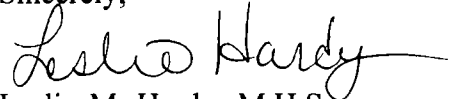

**Controlling Sexually Transmitted Diseases in the United States:
A Vision for the Future**

The National Academy of Sciences is a private, self-perpetuating society of distinguished scholars in scientific and engineering research, dedicated to the furtherance of science and its use for the general welfare. The Institute of Medicine (IOM) was chartered in 1970 by the National Academy of Sciences to enlist distinguished members of appropriate professions in the examination of policy matters pertaining to the health of the public. In this, the Institute acts under both the Academy's 1863 congressional charter responsibility to be an adviser to the federal government and its own initiative in identifying issues of medical care, research, and education.

In December 1994, the Institute of Medicine assembled a 15-member Committee on Prevention and Control of Sexually Transmitted Diseases (STDs) to conduct an 18-month study to (a) examine the epidemiological dimensions of the epidemic of STDs in the United States and the factors contributing to the rising incidence of infections; (b) assess the effectiveness (including cost-effectiveness) of current public health strategies and programs to prevent and control STDs; and (c) provide direction for future public health programs, policy development, and research in this area.

The committee members combine expertise in the following areas: epidemiology, behavioral and social sciences, infectious diseases, pediatrics, adolescent and women's health, family planning, public health, STD program management, health services research and administration, managed care, and public policy. The committee will meet approximately five times over the course of 18 months. In addition to an invitational workshop on the role of effective STD control in HIV prevention efforts, the committee will conduct three site visits to observe and meet with, for example, STD program directors and clinic staff, community-based STD/HIV prevention programs, family planning programs, state and local public health officials, community health centers, and others involved in STD prevention and control.

The published study report, to be released in summer 1996, will present the committee's findings and conclusions about the scope of sexually transmitted infections in the U.S. and the current public health strategies to prevent and control STDs. It will also offer an assessment of existing STD prevention and control programs in the United States. Further, the report will provide guidance in identifying the components of an effective STD prevention and control strategy, which will be used in defining the optimal package of clinical and preventive services to be included in STD programs, as well as the necessary resources to implement and support such programs, and the relative standards by which to measure program effectiveness. The committee's report will also provide direction for future public health programs, policy development, and research in the area of STD prevention and control, along with recommendations for enhancing U.S. efforts to curb the spread of STDs.
