The Johns Hopkins AIDS Service, which was established in 1983, is the oldest such program in the mid-Atlantic region and one of the largest in the nation. We now provide direct care to more than 2,500 people with HIV disease and AIDS and provide oversight in the care of another 3,000 individuals regionally, nationally, and internationally. The Service is consistently ranked among the top AIDS care facilities in the United States in the annual *U.S. News* and *World Report* survey.

The Hopkins program is unique in that it takes an aggressively multi-disciplinary approach to AIDS, offering a broad range of clinical services from a wide variety of medical disciplines. Hopkins physicians participate in a wide array of research activities designed to improve the care of HIV disease. In addition, we have an active Community Advisory Board that provides links among health care providers, researchers and the community. We are in the final stages of implementing a managed care program for Medicaid recipients with AIDS.

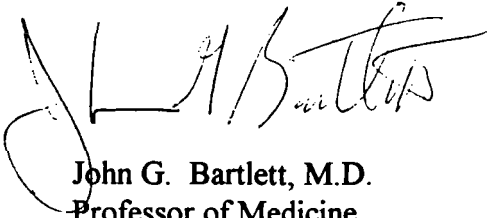

In our selection of panel members, the JLW HIV/AIDS Children's Hospital Committee attempted to create an informative and active forum presenting the crisis of HIV/AIDS in women and children. 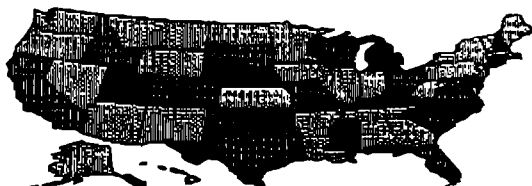

Central to the mission of Trinity Hill's HIV/AIDS Unit is the assurance and provision of outstanding patient care, which we believe should be both compassionate and non-judgmental in its treatment of patients and their families. The rising number of individuals with HIV/AIDS has required us to plan for and provide increased health care services to meet the needs of our patient population.

We believe that a wide range of clinical and supportive services, including case management, is required in providing comprehensive care to patients and their families. Finding peace at Trinity Hill

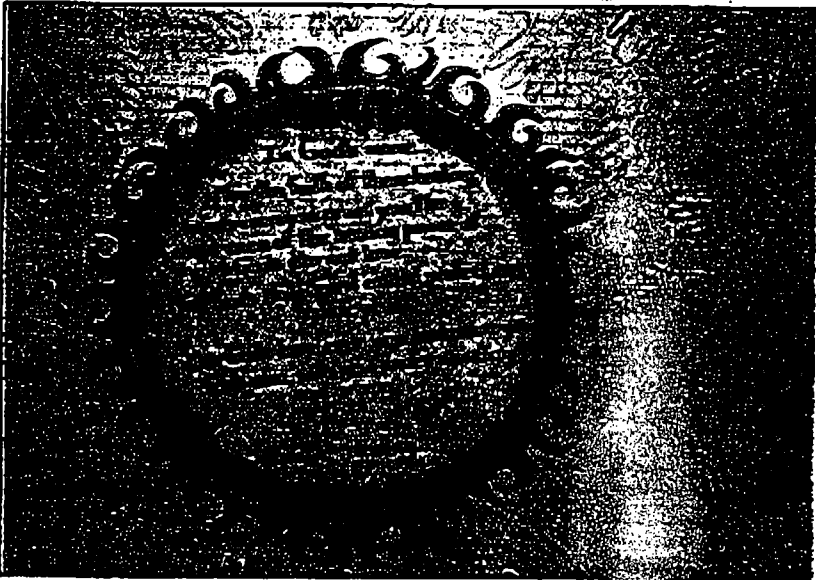
As noon approached one recent Monday at Trinity Hill Healthcare Center in Hartford, AIDS patient Roberto Ruberto slumped outside the building.

Seeking solace on that sweltering day in the meager shade of a maple, Ruberto announced that he was not moving until a nurse brought his pain medication to him.

Head Nurse Elaine Zagorski calmly sent a volunteer to Ruberto. Since the center's AIDS unit opened in October 1994, she has learned to deal with the patients' irritability as she treats their illness. The staff and the patients themselves, many of whom were homeless and drug-addicted, work to make a caring home for those with no place else to go.

Trinity Hill is one of only three such units in the state, and the only one in the Hartford region, which has the largest number of people in the state — 10,000 — infected with the human immunodeficiency virus that causes AIDS, according to recent city and federal statistics.

Treating patients too sick to live on their own, but not sick enough

for hospitalization, poses special problems for the staff, as on the hot day when Ruberto refused medication. As the temperature pushed 90 degrees, the tempers of the 30 men and women in the unit also rose.

Frank Pappalardo, who spent his first year at the center in a stroke-induced coma, leaned his stocky frame on his three-pronged cane and limped to the nurses' station. "I need some more napkins," Pappalardo said. "I don't feel well."

"What is it, honey?" Zagorski asked.

She was preparing for four patients to be admitted to the unit from Hartford Hospital and St. Francis/Mount Sinai Medical Center later that day. With 37 patients, the unit would be nearly filled.

Kenneth M. was not pleased. For two months he had had a double room all to himself. He wasn't about to share it, he told nurse Judy Gallo angrily.

"I have my routine each morning," said Kenneth M., who asked that his last name not be used to protect his privacy. "I get up and say my prayers. Then I do some exercises. How am I gonna do that with another person in the room?"

Then, as noon passed, so did the unrest that had engulfed the unit.

Ruberto came inside. Pappalardo got the napkins and hobbled back to his room. Kenneth M. said a prayer.

"That's how it happens here," Gallo said.

AIDS wing opens

More than two years ago, Zagorski and other staff members, including Peter F. Philipp, the unit's director, asked the state for permission to open an HIV/AIDS unit as more patients were admitted to the nonprofit urban convalescent home on Hillside Avenue, which primarily served the elderly. The state Department of Social Services agreed to allow Medicaid payments for patients with acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

The unit provides comprehensive care in the hope that patients will be less likely to return to their homes or the streets where they might infect more people.

"When someone comes here, you look at their condition and say, 'What can I do to help?'" said Kenneth Abriola, an infectious disease specialist who is on staff at Hartford Hospital and is Trinity Hill's HIV/AIDS unit on-site physician.

"Sometimes all it means is managing their pain and making sure they are comfortable so they have a dignified, peaceful death."

"We provide a few extra months of life. Perhaps we preserve their vision, or bring down a fever. I guess you set your sights a little lower," Abriola said.

Kenneth M.'s T-cell count was 60 when he was admitted to Trinity Hill in February. The blood cells are key components of the body's immune system, and a normal count is about 600. But since being treated for his AIDS-related illnesses, he said he has never felt better.

"It's like I'm a normal person," he said. "That's why I suppose I don't have the urge for drugs."

As did many of Trinity Hill's AIDS patients, Kenneth M., 46, contracted HIV by using dirty needles.

When he was admitted from a drug detoxification center in February, he was dying. Abriola prescribed medication for his muscle spasms and treated the heart muscle inflammation caused by years of drug abuse.

Now, Kenneth M. gets up early each day, a conscious effort to make the most of the time he has left.

"I'm trying to last as long as I possibly can," he said.

After he prays and exercises, he takes his medications and reads the newspaper. He has gained back much of his weight and developed a routine that was impossible in shelters for the homeless.

"It's like I'm learning to live," he

from Peter's Retreat, a Hartford residence for people with AIDS, he weighed 90 pounds. He now weighs 150 pounds.

"Everyone here knows they will leave the earth pretty soon," Andrews said.

"Having AIDS, that's real. You can't wash it away with soap and water. But you can go on with your life and appreciate it," he said.

"It hurts me to see people dying. I get scared. Maybe I'm next."

Heimer asks him what he would like to do with the time he has left.

"I'd like to go fishing. Maybe take my grandson to the park and see the flowers," he said. "Small things."

He calls his former life of shooting drugs and committing crimes to support his habit like walking among the living dead.

"No one wants you. No one cares about you. You're forgotten."

"When you tell someone you have AIDS, it's like bubonic plague. Like you're going to drop a bomb on them," he said.

Rose Johnson, 33, agreed. "When I told my sister I had AIDS, she gave me my own cup and fork. I wanted to pull the covers over my head. I said, 'I'm your sister.' I cry."

Ruberto bowed his head. "It makes me feel like a dog," he said, crying.

Andrews shifted in his seat. "If this happened to anyone in my family, I'd be there for them," he said.

Several weeks later, Manny Homem joined the group.

"I'm having a party and you're all invited," Homem said. "To celebrate that we're still here."

On Easter weekend, Homem fell as he walked across his room at Trinity Hill. His fever reached 105 degrees and he was hallucinating.

Afraid her oldest son was dying, Homem's mother and other family members stood by his bedside. His roommate, Pappalardo, also watched over him.

"I told him his mother loved him," he said. "I told him not to give up."

Homem, 38, contracted HIV in the mid-1980s. He would not learn that he was HIV-positive for a decade, after he and his mother had bought a house in Newington.

"Our dream house," he said, with a back yard large enough for him to garden and for his young nieces and nephews to play when they came to visit, which was often.

A friend promised to throw a party if he survived.

The party took place on a warm Saturday in mid-May. Homem's family and friends stood behind a long table in the unit's dining room, serving rice, beans, chicken, pork and lasagna to residents and staff.

Although he wasn't feeling well, Pappalardo sat by the table, urging people to take a plate and get in line.

Anna Jorge, complaining that she

could not breathe, left her plate on a table while she walked to her room to use the oxygen machine tucked between her bed and a chair where she keeps her stuffed animals.

Jorge spent much of her time in her room listening to oldies on the radio. She was diagnosed in 1990.

"When I first heard I was HIV-positive and didn't have full-blown AIDS, I praised the Lord. I still had time," Jorge, 49, said that day.

One month later, as Zagorski was spoon-feeding her a cup of tea, Jorge told the nurse she was dying.

"Do you want me to call Dr. Ke-vorkian?" Zagorski joked, not wanting to believe it.

"No thanks, I'll do it on my own," Jorge said.

Later that day, Jorge died.

During a memorial service in June, Jorge's older sister, Delia Chaney, thanked the staff at Trinity Hill for caring for her sister.

"Unfortunately, life takes people in different directions," Chaney said. "Some families come closer. For others it means gaps and separations."

For Philipp, the unit's director, Jorge's death meant loss, but also continuation of the cycle. Another patient will take Jorge's bed, he said, and when that patient dies, another will be admitted to the unit.

"There were always people with AIDS living here," he said. "And we knew there would always be more people coming along."

'I get scared'

Nursing assistant Pilar Sandoval knows all of the names of the 200 patients who have lived and died in the unit. She knows how many children they had or what color clothing they liked to wear.

Inside a cabinet in the unit's dining room, Sandoval keeps an album with pictures of patients who have died. Gently, she strokes the pages.

"We try to give them the message that at the end of their lives they will get respect," she said. "I try not to judge them. I don't want to know how they caught this virus. They're sick and they need help."

On Wednesdays, psychiatric worker Carol Heimer offers help by holding group therapy sessions.

At one meeting, Reddit Andrews, a 6-foot-4 former basketball player, boxer and fencer from the Bellevue Square housing project, said he was looking for moral support.

"Something deeper than talking to a nurse. Someone to confide in and trust," Andrews said.

"I can't fill the gap by my own."

Andrews, 53, slouched in a wheelchair, his white Air Jordans untied. When he was admitted in January

A safe, friendly place for those ill with AIDS

Anna is tiny, short and very thin, although she says she's gained some weight. She has trouble breathing, but offers a little smile and says she's "doing all right, considering." Considering she became a drug addict at 19 in New York, and rolled through lost years of heroin, cocaine, reefer and alcohol abuse. "They'd find me sleeping on the sidewalk," she said. Sometimes sleep was induced by a vicious beating from her male companion. Now she has AIDS.

Yet, Anna is happier and more content than she's been in years, maybe in her life. "I feel safe now," she says, gently.

I talked with Anna last week at the HIV/AIDS Unit of the Trinity Hill Healthcare Center on Hillside Avenue. Begun 18 months ago, the unit was the state's first skilled-nursing home for AIDS patients. It serves poor people with no other options.

State officials approved the home for Medicaid funding on the theory that it would be cheaper and more humane, in the long run, than endless trips to emergency rooms.

And more pleasant. The third-floor unit is clean, the people friendly, the atmosphere remarkably upbeat — considering.

When the program began, said director Peter F. Philipp, the staff expected many gay men. They've gotten very few. "They have support systems," said Philipp. Rather, Philipp and his staff are seeing drug addicts — a lot of drug addicts — a growing number of women, and sometimes whole families, as the face of AIDS changes. The people come from prison, from shelters, from their homes.

The AIDS unit started with 24 beds and has expanded to 46. They aren't always full because the turnover is so rapid. Some people get better, well enough to go home. But most come to die. The average stay is 16 days. In the fall, 13 people died in a 15-day period; seven died in a nine-day period at Christmas.

Most men lead lives of quiet desperation, Thoreau observed. Philipp often has to deal with loud, immediate desperation. Many of the patients reconnect with an earlier religious experience, Philipp said. They become very frightened at the prospect of dying, fearing God will punish them.

"We try to show them by example, that if we can love them, God can love them," said Philipp, a slender man with a mustache and curly black hair, bright with a low-key sense of humor. He needs it.

I wish I could march all the kids in Hartford through this place, particularly the ones who are tempted to experiment with drugs. More than 90 percent of the patients have or had a substance abuse problem.

One of them, Angel, told me he got hooked on heroin at 19, when he tried it once with some friends. For so many people, there's no trying it once. Angel's been, as he says, "messing it up" for 30 years. He's had jobs, was even the manager of a fast-food restaurant, but has not been able to hold them. Now at 49 he's fighting hard to stay clean and keep what's left of his health for his 5-year-old son.

Some addicts stay away as long as possible, because they want to go on using drugs for as long as they can. But for some patients, it's important to die clean. So Trinity Hill has a substance abuse counselor and 12 step meetings for alcoholics.

Philipp tries to locate families of patients, who've often been out of touch for years. They have issues to work out, and not much time to do it. Sometimes, the family actually wills the patient to stay alive — "I see it all the time," Philipp said — until they've reached some kind of accommodation.

For nearly all the patients — all that I talked with — the unit is the best place they ever lived. "This is my home," said Angel.

"They trust us. They respect us," Anna said.

As the patients get close to death from the viruses that stalk AIDS, the staff and other patients do what they can. Not long ago, a young man named Frank, who'd already lost his wife and first roommate to AIDS, struggled into his wheelchair to get across the room, to hold the hand of his second roommate, who was soon to die.

A great place of healing

■ I read with great pleasure the article on Trinity Hill [July 15, "Finding peace at Trinity Hill"].

Although I have not, as yet, had the need to avail myself of its services, Trinity Hill has been a place of great healing for me. Just a year ago, I was not dealing at all well with my own HIV infection of more than 10 years.

The Rev. John Murphy of St. Patrick's and St. Anthony's Church arranged for me to visit Trinity Hill with the possibility of doing volunteer work there and the hope that it would help my despondency. I went home after my first night at the center at peace and with a new acceptance of my condition.

This transformation was not

simply personal. I continue to marvel at the magic or grace that is generated through the residents and staff of Trinity Hill. The care given and received there bridges divisions among races, economic classes, sexual orientations and lifestyles that continue to define and divide the Hartford area.

Perhaps what our discouraged community needs is more participation in places such as this center.

Please award the entire staff with a whole basket full of Courant hearts for the profound good it is providing our community.

This is a request for an interview on Monday, June 3, 1994. I spoke by telephone with your appointments secretary, who instructed me to fax you the request.

As you see, I am a professor of political science at the University of Minnesota. I am engaged in an ongoing study of the politics of AIDS with Leonard Robins, professor of public administration and director of health administration at Roosevelt University in Chicago. By the way, Professor Robins met with Jeff Levy as we were beginning our research in the Fall of 1989 as Mr Levy was moving from the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force to the AIDS Action Council.

You may have seen some of the published results of our studies. Our overall views on the politics of AIDS appeared in 1991 in Litman and Robins' Health Politics and Policy, 2d edition (the 3d edition is now in press). The role of state health departments in formulating AIDS policy was dealt with in an article in the American Journal of Public Health in June 1994. Most recently, AIDS & Public Policy December 1995 edition reports the perspectives of state legislative health chairs on AIDS policymaking in the late 1980s. If you desire a reprint of any of these, let me know and I will fax it to you.

The subjects I would like to have your views on include:

- * How you have structured your office to accomplish your tasks
- * How you see your role in dealing with other agencies
- * What are your current priorities
- * What were your strategies in increasing Ryan White funding and getting the repeal of discharge of HIV-positive servicemen
- * How you assess the current contribution of various national AIDS groups to affect AIDS policies
- * What initiatives are you recommending states undertake to improve dealing with AIDS, especially in light of current political control.

I am sorry that my schedule is such that Monday June 3 is the only day I will be able to be in Washington. I could, however, meet with you any time during that day that is convenient for you. I need to catch a flight to Detroit at 7 p.m.

Thank you in advance for considering this request.

Days to Resign as Solicitor General

Soft-Spoken Official Has Riled Both Ends of Political Spectrum

Drew S. Days III plans to resign as solicitor general this summer and return to teaching law at Yale University, Justice Department officials said yesterday.

A longtime civil rights attorney, the 54-year-old Days has run out of leave from the university, where he taught from 1981 until he was sworn in on May 28, 1993. As solicitor general, he represents the government in the Supreme Court and oversees all the Justice Department's appellate court activity.

"No decision has been made with respect to his replacement," Deputy Attorney General Jamie S. Gorelick said. She said the administration

might name an acting replacement, as other administrations have done near the end of a president's first term.

Days is expected to leave by early July, shortly after the expected late June end of the Supreme Court's current term. He originally had a two-year leave, then obtained a third year. To stay longer, he would have to sacrifice his tenured professorship at Yale Law School.

A soft-spoken man, Days has stirred anger on both sides of the political spectrum during his tenure.

Early on, conservatives were furious when he reversed Justice's stand on the child pornography prosecution of a Pennsylvania man because young girls portrayed in salacious videotapes kept their clothes on. President Clinton overruled Days.

Last year, homosexual rights activists and liberals were angered by his decision not to file a friend-of-the-court brief backing their request that the Supreme Court overturn an anti-gay initiative in Colorado.

Republicans on the Senate Judiciary Committee called Days to an unusual hearing late last year to criticize his record before the high court.

His critics contended he was successful only 54 percent of the time in the high court compared with 70 percent for his Republican predecessors.

Democrats said that might simply reflect that seven of the nine justices on the court were appointed by Republican presidents.

Days served in the Carter administration as assistant attorney general

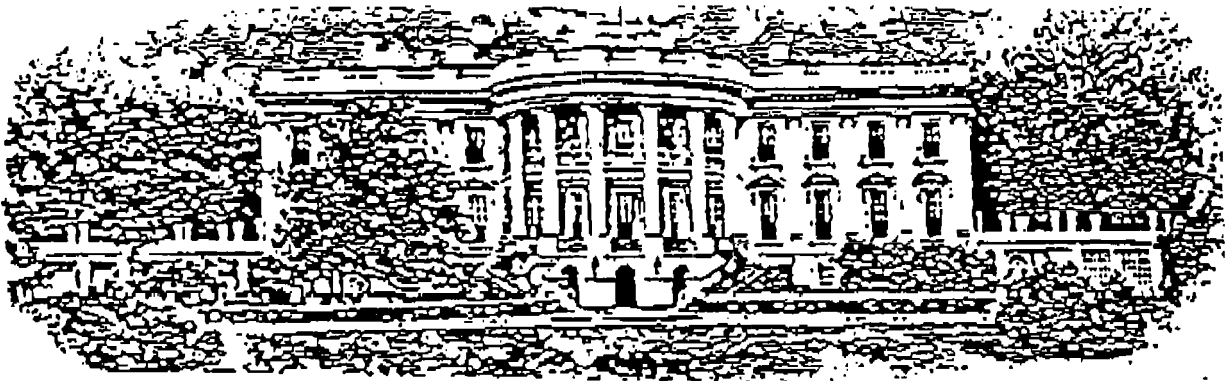

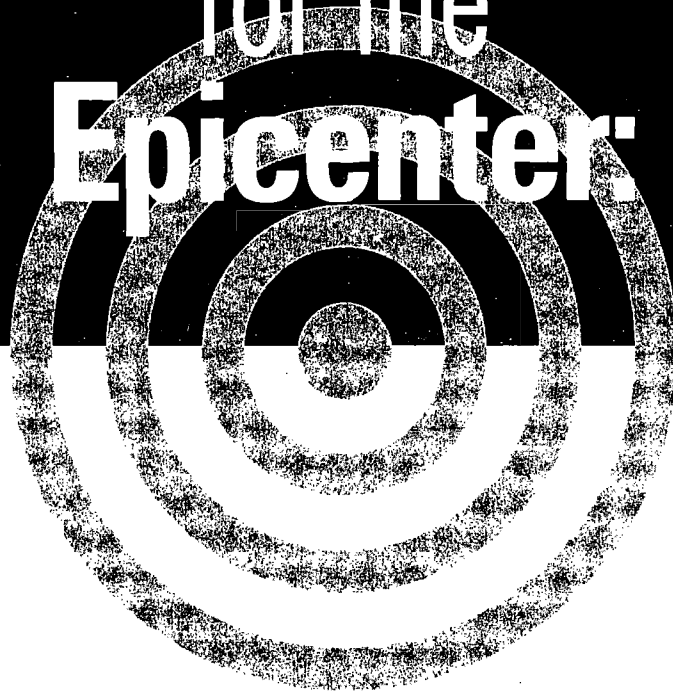

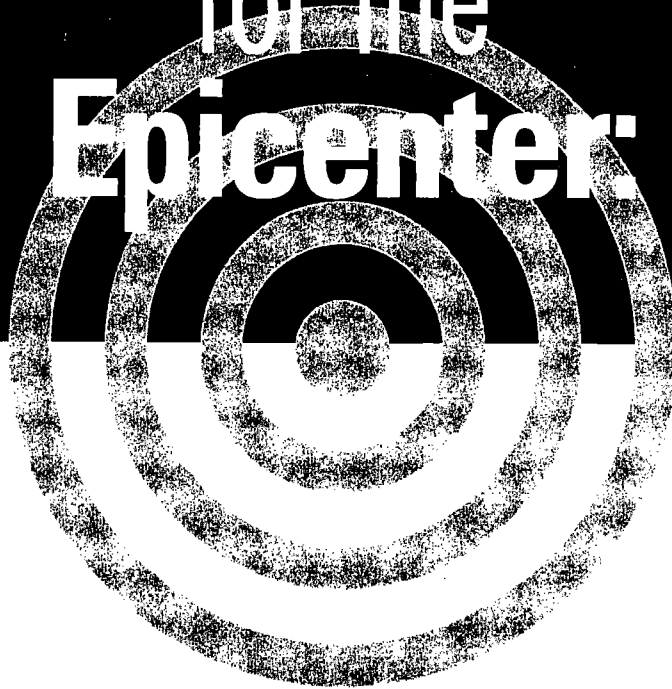
