On November 10, 1994, President Clinton named Patricia S. Fleming to serve as National AIDS Policy Director. In that capacity, Ms. Fleming advises the President on issues related to the Federal response to HIV and AIDS. Ms. Fleming oversees AIDS-related policies at all relevant Federal Departments and Agencies, is an integral participant in the development of the budget for AIDS-related programs, and coordinates development of AIDS policy.

A member of the White House Domestic Policy Council, Ms. Fleming also chairs the Interagency Task Force on HIV/AIDS and represents the U.S. government at international meetings on HIV and AIDS.

Ms. Fleming has spent much of her career in public service, working on Capitol Hill, the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, the U.S. Department of Education, and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. From 1983 until his death in 1992, Ms. Fleming worked for Rep. Ted Weiss (D-N.Y.), first as his Chief of Staff and later as Professional Staff Member of the Human Resources and Intergovernmental Operations Subcommittee of the House Government Operations Committee.

Prior to assuming her current position, Ms. Fleming was a Special Assistant to Secretary of Health and Human Services Donna E. Shalala. In that capacity, Ms. Fleming coordinated and directed HIV/AIDS policy at HHS. Ms. Fleming played a key role in developing the Clinton Administration's response to HIV/AIDS, including creation of the National Task Force on AIDS Drug Development, development of the AIDS Prevention Marketing Initiative, and a coordinated strategy to protect women and infants from HIV.

Ms. Fleming was born in Philadelphia, PA, is a graduate of Vassar College, the mother of three sons, and a resident of Bethesda, MD.

President Names New AIDS Policy Director

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Since August 2, Ms. Fleming has been serving as Interim AIDS Policy Director following the resignation of Kristine Gebbie. Since 1993, Ms. Fleming has been a Special Assistant to Health and Human Services Secretary Donna E. Shalala, focusing much of her work on AIDS policy matters.

From 1982 to 1992, Ms. Fleming was a staff adviser to the late Rep. Ted Weiss (D-N.Y.), serving as his Chief of Staff and as a Professional Staff Member on the Human Resources and Intergovernmental Operations Subcommittee of the House Government Operations Committee. In those positions, Ms. Fleming conducted aggressive oversight of the Federal response to AIDS/HIV, spurred the government to increase its commitment to the development of drugs to treat AIDS-related opportunistic infections, required the inclusion of women and minorities in clinical drug trials, and pressed for a frank and unambiguous AIDS prevention campaign.

"For nearly a decade, Patsy Fleming has been an important voice and a key player in our national response to AIDS and HIV," the President said today. "She has lent her expertise and her passion to this battle."

Noting the rapid spread of the human immunodeficiency virus among adolescent Americans, the President asked Ms. Fleming to provide him with a "detailed report on the status of AIDS among adolescents." Nearly one-fourth of all new HIV infections in the U.S. are among people under the age of 20.

Secretary Shalala noted that Ms. Fleming "has been an integral part of our efforts to turn around the Federal response to the AIDS epidemic."

The Office of National AIDS Policy is a part of the President's Domestic Policy Council, coordinating the Federal response to HIV/AIDS.

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
