PEACE CORPS' HIV/AIDS PLAN

Introduction:

Peace Corps' efforts in HIV/AIDS education and prevention can be divided into three spheres of activities:

- Education efforts targeting Peace Corps employees;
- Education efforts targeting Peace Corps Volunteers; and,
- Prevention efforts conducted by Peace Corps Volunteers targeting the people in the countries in which the Volunteers are serving.

Each of these efforts are described below.

Peace Corps Employees

Responding to President Clinton's mandate that all federal employees be given HIV/AIDS education, Peace Corps had developed and is implementing a plan to educate both domestic and overseas staff. To date Peace Corps has provided an "HIV/AIDS in the Workplace Awareness and Prevention Training" to 87.7% of its domestic employees. Training was done by a training contractor (Planned Parenthood) and Peace Corps' Human Resource Management and Equal Employment Opportunity/American Diversity Program staffs. The training will be conducted annually.

For overseas staff training materials have been prepared and will be delivered to every Country Director. The first round of overseas training is expected to be completed by Fall of 1995. As with the domestic staff training, there will be yearly sessions on HIV/AIDS to update overseas staff.

Peace Corps Volunteers

The approximately 7000 Peace Corps Volunteers serving in 94 countries around the world are a primary audience for Peace Corps' HIV/AIDS education efforts. Volunteers need to be given the information and skills so that they can protect themselves from HIV/AIDS. To date education efforts about AIDS have been based on curriculums developed by the individual Peace Corps posts. The Office of Medical Services has developed a HIV/AIDS and STD prevention training module in order to standardize the delivery of AIDS education to Volunteers around the world. The Peace Corps Medical Officers will receive and be trained in the module at this year's Continuing Medical Education (CME) courses and be expected to use it during the pre-service training of all Volunteers.

The goal of the module is to help Peace Corps Volunteers/ Trainees to realize that they are vulnerable to contracting HIV if they engage in risky behavior and to enhance their abilities to protect themselves from HIV and other STDs. The module has three components. First there is an overview of HIV/AIDS -- what it is, how it is transmitted, and how it can be prevented. Second are a series of skills building exercises that aim at behavior change. Third and final is a 20 minute video based on interviews with 5 returned Peace Corps Volunteers who became HIV infected in their country of service. The purpose of the video is motivational, rather than instructional, in an attempt to internalize Volunteers' sense of their own risk. The video will be followed by a guided discussion to examine reactions to and feeling about the video. The entire module will take about 2 hours.

Peace Corps Volunteers Targeting Host Country Populations

Peace Corps Volunteers are conducting a wide array of HIV/AIDS prevention activities while serving overseas. In December 1988 Peace Corps negotiated its first formal request to place Volunteers in AIDS education with the Government of the Central African Republic. The pace of Peace Corps Volunteer involvement with AIDS prevention and education has been increasing dramatically. Today Volunteers working around the world are developing and implementing, in conjunction with their host country counterparts, community level approaches to HIV/AIDS prevention.

An example of the innovative work that Peace Corps Volunteers have conducted is a curriculum developed in Cameroon with the Ministries of Education and Health titled "Teach English, Prevent AIDS". Volunteers and Cameroonian teachers are targeting a vulnerable population -- youth -- with AIDS prevention messages and skills through the English language classes. In Malawi and Thailand Volunteers are working in the Ministries of Health with District level AIDS coordinators looking at how to use traditional forums such as theater and storytelling to deliver HIV/AIDS education. In addition, they are helping the communities to organize support groups for the individuals and families who are living with AIDS.

Volunteers have a viable role to play in HIV/AIDS prevention and education overseas. Most importantly Volunteers are successful at accessing communities which are often not reached by National AIDS Programs and at introducing new innovative education methods to achieve their outreach.

Although not quantified, there is a growing cohort of Volunteers who, based on their experiences overseas, return to the United States and continue to work in HIV/AIDS prevention in their communities. Bringing the lessons home

is a valuable contribution that Peace Corps makes to the domestic efforts in HIV prevention.

Summary

All three spheres of activities exhibit Peace Corps' dedication to fighting the global pandemic of HIV/AIDS. Our level of effort will only be increasing in the years to come -- as we continue to educate our employees, Volunteers and the world about how to prevent HIV and how to live with AIDS.

Increasingly countries are requesting assistance of Peace Corps in HIV/AIDS education and training. A relatively small (but growing number) of Peace Corps Volunteers work in HIV/AIDS prevention as a primary job. But a large and also growing number of Volunteers incorporate AIDS prevention into their work, for example, education Volunteers incorporate HIV/AIDS prevention activities into their classrooms teaching.

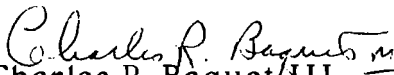
