## 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

The National Lesbian and Gay Health Association's 20th Anniversary Health Conference will be held at the Hyatt Regency in Embarcadero Center in San Francisco, July 25th to July 29th, 1998. This is a significant milestone in the history of the lesbian and gay health movement and for the National Lesbian and Gay Health Association. *Pre-Conference Institutes**Bisexuality & HIV Prevention*

**Overview:** Bisexuals are an underserved population and have been largely ignored by current prevention efforts. Very few prevention programs specifically target bisexuals, although several studies have shown that bisexuals are at increased risk for HIV infection. Furthermore, there is an underlying assumption that only men are bisexual, and that prevention efforts which target gay men or heterosexuals effectively reach bisexuals, regardless of gender and of whether or not they self-identify as bisexuals. The institute will bring together prevention specialists, bisexuals working for community-based and AIDS service organizations and prominent bisexual researchers and theorists to exchange information regarding HIV prevention in bisexual populations, to examine the effectiveness of current interventions and begin work on a national HIV prevention plan targeting bisexuals.

*Gay Male HIV Prevention  
Work in a 'Post-AIDS' Era*

**Overview:** Building on a standing-room only workshop at last year's conference, Chris Bartlett and Eric Rofes argue that the construct of AIDS forged in the mid-1980s no longer applies to most gay men and many are creating post-AIDS identities and social practices. Yet much of prevention operates out of 1980s crisis constructs, thus creating dissonance between gay men's lived experience and representations foisted on them. This interactive day-long session draws on Australian theorizing about post-AIDS gay male cultures and the "new thinking" about HIV prevention and gay men in the US and Western Europe; as well as Rofes' new book *Dry Bones Breathe: Gay Men Creating Post-AIDS Identities and Cultures*.

*Exploring the 'I' After GLB:  
Transgenders, Health and Society*

Given the momentum the "trans" political movement has gained, it's not surprising then that the public health issues facing the transgender community are also being discussed. But what does it mean to be transgender? How are biological sex, gender identity and expression, and sexual orientation and behavior related? What health and related social issues confront the trans community for female to male (FTM) and male to female (MTF) people of transgendered experience? This institute will explore the evolving definition of the term "transgender", present facts and explore perspective from both the MTF and FTM communities, and provide a forum for establishing an agenda for transgender health and wellness in the 21st century.

### THE CHALLENGES OF MID-LIFE AND OLD AGE FOR LESBIANS, GAYS AND BISEXUALS

*Overview:* Many of today's middle-aged and older lesbians, gay men and bisexual people have been invisible among gay and lesbian communities, as they have been in the scholarship and images of America's aging communities. ### LESBIAN HEALTH ROUNDTABLE
