Program Purpose\Prevention Activities

The purpose of the program is to increase access to coordinated, comprehensive care systems for children, youth, women and families who are infected or affected by HIV and AIDS. This is accomplished by coordinating established systems of service delivery, including HIV prevention efforts, primary medical care, and opportunities for clinical research, and addressing barriers to care for the targeted populations.

All grantees are expected to undertake outreach efforts to identify infected and at risk individuals and link them to care, with a special emphasis on youth. Specifically, grantees must coordinate, conduct and \or link with organizations implementing prevention activities that target youth and also must establish linkages with HIV counseling and testing sites in an effort to link infected youth with care. Grantees implement pro-active outreach activities to educate young people about HIV transmission and prevention of infection. Strategies include peer education and outreach, developing youth-specific HIV test sites, education of staff o youth-serving agencies. etc.

In fiscal year 1998 for the first time, a grant program will be developed that will specifically and exclusively target youth with a focus on increased identification of HIV-infected youth and linkage to care. A specific program expectation will be counseling to prevent HIV transmission to sexual or drug using partners of infected youth. Anticipated first year funding is \$2 million. .

Numbers of People Served

In FY 1997 and FY 1998, the Title IV program served 4,955 HIV infected adolescents ages 13 to 19, and 3629 young people ages 20-24. Data are not uniformly collected on prevention activities targeting at-risk youth. Total funding Title IV in FY 1996 was \$29 million. The number of adolescents, 13 to 19 estimated to be served in FY 1998 is 5,500.

Program Purpose
Prevention Activities

The purpose of this program is to provide assistance to community-based organizations (CBO's) to: (1) develop and implement effective community-based HIV prevention programs that reflect national program goals and are consistent with the HIV prevention priorities outlined in their State or local health department's comprehensive HIV prevention plan developed through HIV Prevention Community Planning; and, 2) promote collaboration and coordination of HIV prevention efforts among community-based organizations and local activities of HIV prevention service agencies, public agencies including local and state health departments and HIV Prevention Community Planning groups, substance abuse agencies, educational agencies, criminal justice systems, and affiliates of national and regional organizations. Activities supported under this announcement must be directly related to primary HIV prevention. Recipients will:

- (1) conduct a health education and risk reduction intervention for individuals, groups or communities at high risk of becoming infected or transmitting HIV to others.
- (2) as needed, refer and assist high risks clients in gaining access to HIV antibody counseling and testing; HIV medical care or early medical intervention; STD screening, testing, and treatment; psychosocial support; mental health services; substance abuse treatment; TB prevention and treatment; reproductive health; and other supportive services.
- (3) Coordinate and collaborate with health departments, community planning groups, and other organizations and agencies involved in HIV prevention activities, especially those serving the target population in the local area.
- (4) evaluate all major program activities and services supported with CDC HIV prevention funds.

Numbers of People Served

During FY 1997, 94 CBO's were funded under Program Announcement 704. Sixty-one of the 94 CBOs target youth

1994-1997 -- Program reached 6,436 youth (45% African American, 45% Latino, 10% other; mostly young men who have sex with men). Since the beginning of FY 98, the program has reached, 137 youth with a projected goal of reaching approximately 600 youth during the year.

Secondary Prevention with HIV Positive Youth

Administrative Location

Program Purpose\Prevention Activities

The goal of this study is to test the effectiveness of a secondary prevention programs for youth living with HIV. Subjects are randomly assigned to a three module intervention that is delivered through either anonymous telephone groups or individual sessions. The modules are designed to eliminate or significantly reduce drug use and sexual behaviors that may contribute to the transmission of the HIV virus and to promote adherence to health regimes as well as increase health sufficiency-efficacy. Intervention with adolescent girls living with HIV is very intensive and behavioral interventions are delivered with members of the youth's social support network and focus on improving skills to establish consistent positive daily routines and in order to set goals to motive youth to be oriented toward the future.

Numbers of People Served

In FY 1995, 255 youth were enrolled in the study and 75 eligible youth were identified and expressed an interest in participating. 472 baseline and 569 follow-up assessments were completed. 85 youth participated in the intervention for total cost of \$890,916.

SUBJECT: AIDS INFORMATION AVAILABLE TO SEC EMPLOYEES

Although we have no programs under SEC control that serve young people 13 to 21, our Health Unit which is open daily does provide information on HIV/AIDS to employees.

Various brochures and booklets on the subject are available in the unit, for instance:

"HIV/AIDS--The Basics" "AIDS--A Woman's Health Issue," and "HIV Antibody Testing" from the DC Department of Human Services.

A series of booklets titled: "What everyone should know ABOUT..." which includes the topics of AIDS, STD's, and AIDS in the Workplace.

A handout titled "AIDS Information and Referral" with the phone number of many places to contact such as the AIDS Hotline and National AIDS Clearing House is also available (on reverse).

Also, as I mentioned in our telephone conversation yesterday, information on HIV/AIDS could be included with the packet of information that the Commission gives out at orientation. We do hire a number of young people under the age of 22 especially as "stay in schools" and "summer hires." Older employees hired may have sons and daughters at a vulnerable age for AIDS and may welcome the information also.

In fact, it may be a good idea for your office to reach agencies not directly involved in AIDS programs to encourage the dissemination of HIV/AIDS information at orientation and other times. If you would like to discuss this further, you may contact me on 202-943-4057.
