INTRODUCTION:

The U.S. Department of Education (ED) has funded a significant number of projects related to the HIV/AIDS issue through its various grants programs. Some of the programs are centered on the HIV/AIDS issue while others contain an HIV/AIDS component. The programs address such issues as in-service and pre-service training of teachers, curriculum development of HIV/AIDS education within the context of Comprehensive School Health Education Programs at the state, local and community level, model and demonstration programs for direct delivery of educational services for children and adults who are HIV-infected, rehabilitation needs of persons living with HIV/AIDS, employment and placement models for HIV-infected people, studies to assess quality of life, effects of fitness training and the effects of vocational rehabilitation on individuals with HIV/AIDS. As a result of funding these state and local initiatives a large body of information has been accumulated relating to the education of teachers, students, and parents on prevention of the transmission of the disease as well as how best to continue the education of children living with HIV/AIDS, continued employment and productivity of adults living with the virus, and raising the level of information and knowledge about this disease in order to dispel unwarranted fears and anxieties.

The ED works with the Department of Health of Human Services, Centers for Disease Control and a host of non-governmental entities such as the National Association of State Boards of Education, Education Development Center, Inc., National School Boards Association et. al. to share information and develop strategies to assist those living with HIV/AIDS and change behaviors in the population to minimize the chances for infection.

It is the intention of ED to promote the National HIV/AIDS Plan by collaborating more closely with the above mentioned organizations and government entities to make the body of knowledge and experience generated by the state and local grantees more readily accessible in a user friendly system so that other communities with an interest in combating this epidemic may draw on the lessons learned to create infrastructures and organizations to further the general public's education and provide appropriate services to those suffering from HIV/AIDS.

The program currently supports 24 innovative projects of national significance. Key groups conducting these innovative programs include six state agencies, four university-school system partnerships, three regional educational laboratories/service centers, and numerous local educational agencies.

Although the target for most of the projects is the total student population, significant attention is given to the underrepresented and underserved.

Similarly, although the majority of projects are directed at general statewide needs, they collectively include urban models, suburban models, and rural models. One of the projects will build heavily upon the new satellite technologies. Several support innovative interdisciplinary programs. All include strong evaluation components so that program results can be effectively shared nationwide.

An annual program monograph, Comprehensive School Health Education Programs, which includes abstracts of all funded programs, a general analysis of both the funded and non-funded applications, and a "Key Contact Directory," is developed and disseminated nationally. A national technical assistance workshop is held annually for project leadership teams and leaders from a broad array of major national agencies and organizations from the private and public sectors concerned with comprehensive school health education -- usually one in the fall in Washington and one in the spring at a location to be announced and usually in conjunction with other national entities concerned with health issues, e.g. the Centers for Disease Control.

Meetings are regularly held with representatives of other major health education programs, both within the government and in the field, to share information and develop cooperative activities.

The program coordinator co-chairs the interagency Ad Hoc Committee on Health Promotion Through the Schools. A detailed summary of other program accomplishments is available from the program office.

INTRODUCTION:

The U.S. Department of Education (ED) has funded a significant number of projects related to the HIV/AIDS issue through its various grants programs. Some of the programs are centered on the HIV/AIDS issue while others contain an HIV/AIDS component. The programs address such issues as in-service and pre-service training of teachers, curriculum development of HIV/AIDS education within the context of Comprehensive School Health Education Programs at the state, local and community level, model and demonstration programs for direct delivery of educational services for children and adults who are HIV-infected, rehabilitation needs of persons living with HIV/AIDS, employment and placement models for HIV-infected people, studies to assess quality of life, effects of fitness training and the effects of vocational rehabilitation on individuals with HIV/AIDS. As a result of funding these state and local initiatives a large body of information has been accumulated relating to the education of teachers, students, and parents on prevention of the transmission of the disease as well as how best to continue the education of children living with HIV/AIDS, continued employment and productivity of adults living with the virus, and raising the level of information and knowledge about this disease in order to dispel unwarranted fears and anxieties.

The ED works with the Department of Health of Human Services, Centers for Disease Control and a host of non-governmental entities such as the National Association of State Boards of Education, Education Development Center, Inc., National School Boards Association et. al. to share information and develop strategies to assist those living with HIV/AIDS and change behaviors in the population to minimize the chances for infection.

It is the intention of ED to promote the National HIV/AIDS Plan by collaborating more closely with the above mentioned organizations and government entities to make the body of knowledge and experience generated by the state and local grantees more readily accessible in a user friendly system so that other communities with an interest in combating this epidemic may draw on the lessons learned to create infrastructures and organizations to further the general public's education and provide appropriate services to those suffering from HIV/AIDS.

An annual program monograph, Comprehensive School Health Education Programs, which includes abstracts of all funded programs, a general analysis of both the funded and non-funded applications, and a "Key Contact Directory," is developed and disseminated nationally. A national technical assistance workshop is held annually for project leadership teams and leaders from a broad array of major national agencies and organizations from the private and public sectors concerned with comprehensive school health education -- usually one in the fall in Washington and one in the spring at a location to be announced and usually in conjunction with other national entities concerned with health issues, e.g. the Centers for Disease Control.

Meetings are regularly held with representatives of other major health education programs, both within the government and in the field, to share information and develop cooperative activities.

The program coordinator co-chairs the interagency Ad Hoc Committee on Health Promotion Through the Schools. A detailed summary of other program accomplishments is available from the program office.

INTRODUCTION:

DRAFT

The U.S. Department of Education (ED) has funded a significant number of projects related to the HIV/AIDS issue through its various grants programs. Some of the programs are centered on the HIV/AIDS issue while others contain an HIV/AIDS component. The programs address such issues as in-service and pre-service training of teachers, curriculum development of HIV/AIDS education within the context of Comprehensive School Health Education Programs at the state, local and community level, model and demonstration programs for direct delivery of educational services for children and adults who are HIV-infected, rehabilitation needs of persons living with HIV/AIDS, employment and placement models for HIV-infected people, studies to assess quality of life, effects of fitness training and the effects of vocational rehabilitation on individuals with HIV/AIDS. As a result of funding these state and local initiatives a large body of information has been accumulated relating to the education of teachers, students, and parents on prevention of the transmission of the disease as well as how best to continue the education of children living with HIV/AIDS, continued employment and productivity of adults living with the virus, and raising the level of information and knowledge about this disease in order to dispel unwarranted fears and anxieties.

The ED works with the Department of Health of Human Services, Centers for Disease Control and a host of non-governmental entities such as the National Association of State Boards of Education, Education Development Center, Inc., National School Boards Association et. al. to share information and develop strategies to assist those living with HIV/AIDS and change behaviors in the population to minimize the chances for infection.

It is the intention of ED to promote the National HIV/AIDS Plan by collaborating more closely with the above mentioned organizations and government entities to make the body of knowledge and experience generated by the state and local grantees more readily accessible in a user friendly system so that other communities with an interest in combating this epidemic may draw on the lessons learned to create infrastructures and organizations to further the general public's education and provide appropriate services to those suffering from HIV/AIDS.

AUTHORIZATION: Secretary's Fund for Innovation in Education, P.L. 100-297, section 4659, April 28, 1988. This program received no appropriation for FY 95.

OBJECTIVES: Comprehensive School Health Education Program (CSHEP) -- Discretionary Grants to provide disease prevention and health promotion demonstration grants to design health education curricula; provide staff development, promote knowledge, skills, and behavior in fitness, nutrition, safety and disease prevention; promote parent and community involvement and parent education. The overall goal of the CSHEP is to provide K-12 students with knowledge of decision-making, problem solving, conflict resolution, and refusal skills, as well as behaviors that will enable them to establish healthy lifestyles.

TYPE OF ASSISTANCE: Project Grants (DISCRETIONARY)

USES AND RESTRICTIONS: Assistance must be used to establish or in conjunction with K-12 Comprehensive School Health Education.

APPLICANT ELIGIBILITY: Currently only State and Local Educational Agencies may apply. The law allows the competition to be opened to institutions of higher education, private schools, and other public and private agencies, organizations and institutions.

BENEFICIARY ELIGIBILITY: Students K-12, Parents, Teachers, and the community will benefit.

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The program currently supports 24 innovative projects of national significance. Key groups conducting these innovative programs include six state agencies, four university-school system partnerships, three regional educational laboratories/service centers, and numerous local educational agencies.

Although the target for most of the projects is the total student population, significant attention is given to the underrepresented and underserved.

Similarly, although the majority of projects are directed at general statewide needs, they collectively include urban models, suburban models, and rural models. One of the projects will build heavily upon the new satellite technologies. Several support innovative interdisciplinary programs. All include strong evaluation components so that program results can be effectively shared nationwide.

An annual program monograph, Comprehensive School Health Education Programs, which includes abstracts of all funded programs, a general analysis of both the funded and non-funded applications, and a "Key Contact Directory," is developed and disseminated nationally. A national technical assistance workshop is held annually for project leadership teams and leaders from a broad array of major national agencies and organizations from the private and public sectors concerned with comprehensive school health education -- usually one in the fall in Washington and one in the spring at a location to be announced and usually in conjunction with other national entities concerned with health issues, e.g. the Centers for Disease Control.

Meetings are regularly held with representatives of other major health education programs, both within the government and in the field, to share information and develop cooperative activities.

The program coordinator co-chairs the interagency Ad Hoc Committee on Health Promotion Through the Schools. A detailed summary of other program accomplishments is available from the program office.
