FLORIDA: More HIV/AIDS Patients To Receive Free Medications

Increased federal support for state-level AIDS Drug Assistance Programs will allow Florida to provide expensive HIV/AIDS medications to more low-income persons this year, the St. Petersburg Times reports. Florida will see a 70% increase in federal support for its ADAP effort, rising to \$30.3 million from \$17.9 million last year. The added funds will allow the state "to provide drugs for as many as 1,200 more people" with HIV or AIDS, according to Joe May, manager of the ADAP effort for the Florida Department of Health (Landry, 4/17). The federal funds are provided under Title II of the Ryan White Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency Act, which provides HIV/AIDS care to low-income, uninsured and underinsured individuals affected by the epidemic. Federal health officials announced this week that funding for ADAP would grow 71% this year, totalling \$285.5 million (Kaiser Daily HIV/AIDS Report, 4/15).

Waiting List Woes

"This is a big increase for Florida in terms of the AIDS Drug Assistance Program," said state health department spokesperson Pam Potter-Ricco. Currently the Florida program provides medication assistance to 7,200 people, but has a waiting list of 2,000, the St. Petersburg Times reports. "We don't think this will meet our ultimate need," said May, who explained that there are "a significant number of people who didn't try to access [the] program before because there wasn't much available." Health officials expect the waiting list to grow as "more people are likely to apply for help now that drugs are available that can substantially improve the quality of life for people with HIV and AIDS." In Florida, beneficiaries of the program must be at or below 200% of the federal poverty level, be ineligible for Medicaid and be uninsured.

Important Benefits

Drugs provided under ADAP allows "patients to stay healthier longer, be more productive and basically stay out of the hospital," said Liz Disharoon of Pinellas Care Clinic in St. Petersburg. She added, "The medicines are expensive, but we're seeing people going back to work, and we're seeing people gaining weight and seeing people doing much better than they were two years ago" (Landry, St. Petersburg Times, 4/17). RYAN WHITE CARE ACT: HHS Announces \$520 Million In Grants

Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala yesterday announced \$520 million in formula grant awards for 1998 to improve health care and support services for people living with HIV/AIDS. The funds also include a record \$285.5 million earmarked for state AIDS Drug Assistance Programs, a 71% increase over 1997 levels. The grants are provided under Title II of the Ryan White Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency Act, which provides HIV/AIDS care to low-income, uninsured and underinsured individuals affected by the epidemic. In announcing the grants, Shalala said, "The Ryan White CARE Act brings help and hope to thousands of Americans living with HIV. ... These grants will go a long way toward providing life-sustaining assistance to thousands of men, women and children."

Substantial ADAP Increase

Federal support for state AIDS Drug Assistance Programs will grow by \$118.5 million in 1998, making medications and other treatments available to an estimated 108,000 low-income patients with HIV/AIDS. Dr. Claude Earl Fox, acting administrator of the Health Resources and Services Administration, said, "At any one time, an estimated 55,000 people living with HIV are receiving the life-sustaining drugs they need through the Title II-funded ADAP program. About 87,000 people received ADAP benefits in FY 1997."

Big State Winners

States receiving the largest portion of the HIV/AIDS grants announced yesterday include: California, \$73.6 million; **Florida, \$53.8 million**; New York, \$87.8 million; Pennsylvania, \$16.9 million; Texas, \$35.1 million and Puerto Rico, \$16.7 million. According to HHS, since the CARE Act was first funded in FY 1991, more than \$1.7 billion in Title II grants have been awarded to the states (HHS release, 4/14). (Back to Contents)

Dear Sarah:

Thank you for calling the other day. As promised I am sending you the schedule for Sandy's visit, April 19-20. She and I have discussed it and it is similar to the original one from the date which was postponed. All key agencies are involved in the day. A community planning committee has assisted me in developing the schedule. On Monday, April 20, consumer and provider representatives will attend the small group meetings in the morning. A brief press interview is scheduled prior to the lunch. At the lunch, about 35 community leaders will meet with Sandy. These include agency executives, health department managers, and EMA Planning Council, Ryan White Title II, and Prevention Planning Co-Chairs. Sandy is scheduled to speak briefly at the lunch (maybe 10 minutes). It may be helpful to the group for her to discuss the status of AIDS appropriations for FY 99. But this is up to her.

The lunch is followed by a Press Conference. Again, Sandy will be invited to make introductory remarks and then take questions. Following the Press Conference is the Public Presentation. Here, as I have suggested before, it would be helpful to our community if Sandy could speak about the following: the President's AIDS agenda, the role of the National Advisory Council, major Administration goals, and one or two key issues (e.g., status of needle exchange). If time permits, I will accompany Sandy on a brief tour of an AIDS residential facility following the Public Presentation. She will then be taken to the airport.

On Sunday, April 19, it is my understanding Sandy will be picked up at the Jacksonville Airport around noon the relatives she will be staying with. Please confirm this. I have set time aside on Sunday evening for Sandy and I to possible meet with the AMA president who is also visiting. Also, for her and I to review the schedule. I will need to know where she is staying so I can pick her up for Sunday evening and at what hour. I also need the address so I can pick her up on Monday morning, April 20, around 8:30. Any ground transportation during Monday, including the return to the airport, will be provided by my staff. Please let me know her airline and arrival and departure times so we can make local arrangements.

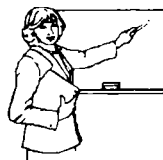

Topical Issues of Concern in Jacksonville, Florida

The following bullet points were gathered from Jeff Bosshart, Administrator of Boulevard Comprehensive Care Center, a colleague of mine from Graduate School. Jeff has been in Jacksonville for approximately 4-5 years.

- Jacksonville is the epicenter of the HIV/AIDS epidemic not only for the 5 county EMA, but for Northeast Florida. Jacksonville, which bills itself as the largest city in America (by land mass) is one and the same with Duval county. The county and city officials are the same. The next largest cities are Daytona Beach, 2 hours south, and Tallahassee, 3 hours to the east.
- For the purposes of Title I, the EMA consists of 4 counties (Baker is excluded as they have had only 17 AIDS cases). For purposes of Title II, all 5 counties are considered the EMA.
- The epidemic is growing fastest among African Americans, women, and substance abusers.
- The County Health Director, Dr. Goldhagen, has suggested dialogue on the opening of a needle exchange program. So far, this has generated a few letters of opposition which have appeared in the Op-Ed page of the daily newspaper.
- The biggest issues of concern to the community is reaching out to those who do not know that they are infected, treated those that are, and securing enough Ryan White funding to pay for this treatment.
- The religious right has been more involved with prevention efforts than with treatment efforts. They want to make sure that the message is a balanced message of condoms and abstinence.
- The Boulevard Comprehensive Care Center (BCCC) treats roughly 1,300 individuals with HIV/AIDS. There are approximately another 500 individuals in the EMA who receive health care through private physicians or other county health departments. Fax sheet on BCCC (which is part of the Duval County Health Department) is included. Note 10-15 new patients per week.
