11.0 Congress, the Media and Public Outreach

11.1 USG Objectives: The objective is to maintain the necessary conditions to continue current U.S. policy in Haiti. That means

building up public and congressional support for U.S. policy, and in particular resisting congressional attempts to undermine it. The message to Congress and the public should stress Haiti's remarkable progress in terms of respect for human rights, democracy, and economy recovery, while forthrightly acknowledging problem areas and demonstrating US leadership in addressing them.

11.2 Congressional Strategy

11.2.1 Congressional Concerns: Despite, or perhaps because of the overall success of the policy, we can expect intense congressional scrutiny. Members probably will not seek to interfere with our planned withdrawal schedule because of concern with maintaining a "secure and stable environment" once the troops are withdrawn. Likewise, in a pre-withdrawal period, Members will be chary of restricting funding for activities we convincingly can portray as essential to preparing for withdrawal of U.S. troops (e.g., police training). Instead, Congress most likely will continue to focus on the political, economic and security situation.

11.2.2 USG Strategy: Between now and the February withdrawal of UNMIH peacekeeping troops, we should use the opportunity of several major events to highlight the Administration's success, address problem areas and frame the debate in such a way that Congressional efforts to obstruct USG efforts will be blamed for any adverse consequences. Specifically, we should:

- ù Share responsibility for the success or failure of our policy with the Congress by stressing that cutting aid to Haiti, or otherwise restricting the Executive Branch's ability to carry out our policy, is a threat to US national security which could result in a return to uncontrolled Haitian migration, a recurrence of widespread violence in Haiti, and/or the potential for another coup.

- ù Seek to limit Congressional conditionality on Haiti policy. In instances where this is unavoidable, work with Congress to ensure that the conditions imposed are not detrimental to overall policy.

- ù Reduce the GOH's vulnerability by highlighting successes, pressing it to take corrective action in problem areas, and letting Congress know when things go right. Provide regular background information so that congressional supporters of the Administration's policy can promote US successes.

- ù We also should make clear that Congress would be held responsible for exacerbating Haiti's problems if Congress interferes with Administration initiatives. In particular, stress that congressional holds on programs like election assistance threaten

Haiti's presidential transition.

- ù Make every effort to avoid using (Plan carefully for funding contingencies to avoid the neuralgic use of) special authorities which can result in congressional holds.

- ù Organize as appropriate interagency briefings (State, DOD, AID, Commerce) for a core group of congressional supporters (e.g., members of the Black Caucus, Oberstar, Foglietta) to brief on a regular basis so that they can serve as advocates on the Hill.

- ù In contacts with Congress, emphasize economic development efforts, particularly Commerce's role, in light of congressional interest in business development in Haiti.

- ù Engage "responsible critics" (e.g., Coverdell, Goss) through individual briefings by appropriate senior Administration officials.

11.3 Media/Public Outreach Strategy: USG public message should stress success of Haiti policy, emphasizing the following points in media briefings, op-eds, and meetings with foreign policy leaders:

- ù America acted in its interest and those of the Hemisphere in restoring democracy to Haiti. We were aware of the risks, but we couldn't permit brutal violence and instability that close to our own shores to continue indefinitely.

- ù Think back to where Haiti was a year ago: Military rule; rampant political violence and killings; absence of democracy, free speech, elections; instability and the real threat of a massive refugee flow.

- ù US and Haitian efforts have been remarkably successful. Aristide is back in office; Haitians can speak freely and elect representatives of their choice without intimidation; people no longer are fleeing the island out of fear; a new, legitimate judicial system is being established; reliable police are now patrolling the streets. These are real, concrete changes that improve the lives of Haiti's people and, by reducing flow of refugees and risk of instability, the lives of US citizens.

- ù By January 1996, a new President will have been elected. This will be a milestone, for we will be witnessing the first peaceful transition from one democratically-elected President to another in Haiti's history.

- ù Haiti is still desperately poor and facing daunting challenges after decades of misrule and plundering of its resources. But is

not the time to retreat. Rather, we should build on what already has been accomplished in so short a time to help Haitians move forward and construct a stable, peaceful democracy

11.4 Issues

11.4.1 Congressional Restrictions: We can expect a number of restrictions and conditions imposed on US activity in Haiti. Senator Dole's amendment to the Senate Foreign Operations bill links assistance to Haiti to Administration certification concerning investigation of the Bertin killing and conduct of Haiti's security forces. Senator Helms has placed a hold on election assistance funds, citing in particular concerns regarding the conduct of the elections and the use of US funds. In the House, Rep. Goss inserted an amendment to the Foreign Operations bill that would restrict the disbursement of funds to Haiti (effective March 1996) if the elections are not held in substantial compliance with the Haitian Constitution. We can anticipate other Congressional holds of varying lengths on upcoming USAID programs in Haiti, since under Section 520 of the FY 96 foreign Operations Appropriations bill, Congress will have to be notified of all USAID projects. Senate appropriators also have taken action to prohibit use of special authorities (which in the past were used to fund the MNF, police training, etc.) and to weigh down the heretofore unencumbered voluntary peacekeeping account with congressional notification requirements.

11.4.2 Haiti's Political Situation: The major opposition parties boycotted the reruns and runoffs of the parliamentary and local elections. They are threatening to boycott the presidential elections if changes are not made to the electoral council. A non-competitive presidential election will create problems both with the Congress and with public opinion. To minimize this risk and maintain our credibility, the USG should continue its efforts to break the political impasse and urge the GOH to address the opposition's legitimate concerns. The Administration also should refrain from blaming the opposition parties for the existing situation and continue its dialogue with them.

11.5 Milestones

ù October 11-18: Consultative Group follow-up meeting. Offer HIRC and SFRC staff briefings on outcome of meetings.

ù October 12: Reception sponsored by the Center for International Policy to celebrate one year of Aristide's return. Expected guest list includes high level Administration officials and other strong backers of President Aristide.

ù October 15: Anniversary of President Aristide's return to Haiti. VP trip to Haiti, possibly including congressional delegation. Provide key congressional members with talking points/background information. Prepare op-eds.

ù December 16: Tentative date of first round of presidential elections.

ù January 21: Tentative date for second round of presidential elections (if needed)

ù February 7: Scheduled date for inauguration of new president.

ù February: Beginning of withdrawal of UNMIH peacekeeping troops. Offer briefings to relevant committees on withdrawal of troops and deployment of police.

ù February-March: Visit of Former President Aristide to Washington. Schedule meetings with key Members.

ù Spring 1996: Visit of new Haitian President to Washington. Schedule meetings with key Members.

SUBJECT: Coercive Family Planning and Asylum

Purpose

To obtain your approval to oppose legislation sponsored by Sen. Helms on coercive family planning and asylum.

Background

Pursuant to a directive you issued last year, we currently provide protection from repatriation to persons with credible fears of return to forced abortion, involuntary sterilization or other severe mistreatment due to their opposition to coercive family planning in their country of origin. Moreover, you recently approved a proposal to enhance those administrative protections and to provide legal status in the U.S. to victims of coercive practices.

In approving these measures, you accepted agency views that administrative protections were preferable to legislation expanding the grounds for political asylum to include coercive family planning. Agencies were particularly concerned that such legislation would serve as a magnet for fraudulent asylum claims and encourage alien smuggling.

State and Justice now recommend that the Administration formally oppose a provision sponsored by Sen. Helms and others that would make fear of return to coercive family planning grounds for asylum. In explaining our opposition, we would emphasize that we are already providing protection for such claimants, but believe it more appropriate to do so outside the legislative context.

In view of the protections we are already providing and our concerns about alien smuggling, we concur in the State/Justice recommendation.

RECOMMENDATION

That State and Justice be permitted to express our opposition to the Helms provision while emphasizing that we support administrative protection of such claimants.

Background

Pursuant to a directive you issued last year, we currently provide protection from repatriation to persons who have been denied political asylum but who nonetheless have credible fears of return to forced abortion, involuntary sterilization or other severe mistreatment due to their opposition to coercive family planning in their country of origin. Moreover, you recently approved a proposal to enhance our administrative review procedures under this directive. Finally, you authorized us to seek legislation empowering the Attorney General to provide legal status in the United States to claimants who are granted administrative relief. A version of our proposed legislation has now been incorporated into an immigration bill being considered by the House Judiciary Committee.

In approving each of these measures, you accepted agency views that our approach -- administrative relief from deportation combined with legislation providing legal status -- was preferable to legislation expanding the grounds for political asylum to include coercive family planning. Our current law on asylum is identical to the international standard contained in the Refugee Convention, and State and Justice have opposed a unilateral U.S. expansion of the standard that would favor one particular group. In addition, agencies were concerned that a legislative expansion would serve as a magnet for fraudulent asylum claims and encourage alien smuggling.

State and Justice now recommend that the Administration formally oppose legislation sponsored by Sen. Helms and others that would make fear of return to coercive family planning grounds for asylum. In explaining our opposition, we would emphasize that we are already providing protection for such claimants, but believe our administrative and legislative remedies are more appropriate.

In view of the safeguards we have adopted, we support the State-Justice recommendation.

RECOMMENDATION

That State and Justice be permitted to express our opposition to the Helms provision while emphasizing that we support administrative protection of such claimants.
