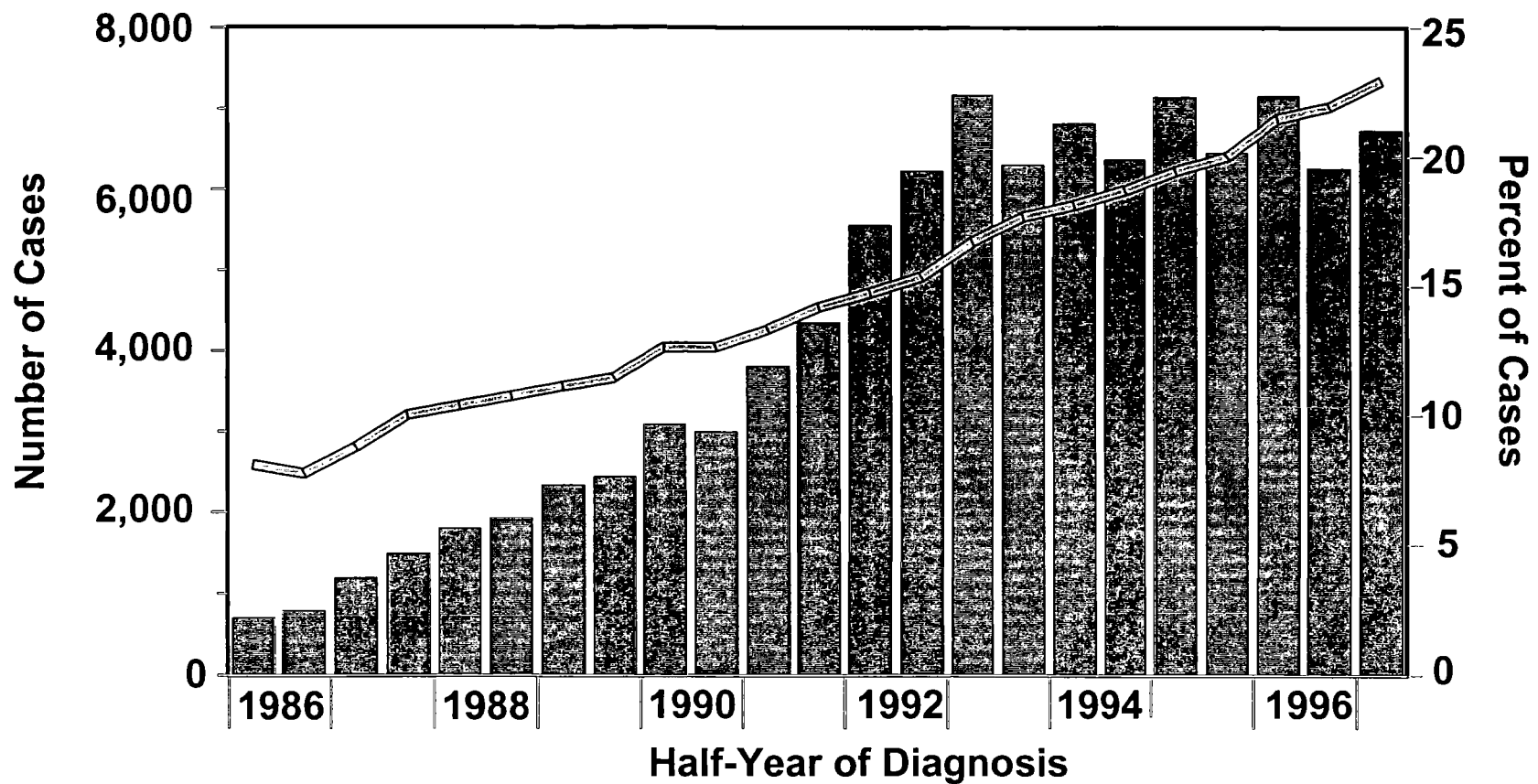

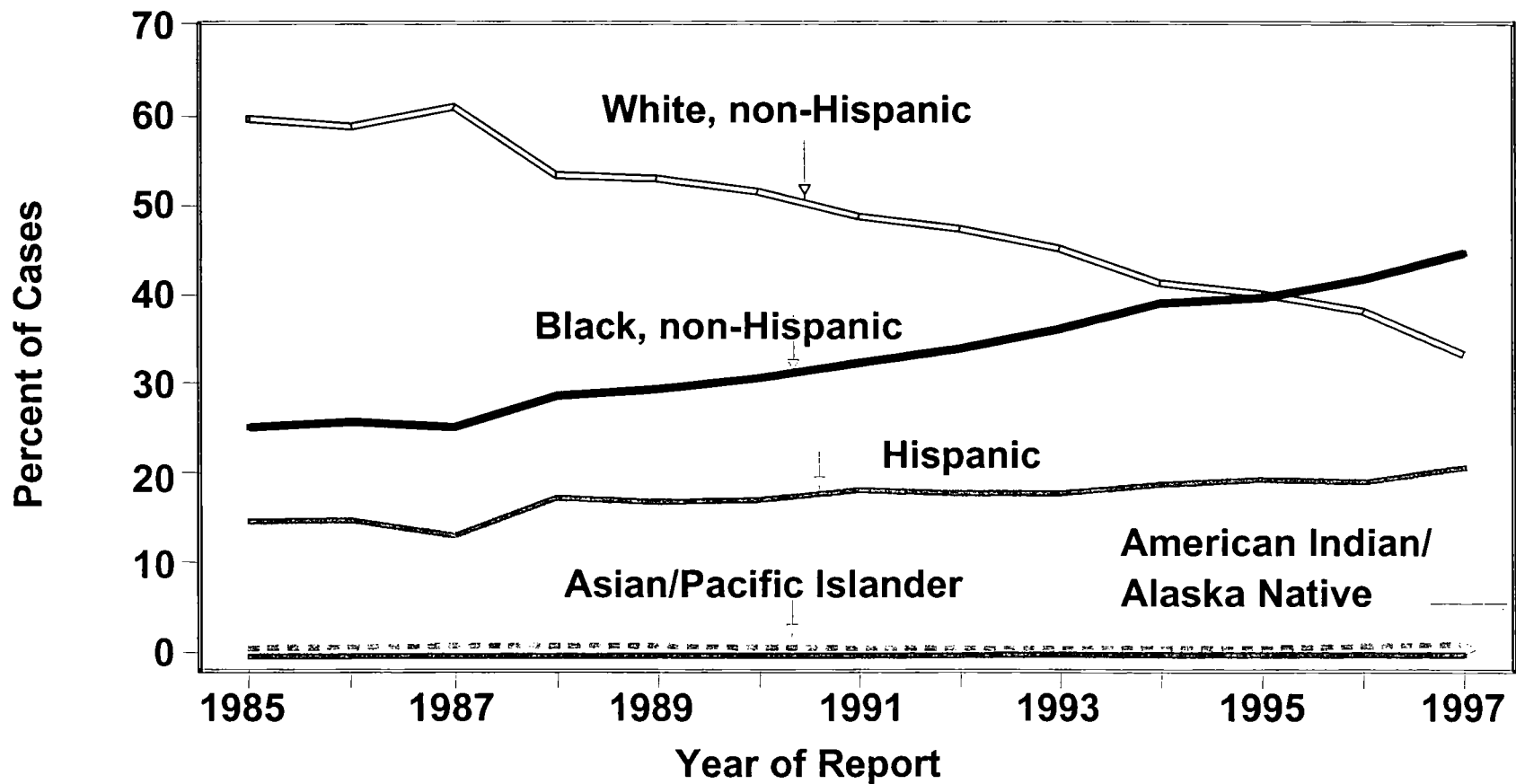

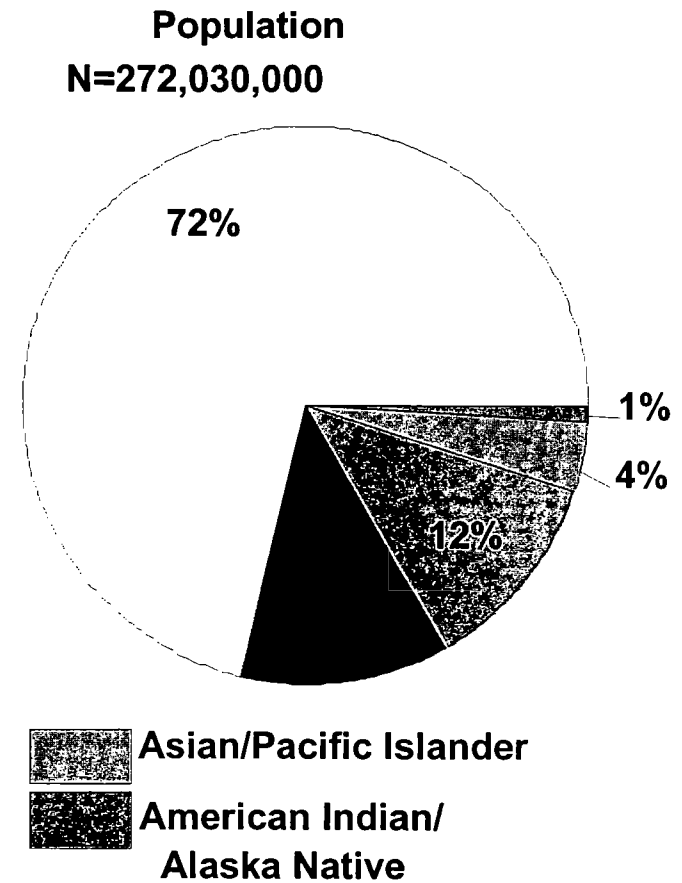

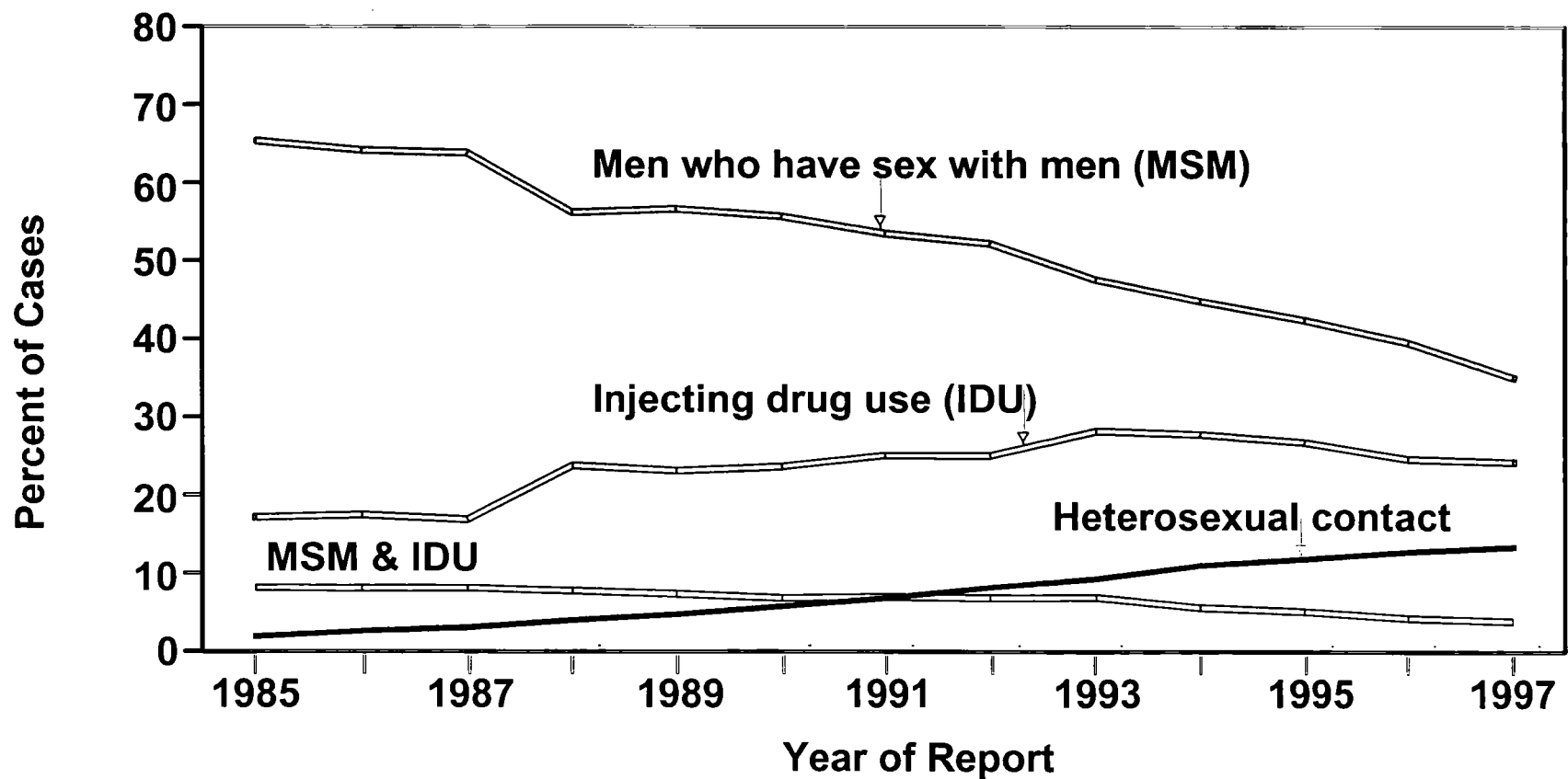
AIDS Cases by Race/Ethnicity

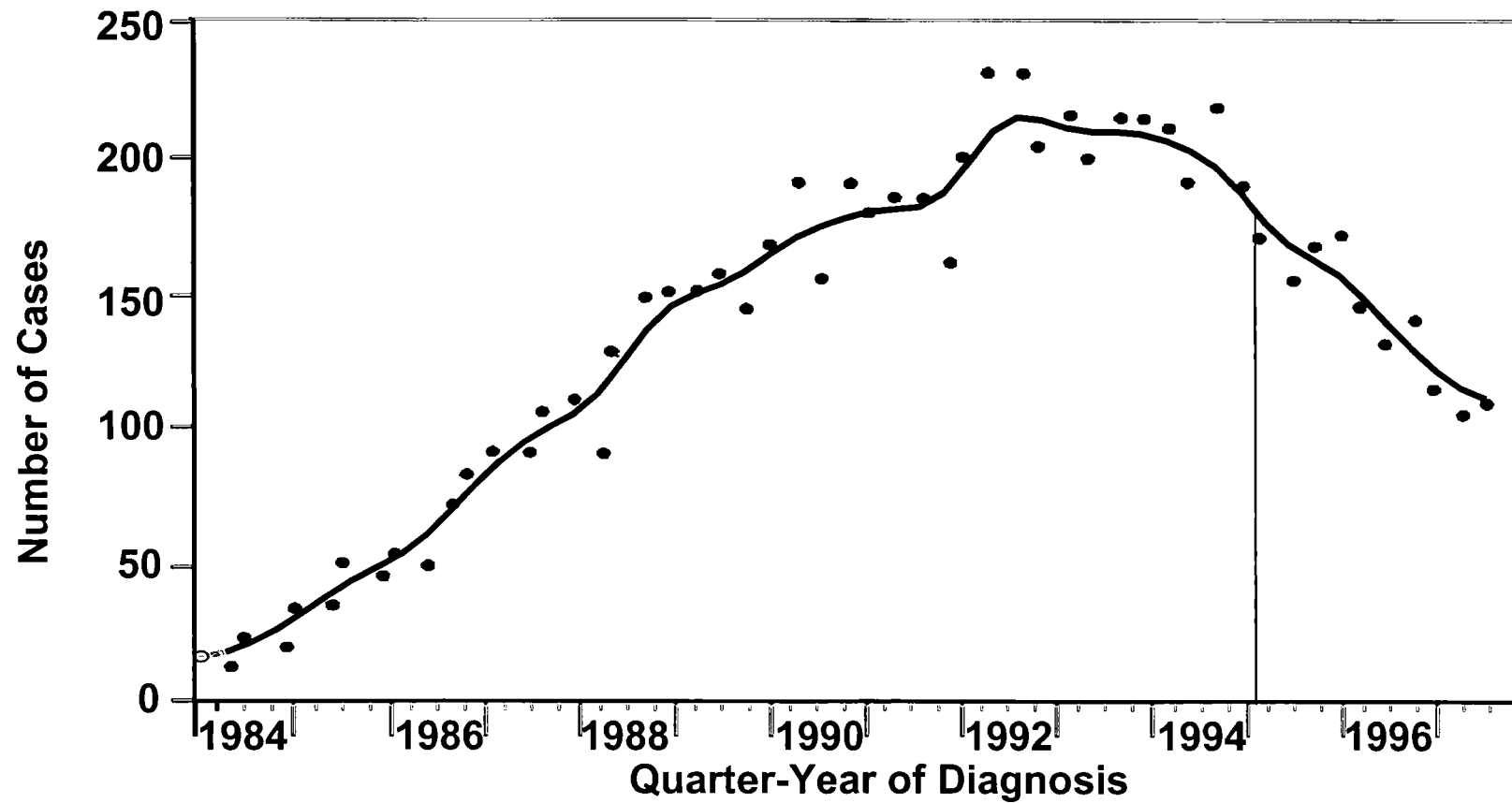
AIDS Cases by Exposure Category

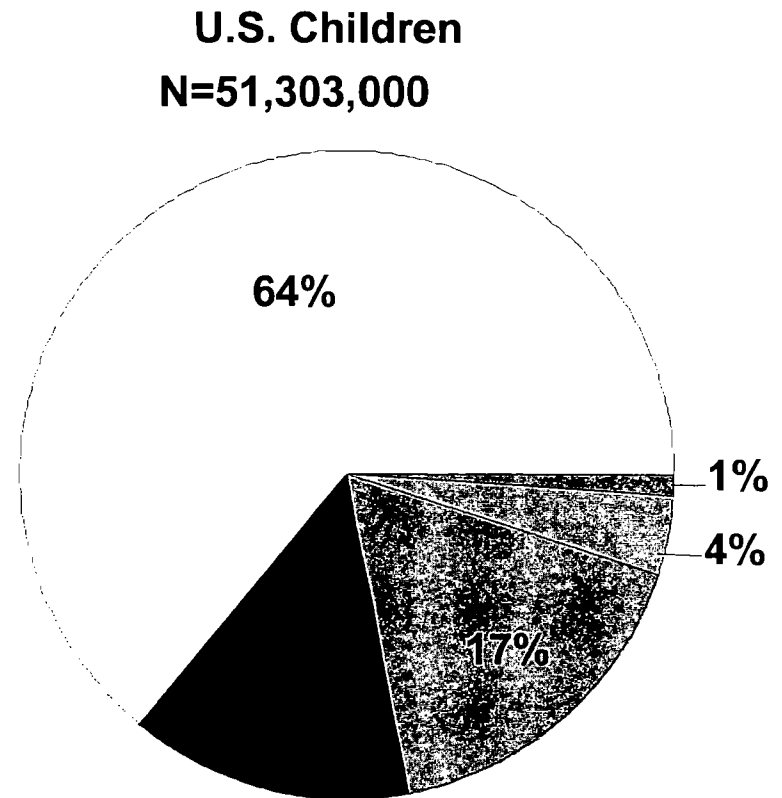
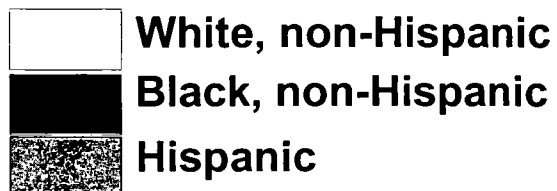
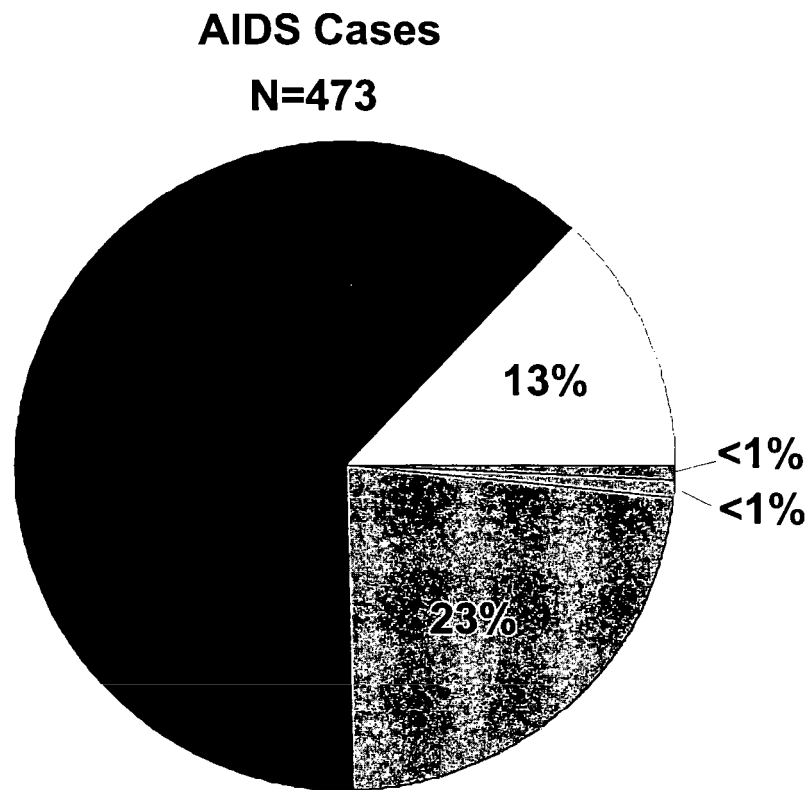
Perinatally Acquired AIDS Cases

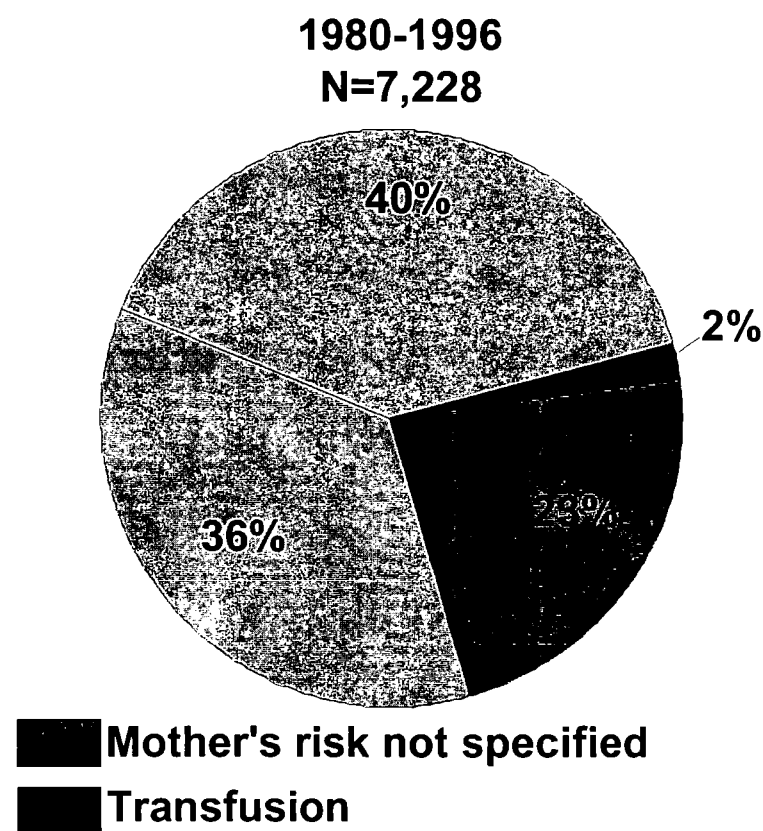
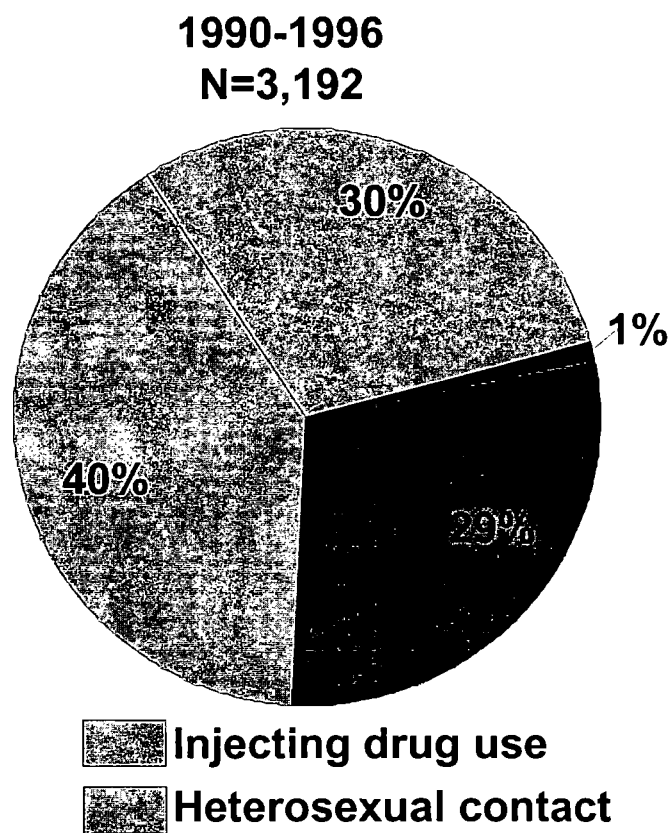
AIDS Cases in Children <13 Years of Age Reported in 1997

Mother's Exposure Category for Perinatally Acquired AIDS

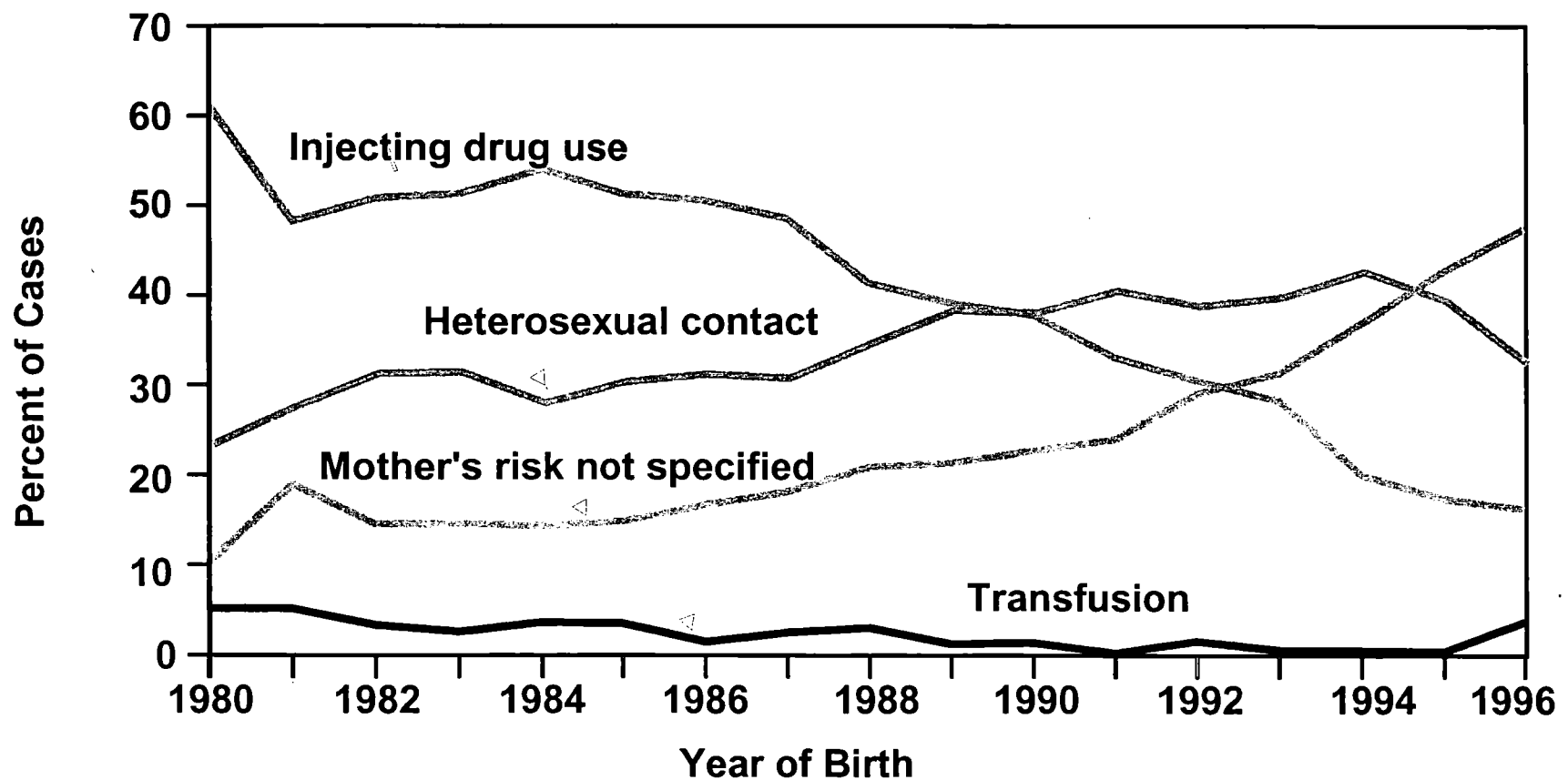
by Year of Child's Birth, 1990-1996 and Cumulative

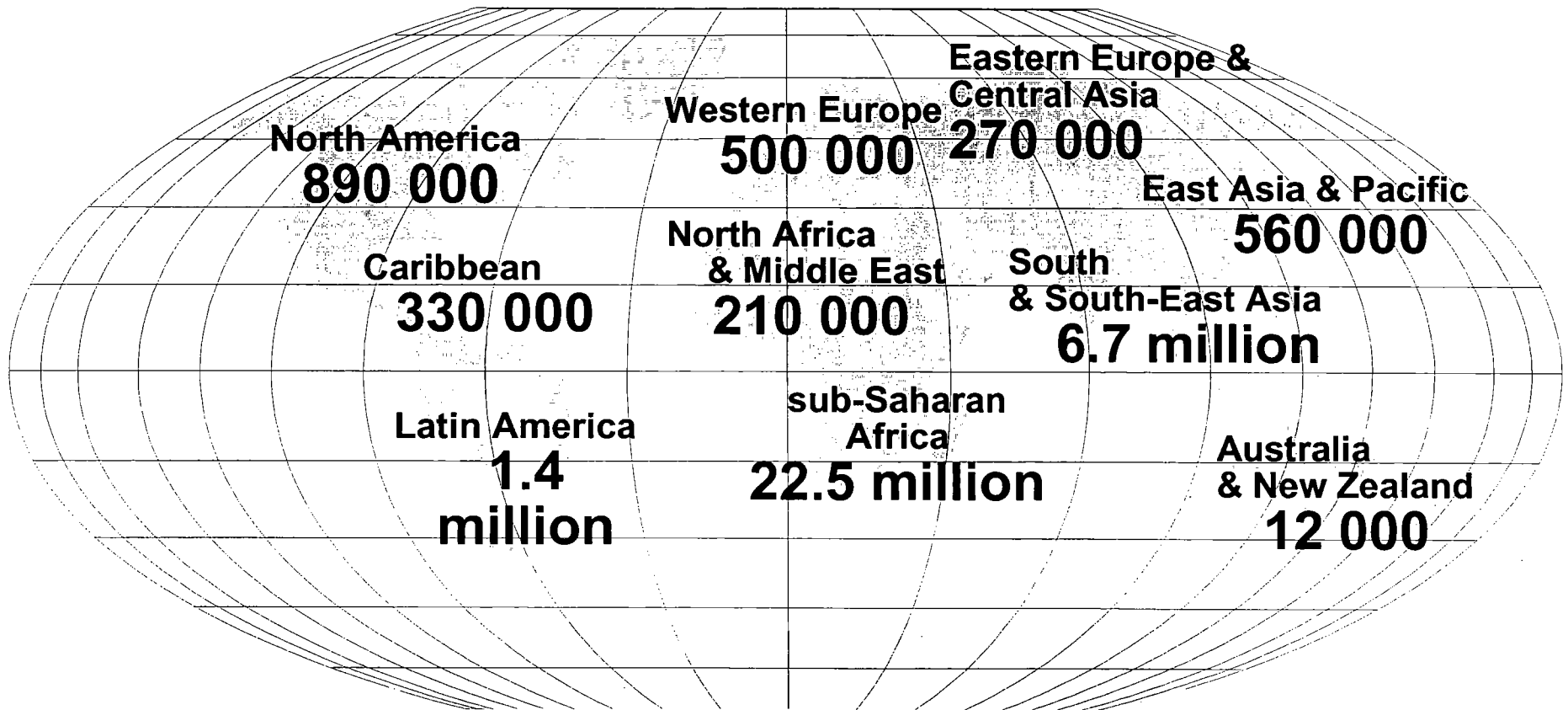

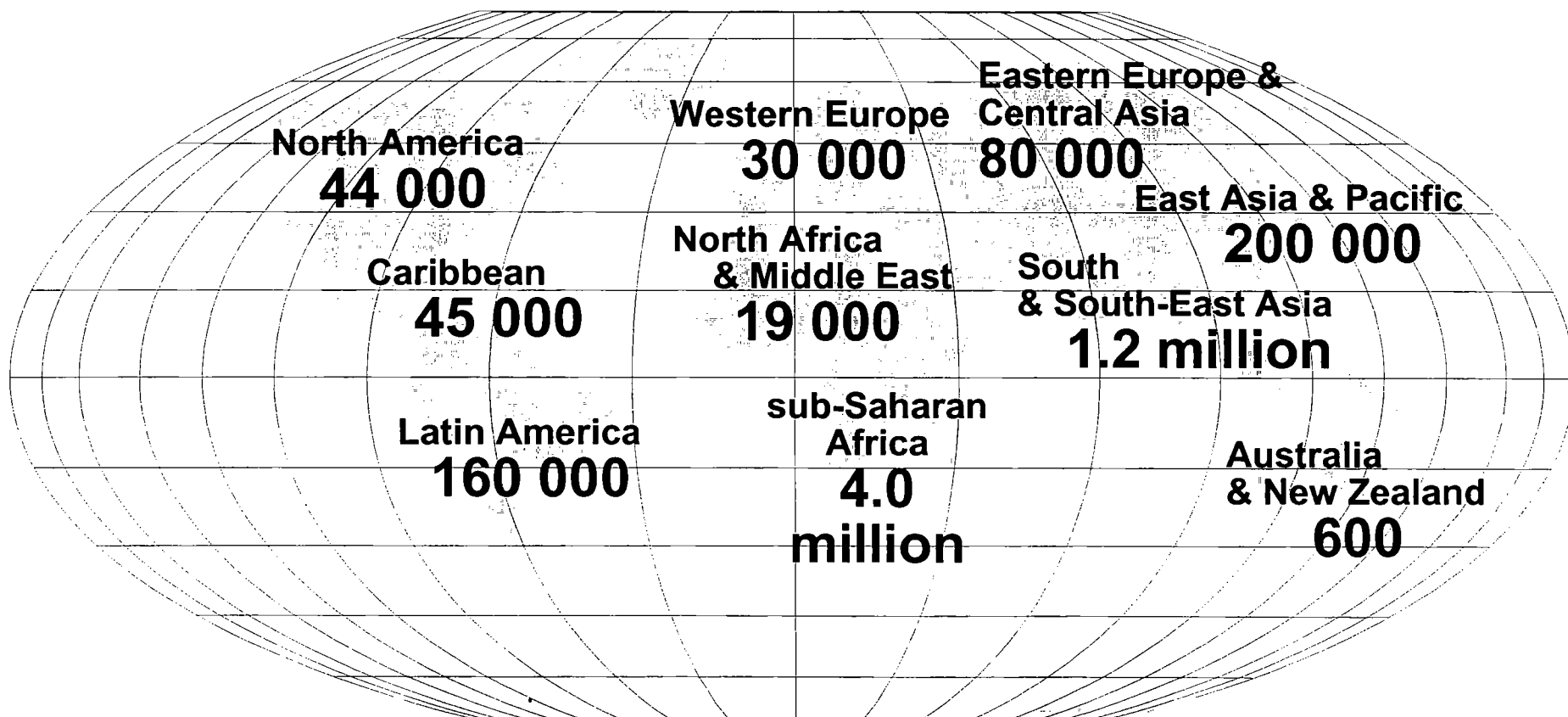

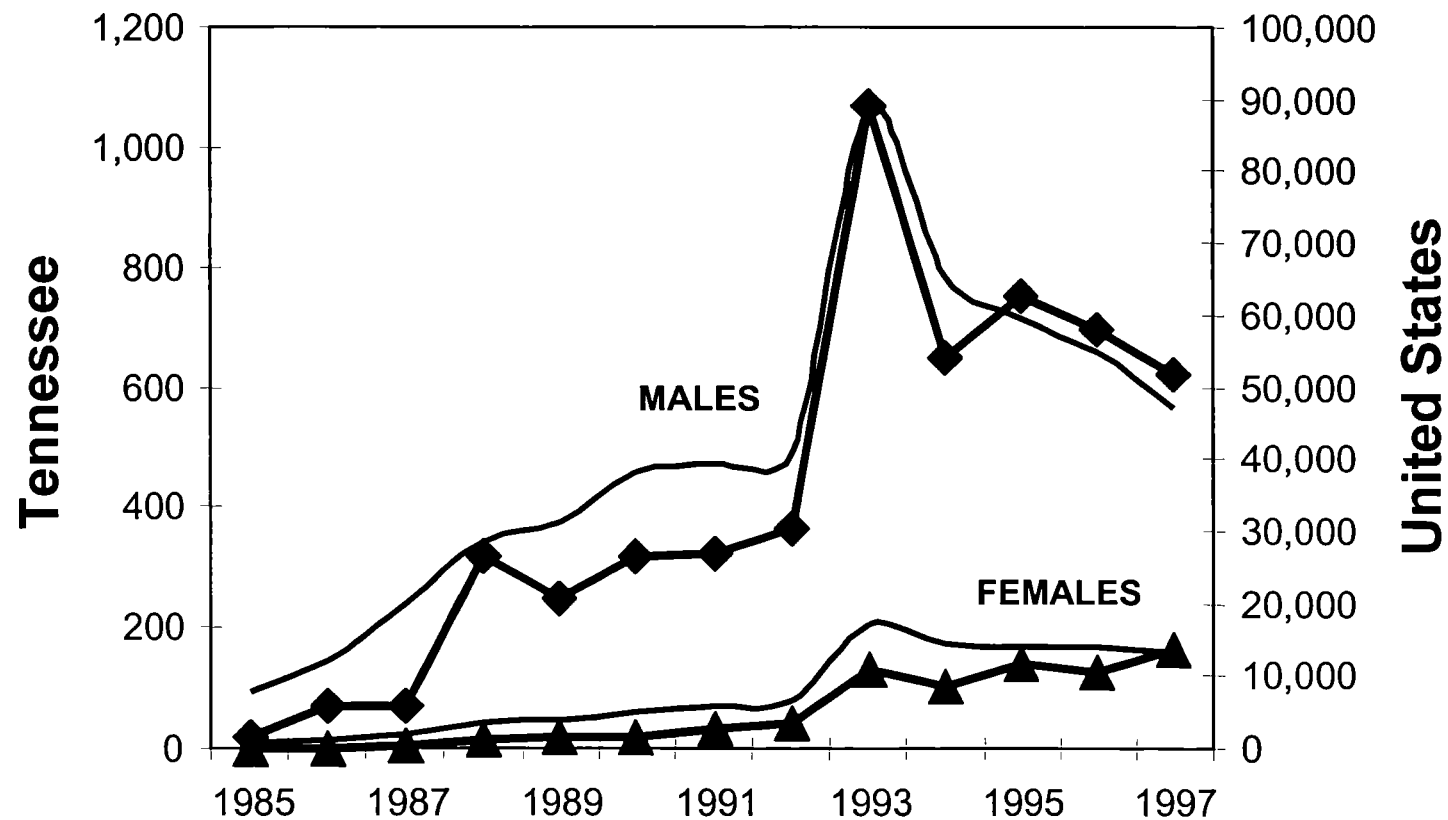

New AIDS Cases by Year of Dx

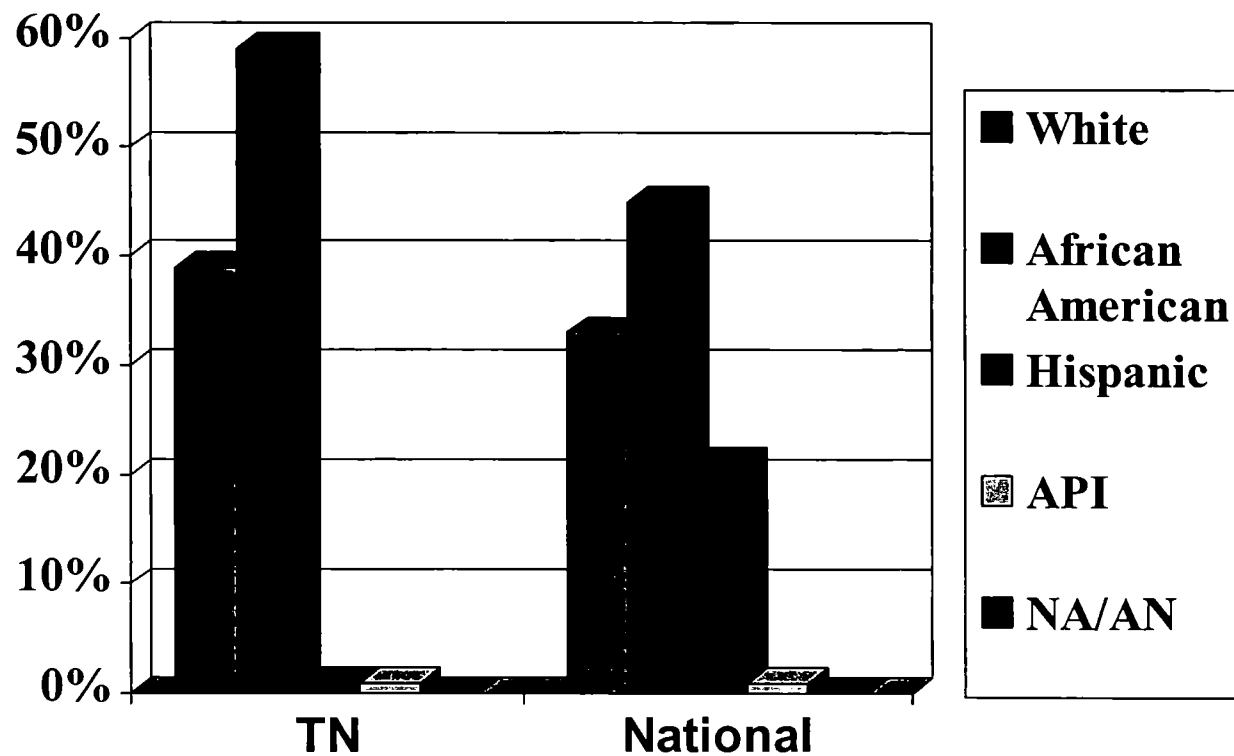

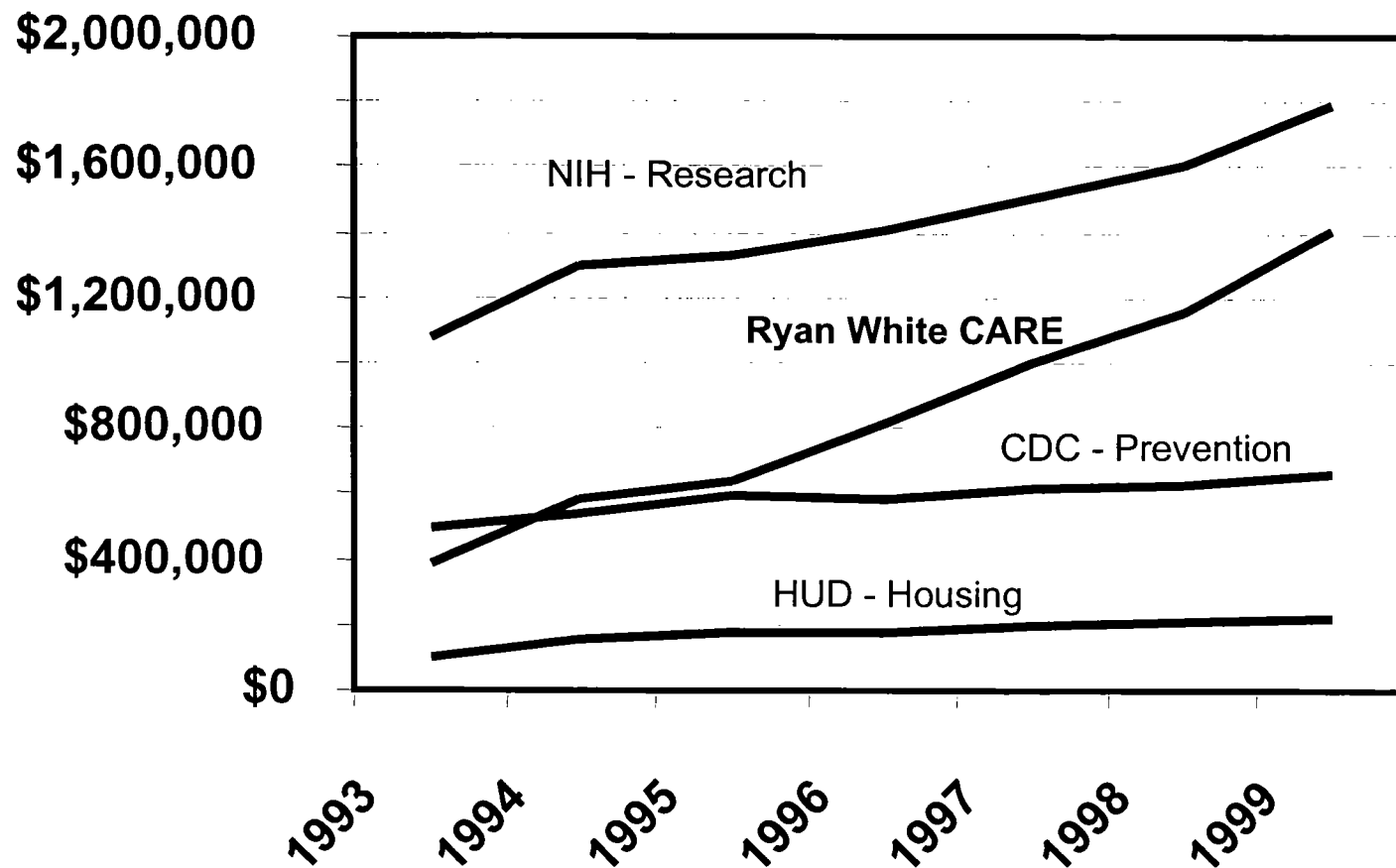

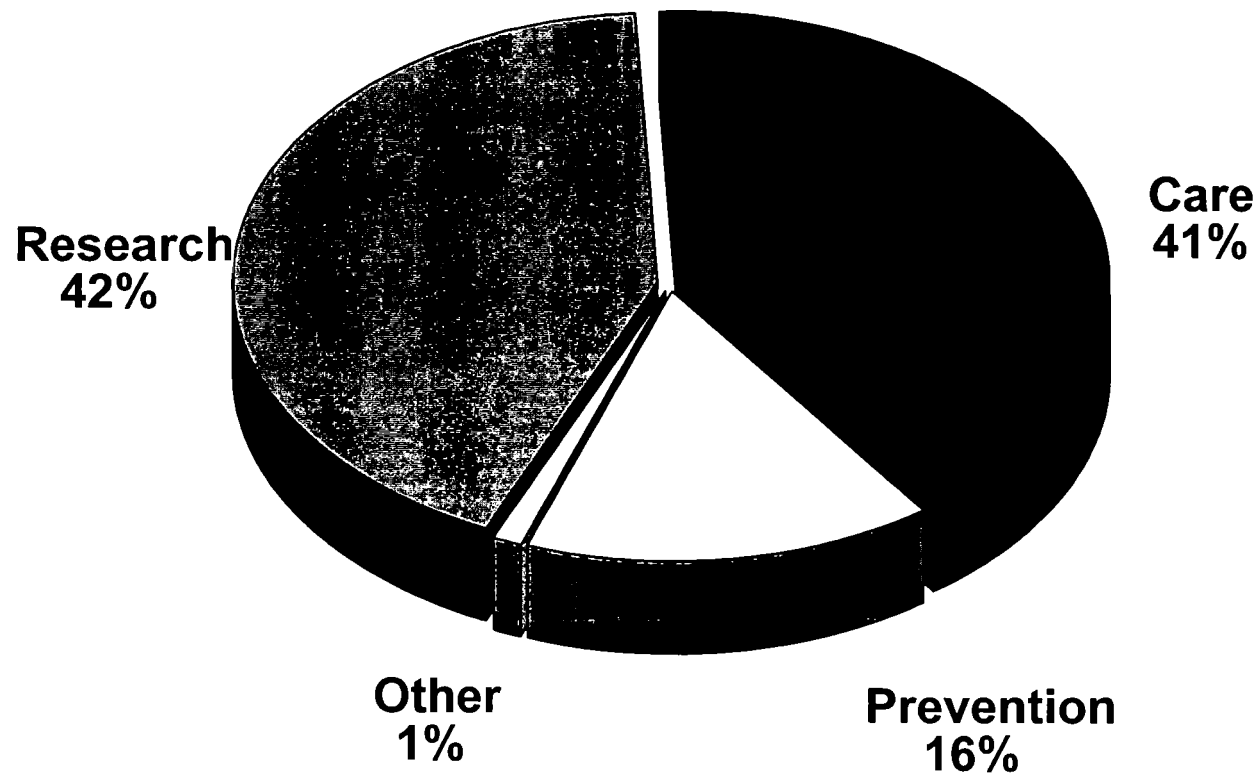
Federal Spending on AIDS and HIV

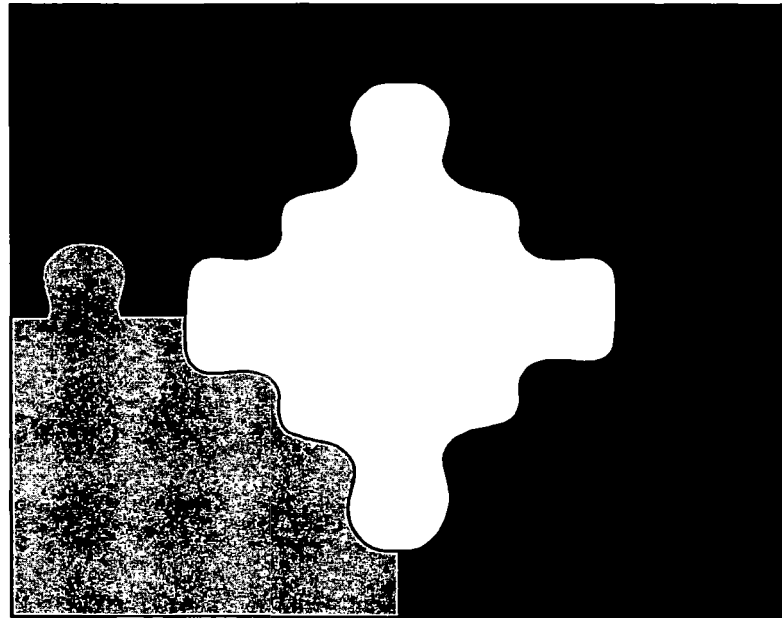

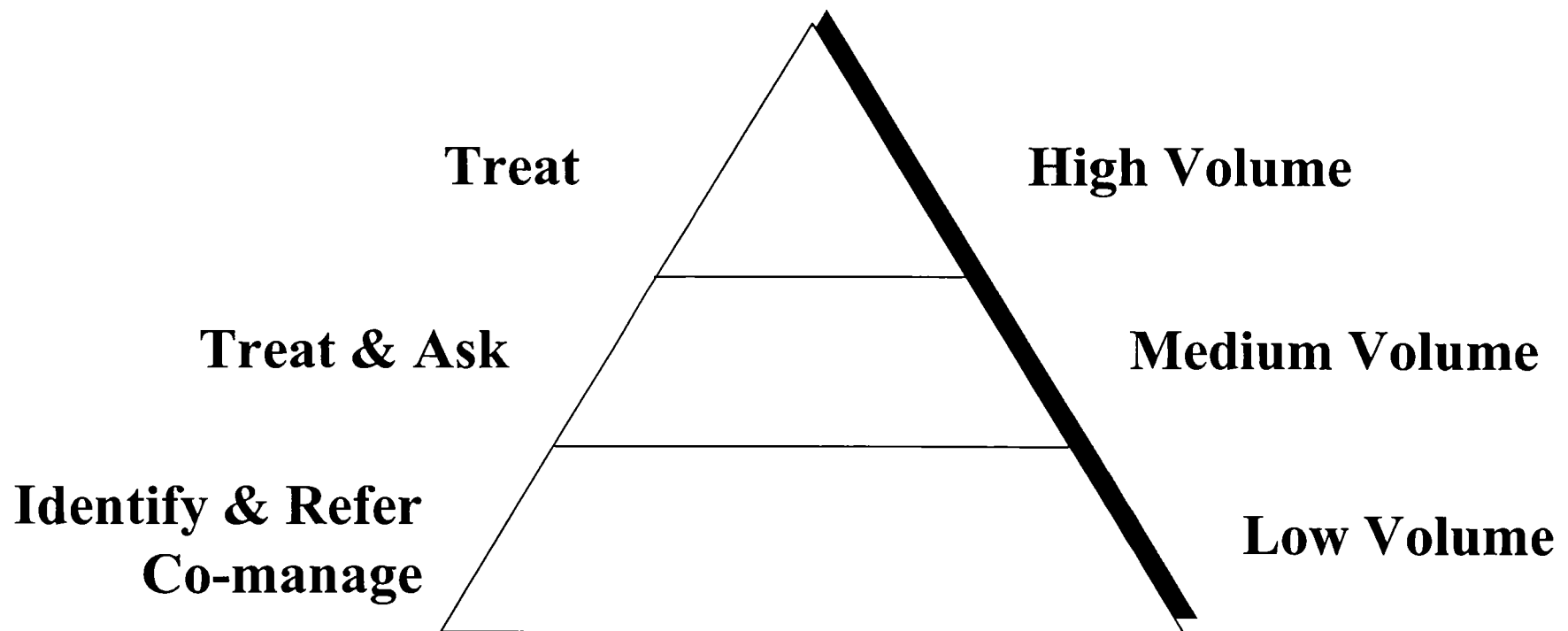

Stigmatization

- Spousal abuse
- Rejection
- Losing Children (particularly if drugs are involved)

Serving Women & Children: The Challenges

Identification and Dx

- Women may not know they are at risk
- Health care providers need better training in risk assessments
- Women with children frequently de-prioritize their own health care needs to those of their family
- Symptoms in women not unique to HIV

Serving Women & Children: The Challenges

Treatment

- Pathogenesis of HIV different in women
- Implications of these differences on tx strategies still being worked out
- Complicated tx regimens particularly difficult to manage when children are involved
- Side effects of medications are less tolerable to women struggling to care for others

- Scientific validation of needle exchange programs
- Increasing awareness of risk

- new testing technologies increase likelihood of awareness of status, even at delivery
- We now know ZDV to newborns and C-sections can significantly reduce HIV transmission to children

- school-based programs work for those who are in school
- condom availability does not promote sexual activity
- gay and bisexual young men have special needs

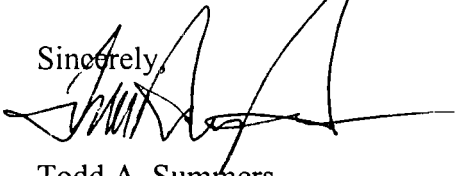

Todd Summers Deputy Director, Office of National AIDS Policy
Todd Summers was appointed by the President on August 4, 1997 as the Deputy Director of the White House Office of National AIDS Policy, serving under its Director, Sandra L. Maman.

He recently, Mr. Summers served as the Executive Director of the AIDS Housing Corporation in Boston, Massachusetts. As one of its founders, Summers developed the organization into a nationally recognized technical assistance provider and advocate for assessing the supported housing needs of people living with HIV/AIDS. Under his direction, the agency raised more than \$50 million for innovative housing and supportive care programs for people with HIV/AIDS and other special needs.

He has served in leadership positions in both the private and public sector with numerous organizations, including co-chair of the Boston Ryan White HIV Service Planning Council, president of the Boston AIDS Consortium, executive committee member of Cities Calling Emergency AIDS Relief (CAEAR Coalition), and board member of the National Housing Coalition. He has presented testimony before Congress and the Massachusetts legislature on the housing needs of persons living with HIV/AIDS, led discussions in meetings with cabinet officers, and presented at numerous conferences nationally and internationally.

Mr. Summers has received commendations from the Mayor of Boston, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the Boston City Council, and the Boston Fair Housing Commission. He has authored several publications, books, and articles on AIDS and housing issues.

Mr. Summers is a 1982 graduate of Middlebury College in Vermont, where he received a Bachelor of Arts in religion.

Martha I. Buitrago, MD, Assistant Research Professor, Yale School of Medicine, Infectious Disease Section of the Department of Medicine.

Dr. Buitrago received her medical training at the Rosario University School of Medicine in Columbia, South America with subsequent residencies and fellowships at Mount Sinai Hospital, Jamaica, New York; Albert Einstein School of Medicine, New York; and Yale University, New Haven, Connecticut.

Dr. Buitrago is an Associate Member of the Infectious Diseases Society of America. She has published numerous publications and extensively lectured on the care of patients with HIV/AIDS.

Dr. Buitrago has participated in the New Haven Community Health Care and Needle Exchange Project to provide this vital service to the underserved in that community. In addition to her clinical responsibilities at Yale, she also provides clinical care to the HIV-infected inmates at the Connecticut Department of Corrections.

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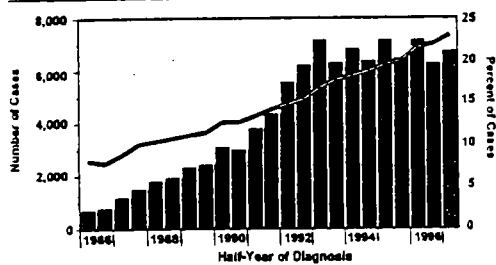

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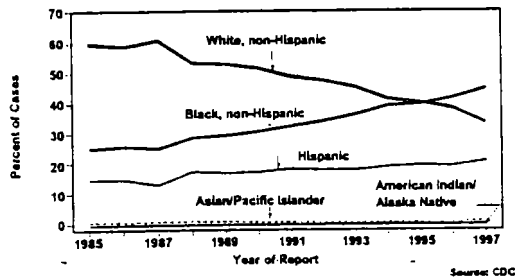
AIDS Incidence* for Women and Percentage of Adult Cases

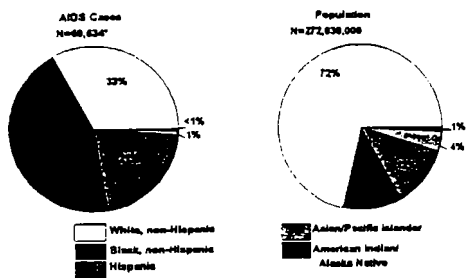

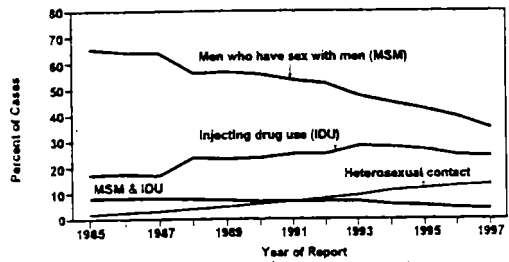

AIDS Cases by Race/Ethnicity United States 1997

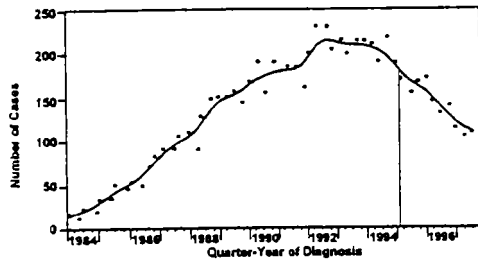


AIDS Cases by Exposure Category



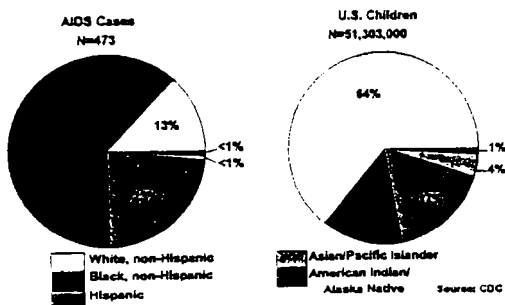

Perinatally Acquired AIDS Cases Children <13 Years



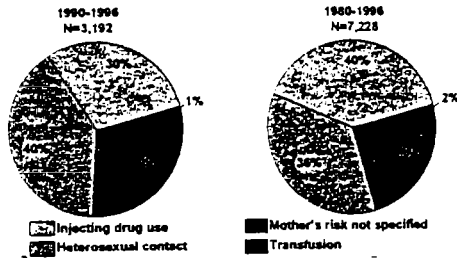

AIDS Cases in Children <13 Years of Age Reported in 1997



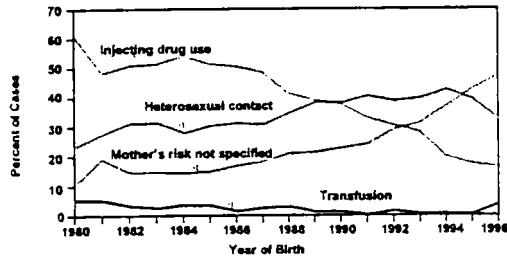

Mother's Exposure Category for Perinatally Acquired AIDS by Year of Child's Birth, 1990-1996 and Cumulative



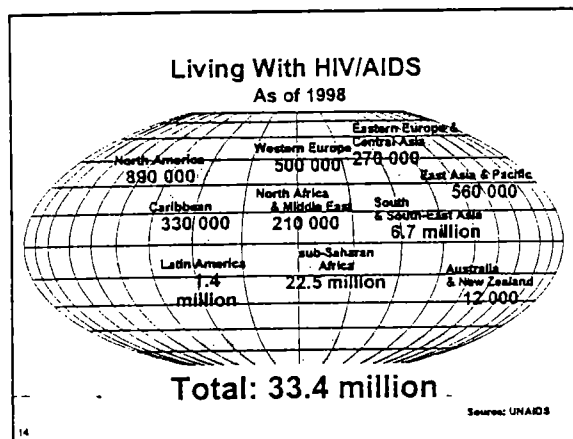

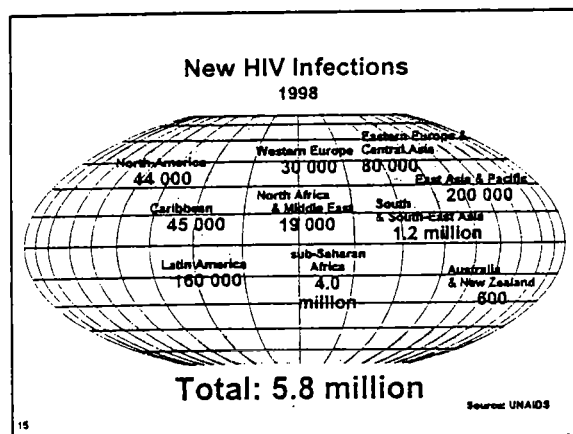
Mother's Exposure Category by Year of Child's Birth Perinatally Acquired AIDS

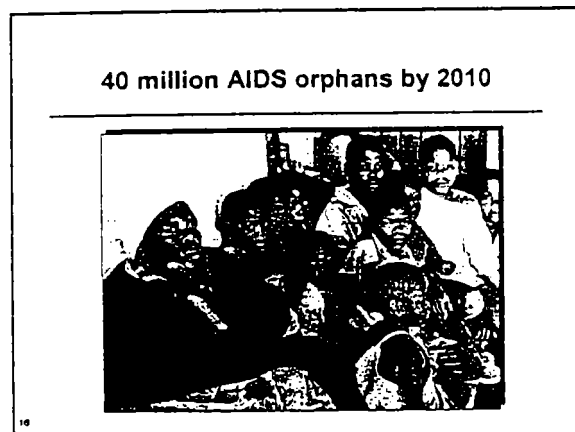

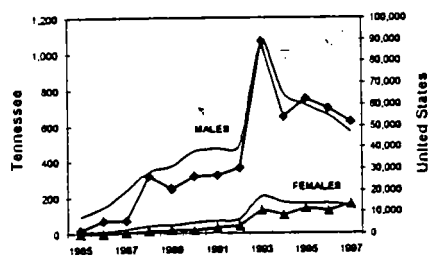

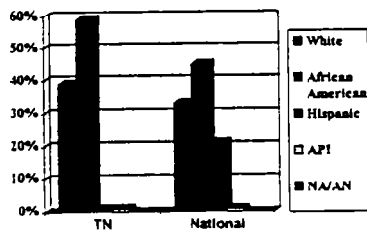
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New AIDS Cases by Year of Dx

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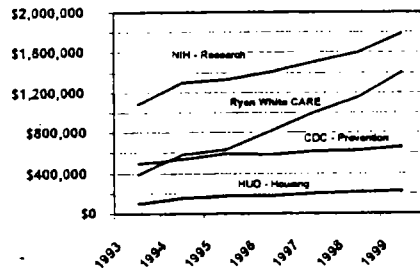

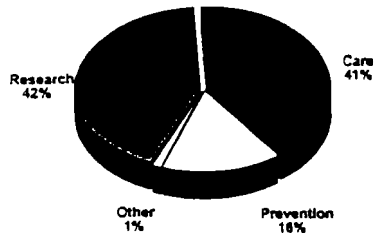

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Serving Women & Children: The Challenges

Stigmatization

- Spousal abuse
- Rejection
- Losing Children (particularly if drugs are involved)
- Translation services important, but must professional and confidential

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Serving Women & Children: The Challenges

Identification and Dx

- Women may not know they are at risk
- Health care providers need better training in risk assessments
- Women with children frequently de-prioritize their own health care needs to those of their family
- Symptoms in women not unique to HIV

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Serving Women & Children: The Challenges

Treatment

- Pathogenesis of HIV different in women
- Implications of these differences on tx strategies still being worked out
- Complicated tx regimens particularly difficult to manage when children are involved
- Side effects of medications are less tolerable to women struggling to care for others

Prevention for Women

- Scientific validation of needle exchange programs
- Increasing awareness of risk
- ZDV to mothers and newborns, C-sections
- More attention to STDs

Prevention for Children

- voluntary counseling and testing programs work
- new testing technologies increase likelihood of awareness of status, even at delivery
- We now know ZDV to newborns and C-sections can significantly reduce HIV transmission to children

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Serving Women & Children: The Opportunities

Prevention for Youth

- prevention works!
- peer education has been proven to be effective
- school-based programs work for those who are in school
- condom availability does not promote sexual activity
- gay and bisexual young men have special needs

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Serving Women & Children: The Opportunities

Treatment

- Increasing number of women in clinical trials - better understanding of variations in pathogenesis
- Pediatric labeling requirements - better understanding of drug interactions in children
- Newer formulations reduce side-effects and complexity of tx regimens
- Broader support systems through Ryan White CARE Act, and state and local programs

- New initiative on HIV/AIDS in racial and ethnic minorities - \$156 million
- Historic increases in Ryan White CARE Act
- Strong, bipartisan support for the NIH
