With just under a month remaining before our November 9-10, 1995 meeting, I'm writing with a few last-minute conference details. We're looking forward to a timely and productive meeting and are grateful for your willingness to be with us for as much of the meeting as possible.

I have enclosed the latest draft of the program with your placement(s) highlighted for quick reference. Please do not hesitate to let me know if there are any problems with these assignments, as it is never too late to make necessary changes. As you can see, there are still a few workshops in need of co-moderators, in that we hope to have two or three resource persons in each. If you would like to take on an *additional* session, please look over those workshops with only one person listed as co-moderator, and let me know at your earliest convenience if there are any that you are willing to join. There are also some as yet unconfirmed placements (noted by a "uc"), and we would appreciate an immediate response to those of you to whom this applies so that we might finalize the program by next week. In order to facilitate a broad exchange of ideas in each workshop, we prefer to involve co-moderators who represent different perspectives, so please be aware of this as you review the available openings.

In preparing for the conference, please keep in mind that the task of moderating a workshop is akin to that of leading a seminar, in that we strongly encourage the leader(s) to involve as many of the participants as possible in a focused and concrete discussion. In a few areas -- most notably those involving federal regulations or other directive materials -- there is often the need for a more didactic approach, and we thus leave to the moderators the determination of which sessions will require a more formal presentation. In either case, our attendees consistently express their preference for well-prepared moderators who come armed with substantive introductions, but who thereafter facilitate a more participatory discussion.

In addition to these programmatic requests, we are still very much in need of articles for the **Conference Educational Packets**. Please forward any relevant materials to the PRIM&R

office as soon as possible. This breakfast will provide an opportunity for the Conference Planning Committee to personally welcome and thank the faculty before the conference officially begins. In addition to the faculty breakfast, we hope that you can join us for the luncheon on both days of the meeting and the Conference Dinner at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, November 9. If you haven't already done so, please let us know which of these meals you will be attending.

Also, if you have any last-minute ideas to improve the program, or if you require assistance with any other pre-conference arrangements, please let me or a member of the PRIM&R staff know. In the meantime, you should know that your generous willingness to participate is what has kept PRIM&R strong and growing these almost twenty-two years! I only wish that these words could be less word-processed and more personal, but look forward to thanking you more directly at the meeting.

PRIM&R Activities

Conferences

PRIM&R's primary activity is the sponsorship of conferences held in Boston and other U.S. cities. Currently we host four conferences a year. These meetings provide an educational forum for the analyses of various biomedical and bioethical issues.

Recent conference topics have included:

(1) Educating for the Responsible Conduct of Research: The Mandate, the Intent, and the Means; (2) Changes and Choices for Institutional Review Boards: The Inclusion of Women and Minorities, and Other Emerging Issues in Research; (3) The Ethical Implications of the New Genetics; (4) Animal Research at the Crossroads: Challenges for the 21st Century; (5) The Presence of Industry and Government in the Academic Setting: Benefits and Conflicts; (6) AIDS Clinical Research and Care: Meeting the Challenges of an Epidemic in Flux; (7) Ethical Decision-Making in Healthcare: Ethics Committees and Conflict Resolution Techniques

PRIM&R's conference attendees come from throughout the United States and Canada, and include: Institutional Review Board and Institutional Animal Care & Use Committee members and administrators, biomedical researchers, physicians, nurses, hospital administrators and other health care personnel, healthcare ethics committee members, lawyers, governmental representatives, members of the academic community, patient and animal welfare advocates, and journalists.

Publications

PRIM&R publishes conference-related educational materials and conference proceedings, which are available for purchase. In addition, PRIM&R compiled and edited major portions of "The Official IRB Guidebook," published by The President's Commission.

Training

PRIM&R provides an integrated and comprehensive workshop series at its annual IRB and IACUC conferences. These series provide education and orientation to IRB and IACUC members and to those who deal primarily with behavioral science research with humans. PRIM&R has also sponsored short seminars on "Making Your IRB Work" in cities around the U.S.
