What is the AIDS Insurance Continuation Program (AICP)?

The AIDS Insurance Continuation Program (AICP) is a state program for persons who are diagnosed with AIDS or are HIV symptomatic, and who cannot afford to pay their private health insurance premiums. The program makes direct payments (up to \$500/month) to each client's employer or insurance company for the continuation of medical, dental, and optical coverage.

The AICP is funded by Florida's Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services (HRS) through a combination of federal and state monies. The program is managed by the Health Council of South Florida, Inc., a private, non-profit agency. It is administered through regional community-based organizations (CBOs).

The AICP began in 1990, serving only Broward and Monroe Counties. The program was expanded statewide in 1994. As of September 1995, the program has enrolled over 1200 clients, throughout the state. Florida has saved a substantial amount of money that would have been spent on health care, had participants lost their insurance coverage and been forced to use other health care programs (see the Health Council of South Florida's report entitled: AICP: A Cost Benefit Analysis for Calendar Year 1994).

Who benefits from the AICP?

The AICP benefits **participants, health care providers, and the government.**

Participants are able to remain under the care of their personal doctors without worrying that their doctor will not accept an alternative form of coverage, such as Medicaid. Also, since AICP clients retain their private insurance, they generally have greater access to various HIV/AIDS treatments than individuals who are forced into a public health setting. This is because most private insurance policies cover certain treatments and prescription drugs that are not offered under public programs.

Providers such as: doctors and hospitals also benefit from the AICP because private health insurance companies tend to offer higher payment rates than public programs. Because AICP participants keep their private health care coverage, doctors can continue serving these clients while obtaining the higher payment rates offered by private insurance companies.

The **Government** and thus the public achieve savings as a result of the AICP. Insurance companies continue to pay for actual health care and treatment, while the government pays for each AICP client's insurance premium. Thus, the government and the insurance companies share in the payment of HIV/AIDS care. This relieves the public from paying the full cost of HIV/AIDS care.

Who is eligible for the AICP?

Depending on the availability of funds, the AICP is open to Florida residents who meet **all** of the following requirements:

✓ Diagnosis of **AIDS**, or **HIV** positive with symptoms

✓ Gross income less than or equal to **250%** of Federal poverty guidelines.

✓ Cash assets less than or equal to **\$4500** (one person)

✓ Willing to **sign all forms** and provide eligibility information

✓ Currently covered by **private health insurance**

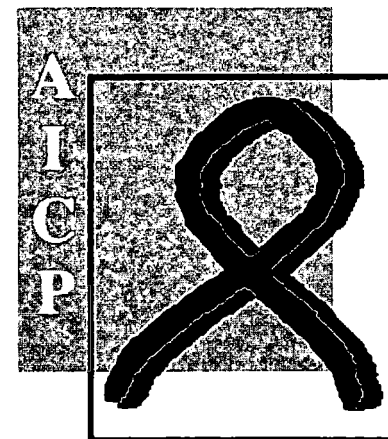

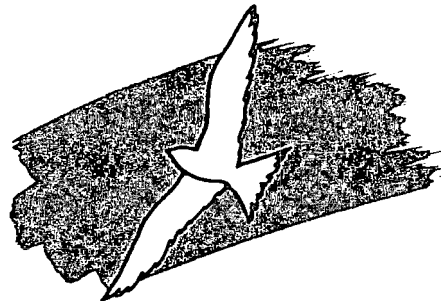

and alcohol free life. The professional addiction staff at Broward House provides both day and outpatient treatment. The program is designed to teach and reinforce healthy and

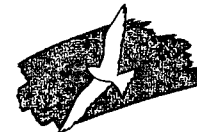

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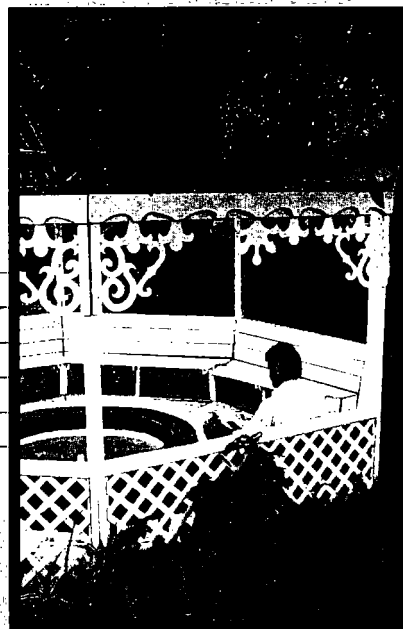

Services Provided



Case Management

Community-wide case management gives clients the support they deserve and assures their needs are met. This client advocacy program helps people with HIV obtain needed services and maximum benefits.

Supportive Housing

Broward House takes great care to create a homelike setting in its 52-bed assisted living facility. Services include 24 hour nursing supervision, nutritious meals, medical and personal supplies, and housekeeping assistance. 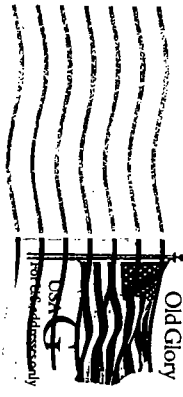
Dear Patsy,

I hope the trips are going well. I miss everyone and the excitement of Washington. Thanks for everything. Good luck. Take care.

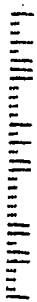
