.

Th.D.351**COMPASSIONATE ACCESS TO EXPERIMENTAL THERAPIES**

Atkinson, Maerie. AIDS Action Now!, Toronto, Ontario, Canada

Compassionate access is the provision of a therapy which has not yet been approved for sale to catastrophically ill people who, in consultation with their physician, believe that it may

save life, re-establish health or alleviate suffering. The most compelling argument against compassionate access is that in practice as it has evolved over the course of the AIDS epidemic it may slow drug development because it can slow the recruitment of volunteers to clinical trials. The reason for this problem is that people believe the new drug is better than the standard of care on the basis of preliminary trials. One of the ethical requirements of clinical trials is "equipoise", a state of genuine uncertainty about the relative merits of the therapies in the trial and this requirement is evidently not being met. The study should be designed to ensure that the participants are indifferent as to the arm to which they are randomized. This might mean a study of AZT + 3TC + SAQ v. AZT + 3TC + IND, based on the surrogate marker data from phase III trials, rather than a study of AZT + 3TC v. AZT + 3TC + SAQ. Compassionate access may be required for a clinical trial to be both ethically and scientifically valid. AIDS activists, particularly in Canada, have argued that in order for participation in a trial to be truly voluntary, persons with catastrophic illnesses must not be coerced into trials as their only hope of receiving a potentially life-saving treatment. This paper will also examine a number of the practical issues of compassionate access: financial, administrative and regulatory. Who should get it? Who should pay? Is it research? Should it be mandatory? How do you ration compassionate access when demand exceeds supply?

The HIV/AIDS epidemic has brought an unprecedented mobilization in terms of responses arising in different cultures and societies around the world. During the 80s, supposedly the "Me" decade, a wide range of strategies for living with AIDS, caring for people with AIDS and conveying information on the disease were developed by individuals, groups and communities directly affected by HIV. Over the 90s, these responses have become more complex and new actors have come on stage, such as national and international cooperation agencies and multilateral banks. How community groups and NGOs will go about harmonizing individual priorities and global trends and issues is one of the most pressing issues to be faced in the third decade of the HIV/AIDS epidemic.

Th.D.360**COMPLIANCE WITH A SELF-REPORT OF HIV STATUS AND THE PROVISION OF A SALIVA SPECIMEN IN A SURVEY OF SELF-IDENTIFIED GAY AND BISEXUAL MEN.**

Objectives: 1) To compare the extent to which gay and bisexual men who participate in a community venue-based seroprevalence survey agree to self-report their HIV antibody status and to provide an optional anonymous specimen of saliva for subsequent testing; and, 2) to examine variables associated with compliance for each method of serostatus determination. **Methods:** A purposive sample of gay and bisexual men (n=468) was recruited using a phased strategy through gay organizations (n=107), bars (n=316) and a bathhouse (n=15) in a mid-west Canadian city. Respondents were asked to complete an anonymous questionnaire examining sociodemographic characteristics, sexual and testing behaviour, HIV status, gay community involvement and how they had heard about the study. Bivariate analyses were conducted to examine the association between disclosure/specimen provision and socio-behavioural variables. Results were verified using logistic regression.

Results: Response to the survey was high with only 13% refusing to participate. Of the participants, 75.2% reported that they had been tested for HIV and 63.7% reported their HIV status, whereas 85.3% agreed to provide a saliva specimen. All men recruited through community groups agreed to provide saliva. 82.9% through bars and 66.8% through the bathhouse. In general, variables significantly associated with compliance were recruitment venue, age, membership in gay organizations, and having heard about the study through word-of-mouth. Among the subgroup of men with the potential to respond to both aspects of the study (i.e. those previously tested for HIV), the highest compliance (i.e. participation in both methods of data collection) was among members of gay organizations (96.5%) vs. non-members (76.0%), men in one relationship (91.2%) vs. multiple (72.7%), non-aboriginals (88.6%) vs. aboriginals (75.9%), participants in non-anal sex (88.3%) vs. anal sex (80.9%) and men who had heard about the study through word-of-mouth (95.0%) vs. other (84.7%).

Conclusions: Results of this study reveal that acceptance of HIV seroprevalence testing and disclosure of HIV status remain issues for many gay men. The high rate of compliance with providing a saliva specimen suggests that there is a potential for seroprevalence research with this population not previously acknowledged. Recruitment strategies that ensure: 1) respondents are fully informed of the study objectives, 2) data will be used at a community programme level, and that 3) participation is voluntary, confidential and anonymous are important aspects to the achievement of high participation rates in seroprevalence surveys.

Th.D.361**CONDOM CARRYING AND ITS RELATIONSHIP TO CONDOM USE AMONG HIGH RISK POPULATIONS**

Carbin, Guenter-Grey*, Rich Wolitski*, Martin Fishbein*, The AIDS Community Demonstration Projects, *Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Atlanta, GA.

Objective: To examine the correspondence of self-reported and observed condom carrying, and the relationship between observed condom carrying and reported condom use among various populations at risk for HIV infection.

Methods: As part of a community-level intervention study, data were collected from 1991-1994 through field surveys in five U.S. cities. For this analysis, respondents (N=8700) were: male and female injecting drug users not in treatment (IDUs), female sex partners of IDU (FSPs), female commercial sex workers (CSWs), and non-gay-identifying men who have sex with men. Respondents were asked if they were currently carrying a condom and, if so, to show it to the interviewer. Respondents were also asked how often they used a condom

GOOD AFTERNOON:

Thank you for that kind introduction. It is an honor to join you today to discuss a subject that is near and dear to my heart.

It is sometimes difficult to believe that the pandemic of HIV and AIDS has been with us for 15 years. In that time, more than a million women, men, and children have lost their lives and millions more are living every day with this deadly virus in their bodies.

This epidemic has torn at the fabric of our society and at the structures of our communities and our families. It has created untold misery for the millions of people who love and care for those who are infected.

But AIDS has also brought us together, forging new partnerships and new movements. It has strengthened our resolve to fight for the rights and the needs of those who are affected. And it has unified our nations against a common enemy.

Those alliances have helped us to share information and lessons. One important lesson has been the need to focus our attention and our efforts on the prevention and treatment of sexually transmitted diseases.

We know from the work being done all around the world that infection with STDs make people -- especially women -- much more susceptible to HIV infection. We know, too, that by controlling STDs we can achieve a significant reduction in the number of people who become infected with HIV.

But we also know that women are much more susceptible to STDs; they are more difficult to diagnose; and they are more difficult to treat. Finally, we know that complications from STDs, like pelvic inflammatory disease, can cause serious health problems in women.

Take a look, for example, at chlamydia, which has reached epidemic proportions in the United States. Approximately one in ten adolescent females in the U.S. between the ages of 15 and 19 are believed to be infected with chlamydia. The same holds true for approximately 1 in 20 women between the ages of 20 and 24.

These kind of numbers make it clear that we have a large task before us. We need better diagnostic tests. We need more basic research on the pathogenesis of STDs. And we need more methods of prevention.

There are a number of methods available to us to control STDs, but it is also clear that those methods are not as effective as we would like them to be.

That is why I am such a passionate proponent of research and development of topical microbicides.

Currently, women have very few prevention methods available to them that they can control themselves. The advent of the female condom was certainly a welcome development. But, so far at least, the female condom has not been widely accepted by women in my country and in most countries around the world. That is not to say that we should not continue to work to improve that product and promote its use.

But other methods are needed and a microbicide is at the top of the list. A safe and effective topical microbicide can prevent HIV infection as well as a long list of other sexually transmitted diseases.

A microbicide is likely to be easy to apply and can be applied without the knowledge of a woman's sexual partner. It can be tasteless, odorless, and virtually undetectable. And, perhaps best of all, it can be inexpensive. Combined, these factors build a strong case for the rapid development of a microbicide as a powerful tool to fight sexually transmitted diseases.

Just yesterday, Donna Shalala, Secretary of Health and Human Services, announced a four-year \$100 million initiative to develop a safe and effective topical microbicide by the year 2000.

This will require unprecedented cooperation among nations and between government and the private sector -- especially the pharmaceutical industry. And it will be a challenge for all of us to keep the pressure on and make sure that this initiative is successful.

We have a unique opportunity to change the lives and the future of millions of men, women, and children around the world.

Marshall McLuhan, the great Canadian philosopher, may have been the first to talk about our global village.

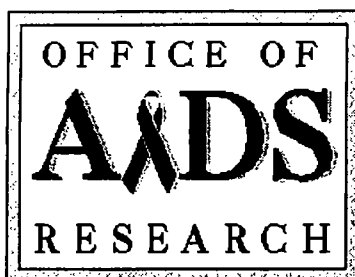
Well, today, our global village is threatened by sexually transmitted diseases including HIV and AIDS.

It is our job as scientists, as public health professionals, as activists, as citizens of this planet to take back our future.

It may well take a village to raise a child, but it also takes the commitment and the passion of millions of individuals to preserve a village.

I know that we are up to that task. We all know that we must be.

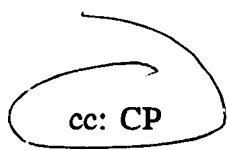

BACKGROUND

International collaboration is a basic tenet of HIV/AIDS policy in the United States of America, a key principle of the National AIDS Strategy Phase II of Canada and vital to the national strategies of CONASIDA in Mexico. We will co-sponsor multiple events for the XI International AIDS Conference.

Content

- Two satellite symposia have been approved by the Conference Program Co-Chairs. Satellite symposia are sessions intended to take advantage of the presence of Conference delegates in a single location. These symposia occur before or after the Conference, or during the Conference day at times when other Conference sessions are not scheduled (e.g., in the evening or at lunch time). The Conference gives priority to satellite symposia that are original programs, to those that attract a global audience, or to those that provide skills building. The Conference will publicize the satellite symposia in all Conference material, including the Conference newsletter and other Conference publications. We have chosen innovative partnerships between health professionals and people living with HIV (PLHIV) as the theme for the satellite symposia.
- The first U.S.- Canada satellite symposium will occur on July 8, 1996 in the evening (19:00 - 21:30). It emphasizes innovative partnerships between health professionals and PLHIV on the following topics: 1) counseling and testing HIV infected women, 2) models for training health professionals and PLHIV providers that applicable to the developing world, and 3) communication (print and electronic). We will focus on DHHS accomplishments; e.g., counseling and testing guidelines for HIV infected women, ATIS, etc.
- The second U.S. - Canada satellite symposium will occur on July 9, 1996 in the evening (19:00 - 21:30). It contains the following presentations: 1) roundtable on protease inhibitors-access issues, 2) HIV related mental health, and 3) examples of successful innovative partnerships. In addition, the session will contain a fair consisting of exhibits and displays of educational resources on research, prevention, AIDS Service Organizations, care, and mental health. The United States, Canada, and Mexico will jointly share and staff the display and exhibit areas.

Industry will be allowed to display educational materials only.

- **Dr. Daniels (U.S.) and Dr. Bally(Canada) designed the conceptual framework and structure for the satellite symposia. In the U.S., the specific content of the sessions will be designed by DHHS programs (principally IIRSA's AETC Program, with financial co-sponsorship contributed by the Ryan White IIIb program). We will invite multiple agencies of the DHHS(e.g., CDC , NIH, etc.) to participate in the health professionals - PLHIV educational resources fair.**
- **In addition to the two symposia , the government units of the three countries (DHHS, Health Canada, and CONASIDA) will hold a two-hour luncheon on July 9, 1995. The luncheon session is**

CONFIDENTIAL. Government officials and invited PLHIV from the U.S., Canada and Mexico will discuss major accomplishments in partnerships between health professionals and PLHIV . We will provide status reports on two U.S. - Canada initiatives (HIV palliative care and HIV rehabilitation) and one U.S. - Mexico initiative (HIV related migrant health). Representatives from UNAIDS, PAHO, and the GNP+ (Global Network of PLHIV) will offer remarks. Jeff Levi of ONAP was briefed on Conference activities on January 17, 1996; Jane Sanville will follow activities for ONAP. Additional briefing of Jeff Levi occurred in May. A specific invitation will be issued to Ms. Patricia Fleming of ONAP to make special remarks at the luncheon. In addition, we plan to launch one shared priority for 1997 - 1998 (i.e., a priority common to the countries involved for which we will plan collaborative activities). We have selected, "Creating and Enhancing Health Care and Social Services for HIV Affected Families." Reading of the joint declaration on HIV affected families will mark the conclusion of the luncheon.

Immediately following the luncheon, the Secretary and the Ministers will go to an adjoining room to sign the joint declaration. Media will be invited to witness the signing. The Secretary and the Ministers may make brief remarks. Media will not be allowed to ask questions. Government officials that will lead this session include: the Canadian Minister of Health or his designee, the U.S. Secretary of Health or her designee, and the Secretary of Health of Mexico or his designee.

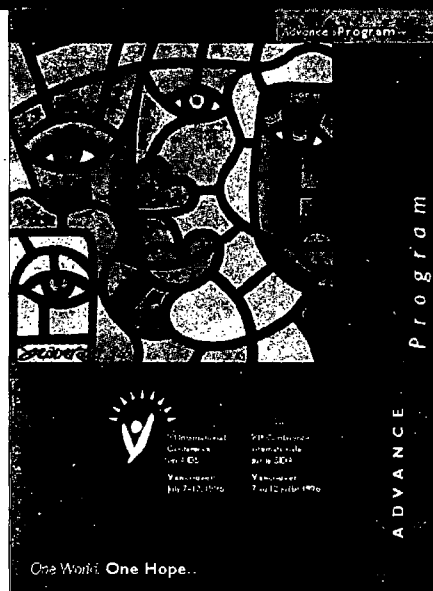
Travel, Arrival, Sites, and Services

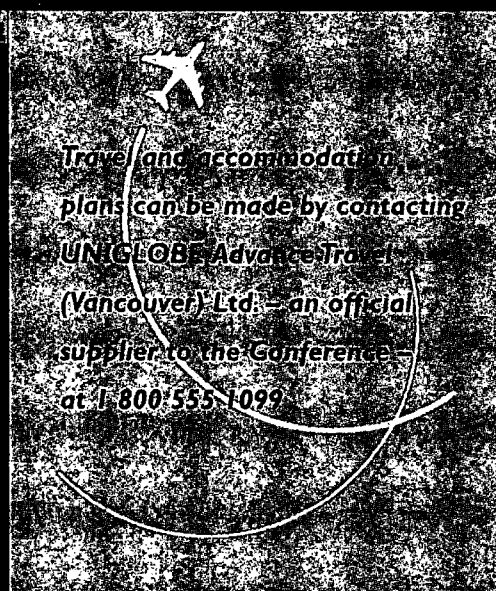
Scientific Program

Flights and Accommodation Available

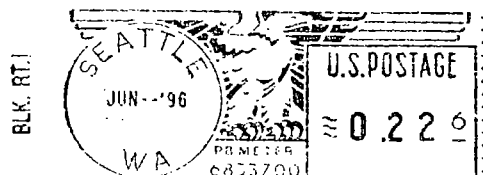

The Office of AIDS Research (OAR), NIH, is providing information about conference registration, abstract submissions, and lodging arrangements to potential participants of the *XI International Conference on AIDS* to be held July 7-12, 1996, in Vancouver, Canada. The conference is sponsored by the International AIDS Society, the Global Network of People Living with HIV, the International Council of AIDS Service Organisations, the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS, and the Canadian Association for HIV Research. The information which follows outlines arrangements which have been made for the conference.

ABSTRACT SUBMISSIONS

Individuals are responsible for submitting their own abstracts directly to the conference organizers. **The deadline for abstract submissions is FEBRUARY 1, 1996 (no later than 1700, Vancouver Time).** No abstracts will be accepted after this deadline. Our request to the Conference Organizers for an extension of this deadline was denied. Guidelines for the abstract submissions are below:

1. Indicate the location (country) of research or project.
2. Indicate if Registration and Accommodation Form and fees are attached, or have been previously sent.
3. Indicate your preference for oral or poster presentation format.
4. Indicate first and second choices for track category, select a pathway, and indicate at least 3 key words.
5. Contact information must be complete: include name, affiliation, address, telephone, facsimile numbers and e-mail address.
6. Please sign the Abstract Form.

7. Indicate if the presenting author wishes to be considered for a Young Investigator Award.
8. Two different kinds of forms must be submitted for each abstract:
 - one complete form including the list of authors and the presenting author's full name, address, and signature;
 - a second blinded form without the list of authors, without the presenting author's name, address, and signature, and without the contact author's name and address. Only the location of the research or project should remain clearly marked in the space provided at the top of the form.

To blind the abstract, either remove information in BOXES 2,4 and 5 and reprint or type the abstract on another Abstract Form; or make a photocopy of the original covering BOXES 2, 4 and 5.
9. Five (5) photocopies of the blinded abstract and five (5) photocopies of the complete abstract must accompany the original abstract.
10. Complete the Abstract Receipt Acknowledgement Card.
11. Please mail or courier abstracts with the Registration and Accommodation Form and fees of the presenting author in the envelope provided. Note that abstracts without registration and payment cannot be considered.

Please note the following important information regarding abstracts:

- Each abstract must be accompanied or preceded by a Registration and Accommodation Form (and fees) for the presenting author.
- The Rule of One will apply. An investigator may serve as the presenting author on only one abstract submission. However, investigators may be listed as co-authors on any number of submissions. The presenting author is asked to sign a statement of compliance on the Abstract Form.
- Abstracts should be organized by sub-headings: "Objectives, Methods, Results, and Conclusions" for the traditional, scientific abstract, or alternately, "Issues, Project, Results, and Lessons Learned" for a program description or "experiential" abstract.
- Abstracts must not have been published or submitted for presentation to any national or international meeting before the XI International Conference on AIDS.
- Abstracts will be printed in the Abstract Volume exactly as submitted. No editorial corrections will be made.
