An Open Letter to President William Jefferson Clinton
From: Rabbi Gene Levy and Imam Johnny Hasan
Reference: PEACE MAKERS & PEACE-INITIATORS

As terrorism and violent clashes continue to claim victims in the struggles in and around Jerusalem and The West Bank, we call upon you to renew your efforts to mediate an end to the conflict. As Rabbi and Imam, the two of us have spoken between ourselves and among our congregants and associates, and we recognize that there is definitely a religious, as well as political component involved, and we would thereby suggest that the Jewish, Christian, and Muslim religious leaders be brought to the table, as well. We know that rabbis, priests, and imams could offer not only prayer, but practical spiritual insights to end the violence. We also know that attitudes and behavior are often shaped by the Middle East's religious leadership. If peace is to be established in Jerusalem, in Palestine, and in the land of Judaism, Christianity, and Al-Islam, it should be established by the peace-makers and peace-initiators, namely the rabbis, priests, and imams of the faithful.

We know that, as the most respected leader of the free world, who also has the power to bring together all sides in this volatile conflict, you, Mr. President are really the only person who can inspire the trust to do so. We pray that, before you leave your position as President, you can find the time and the resources to invite rabbis, priests, and imams from the Middle Eastern areas, and from other affected areas like East Jerusalem, to consult with each other for the sake of PEACE!

Together, we are writing to offer to help you, when and where we can, and together we pray for your success in the challenge. With grateful thanks for all you have done to try to achieve a just and lasting peace, we ask you now to consider this bold new step with religious leaders.

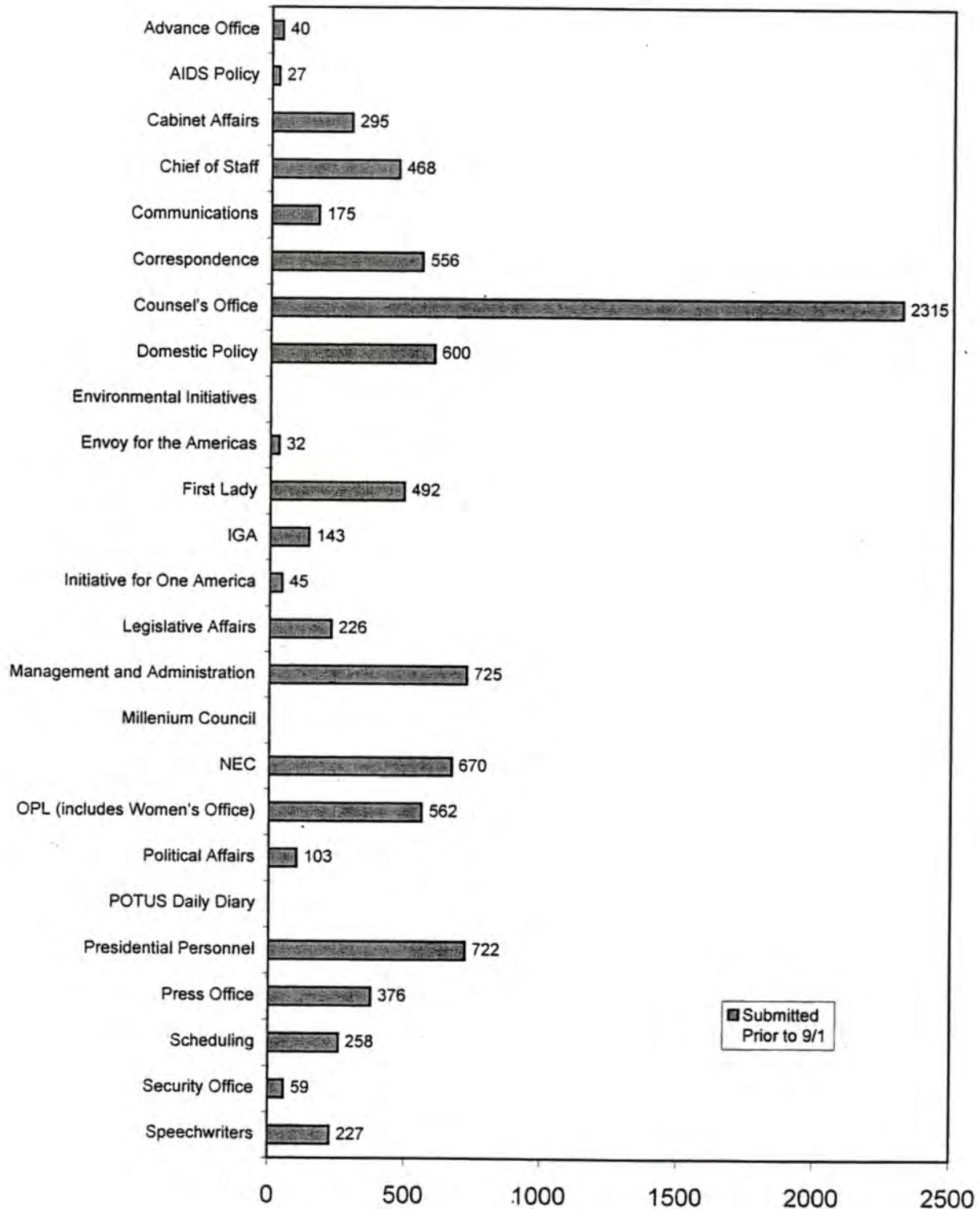

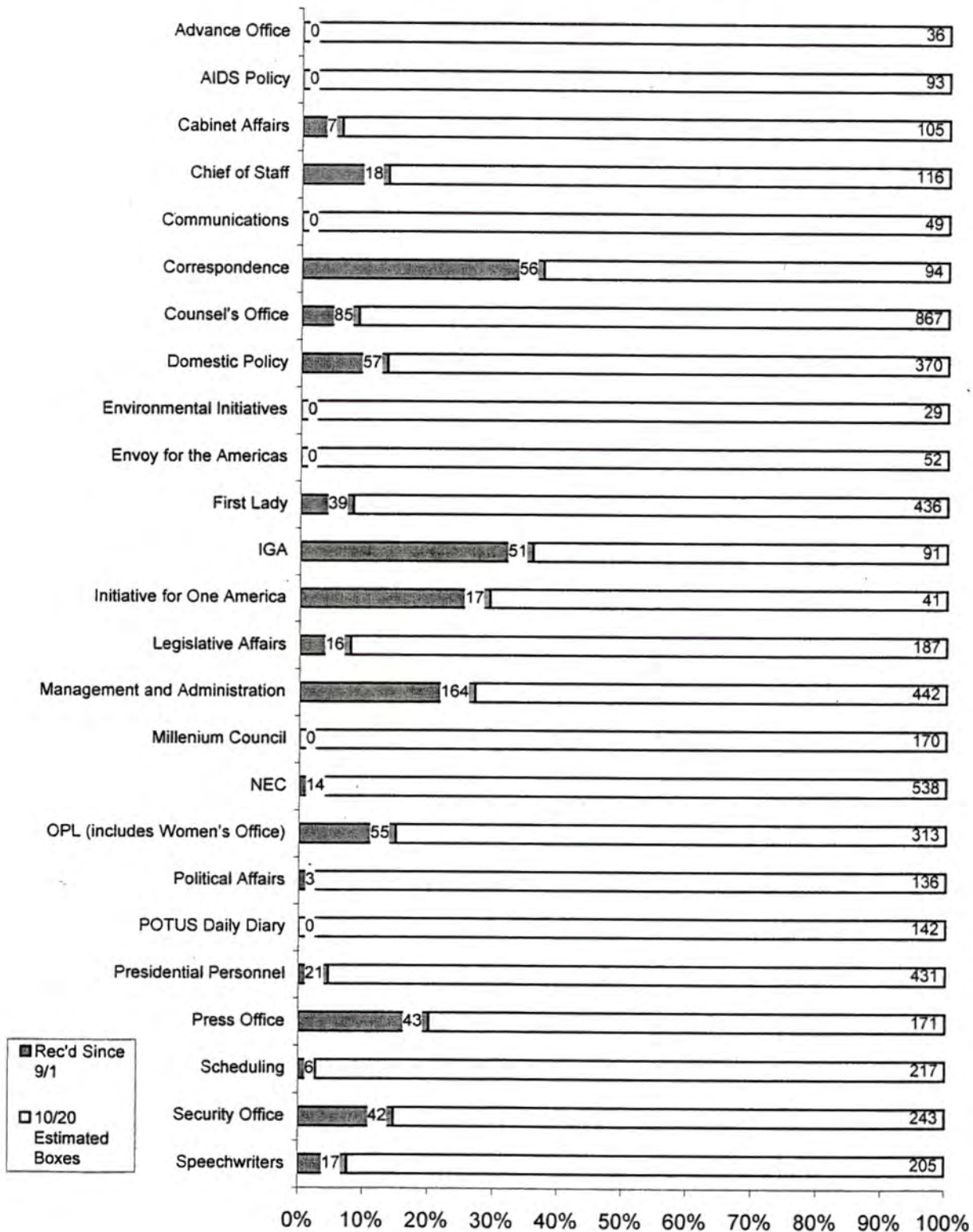

SUBJECT: INTERVIEW PRIORITIES FOR REMAINING MONTHS IN
OFFICE

A short series of exit interviews will provide you with an opportunity to shape the coverage of the end of your Administration. The major newspapers and networks all plan a series of articles and shows that will attempt to sum up the last eight years. You can expect coverage to begin shortly after the final results of the election are clear.

After consulting with John Podesta and considering the limits of your schedule, we have decided to focus your time on the most influential news outlets in each medium – *The New York Times*, *CBS News* (radio and television), and *National Public Radio*. In addition, we have selected a couple of other interviews that will allow you to cover your work in a particular area – science and technology with the *Discovery Channel* and *Science Magazine* or foreign policy with Helen Thomas of *Hearst Newspapers*. Finally, we have proposed an off-the-record dinner with influential younger reporters and columnists who have most closely covered your efforts to reshape the Democratic Party and, more broadly, the way in which the national government works for the people.

These interviews come at a particularly critical moment for shaping the views many Americans have about your Administration. The uncertainty of the election and the contentiousness surrounding its aftermath have led to a re-assessment of the last eight years -- a period that, for all the turbulence and partisan rancor in Washington, was marked by steady economic gains and remarkable stability and progress across the country. These interviews give you a chance to point out the many ways in which your Administration contributed to the economic advances and social progress through leadership on specific policies.

There will be a natural tendency on the part of the press to dwell on the impeachment drama and its consequences. While there may be some value in rebutting some common misconceptions about impeachment, it comes at a very high cost. Every minute spent on that is a minute not spent on the tangible improvements your Administration has helped make in the lives of American families. Your time is better spent focusing on areas where the press is more inclined to recognize your achievements:

- the unparalleled understanding of how to make the forces of globalization and the information revolution transform the American economy;
- the dramatic turnaround in the federal government's fiscal balance sheet and the flood of private investment capital that made possible;
- the new thinking about crime and welfare that has reshaped the Democratic party and led to solid and sustained improvements in social policy; and
- the consistent commitment to peace-making around the world from Northern Ireland to the Balkans and the Middle East.

Keeping the focus on these areas, where your commitment and achievements are undisputed, will make these interviews more worthwhile.

In addition to listing the interviews that we have most strongly recommended, we have included a sampling of other worthwhile requests that have been submitted. Please let us know what you think of those and any others that we may have missed. Keep in mind that we have literally hundreds of requests for your time and that we are trying to make the best use of the last seven or eight weeks.

Recommended Interviews:

- ***The New York Times***

The *New York Times* is working on a major retrospective on your Presidency. We believe the *NYT* has treated the substantive issues of this Administration very seriously throughout the previous eight years. Because of this history and the broad reach of this publication, we believe that you should have a voice in this piece.

We recommend that you spend one hour on Thursday, November 30 with the following group of reporters: Todd Purdum, David Sanger, Marc Lacey, and Robin Toner. They will each be writing a major piece for the *NYT* retrospective package.

- **Dan Rather/CBS**

We have been approached by all the major networks and their top talent – including Mike Wallace, Ted Koppel and Barbara Walters – with requests for exit interviews with you. We recommend, however, that you grant your primary television exit interview to Dan Rather of CBS. He is not only the dean of the delegation, but he has been the most fair and straight with us throughout your Presidency. In addition, he has shown the most interest by coming in person to meet with myself and with John Podesta.

Rather has said that they are willing to accommodate our wishes for format but has proposed the interview for "60 Minutes II." We believe this is the right format.

We suggest that we schedule this interview for the week of December 18, around our medical privacy announcement.

- **Mark Knoller/CBS Radio**

As one of our long-time regulars and a close student of yours, Knoller is someone we would like to cover before the close of this Administration. One possibility would be to have you give your first reaction to the final election outcome in an interview with Knoller – rather than a full-scale Oval Office Address.

CBS Radio has the broadest reach of any radio network in the country.

- **Helen Thomas/Hearst Newspapers**

As with Knoller, we believe you should grant one final interview to Helen before the close of your Administration. We recommend this interview for January to sum up your efforts on foreign policy, particularly on the Middle East.

- **Discovery Channel/Science Magazine**

We believe that interviews with the *Discovery Channel* and *Science Magazine* would give you the opportunity to cement a different part of your legacy. We believe you would enjoy the opportunity to speak at length on the implications of the last decade's advancements and

to share your thoughts on how technology and globalization are shaping the world. These interviews would allow you to address topics such as the human genome, gene therapy, cloning, AIDS and the digital divide.

We recommend that you do these interviews back-to-back in order to utilize one briefing for both interviews.

- **OTR Dinner**

This off-the-record dinner would give you the opportunity to meet with the younger generation of political reporters who will shape your legacy in the years to come. This dinner would be informal, with journalists and columnists who share your New Democrat philosophy.

This interview would make sense in the context of a trip to Northern Ireland and England. As you did with the *Associated Press* on your trip to Brunei and Vietnam, this could be used as a scene-setter interview at the start of your trip.

Dear Mr. President:

Enclosed you will find my letter to be included in Ex-Im Bank's Year 2000 annual report. I am pleased with the turnaround and recovery of Ex-Im Bank during the last three and a half years. I shall always be grateful to you for giving me the opportunity to serve our country in this capacity. I still have some important work at Ex-Im Bank to complete in the next few months, including implementation of the HIV-AIDS healthcare program for sub-Saharan Africa and certain significant Russian transactions.

In addition, in June of this year, I authorized a study of the competitiveness of the Ex-Im Bank by the International Institute of Economics. This report, together with recommendations from our Advisory Committee, will be presented to the transition team next month.

In my annual report letter, I note that a pending risk-sharing proposal is critical because for the first time, it brings the private sector into a significant partnership with Ex-Im Bank. This will achieve several important objectives: (a) a net cost savings for the government; (b) encourage more private sector institutions to provide capital for developing countries and (c) both the public and private sectors will gain important knowledge and experience on risk management related to developing countries. We hope that this transaction will be a catalyst for the developing countries to attract private sector long-term capital that is absolutely essential for sustainable development. It may also allow Ex-Im Bank to support more trade with the existing budget. Although not the core of Ex-Im Bank's mission, I believe that it will be a very important achievement if we are able to encourage the private sector in this direction.

In this regard, you may remember that I commented to you in Nigeria that there is an urgent need for a private sector entity (merchant bank) to advise the developing (mostly the higher risk) countries on a number of issues related to attracting long-term, private sector capital.

I would welcome the opportunity to meet with you either privately or officially to discuss any of the above.

'EX-IM BANK IS IN EXCELLENT FINANCIAL CONDITION'

Fiscal 2000 was a good year for the Export-Import Bank of the United States.

I am pleased to report that:

- New authorizations of loans and guarantees of \$12.6 billion supported \$15.5 billion in U.S. exports in FY 2000 -- one of the largest levels of support in Bank history.
- The Bank used \$936 million in program budget, which fully utilized our \$756-million appropriation for FY2000, as well as resources available from prior years.
- Despite a sharp decline in the aircraft sector after a record high in FY1999, total authorizations for FY2000 were off by only 3.2%. At the same time, the Bank's portfolio grew more balanced and diversified, both geographically and among sectors. In fact, authorizations to the oil and gas, manufacturing, and technology sectors in the aggregate more than doubled in FY2000.
- Net income increased to \$345.8 million in FY2000 from \$214.4 million in FY1999.
- The Bank was profitable for the fourth time in the last five years.
- Total portfolio exposure at year-end was \$61.6 billion, up 5.4% from FY1999. The Bank also ended the year with a significant risk improvement, reflecting the upgrade of a substantial number of project finance cases, airline companies and large exposure in certain countries.

As a result of this progress, Ex-Im Bank is in excellent financial condition. This is a tribute to the hard work, good policy and sound judgment of the dedicated Ex-Im Bank staff and to the support of the U.S. Congress. Today, Ex-Im Bank is well-positioned to innovate in response to more intense global competition and to assume greater risk to maximize support for U.S. exports.

ASIAN/RUSSIAN FINANCIAL CRISIS

The fact that Ex-Im Bank emerged relatively unscathed from the Asian/Russian financial crisis of 1997/98 is a testament to the prudent management and good leadership of the Bank's prior chairmen, Board members, and senior staff. For the two-year period ended September 30, 1999, Ex-Im Bank paid guarantee and insurance claims totaling \$1.5 billion (mostly on Asian transactions). This is equal to about 2.8% of the Bank's total exposure at the end of FY1997. By comparison, Ex-Im Bank paid guarantee and insurance claims during the five years of the Latin American debt crisis of 1983-87 in the amount of \$1.2 billion, equal to 3.1% of total exposure preceding the crisis. In the 10 years following the Latin American crisis, Ex-Im Bank recovered a significant portion of those claims. The recent Asian/Russian crisis was more private-sector focused, and thus involved more risk, than its Latin American predecessor. Yet, the Bank again expects reasonable recovery of claims paid.

In the Asian/Russian crisis, the international banking community learned once again that there is no economic stability without political stability. Indonesia and Russia were the principal examples. Indonesia has been our most difficult market in recent years. Our exposure in the country at the end of the 1997 fiscal year was approximately \$3.8 billion, equal to 7% of the total Bank portfolio at that time. Yet, net losses are expected ultimately to run only about 5% of that exposure. Even more impressive, our Russian losses to date are below the Bank's global

average – amounting to less than 1% of our exposure there just prior to Russia's August, 1998 crisis.

These recent economic trials put Ex-Im Bank to the test, and the Bank emerged from these challenges stronger than ever. Our losses are modest. The Bank's portfolio has solid industry and regional balance. Ex-Im Bank supported approximately \$45 billion in exports during the past three years, and the Bank's role as a stabilizing influence during periods of economic instability has grown in importance. The Bank staff and Board should be proud of this record.

EXPANDING SUPPORT FOR SMALL BUSINESS

We also are proud of the dramatic growth in support that Ex-Im Bank offers U.S. small businesses. Our small business financing rose 10% to \$2.3 billion in FY2000, and small businesses are using our working capital guarantees more than ever before. These guarantees, which provide small- and mid-sized U.S. companies with pre-export financing, increased 41% to more than \$588 million in FY2000. Working capital guarantees to women-owned businesses increased significantly to \$14.5 million, and the number of insurance policies held by minority- and women-owned businesses increased nearly 18%. This is strong evidence that our aggressive outreach efforts and our new partnership with dozens of trade associations are paying off.

THE CHALLENGES AHEAD: INNOVATION AND COMPETITION

With the Bank's good record in recent years and serving a wider variety of U.S. businesses than ever before, it is time to press forward with reforms that will help the Bank better defend and expand U.S. export opportunities. From Japan's untied aid, to Canada's and Germany's market windows, to the UK's vigorous co-financing, our competitors have restructured and refocused their trade finance efforts to be more aggressive in today's world.

In the coming year, we must focus on developing and implementing the policy and structural changes necessary to maintain Ex-Im Bank's competitiveness. When the new Administration and Congress arrive, we will hand to them an independent report on the Bank prepared by the Institute for International Economics with an attached report from the Bank's Advisory Committee and my own recommendations. We hope that these reports will serve as the basis for strengthening the Bank, as part of its upcoming reauthorization, to better serve U.S. exporters in today's environment. One key recommendation will be that the U.S. government foster greater cooperation among its various trade finance agencies. Ex-Im Bank, the Overseas Private Investment Corporation, and the U.S. Trade and Development Agency frequently have the same U.S. and developing world clients. In some cases, we offer a similar product to the same client. Given the rising competition, we need to operate more effectively as a team.

As I write this letter, Ex-Im Bank has begun the final stages of reviewing important policy reform proposals with the export and labor communities. These proposals cover three key areas: foreign content, co-financing and local cost. Reforms on this scale have not occurred at the Bank since the mid-1980s. But their time has come. These revisions aim to make Ex-Im Bank programs more flexible and responsive. They will allow us to support more exports in an efficient way that helps U.S. businesses stay on a level playing field with their foreign competitors, while maintaining our commitment to our core mission of supporting U.S. jobs through exports.

We also must seek new ways to leverage the efforts of this lean, 420-employee agency. In the past year, Ex-Im Bank launched an ambitious risk-sharing initiative to encourage more private-sector participation in U.S. export financing. For the first time in Bank history, our Board approved a competitively bid proposal from Citigroup to share the risks and benefits of certain Bank transactions. We hope to finalize this agreement in the near future. I believe the Bank and

other U.S. government entities can learn from this innovative experiment. Long term, the public sector has much to gain by partnerships with the private sector, particularly in the area of trade finance.

Ex-Im Bank also has undertaken an ambitious effort to harness the power of the Internet to reach more U.S. businesses and foreign buyers. By automating many services, we can greatly extend the impact of our small agency. A key milestone in the coming year will be the establishment of an Internet-based marketplace that can serve as a "virtual Ex-Im Bank," offering access to our services, as well as links to other export financing information and resources. This effort will take more than one year to complete, but its ultimate contribution will be considerable.

EX-IM BANK AT 65: SUPPORTING MORE JOBS THROUGH EXPORTS

The Bank celebrated a milestone this past year. We turned 65. While the world and the global economic landscape have changed a great deal since the 1930's, this Bank remains true to its timeless mission: to support U.S. jobs through exports. 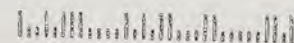
