TIME TO LEAD ON THE NUCLEAR TEST BAN TREATY
BY SAMUEL R. BERGER

Senate Foreign Relations Committee Chairman Jesse Helms recently argued on this page that the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty (CTBT) is "worthless" now that India and Pakistan have conducted nuclear explosions. He compared the treaty to "closing the stable door after the horses have galloped away." But, in fact, the dangerous developments in South Asia make it more critical than ever to move forward on the CTBT, while the horses are still in the corral, and before there is a stampede.

The CTBT, which would ban all nuclear explosive tests, was first proposed by President Eisenhower. President Clinton has called it the "longest-sought, hardest-fought prize in the history of arms control." That prize is finally within reach. Two years ago, the U.N. General Assembly voted 158-3 to adopt the Treaty. President Clinton was the first world leader to sign. Russia, China, France and the United Kingdom -- the nations with declared nuclear arsenals -- followed suit, and the U.K. and France have already ratified it. All told, 149

nations - including Japan, South Korea, Israel and our NATO allies - have now signed.

We should pause and contemplate this achievement: After five decades of nuclear danger, 149 nations have signed an accord to never, or never again, test a nuclear explosive. We must not let this extraordinary opportunity slip away.

Four former chairmen of the Joint Chiefs of Staff -- John Shalikashvili, Colin Powell, William Crowe, and David Jones -- plus all six current members of the JCS say the Treaty is in our national interest. The directors of our three national nuclear weapons labs and leading independent experts say America can maintain a reliable nuclear deterrent without explosive testing. The public strongly supports the Treaty, as it has for forty years.

The CTBT will constrain the development of more advanced and dangerous nuclear weapons by nations that already possess them -- and limit the possibilities for other states to acquire them. It will also enhance our ability to monitor for nuclear explosions by other nations.

With or without a CTBT we must watch for such activities. The Treaty gives us new tools to pursue this vital mission: a global network of sensors to supplement our intelligence capabilities, and the right to request short-notice, on-site inspections in other countries.

Continued U.S. inaction on the CTBT could unravel the emerging global consensus to reduce nuclear dangers and contribute to the acceleration of nuclear weapons programs in India and Pakistan. It might spur nuclear arms competition in other regions. This would create a much more dangerous world.

Senator Helms suggests we could be protected in such a world by giving up on arms control and simply deploying nationwide defenses against ballistic

missile attacks. But abandoning arms control could undermine America's security, and missile defenses are already part of our strategy.

We continue to develop national anti-missile systems that could protect us from emerging threats, such as the acquisition of long-range missiles by rogue nations, so we would be able to deploy such a defense as early as 2003, if necessary. We are also moving forward with deployment of advanced defenses against shorter or theater-range missiles, which threaten our forces and allies in regional conflicts.

Arms control is also a key element of our strategy. To facilitate deployment of new theater missile defenses, Presidents Clinton and Yeltsin signed agreements last fall that clarify conditions for testing these systems, consistent with the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile (ABM) Treaty. Once the Russian Duma ratifies the START II Treaty, President Clinton will send these new accords and related agreements to the Senate for approval.

Senator Helms calls the ABM Treaty "antiquated." But without continued agreement between the U.S. and Russia on rules of the road controlling deployment of nationwide defenses against missiles, further missile reductions under START II and III -- cutting nuclear inventories by 80 percent from levels at the end of the Cold War -- would be at risk. We must not undermine the effort, advanced by four Republican and two Democratic presidents over 30 years, to reduce these deadly arsenals and protect our people from nuclear war.

Constraining the spread of all weapons of mass destruction -- nuclear, chemical and biological -- is a key pillar of President Clinton's national security policy. We have stood firmly against Saddam Hussein to ensure U.N. efforts to destroy Iraq's dangerous weapons. Recently, we worked with the U.K. and the

Republic of Georgia to ensure safe storage of nuclear materials left over from the breakup of the Soviet Union. The CTBT is a vital component of our nonproliferation strategy.

Thirty years ago, President Kennedy called the completion of the Limited Test Ban Treaty -- which banned all above-ground nuclear tests -- "a shaft of light cut into the darkness" of global confrontation. Now, the Cold War is over, but the dark cloud of nuclear danger remains. The Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty can help reduce this threat and make America more secure. The agreement has sat in the Senate's in box for too long. It is urgent that we go forward.

Jesse Helms to undergo knee replacement surgery<
RALEIGH, N.C.

(AP) Sen. Jesse Helms will undergo two knee replacement operations later this year.

"The sooner, the better," the 76-year-old North Carolina

Republican said Wednesday. "It's the fashionable thing to do."

Helms, who was elected to his fifth term in 1996, said the cartilage in his knees had worn away and that arthroscopic surgery performed in December had not corrected the problem. He now has bone grinding on bone.

"It is painful," he said.

"I am walking with a cane."

He also occasionally uses an electric cart for traveling long distances around the Capitol Hill complex.

Helms said he decided to have both knees replaced at the same time on the advice of his friend, former Senate Majority Leader Howard Baker of Tennessee. Baker told Helms the surgery was painful and that Helms wouldn't want to go through it twice.

``They put
in a man-made knee," Helms said. ``I don't know if
it's metal or
plastic. It has worked for a lot of folks. Howard
Baker is my authority."

Although he has not set a date for the operation, Helms said he
probably
would have it done at a Raleigh hospital sometime in the
fall after
the Senate adjourns.
The senator had surgery in April for a
blockage in a carotid
artery.

* IMF funding -- It's in the Senate ForOps bill at full
amount with livable conditions; it's no where on the House side.

Effort to add the \$18B with authorizing language (from House Banking Committee bill) failed in ForOps committee mark up vote. Still some question about whether to offer as floor amendment should some version of ForOps make it to floor at some point; might also be agreed to in conference, absent a House floor vote. Strategy on what route is best/most likely to be successful unclear. (Being worked by Treasury and WHLA.)

* UN arrears and family planning issues -- family planning (i.e., Mexico City policy) increasingly again appears to be tied to IMF as well as UN. Wicker amendment accepted in ForOps Committee markup. Includes language which prohibits assistance to organizations that either perform abortions or lobby to alter laws or policies related to abortions in foreign countries. The language allows the President to waive the prohibition on performing abortions but not the prohibition on lobbying. It further defines lobbying quite broadly to include activities such as "sponsoring... conferences and workshops on the alleged defects in abortion laws, as well as the drafting and distribution of materials or public statements calling attention to such alleged defects." (Administration has a veto threat against this provision.)

* CEDAW -- In the Senate, not moving anywhere before end of the session, no hope that it will. Unlikely to move while Jesse Helms remains SFRC chair.

* Foreign Ops Budget
-- Overall, still short (by about a billion) of the Administration's request in the Senate, and thus far in the House. In addition to trouble with IMF funding, specific shortfalls include KEDO funding, which has been eliminated in the Committee markup, and GEF funds have also eliminated.
