Dear Mr. President;

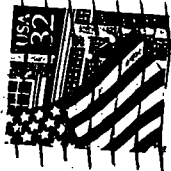

Criminal, not victim

An Orange County judge sent the worst possible signal when she let an Orlando man off with a slap on the wrist after he pleaded no contest to infecting an unsuspecting, underage sex partner with the AIDS virus.

Jerrime Day was charged in 1996, after a 16-year-old girl said she had contracted HIV as the result of intercourse with him. Several women reportedly complained that Day also had failed to tell them about his condition before he had sex with them.

Day's lawyer argued that his fine, upstanding young client simply "didn't know how contagious" HIV was — and therefore needed education, not punishment. Also, he wanted the court to protect Day from malicious future lovers who might falsely claim they did not know he was infected.

The judge, somehow, apparently thought that was logical.

She could have sentenced him to a year in jail. Instead, he got 9½ months of probation, during which time he is to take an AIDS awareness class.

He also is to get written consent from future sex partners, stating they realize he has HIV. Those forms are to be filed with his probation officer.

Once the probation is up, he

Oddly enough, the loudest cry came from the National Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers in Washington — which said it would "humiliate" future sex partners for his probation officer to know he had been sleeping with them.

"It's terrible," a spokesman said potential to cause harm to his potential sexual partners is too great a risk for this."

Indeed, the privacy of a sex partner may be compromised if she reveals her identity. A probation officer probably doesn't know her. But the trade-off might be to save the lives of a lot of other women, who would decline intimacy if they realize he has HIV.

The judge and the association both seem to forget that Day was not the victim. He

When a person infects another with HIV, that almost certainly results in death. At best, it is manslaughter. At worst, it could be considered murder.

If Day infects enough people, arguably, he could be considered a killer.

Dear Mr. President

This letter is relative to a major concern I have relative to the treatment people with HIV/AIDS are getting .

To the point of this letter.

I have a 32 year old son who has AIDS. Dennis was in the process of completing his last semester at the Bastyr School of Naturopathic Medicine in Seattle when he became gravely ill. His prognosis was less than 18 months. This forced him to leave school and not complete his training to become a naturopathic physician. He had sustained cognitive brain damage which left him unable to continue. The University, that year did award him an honorary doctorate, however, because he was unable to graduate, he cannot practice. All this after 22 years of schooling. After high school, 5 years at Northeastern, 1 year at the University of Massachusetts, and 3 1/2 years at Bastyr.

Because of the bleak prognosis, he was told by the physicians treating him he would die within the next 18 months. With student loans of over \$200,00.00 due, and a short future and no source of income, he sold his life insurance policy for \$28,000.00 to plan the life he had left. He purchased a boat and moved to San Diego where HIV/AIDS research and treatment was some of the best in the country.

This turned out to be a good move as the new Triple AIDS cocktail in the form of Protease Inhibitors was made available to him. As a California recipient of Welfare and Federal disability, he is earning \$600.00 a month and his health care is covered. Soon his disease was beginning to abate. His T-Cell count has risen from 13 to over 100 and his Viral Count has dropped to undetectable levels.

Today, 3 years later, he is much improved. His mental status is back to normal. He continues to live on his small boat, take the 25-30 pills a day provided by welfare and receive excellent health care. His income is limited to the \$600.00 per month. He has been advised that if he should find employment he will be shut off. He continues to be hounded by those who made the student loans.

We now have a son who is highly educated, one semester from becoming a physician, with no income and the rest of his life to plan with, no source of income or he would lose access the life-sustaining drugs and health care.

I am looking for your support in the congress to submit legislation to help a whole generation of young men and women who had a death sentence and now thanks to research have an opportunity at new life.

HIV/AIDS research has produced drugs that, when used, properly, will keep the virus in check and allow a potential good life span and individuals to contribute to our society. This will never happen if we stifle their ability to earn and support themselves.

At a minimum, we need to consider, maintaining their health care benefit while allowing them to go on with their lives. In Dennis' case we have a young man who can give back by treating patients himself. Except for volunteering his time, at present, he is simply depressed and faces a future of dependency and loneliness.

This is a recurring scenario, and needs to be addressed. Only congress can help these unfortunate young people who have a lot to offer.

The purpose of this letter is to see if I could spark some interest in you to at least begin to look at this issue that affects thousands with HIV/AIDS in this country.

ASIAN AND PACIFIC ISLANDER STATEMENT OF SOLIDARITY AND SUPPORT FOR THE CALL FOR A NATIONAL STATE OF EMERGENCY ON HIV AND AIDS IN THE AFRICAN AMERICAN COMMUNITY

We, the undersigned Asians and Pacific Islanders, express our solidarity and support for the Congressional Black Caucus' call for a national state of emergency on HIV and AIDS in the African American community. As leaders in HIV prevention and services in our own Asian and Pacific Islander communities, we want to add our voices to this call for increased governmental and public action. We do so not to overlook or minimize the need for similar actions, services and resources for HIV and AIDS prevention and services in our Asian and Pacific Islander communities but because we believe that refocusing government and public attention and resources on HIV and AIDS will benefit all our communities and the nation's public health.

In particular, we strongly believe that increased funding and resources for HIV prevention and client services that are culturally and linguistically appropriate are vital for their success in all communities. We also strongly support the specific focus on HIV prevention, care, treatment and support services for gay men at risk for HIV and AIDS. Nationally, nearly 70% of the AIDS cases being reported in our Asian and Pacific and Islander communities are among gay and bisexual Asian and Pacific Islander men. At the same time, we support the development and implementation of targeted programs for women, youth, transgendered individuals, recent immigrants and refugees and other populations at highest risk for HIV and AIDS. We also support the increased coordination and linkage between HIV prevention and treatment programs and substance abuse and mental health services. Finally, we strongly support a comprehensive plan, accompanied by sufficient government funding, to conduct both clinical and behavioral research through research projects that are based in the community and involve community agencies and researchers of color as partners.

HIV and AIDS has long been a crisis in our communities of color. We share and join the urgency of the Congressional Black Caucus in their call for a declaration of a national state of emergency and renewed government and public action on HIV and AIDS. Many in our communities have still not received basic HIV prevention interventions that are culturally appropriate and effective. Those who are living with HIV and AIDS in our communities continue to face cultural, linguistic, social, economic, political and legal barriers to accessing care and services.

As Asians and Pacific Islanders, we join in this call for real and substantive change and significantly increased investment by our federal, state and local governments and by the public in HIV and AIDS prevention and care that will effectively reach our communities.

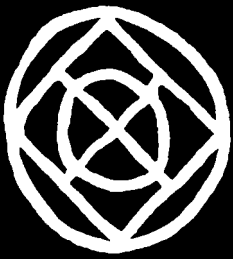

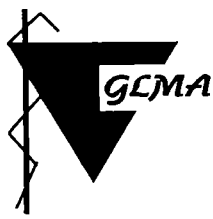

Dear Drs. Gayle and Hughes:

We're not sure if you are aware of a recent Federal Appeals Court decision in which the CDC guidelines on HIV-positive health care workers are specifically quoted to justify discrimination against HIV-positive health care workers. In the *ESTATE OF MAURO v. BURGESS MEDICAL CENTER* (United States Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit, February 25, 1998), the court found that the a surgical technician was automatically ineligible for ADA protection because he performed "exposure-prone procedures" as defined by the CDC's 1991 guidelines.

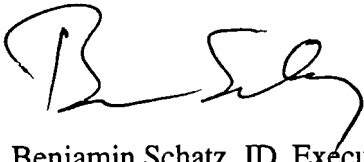
The court ignored expert testimony that the technician presented an extraordinarily remote risk to patients, ruling instead that, "We must defer to the medical judgment expressed in the Report of the Centers for Disease Control in evaluating whether Mauro posed a direct threat in the essential functions of his job."

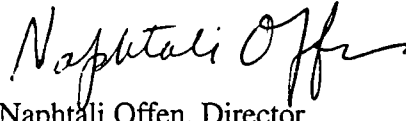
This dreadful decision makes urgent the need to speed up the review process in drafting new guidelines. It also puts to rest any doubts expressed by Dan Riedford at the February 11th working group that the CDC guidelines have not had an impact on judicial decisions.

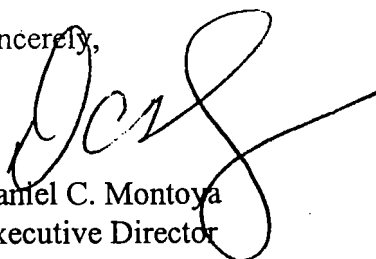
