CONFERENCE REPORT

[To accompany H.R. 2264]

The committee of conference on the disagreeing votes of the two Houses on the amendment of the Senate to the bill (H.R. 2264) "making appropriations for the Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education, and related agencies for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1998, and for other purposes", having met, after full and free conference, have agreed to recommend and do recommend to their respective Houses as follows:

That the House recede from its disagreement to the amendment of the Senate, and agree to the same with an amendment, as follows:

In lieu of the matter stricken and inserted by said amendment, insert:

That the following sums are appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education, and related agencies for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1998, and for other purposes, namely:

TITLE I—DEPARTMENT OF LABOR

EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING ADMINISTRATION

TRAINING AND EMPLOYMENT SERVICES

For necessary expenses of the Job Training Partnership Act, as amended, including the purchase and hire of passenger motor vehicles, the construction, alteration, and repair of buildings and other facilities, and the purchase of real property for training centers as

bills allowing the Social Security Administration to use unexpended fiscal year 1997 funds for fiscal year 1998 activities.

The conference agreement includes a provision proposed by the House and not included in the Senate bill requiring the Secretary of the Treasury to reimburse the trust funds from general revenues for expenditures related to union activities performed on official time. The conferees request that Social Security coordinate with the government-wide reporting effort which will be undertaken by the Office of Personnel Management in consultation with the Office of Management and Budget as required by Public Law 105-61.

The conferees support the Social Security Administration's unique, cooperative training program for Administrative Law Judges which is recognized by State Bar Associations for continuing legal education credits. The conferees encourage the Office of Hearings and Appeals to continue this training program and to expand financial support to enable greater ALJ participation.

OFFICE OF INSPECTOR GENERAL (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

The conference agreement provides \$48,424,000 for the Office of Inspector General through a combination of general revenues and limitations on trust fund transfers instead of \$52,424,000 as proposed by the House and \$37,354,000 as proposed by the Senate.

TITLE V—GENERAL PROVISIONS

DISTRIBUTION OF STERILE NEEDLES

Both the House and Senate bills contained restrictions on the use of federal funds for the distribution of sterile needles for the injection of any illegal drug (section 505). The Senate bill repeated language from previous appropriations bills allowing the Secretary to waive the prohibition if she determined that such programs are effective in preventing the spread of HIV and do not encourage the use of illegal drugs. The House bill removed the Secretary's authority over this issue.

The conference agreement includes the House language prohibiting the use of federal funds for carrying out any program for the distribution of sterile needles or syringes for the injection of any illegal drug. This provision is consistent with the goal of discouraging illegal drug use and not increasing the number of needles and syringes in communities.

The conference agreement also includes bill language limiting the use of federal funds for sterile needle and syringe exchange projects until March 31, 1998. After that date such projects may proceed if (1) the Secretary of Health and Human Services determines that exchange projects are effective in preventing the spread of HIV and do not encourage the use of illegal drugs; and (2) the project is operated in accordance with criteria established by the Secretary for preventing the spread of HIV and for ensuring that the project does not encourage the use of illegal drugs. This provision is consistent with the goal of allowing the Secretary maximum authority to protect public health while not increasing the overall number of needles and syringes in communities.

With respect to the first criteria, the conferees expect the Secretary to make a determination based on a review of the relevant science. If the Secretary makes the necessary determination, then the conferees expect the Secretary to require the chief public health officer of the State or political subdivision proposing to use federal funds for exchange projects to notify the Secretary that, at a minimum, all of the following conditions are met: (1) a program for preventing HIV transmission is operating in the community; (2) the State or local health officer has determined that an exchange project is likely to be an effective component of such a prevention program; (3) the exchange project provides referrals for treatment of drug abuse and for other appropriate health and social services; (4) such project provides information on reducing the risk of transmission of HIV; (5) the project complies with established standards for the disposal of hazardous medical waste; and (6) the State or local health officer agrees that, as needs are identified by the Secretary, the officer will collaborate with federally supported programs of research and evaluation that relate to exchange projects.

It is hoped that the delay in implementation of the provision with regard to exchange projects will allow the authorizing committees sufficient time to conduct a complete review and evaluation of the scientific evidence, as well as any conditions proposed by the Secretary, and consider the need for legislation with regard to these programs. It is the intent of the conferees that the Appropriations Committees refrain from further restrictions on the Secretary's authority over exchange after March 31, 1998.

TECHNICAL

The conference agreement inserts the word "the" before the word "Departments" in section 516 as proposed by the House.

SALARIES AND EXPENSES REDUCTION

The conference agreement deletes section 517 of the Senate bill that would have reduced salaries and expenses appropriations for all agencies in the bill by a total of \$75,500,000 to be allocated by the Office of Management and Budget. The House had no similar provision.

TEAMSTERS ELECTION

The conference agreement includes a general provision (section 518) proposed by the House that prohibits the use of funds in this Act for the election of officers of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters. The conference agreement deletes section 106 of the Senate bill which included a related provision. The conferees are aware that the U.S. District Court is currently supervising the election of IBT officers pursuant to a consent decree between the IBT and the Department of Justice. This consent decree provided, in part, a Federal government option to order supervision of the 1996 election at government expense. While the Department of Labor contributed a portion of the funding to assist the Department of Justice in financing the 1996 election supervision expenses, it is the understanding of the conferees that the cost to rerun this election is expected to be significantly less than the original elec-

Cybell:

As promised, here is the approved, agreed-upon language from the NORA Needle Exchange Working Group (NORA = National Organizations Responding to AIDS, a 175+ organization coalition of HIV, religious, health and affiliated agencies representing the broadest coalition on HIV/AIDS interests).

Thank you for all of your efforts on behalf of the countless thousands of individuals at-risk for HIV who are alive today because of needle exchanges.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act, no funds appropriated under this Act may be used to carry out any program of distributing sterile needles for the hypodermic injection of any illegal drugs unless the Secretary of Health and Human Services determines that such programs are effective in preventing the spread of HIV and do not encourage the use of illegal drugs. FURTHER, no federal funds appropriated under this Act may be used to carry out any program of distributing sterile needles for the hypodermic injection of any illegal drugs unless said expenditure is consistent with a state or local jurisdiction's comprehensive HIV prevention strategy to reduce the further spread of HIV within that given jurisdiction.

The italicized section is the CURRENT language.

Talking points:

1. **The point is LOCAL CONTROL.**
2. We still maintain that science drives policy. This second degree preserves the Secretary's waiver authority, it does NOT lift the ban.
3. In order for this specific intervention to be able to be funded, it must be part of a comprehensive HIV prevention strategy (as in Secretary Shalala's transmittal to Senators Specter and Harkin 2/15/97).
4. It is **within** a comprehensive HIV prevention strategy that a jurisdiction already delineates its spectrum of interventions (access to & referrals for drug treatment, primary medical care services, counseling and testing services, outreach, psychoeducational interventions, etc.).

In response to the substitute amendment on needle exchange prepared by Representative Pelosi, I would like to offer the following comments:

1. This amendment transfers authority away from the Secretary of HHS and puts it into the hands of local public health officials. We have been working a great deal with community groups and Senate staff, telling them that the White House is firmly behind the Senate version of the bill which leaves the Secretary's waiver authority intact. I do not think they will be at all happy if we suddenly change our tune on them.
2. I talked to HHS today and they are still firmly behind the effort to support the Senate version, and we are as well.
3. Several of the most active community people have expressed strong objection to compromising now. They feel that the fight to maintain the Senate version is far from over and that a compromise now simply defeats their efforts.
4. Recognizing that this is an attempt to mediate a compromise, I have concern about the delineation of specific conditions that must be met in order for a needle exchange program to be acceptable. Though the conditions outlined in the Pelosi language are not in and of themselves inappropriate, it would be preferable to have more generic language about local control instead of restricting the Secretary by prescribing conditions in the legislation at this time. This preserves the option for the Secretary to narrow the scope in the future.

Should we find ourselves in the unfortunate position of having to offer a compromise, I would recommend that we suggest language which retains the authority with the Secretary of HHS and which includes more general language providing for local control over the implementation of needle exchange programs. If the delineation of specific conditions is necessary in order for a compromise to be achieved, then those outlined in the Pelosi language would be acceptable, along with retention of the Secretary's authority.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act, no funds appropriated under this Act may be used to carry out any program of distributing sterile needle for the hypodermic injection of any illegal drugs unless the Secretary of Health and Human Services determines that such programs are effective in preventing the spread of HIV and do not encourage the use of illegal drugs. *Further, should the Secretary make such a determination, no funds appropriated under this Act may be used to carry out any program of distributing sterile needles for the hypodermic injection of any illegal drugs unless the chief public health officer of the State or of the political subdivision proposing to use Federal funds for such a program determines*

that such an expenditure is a necessary component of the comprehensive HIV prevention plan for the jurisdiction and that entities expending funds for this activity provide referrals for the treatment of intravenous drug abuse and for other appropriate health and social services.

In response to the substitute amendment on needle exchange prepared by Representative Pelosi, I would like to offer the following comments:

1. This amendment ~~appears to~~ transfer authority away from the Secretary of HHS and put it into the hands of local public health officials. That is inconsistent with the Administration's support of the current law, which rests authority for determining the appropriateness of needle exchange programs with the Secretary. Therefore, it would be inconsistent of us to support this Pelosi language.
 2. Recognizing that this is an attempt to mediate a compromise, I have concern about the delineation of specific conditions that must be met in order for a needle exchange program to be acceptable. 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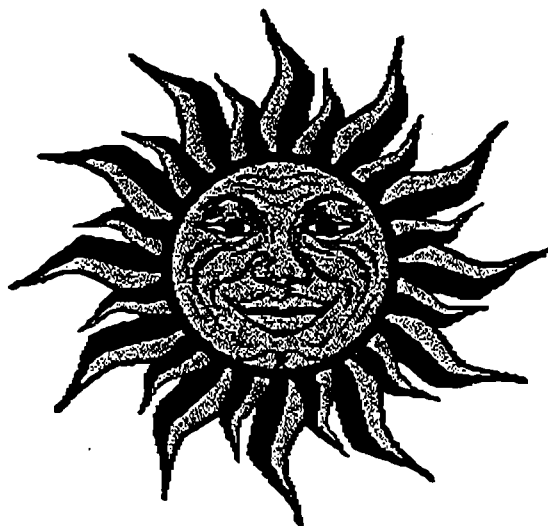

Take action on needle exchange

As you may be aware, the House of Representatives passed an amendment to the Appropriations Legislation currently under consideration which would remove HHS Secretary Donna Shalala's authority to end funding restrictions on needle exchange. The amendment, introduced by Representatives Hastert (R-IL) and Wicker (R-MS) is as follows:

"Sec. 516. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act, none of the funds made available in this Act may be used to carry out or promote any program of distributing sterile needles for the hypodermic injection of any illegal drug."

In other words, EVEN IF the Secretary determines, based on evidence, that needle exchange reduces the spread of AIDS and does not encourage drug use, she cannot allow Federal prevention funds to be used for needle exchange, period. In spite of the fact that many communities are begging to use Federal funding for needle exchange (note the US Conference of Mayors strong statement urging Shalala to lift the ban), the supporters of the amendment would impose their moral values on these communities.

The Senate version of the appropriations bill does not contain the restrictive language. The Senate and House have chosen committees which will meet and decide which version of the bill will be enacted.

YOU CAN IMPACT ON THIS PROCESS.

ACTION 1: If your Representative or Senator is on the conference committee, call them and let them know you want them to adhere to the Senate version of the appropriations bill on needle exchange. If not, ask your Senator or Representative to call the chairpersons of the conference committee and insist on maintaining HHS authority to make a determination on needle exchange. **ALL CONGRESSPERSONS CAN BE REACHED THROUGH THE CONGRESSIONAL SWITCHBOARD: 202-224-3121.**

THE WHITE HOUSE/ADMINISTRATION also has a role to play, and there are some observers who suspect that Clinton/Shalala et. al. would like nothing better than to have their authority on this issue removed. Had the administration used their clout, the chances are the restrictive house amendment would never have passed in the first place (59 Democrats voted FOR the amendment). Now, the White House must make it clear to conservative Democrats on the committee, such as Hollings and Bumpurs, who might not be inclined to fight against this restrictive amendment.
