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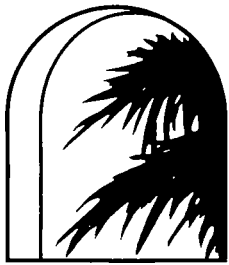

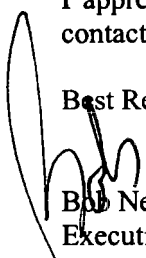

As winter and the holidays are quickly approaching, **I want to include you** in an effort I have spent much time and energy on over this past year. I have worked with Dolores Street Community Services (DSCS), a non-profit organization serving the homeless and people with AIDS in San Francisco, for almost two years. We have recently celebrated our 15th anniversary, marking a history of continuously providing **high-quality and effective housing, food and support services** in culturally sensitive environments to over *2000 homeless and at-risk individuals each year*. Our programs are highly respected and continue to receive praise and awards throughout the city.

Even as we deliver these preeminent services to the needy, **we continue to have one major deficiency** – funding. Each month *we scramble to meet cash flow needs, cope with an operating deficit, and house our services in inadequate buildings we do not own*. This past month we were faced with the possibility of closing one of our shelters and placing 30 people back on the streets. *With cutbacks we have saved the shelter for the time being. What is DSCS doing to address this?* We operate with a barebones staff, committed to keeping costs as low as possible. We actively solicit private and public foundations and funding sources. In addition, we maintain government contracts that provide over 60% of our funding. We are constantly seeking new and creative funding sources and partnerships on the local, state and national level.

These efforts are never enough to maintain the level of services the community requires. We truly need people like you to help us. I know there are many inquiries and drains on your personal finances; however, **I make a personal request** that you contribute to this organization that I have also committed much time and resources to. I believe that the work DSCS is doing is deserving of your support - I hope you will agree. Any financial contribution would be most appreciated. I have enclosed an envelope for your donation. Please sit down and write a check today. You should know that *85% of funds received go directly into our programs that shelter, feed and support the homeless*. 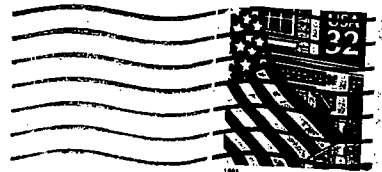

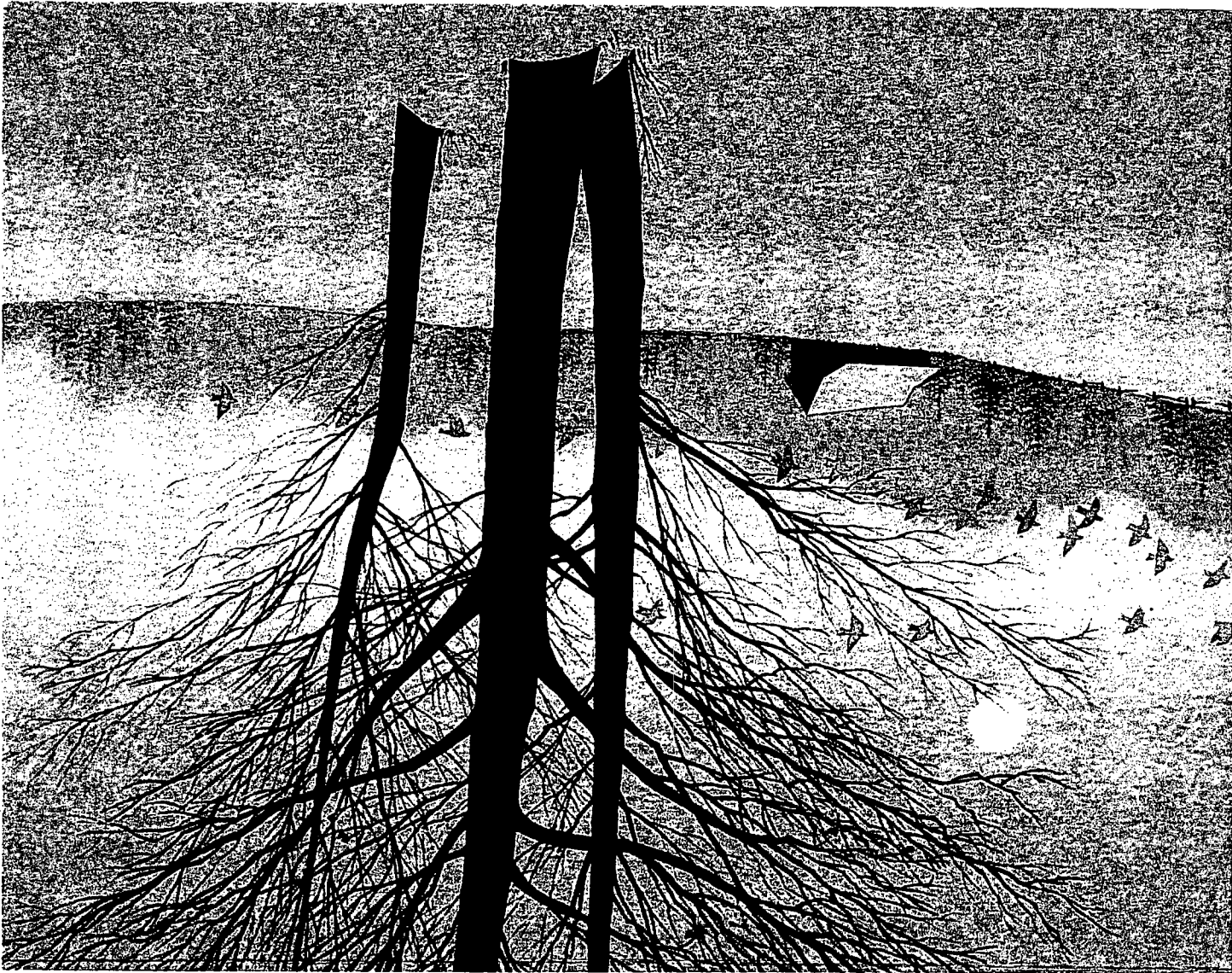

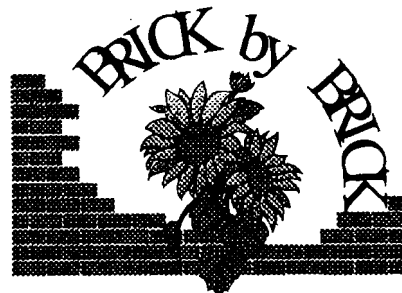

Sunflower House Opens

Renovations are finally complete on Sunflower House, a 20-unit apartment building for families living with HIV/AIDS. Starting as an abandoned building, Sunflower House will soon provide safe and affordable housing to 20 families, including 40 children. Providing housing is more than just bricks and mortar; to be truly successful, we must also build community among the families and a support structure to help residents become more self-sufficient. Carol Simmons, LGSW, recently joined Building Futures as our Clinical Services Coordinator. She will work at Sunflower House to provide family-centered case management and coordinate on-site activities such as financial planning, nutritional workshops, job training and child development activities.

Sunflower House Reception December 10

On Thursday, December 10, 1998, Building Futures will host a reception at NationsBank to celebrate the opening of Sunflower House. The completion of Sunflower House would not have been possible without financial support from our partners: the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD); the Washington AIDS Partnership; the Fannie Mae Foundation; NationsBank and other private donors. The creative talent of our architect, Eric Colbert and Associates and the renovation and construction expertise of Edmar Construction created the structure. 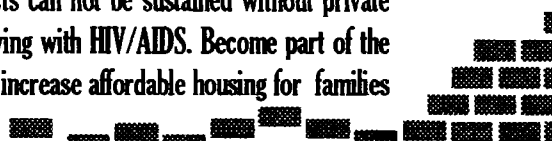
Daffodil House Outings

Each month volunteers from Greater DC Cares coordinate an activity for the Daffodil Kids and other neighborhood children. Excursions have included trips to the Baltimore Aquarium and the Children's Museum, ice skating outings and visits to water parks and pumpkin patches. These outings provide valuable respite time for the mothers of Daffodil House kids and by including the neighborhood children, we demonstrate our commitment to the community as a whole.



Rental Assistance Program Breaks 100

Starting with a client base of 16 in 1994, the rental assistance program now serves more than 100 individuals and families. Participants in this program contribute 30% of their income toward their rent and Building Futures pays the balance of the fair market rent. Participants report that they are often unable to access all the supports services that they need. In response to this, Building Futures hired Yasmin Lluveras, LGSW, as a Case Management Coordinator to work with the them to increase their access to all support services including job training, mental health services and medical services. Yasmin spends nearly half of her time in the field, visiting clients in their home helping to assess their needs and to obtain necessary services.



Building Futures Wins Excellence In Non-Profit Management Award

Building Futures was recently recognized for its management and program administration. In May, the Washington Council of Agencies (WCA) presented Building Futures with the "Excellence in Nonprofit Management" award. This annual award contest included a review of agency records and interviews with Board of Directors and staff to access organizational and management issues. A WCA Winner's Workshop was held in July where Building Futures shared some of its best practices.

AIDS Medicaid Demonstration - Talking Points (Zonana, HHS: 690-6343)**12/4/97**

Background: In April, the Vice President directed the Health Care Financing Administration and the Office of National AIDS Policy to determine the feasibility of establishing a demonstration to permit earlier Medicaid coverage for HIV positive individuals, and to report back within 30 days.

TPs:

- • Clearly the analysis was complicated and took longer than we expected. The question is far more complex than many believed it to be. Perhaps our past successes in AIDS - most notably, the rapid development and approval of life-prolonging treatments - made us too optimistic.
- • After rigorous analysis of the many complex policy issues, including costs, HCFA and ONAP are not able to determine a revenue neutral method to establish a demonstration project in this area.
- • The Administration remains strongly committed to making sure that as many HIV-positive individuals receive appropriate drug therapy as possible.

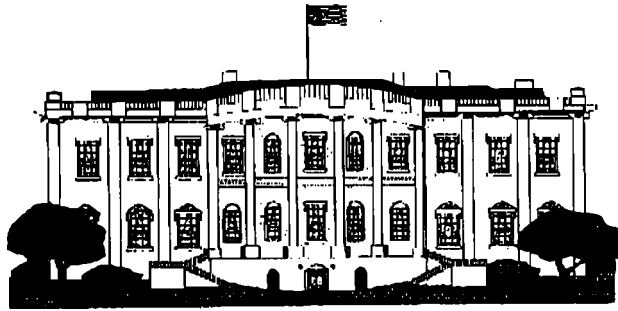
The President recently signed a fiscal 1998 appropriations bill that provides \$285.5 million for the AIDS Drug Assistance Program, a 71% increase from FY1997.

Medicaid is the largest single payer for AIDS services and AIDS drug therapies in the country. In 1997, federal Medicaid expenditures for people living with HIV/AIDS totaled \$1.8 billion, including nearly \$500 million for AIDS drugs.

- • The Administration will continue to work with Congress, patient advocates, States, pharmaceutical manufacturers, and others to find innovative ways to expand coverage for low-income individuals living with HIV.
