I am writing to ask you to meet with three very talented young people who are spending six months in Washington as part of the Pedro Zamora AIDS Public Policy Fellowship Program. They would benefit greatly from your insights and experience in helping to shape America's response to the AIDS epidemic.

The Pedro Zamora AIDS Public Policy Fellowship Program was created to carry on the legacy of Pedro Zamora by training young people, particularly young people of color, to be advocates for fair and effective AIDS policy. The program is designed to develop skills in public and media advocacy, public policy and grassroots organizing, and to prepare the Zamora Fellows to be AIDS advocates in their local communities. The Fellowship Program is housed at AIDS Action Council, the Washington voice of over 1,400 community-based AIDS service organizations.

As you may recall, Pedro Zamora was a young man with AIDS who dedicated his life to educating young people about the AIDS epidemic. On November 10, 1994, President Clinton named Patricia S. Fleming to serve as National AIDS Policy Director. In that capacity, Ms. Fleming advises the President on issues related to the Federal response to HIV and AIDS. Ms. Fleming oversees AIDS-related policies at all relevant Federal Departments and Agencies, is an integral participant in the development of the budget for AIDS-related programs, and coordinates development of AIDS policy.

A member of the White House Domestic Policy Council, Ms. Fleming also chairs the Interagency Task Force on HIV/AIDS and represents the U.S. government at international meetings on HIV and AIDS.

Ms. Fleming has spent much of her career in public service, working on Capitol Hill, the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, the U.S. Department of Education, and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. From 1983 until his death in 1992, Ms. Fleming worked for Rep. Ted Weiss (D-N.Y.), first as his Chief of Staff and later as Professional Staff Member of the Human Resources and Intergovernmental Operations Subcommittee of the House Government Operations Committee.

Prior to assuming her current position, Ms. Fleming was a Special Assistant to Secretary of Health and Human Services Donna E. Shalala. In that capacity, Ms. Fleming coordinated and directed HIV/AIDS policy at HHS. Ms. Fleming played a key role in developing the Clinton Administration's response to HIV/AIDS, including creation of the National Task Force on AIDS Drug Development, development of the AIDS Prevention Marketing Initiative, and a coordinated strategy to protect women and infants from HIV.

Ms. Fleming was born in Philadelphia, PA, is a graduate of Vassar College, the mother of three sons, and a resident of Bethesda, MD.

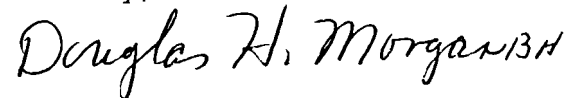

The purpose of this letter is to invite you to participate as a distinguished guest at the first meeting of the *Panel on Clinical Practices for Treatment of HIV Infection*, a unique and exciting public/private sector partnership approach to develop comprehensive guidance for clinical treatment of people living with HIV disease. This collaborative effort is being sponsored by the U.S. Public Health Service and the Henry J. Kaiser Family Foundation, through the leadership of Mark D. Smith, M.D., M.B.A., Executive Vice President. The panel is scheduled to meet December 2 - 3, 1996 at the Loews L'Enfant Plaza Hotel in Washington, D.C.

During the past several months, we have experienced extraordinary progress in the development, testing and licensure of several new therapies for the treatment of people with HIV/AIDS. This has brought a new dimension to the role of antiretroviral drugs and their effect on the progression of HIV. The growing complexities associated with HIV therapy coupled with the rapid licensure of new therapies has resulted in a problematic situation for clinicians treating people with HIV - a growing number of drugs are available from which physicians can choose, but little guidance is available to physicians on the use of these new therapies.

Expert scientific groups have convened to issue guidelines for employing new therapies. While useful in the clinical setting, the guidance thus far is very limited in scope and does not fully encompass the concerns of health payers, insurers, consumers, government and other interested parties. There remains a need to develop comprehensive clinical practices for treatment of people with HIV infection.

The *Panel on Clinical Practices for Treatment of HIV Infection* will be co-chaired by two internationally recognized and highly respected experts in infectious diseases: Anthony S. Fauci, M.D., Director, National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, National Institutes of Health; and John G. Bartlett, M.D., Professor of Medicine and Chief of Infectious Diseases, Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. We look forward to your joining us for the initial meeting of the panel because of your outstanding commitment to advancing sound and compassionate public health approaches for treatment and care of persons with HIV.

The work of the panel will evolve over the next three years to promulgate an initial set of comprehensive guidelines for clinical application. Specifically, the panel will assess recommendations resulting from the November 13 and 14 meeting of the NIH panel to Define Principles of Therapy of HIV Infection. (The work of the NIH panel will focus on providing an updated summary of available data on new therapies and their effect on the progression of HIV disease, and make recommendations to be used by clinicians in developing guidelines.)

The *Panel on Clinical Practices for Treatment of HIV Infection* will deliberate to develop clinical practices based on consideration of: (1) recommendations from the NIH panel derived from examination of current data; (2) analysis of existing practices; (3) practices of Federal and private HIV clinical experts; and (4) health outcomes and experiences of people living with HIV. The RAND Corporation will assist in this effort by performing a cost analysis of the proposed practices under consideration by this panel.

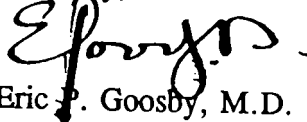

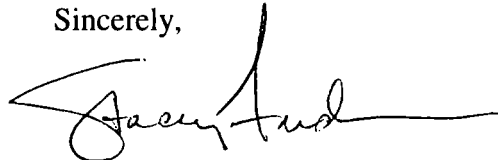

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## **Executive Summary**

The DUKE JOURNAL OF GENDER LAW & POLICY (DJGL&P) is an interdisciplinary legal journal seeking participants for a conference and symposium publication that will address the challenge of ensuring gender-equitable solutions to current HIV law and policy dilemmas.

Five conference panels will address current legal and policy issues:

- The partner notification panel will examine how this form of prevention creates a tension between public health concerns and privacy rights.
- The Medicaid panel will analyze current Medicaid reform and how states can fairly and effectively contend with shrinking funds and the growing costs of providing health care for women with HIV.
- The research panel will examine research protocols in clinical trials, the development of new drug therapies, and how reforms in these areas can best take account of the interests of women and minorities.
- The social construction panel will examine how racial, religious, and sexual preconceptions have affected the development of HIV law and public policy, specifically as it relates to women.
- The legal services panel will analyze the unique challenges HIV legal clinics face in providing legal services to women.

Panel participants will include government officials, academics, legal and medical practitioners, and leaders from private industry. DJGL&P will ask that each panel define current policy issues and critically examine current proposals for legal and policy reforms, taking special account of gender equity concerns.

## **Mission Statement**

On the weekend of February 21-22, 1997, the DUKE JOURNAL OF GENDER LAW & POLICY will host a conference on the topic of "HIV Law & Policy: Ensuring Gender-Equitable Reform." This conference seeks to fill a need for sustained, interdisciplinary scholarship on a number of important and timely issues relating to HIV, especially those relating to gender equity. Thus far, scholarly work and media attention about the relationships between gender, law, policy, and HIV have been primarily reactionary - producing observational outlines of what is happening. Reform issues have been often bypassed or not critically examined for their effectiveness.

HIV will continue to raise troubling legal and policy issues well into the next century. The World Health Organization projects that HIV has infected seventeen million people and will infect forty million by the end of the decade. As an ongoing and escalating public health disaster, the personal cost of this disease has been devastating. HIV continues to defy our medical capacity to provide a cure, remains deeply misunderstood, and routinely leaves its victims mischaracterized and mistreated. As HIV continues to raise troubling legal, political, and ethical questions, the challenge is to respond fairly and effectively within our existing societal restraints.

The pressure this virus has placed on society has produced the need for substantial reform. Yet as reform is rushing forward, many facets of HIV are absent from the discussion. Women are currently the fastest growing population of people with HIV, representing more than 50% of the new infections this past year. However, scant attention has been paid to the implications of HIV for women or the fact that the disease crosses ethnic, social, racial, generational, and economic lines. The significance of these facts must be considered as debate over reform solidifies into public policy and law.

Administrators, lawyers, professors, policymakers, and theorists have voiced the need to develop a comprehensive body of knowledge that can inform forthcoming reforms. The well recognized need for scholarship in this area provides an opportunity for the conference to help shape the direction of future research and promote debates that will generate a broad understanding of complexities in the field.

## Conference Program

### PANEL I

#### **PARTNER NOTIFICATION: PRIVACY AND PUBLIC HEALTH FROM A GENDER PERSPECTIVE**

In an attempt to develop effective strategies to control the spread of HIV, many states have passed partnership notification statutes that allow physicians and/or other health care professionals to notify partners of their potential exposure to HIV. The commendable goal of these bills is to prevent the further spread of HIV. These statutes encompass two distinct notification approaches: the physician's duty to warn and the government's duty to institute contact tracing. Both approaches create tension between patients' privacy rights and public health concerns. Although this tension has historic roots, the fact that HIV remains terminal, severely stigmatized, and intersected with domestic violence adds dimensions to the debate which have never been seen in a public health crisis.

**Questions Presented:** Although the federal courts have yet to address the issue of how partnership notification affects an individual's right to privacy and confidentiality, this panel will be asked to speculate on the moral and constitutional boundaries of partner notification. For instance, what role does gender play in the debate? Should women be concerned whether notification legislation is paternalistic? Could notification requirements negatively affect rights that lay at the foundation of abortion law? How does the recognized intersection of HIV and domestic violence relate to this discussion? How should public policy acknowledge the personal repercussions of partner notification? How should concern for personal safety, in light of the intersection with domestic violence, shape HIV prevention strategies and public health laws? Should any or all of these concerns be subordinate to the state's compelling interest in preventing the spread of HIV?

## **PANEL II**

### **BLEAK HORIZONS OR WINDOWS OF OPPORTUNITY: WHAT CAN MEDICAID-ELIGIBLE PEOPLE WITH HIV EXPECT IN THE FUTURE**

Though states are already facing difficulties in funding their portion of the Medicaid programs, more cutbacks are threatened. The fact that Medicaid is the largest source of federal money for HIV and HIV-related medical services makes ensuring equitable implementation of reforms critical to the HIV population. Currently, 40-60% of adults living with HIV and over 90% of children with HIV depend on Medicaid as their only source of medical care. This panel will examine present Medicaid policies and current reforms. The critical question is: How can states make up for reduced federal support and provide health care access to people with HIV?

Critical analysis of current Medicaid programs highlights where people with HIV have been ill-served by health care choices. Studies show that HIV patients covered by Medicaid have a higher mortality rate than those who are privately insured. This has been directly linked to a rationing of services. Additionally, recent loosening of federal controls has led to discrepancies among states in terms of eligibility, benefit levels, and per capita contributions — allowing states to provide disparate services. As costs grow and the current federal matching system is scrapped in favor of block grants, the likely scenario is that states will limit access to Medicaid by tightening eligibility rules or paring benefits. The challenge to state policymakers will be to ensure equitable reform for people with HIV.

In an attempt to meet the challenge of providing adequate health care services to an increasing number of HIV patients under budget constraints, some state Medicaid agencies are already testing community-based services and managed care. Unfortunately, other states have shown they are willing to cut off health care for people with HIV. As summarized by Marsha Lillie-Blanton, associate director of the Kaiser Commission on the Future of Medicaid, "we don't have enough experience to know whether [any of these reforms are] a good or a bad thing . . . There's a potential . . . to have less fragmented, better coordinated care. But there's a risk that the population with high health care needs and large expenses [could be left out of reform where] the incentives are to reduce payments."

***Questions Presented:*** This panel will analyze current Medicaid reform, project how these provisions will affect the indigent HIV-infected population and local and state health care infrastructures, and forecast what legal battles will be waged over the new forms of public assistance. The concern for the budget is understandable, but what dangers do block grants pose for Medicaid? What are the practical effects of relinquishing to the states almost all control over eligibility, coverage and benefits? Does the scope of the public health crisis raised by HIV justify federal as well as state priority?

**PANEL III**  
**FORMING EQUITABLE RESEARCH REFORM: RATIONING ACCESS TO CLINICAL TRIALS AND NEW DRUGS**

Regulation of HIV research is undergoing heated debate, but a majority of proposed legislation has been aimed simply at accelerating the approval process of new drugs. Generally absent from the reform debate is the need for gender and race equitable access to clinical trials and new drugs. Where efforts have been made, they have been ineffective with both clinical trials and new drug therapies remaining relatively inaccessible to women and minorities. This panel will be asked to critically examine current drug strategies and propose how equitable reform can be obtained.

Women and minorities comprise the fastest growing HIV-infected population, yet are routinely excluded from clinical trials. Exclusion means less initial access to drugs and eventually less data specifically applicable to these groups. Presumably the exclusion of these populations is not malicious. Many of the clinical trials and new therapies have rigid compliance measures. Treatment and research protocols that require repeated medical visits can lead to exclusion for several reasons: the need to stay in the home to supervise children; the presence of cultural barriers to pursuing self-interest; and the impact of other problems generally associated with poverty. Also, significant liability barriers exist that encourage the exclusion of pregnant or fertile women from studies and new drugs.

***Questions Presented:*** Why have the few clinical trials reforms that have focused on gender and race equities failed to effectively correct gender and race biases? Why, within HIV research and treatment, do we see the perpetuation of the longstanding circumstance, that women's health is not a priority for either attention or investment? How does product liability limit women's access to clinical trials? Is there an alternative to product liability that protects consumers yet allows private industry to include women of child-bearing age in clinical trials? Why, where women's health concerns are recognized, do they fall into the historical trap of being viewed as synonymous with maternal health? In what ways has the limited attention given to the specific treatment of women resulted in the inadequate allocation of resources for women's unique health concerns? This panel will also critically examine how people with AIDS (PWAs) currently access new drug therapies. How should public policy be developed? Since limited public assistance means these drugs will not be available to all PWAs, how should policymakers decide who gets access? What priority should a vaccine take in medical research given the fact that drugs will never be affordable to most of the world?

#### **PANEL IV**

#### **WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A WOMAN SURVIVING WITH HIV -- HOW LAW AND PUBLIC POLICY ARE AFFECTED BY THE SOCIAL CONSTRUCTION THIS EPIDEMIC**

HIV has a unique social construction. Ethnic, religious, and sexual norms converge to marginalize people with HIV. For women, conceptualization of the disease as a "gay male disease," the inseparability of HIV from people's reticence toward sexual activity, and animosity toward intravenous drug use heightens the marginalization. Equitable reform is dependent upon an understanding and measured recognition of these stigmas during the formulation of law and public policy.

Understanding the stigma for an HIV-infected woman necessitates both an understanding of the foundations and effects of the stigma. Foundations will vary for women of different cultures, religions, and socio-economic statuses. The effects of these stigmas impact not only people with HIV, but health care providers, legislators, and public policymakers who deal with

the epidemic.

**Questions Presented:** The challenge to this panel will be to explain how the social construction of HIV has been both over-recognized and under-recognized in the development of HIV law and policy reforms. How would response to the HIV epidemic be different if the disease had first emerged in the mainly white, heterosexual population which elects most of our law and policymakers? Has over-recognition of this epidemic as a “gay male” disease led to policies that are ineffective for women? Does under-recognition of the particular cultural and religious barriers that women face lead to ineffective prevention policies, educational programs, and funding decisions? Are there overlapping complexities that should holistically inform every policy decision? How do we adjust the law and public policy to ensure that legislators, judges, and communities respond fairly and effectively to the HIV crisis?

## **PANEL V**

### **THE CHALLENGE OF PROVIDING LEGAL SERVICES TO HIV-INFECTED WOMEN: A COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS**

This panel will be asked to critically examine the history of legal aid for women and to open a dialogue with HIV legal service providers on how to remove barriers to providing legal services to women with HIV.

Historically, the obligation of guarding the rights of marginalized women has fallen on the shoulders of legal clinics. Domestic violence clinics, rape crisis centers, immigrant legal services, and many others have filled this role. In each context, the legal clinic has addressed the plight and found effective ways to overcome barriers to provide effective legal services. Rape crisis centers have targeted emergency rooms and police stations. Domestic violence clinics have joined with battered women’s shelters and court houses to provide easier access to temporary restraining orders. What lessons can be learned from this history?

Studies have shown that timely provision of legal services positively affects HIV-infected women’s health, but unique concerns make providing legal services to this population difficult. First, HIV clinics serve a terminal population. Accordingly, women with HIV, especially those

with children, need to organize their legal affairs in preparation for death. Permanency planning requires wills, powers of attorney, and custody decisions. Without proper assistance, access to public benefits can be denied and discrimination can go unchecked. Second, HIV infection requires a multifaceted response. Some clinics have found success by joining an “HIV Service Organization.” These organizations are multi-disciplinary, providing a range of medical, legal, and psychological services to PWAs, to persons in high-risk groups for HIV infection, and to those associated with these two groups. However, this is a model that is difficult to replicate, especially in rural areas.

***Questions Presented:*** How do the historic lessons of legal aid clinics inform the development of HIV legal services? What practical programs does a legal clinic need to implement to ensure that the female HIV population has access to legal aid? The findings of this panel will be published as a manual entitled “Counseling HIV+ Clients: A Training Module for Legal Services Lawyers,” and in addenda to the symposium issue.

### **Organizational Information: The DUKE JOURNAL OF GENDER LAW & POLICY**

**Interdisciplinary Mission:** The DJGL&P is an interdisciplinary publication devoted to the discussion of gender issues in the context of law and public policy. 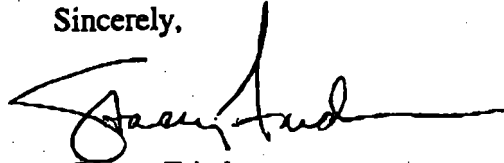

Panel participants will include government officials, academics, legal and medical practitioners, and leaders from private industry. DJGL&P will ask that each panel define current policy issues and critically examine current proposals for legal and policy reforms, taking special account of gender equity concerns.

DJGL&P's symposium conference is an ideal tool for addressing the current challenge of ensuring gender-equitable reform of HIV law and policy. There is a demonstrated need for scholarship in the five panel areas. The legal, policy, and social implications of this debate will make this conference and subsequent publication a valuable resource to legal practitioners and policymakers. DJGL&P's proven record, interdisciplinary mission, and university-wide support provide the ideal formula for a successful conference. DJGL&P invites you to review the attached proposal and support its effort by joining this conference.

## **Mission Statement**

On the weekend of February 21-22, 1997, the DUKE JOURNAL OF GENDER LAW & POLICY will host a conference on the topic of "HIV Law & Policy: Ensuring Gender-Equitable Reform." This conference seeks to fill a need for sustained, interdisciplinary scholarship on a number of important and timely issues relating to HIV, especially those relating to gender equity. Thus far, scholarly work and media attention about the relationships between gender, law, policy, and HIV have been primarily reactionary - producing observational outlines of what is happening. Reform issues have been often bypassed or not critically examined for their effectiveness.

HIV will continue to raise troubling legal and policy issues well into the next century. The World Health Organization projects that HIV has infected seventeen million people and will infect forty million by the end of the decade. As an ongoing and escalating public health disaster, the personal cost of this disease has been devastating. HIV continues to defy our medical capacity to provide a cure, remains deeply misunderstood, and routinely leaves its victims mischaracterized and mistreated. As HIV continues to raise troubling legal, political, and ethical questions, the challenge is to respond fairly and effectively within our existing societal restraints.

The pressure this virus has placed on society has produced the need for substantial reform. Yet as reform is rushing forward, many facets of HIV are absent from the discussion. Women are currently the fastest growing population of people with HIV, representing more than 50% of the new infections this past year. However, scant attention has been paid to the implications of HIV for women or the fact that the disease crosses ethnic, social, racial, generational, and economic lines. The significance of these facts must be considered as debate over reform solidifies into public policy and law.

Administrators, lawyers, professors, policymakers, and theorists have voiced the need to develop a comprehensive body of knowledge that can inform forthcoming reforms. The well recognized need for scholarship in this area provides an opportunity for the conference to help shape the direction of future research and promote debates that will generate a broad understanding of complexities in the field.

## Conference Program

### PANEL I

#### **PARTNER NOTIFICATION: PRIVACY AND PUBLIC HEALTH FROM A GENDER PERSPECTIVE**

In an attempt to develop effective strategies to control the spread of HIV, many states have passed partnership notification statutes that allow physicians and/or other health care professionals to notify partners of their potential exposure to HIV. The commendable goal of these bills is to prevent the further spread of HIV. These statutes encompass two distinct notification approaches: the physician's duty to warn and the government's duty to institute contact tracing. Both approaches create tension between patients' privacy rights and public health concerns. Although this tension has historic roots, the fact that HIV remains terminal, severely stigmatized, and intersected with domestic violence adds dimensions to the debate which have never been seen in a public health crisis.

*Questions Presented:* Although the federal courts have yet to address the issue of how partnership notification affects an individual's right to privacy and confidentiality, this panel will be asked to speculate on the moral and constitutional boundaries of partner notification. For instance, what role does gender play in the debate? Should women be concerned whether notification legislation is paternalistic? Could notification requirements negatively affect rights that lay at the foundation of abortion law? How does the recognized intersection of HIV and domestic violence relate to this discussion? How should public policy acknowledge the personal repercussions of partner notification? How should concern for personal safety, in light of the intersection with domestic violence, shape HIV prevention strategies and public health laws? Should any or all of these concerns be subordinate to the state's compelling interest in preventing the spread of HIV?

**PANEL II**

**BLEAK HORIZONS OR WINDOWS OF OPPORTUNITY: WHAT CAN MEDICAID-ELIGIBLE PEOPLE WITH HIV EXPECT IN THE FUTURE**

Though states are already facing difficulties in funding their portion of the Medicaid programs, more cutbacks are threatened. The fact that Medicaid is the largest source of federal money for HIV and HIV-related medical services makes ensuring equitable implementation of reforms critical to the HIV population. Currently, 40-60% of adults living with HIV and over 90% of children with HIV depend on Medicaid as their only source of medical care. This panel will examine present Medicaid policies and current reforms. The critical question is: How can states make up for reduced federal support and provide health care access to people with HIV?

Critical analysis of current Medicaid programs highlights where people with HIV have been ill-served by health care choices. Studies show that HIV patients covered by Medicaid have a higher mortality rate than those who are privately insured. This has been directly linked to a rationing of services. Additionally, recent loosening of federal controls has led to discrepancies among states in terms of eligibility, benefit levels, and per capita contributions — allowing states to provide disparate services. As costs grow and the current federal matching system is scrapped in favor of block grants, the likely scenario is that states will limit access to Medicaid by tightening eligibility rules or paring benefits. The challenge to state policymakers will be to ensure equitable reform for people with HIV.

In an attempt to meet the challenge of providing adequate health care services to an increasing number of HIV patients under budget constraints, some state Medicaid agencies are already testing community-based services and managed care. Unfortunately, other states have shown they are willing to cut off health care for people with HIV. As summarized by Marsha Lillie-Blanton, associate director of the Kaiser Commission on the Future of Medicaid, "we don't have enough experience to know whether [any of these reforms are] a good or a bad thing . . . There's a potential . . . to have less fragmented, better coordinated care. But there's a risk that the population with high health care needs and large expenses [could be left out of reform where] the incentives are to reduce payments."

**Questions Presented:** This panel will analyze current Medicaid reform, project how these provisions will affect the indigent HIV-infected population and local and state health care infrastructures, and forecast what legal battles will be waged over the new forms of public assistance. The concern for the budget is understandable, but what dangers do block grants pose for Medicaid? What are the practical effects of relinquishing to the states almost all control over eligibility, coverage and benefits? Does the scope of the public health crisis raised by HIV justify federal as well as state priority?

### **PANEL III**

#### **FORMING EQUITABLE RESEARCH REFORM: RATIONING ACCESS TO CLINICAL TRIALS AND NEW DRUGS**

Regulation of HIV research is undergoing heated debate, but a majority of proposed legislation has been aimed simply at accelerating the approval process of new drugs. Generally absent from the reform debate is the need for gender and race equitable access to clinical trials and new drugs. Where efforts have been made, they have been ineffective with both clinical trials and new drug therapies remaining relatively inaccessible to women and minorities. This panel will be asked to critically examine current drug strategies and propose how equitable reform can be obtained.

Women and minorities comprise the fastest growing HIV-infected population, yet are routinely excluded from clinical trials. Exclusion means less initial access to drugs and eventually less data specifically applicable to these groups. Presumably the exclusion of these populations is not malicious. Many of the clinical trials and new therapies have rigid compliance measures. Treatment and research protocols that require repeated medical visits can lead to exclusion for several reasons: the need to stay in the home to supervise children; the presence of cultural barriers to pursuing self-interest; and the impact of other problems generally associated with poverty. Also, significant liability barriers exist that encourage the exclusion of pregnant or fertile women from studies and new drugs.

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**Questions Presented:** Why have the few clinical trials reforms that have focused on gender and race equities failed to effectively correct gender and race biases? Why, within HIV research and treatment, do we see the perpetuation of the longstanding circumstance, that women's health is not a priority for either attention or investment? How does product liability limit women's access to clinical trials? Is there an alternative to product liability that protects consumers yet allows private industry to include women of child-bearing age in clinical trials? Why, where women's health concerns are recognized, do they fall into the historical trap of being viewed as synonymous with maternal health? In what ways has the limited attention given to the specific treatment of women resulted in the inadequate allocation of resources for women's unique health concerns? This panel will also critically examine how people with AIDS (PWAs) currently access new drug therapies. How should public policy be developed? Since limited public assistance means these drugs will not be available to all PWAs, how should policymakers decide who gets access? What priority should a vaccine take in medical research given the fact that drugs will never be affordable to most of the world?

#### **PANEL IV**

#### **WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A WOMAN SURVIVING WITH HIV -- HOW LAW AND PUBLIC POLICY ARE AFFECTED BY THE SOCIAL CONSTRUCTION THIS EPIDEMIC**

HIV has a unique social construction. Ethnic, religious, and sexual norms converge to marginalize people with HIV. For women, conceptualization of the disease as a "gay male disease," the inseparability of HIV from people's reticence toward sexual activity, and animosity toward intravenous drug use heightens the marginalization. Equitable reform is dependent upon an understanding and measured recognition of these stigmas during the formulation of law and public policy.

Understanding the stigma for an HIV-infected woman necessitates both an understanding of the foundations and effects of the stigma. Foundations will vary for women of different cultures, religions, and socio-economic statuses. The effects of these stigmas impact not only people with HIV, but health care providers, legislators, and public policymakers who deal with

the epidemic.

**Questions Presented:** The challenge to this panel will be to explain how the social construction of HIV has been both over-recognized and under-recognized in the development of HIV law and policy reforms. How would response to the HIV epidemic be different if the disease had first emerged in the mainly white, heterosexual population which elects most of our law and policymakers? Has over-recognition of this epidemic as a "gay male" disease led to policies that are ineffective for women? Does under-recognition of the particular cultural and religious barriers that women face lead to ineffective prevention policies, educational programs, and funding decisions? Are there overlapping complexities that should holistically inform every policy decision? How do we adjust the law and public policy to ensure that legislators, judges, and communities respond fairly and effectively to the HIV crisis?

#### **PANEL V**

#### **THE CHALLENGE OF PROVIDING LEGAL SERVICES TO HIV-INFECTED WOMEN: A COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS**

This panel will be asked to critically examine the history of legal aid for women and to open a dialogue with HIV legal service providers on how to remove barriers to providing legal services to women with HIV.

Historically, the obligation of guarding the rights of marginalized women has fallen on the shoulders of legal clinics. Domestic violence clinics, rape crisis centers, immigrant legal services, and many others have filled this role. In each context, the legal clinic has addressed the plight and found effective ways to overcome barriers to provide effective legal services. Rape crisis centers have targeted emergency rooms and police stations. Domestic violence clinics have joined with battered women's shelters and court houses to provide easier access to temporary restraining orders. What lessons can be learned from this history?

Studies have shown that timely provision of legal services positively affects HIV-infected women's health, but unique concerns make providing legal services to this population difficult. First, HIV clinics serve a terminal population. Accordingly, women with HIV, especially those

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with children, need to organize their legal affairs in preparation for death. Permanency planning requires wills, powers of attorney, and custody decisions. Without proper assistance, access to public benefits can be denied and discrimination can go unchecked. Second, HIV infection requires a multifaceted response. Some clinics have found success by joining an "HIV Service Organization." These organizations are multi-disciplinary, providing a range of medical, legal, and psychological services to PWAs, to persons in high-risk groups for HIV infection, and to those associated with these two groups. However, this is a model that is difficult to replicate, especially in rural areas.

***Questions Presented:*** How do the historic lessons of legal aid clinics inform the development of HIV legal services? What practical programs does a legal clinic need to implement to ensure that the female HIV population has access to legal aid? The findings of this panel will be published as a manual entitled "Counseling HIV+ Clients: A Training Module for Legal Services Lawyers," and in addenda to the symposium issue.

## **Symposium Publication**

Experts invited to participate in conference panels will also be asked to prepare an article for publication in the DUKE JOURNAL OF GENDER LAW & POLICY. These submissions will be compiled in a special symposium issue to be published in Winter 1997/1998. The publication will be distributed nationally to law schools and other subscribers, on-line through Lexis and Westlaw, and available on the worldwide web. The symposium issue will be a valuable resource for lawyers, policy-makers, educational theorists, governmental officials, and anyone interested in the intersection of gender and HIV.

### **Organizational Information: The DUKE JOURNAL OF GENDER LAW & POLICY**

**Interdisciplinary Mission:** The DJGL&P is an interdisciplinary publication devoted to the discussion of gender issues in the context of law and public policy. The Journal's forum exists to foster discourse, to provide an opportunity for ongoing debate, and to open channels of communication between people of different viewpoints and disciplines.

DJGL&P incorporates work from multiple perspectives, with particular emphasis on practical analysis. The intent is to transcend rigid disciplinary boundaries by illuminating connections between social science and the law, scholarship and public policy, academic theory and professional practice. Promoting an integrated and interdisciplinary analysis of gender issues is often a task of daunting complexity. DJGL&P's mission is to appreciate and explore this complexity and the conflict it engenders. An interdisciplinary approach to the analysis of legal and policy problems provides an opportunity for serious and productive discussion of gender issues.

**Successful Conference Planning and Publishing History:** DJGL&P has established a tradition of hosting an annual conference on a specific topic and publishing a subsequent symposium issue. In 1994, DJGL&P hosted a conference titled "Defining Family: Adoption Law

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& Policy." The diverse panelists included legal scholars, practicing attorneys, adoptive and biological parents advocates, a psychologist, a senate judiciary committee advisor, adoptees, and adoptive parents. Discussions generated at the conference are compiled in the Spring 1995 symposium issue.

In 1995, DJGL&P organized a conference on gender equity in sports titled "Gender and Sports: Setting a Course for College Athletics." The conference focused on the 1972 federal Title IX legislation and provided a forum for administrators, coaches, players, advocates, legal scholars, and sociologists to discuss the legal, policy, and social issues surrounding the mandate for gender equity in athletic programs. Although focused primarily on college athletics, discussions touched upon larger social questions, including the role of high school and professional sports and the balance between participation and competition. This conference was widely acclaimed as the most successful event of its type.

This spring, DJGL&P hosted its third conference: "Gender and Higher Education: Maximizing the Learning Environment." The topic was initially inspired by the Virginia Military Institute and Citadel cases, but expanded to embrace a wide range of concerns beyond these cases including the effects of legal reform on the higher education classroom, sociological research, and policy ideas for implementing future changes in higher education that will help maximize the learning experience for men and women. Our editorial staff is currently in the process of preparing a special symposium publication on gender and higher education which is comprised of essays and articles by participants in the conference.

Our innovative symposium format has enabled DJGL&P to fill a important void in gender studies. Because DJGL&P attracts distinguished academics and practitioners to our conferences, subsequently published symposium issues are comprised of articles and essays by leading scholars. Our success is charted by a rapidly growing subscription rate, unprecedented by any other student-generated publication at Duke University Law School. In planning the upcoming conference, DJGL&P looks forward to building upon its record and continuing to provide a quality conference and special issue that will become a national resource for those interested in reform and HIV.

**Institutional Support:** Since its genesis in 1993, DJGL&P has garnered significant university-wide support. Faculty advisors from the law school include professors Katharine Bartlett, Jerome Culp, Trina Jones, Madeline Morris, as well as Director of Legal Writing, Teresa Newman. Our advisory board also includes Helen Ladd, Director of Graduate Studies at the Terry Sanford Institute of Public Policy, and Jean O'Barr, Director of the Duke Graduate Program in Women's Studies.

### **Conclusion**

The interdisciplinary nature of DJGL&P, a proven history of successful conferences, and our symposium format provides the ideal formula for exploring the complex relationship between gender and HIV reform. There is a need for an in-depth inquiry and debate about current reforms in HIV law and policy. By focusing on these HIV reforms through the lenses of gender, law, and policy, our proposed conference and publication will provide a natural forum for debate about how equitable reform can be achieved.
