Motorpool

There will be a 24 hour motorpool operation during the entire visit. To request a vehicle, call or go in person to the dispatcher located in the South wing lobby of the Hotel Okura at Embassy ext. 5798 or 5799. It is recommended that you call in advance and reserve a vehicle. There are no vehicles designated for anyone's particular use. These vehicles are for official use only.

There will also be a shuttle bus service departing from the South Wing entrance of the Hotel Okura to and from the New Sanno U.S. Military Hotel for dining and shopping needs. This shuttle will operate non-stop from 11:00 am to 11:00 pm departing every half hour.

There will also be separate transportation to the Akasaka Palace through the main dispatcher. Please call dispatcher extension (5798 or 5799) to request a vehicle.

The Embassy's main entrance is on your right. You must bring your temporary Embassy i.d. to gain admittance to the building.

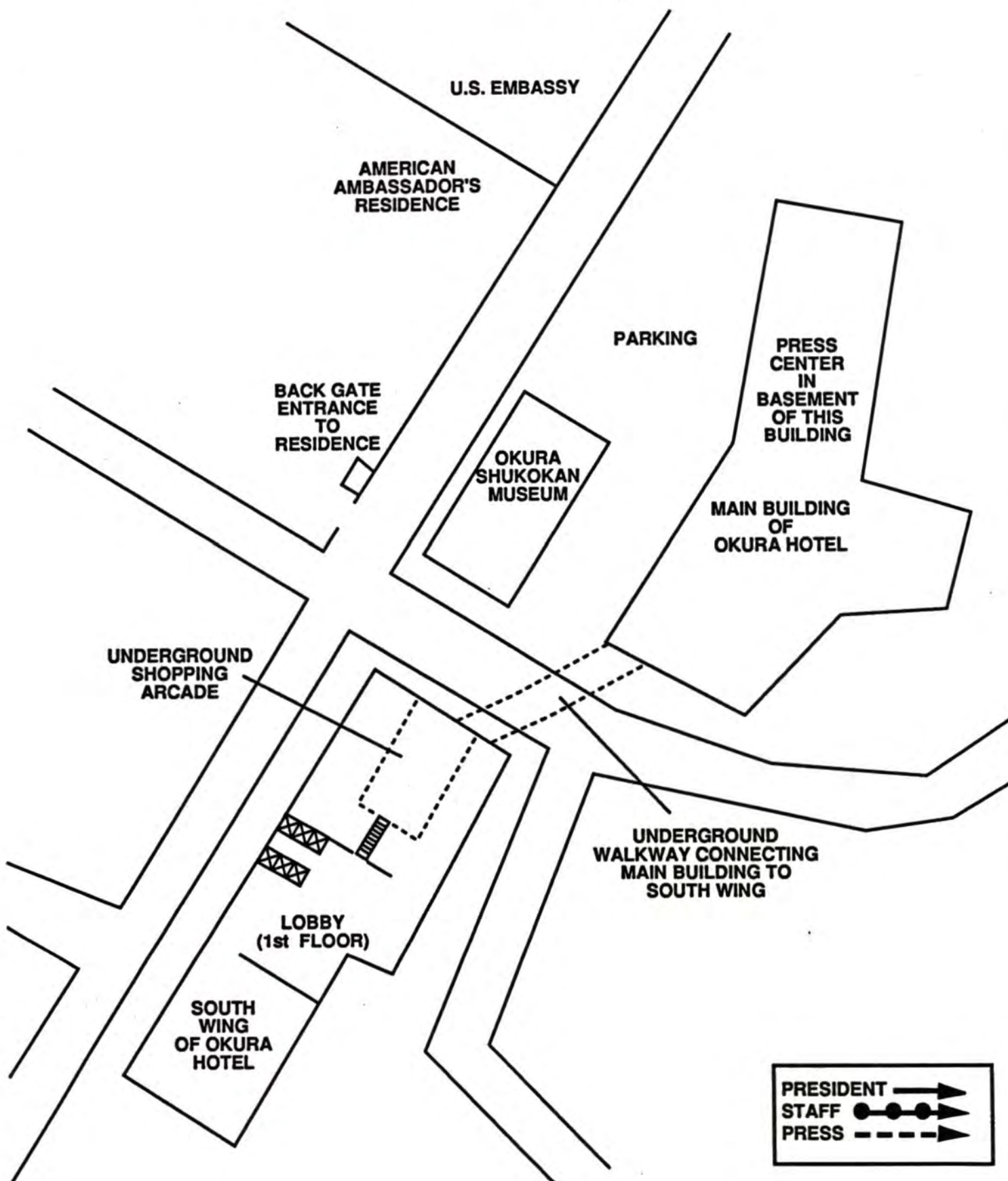
Weather

Gratuities

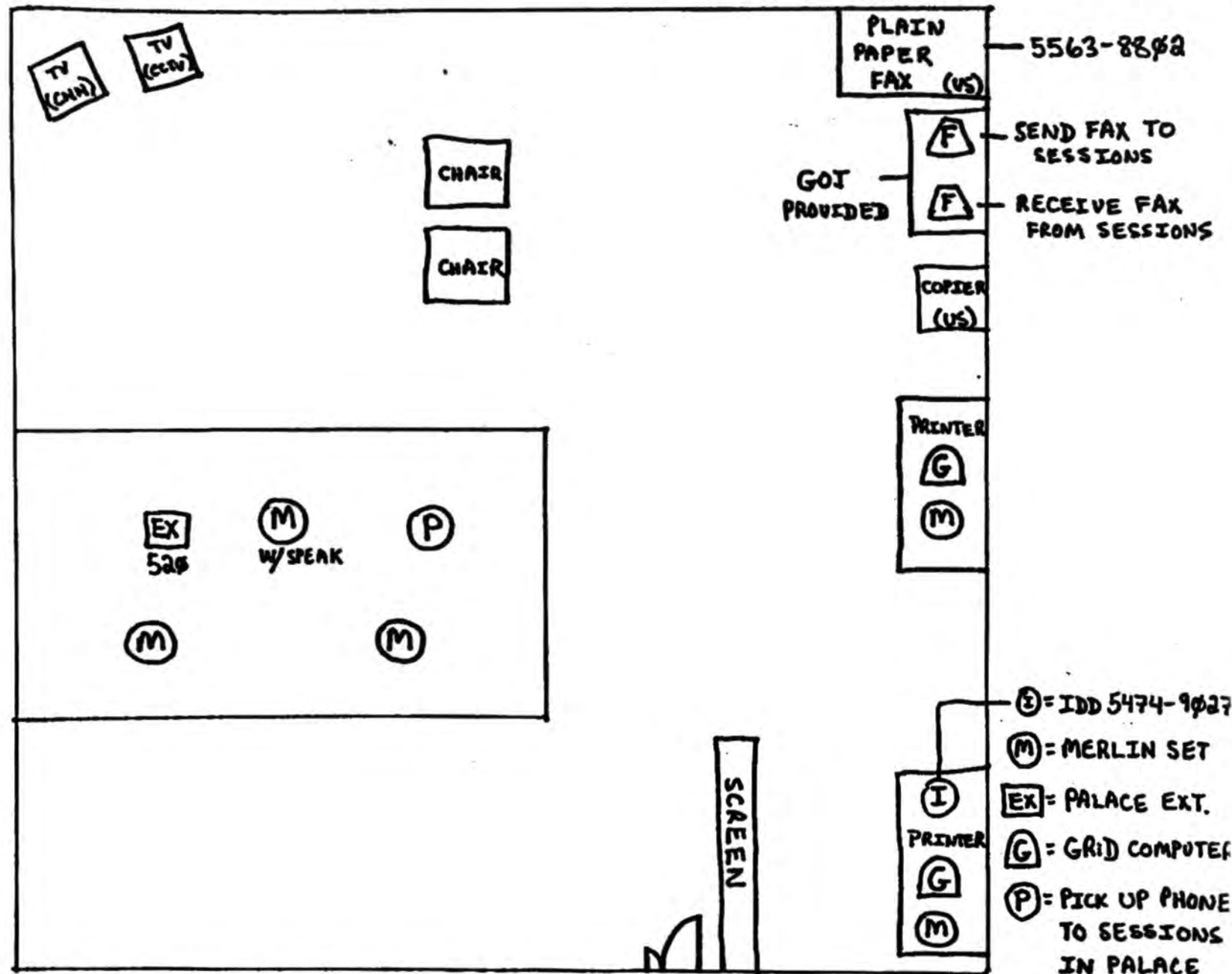
It is NOT customary to tip for services in Japan. Service charges are added to restaurant and hotel bills. Taxi drivers and bellhops do not expect tips.

Hiroataka Akamatsu (47) Secretary General, Japan Socialist Party A Waseda University graduate, Akamatsu served three times in the prefectural assembly before his election to the Diet in 1991. He was a surprise nominee for the number two spot in the party and is an advocate for reform in hardline socialist positions.

Tetsuya Chikushi (50) Anchorman, TBS Evening News A former senior editor at the Asahi Shimbun, Chikushi is a respected journalist who now anchors the most widely watched evening news program in Japan.

Koichiro Ejiri (65) Chairman, Japan Foreign Trade Council A graduate of Tokyo University, Ejiri entered Mitsui Trading Company and was posted in Australia for six years and the U.S. for two. He currently is the chairman of Mitsui.

Reona Esaki (68) President, Tsukuba University A graduate in physics from Tokyo University, Esaki was awarded the Nobel Prize in physics in 1973 for his pioneering work on tunneling in solids and discovery of the tunnel diode.

Tsutomu Hata (57) Chairman, Shinseito A Seijo University graduate, Hata worked for his family's bus company before succeeding to his father's Diet seat. He subsequently has been elected eight times to the Diet from his Nagano LH constituency. A strong proponent of political reform, he joined with Ichiro Ozawa to form the Shinseito (New Life Party) after the June 18 dissolution of the Diet.

Masaru Hayami (68) Chairman, Keizai Doyukai A graduate of Hitotsubashi University, Hayami married the daughter of the founder of the Nissho Iwai trading company and subsequently rose through the ranks to become its president.

Gaishi Hiraiwa (79) Chairman, Keidanren A graduate of Tokyo University, Hiraiwa is concurrently chairman of Tokyo Electric Power Company. He and other utilities executives are currently the dominant force in Japan's business community.

Morihiro Hosokawa (55) Chairman, Japan New Party A Sophia University graduate, Hosokawa worked as a newspaper reporter before entering politics. He subsequently served two terms as an LDP Upper House member and two terms as governor of Kumamoto prefecture. In April 1991, he organized the Japan New Party to reform Japan's politics. He was elected to the Upper House in July 1992 and currently is contesting for a Lower House seat.

Rokuro Ishikawa (67) Chairman, Japan Chamber of Commerce and Industry A Tokyo engineering graduate, Ishikawa began his career in the Transport Ministry and subsequently entered Kajima Construction company, where he is chairman of the board.

Kazuo Inamori (61) Chairman, Kyocera Corporation An iconoclastic industrialist, whose company manufactures ceramic housings used in semiconductors, Inamori is an advocate for change in traditional Japanese business practices. He is a graduate of Kagoshima Technical College.

Seiroku Kajiyama (67): LDP Secretary General A graduate of the Imperial Military Academy, Kajiyama had a career in local politics before entering politics. He has been elected seven times from his Ibaraki LH constituency. As secretary general, Kajiyama is charged with managing the LDP campaign effort in the current election.

Mikio Kawaguchi (63) Chairman, NHK A graduate of Tokyo University, Kawaguchi is only the fourth NHK employee to head up the influential semi-government broadcasting network. Kawaguchi based his career on production of a number of successful musical and cultural shows.

Nobuhiko Kawamoto (57) President, Honda Motors Corporation
A graduate of Tohoku University, Kawamoto is an engineer by profession.

Yohei Kono (56): Chief Cabinet Secretary A Waseda and Stanford University graduate, Kono is the son of LDP founder and powerbroker Ichiro Kono. Kono broke with the LDP in 1976 to establish the conservative reformist group, the New Liberal Club. He returned to the party after the 1986 election and is a key leader of the LDP Miyazawa faction. He has been elected nine times from his Kanagawa LH constituency.

Dr. Yutaka Kosai (60) President, Japan Center for Economic Research A graduate of Tokyo University, Kosai worked at the Economic Planning Agency before leaving to teach economics at the Tokyo Institute of Technology and later head up the JCER, which is a think-tank sponsored by the Nihon Keizai Shimbun group.

Dr. Chumaru Koyama (56) President, Waseda University A graduate of Waseda University, Koyama is a specialist in Western Philosophy.

Yutaka Kume (72) Chairman, Nissan Motors A graduate of Tokyo University, Kume majored in engineering.

Amb. Nobuo Matsunaga (70) President, Japan Institute for International Affairs A graduate of Tokyo University, Matsunaga has had a distinguished diplomatic career, including serving as Ambassador to the United States between 1985 and 1989.

Hiroshi Mitsuzuka (65) Chairman, LDP Policy Affairs Research Council A graduate of Waseda University, Mitsuzuka entered politics after working as a Diet staffer. He has been elected seven times from his Miyagi LH constituency. Known for his expertise in the transport area, Mitsuzuka is a candidate to succeed Kajiyama as secretary general and a possible future prime ministerial candidate.

Yoshiro Mori (56): MITI Minister A Waseda University graduate, where he played rugby, Mori entered politics after working as a reporter and a Diet staffer. Elected eight times from his Ishikawa LH constituency, he is a key member of the LDP Mitsuzuka faction and considered a future prime minister.

Akio Morita (72) Chairman, U.S.-Japan Businessmen's Council
A graduate of Osaka University in physics, Morita is the founder and chairman of the Sony Corporation.

Takeshi Nagano (70) Chairman, Japan Employers Federation A Tokyo University graduate who also attended Colombia University for advanced studies in metallurgy, Nagano is chairman of the Mitsubishi Material Company.

Toshitada Nakae (64) President, Asahi Shimbun A graduate of Tokyo University, Nakae moved through the ranks before assuming the top position at Japan's most influential newspaper in 1989.

Kenichi Omae (50) Chairman, Heisei Isshin no Kai A Waseda University graduate, Omae is the controversial head of the Tokyo office of the American consulting firm, McKinsey. With an eye on reforming Japan's politics from a business perspective, he organized the Heisei Isshin no Kai (Heisei Reformation Group) last year to promote progressive candidates. His group has endorsed 70 in the current election.

Hatsuhisa Takashima (49) Chief Correspondent, NHK A graduate of Gakushuin University, Takashima was NHK's Washington correspondent from 1974-1978. He has anchored NHK's widely watched evening news broadcast.

Shoichiro Toyoda (68) Chairman, Toyota Motors Corporation A graduate of Tokyo University, Toyoda majored in engineering.

Mitsuharu Warashina (55) Member, Upper House A graduate of Waseda University, Warashina a former chairman of the powerful Electrical Workers Union and a strong advocate of political reform.

Etsuya Washio (54) Chairman, Japan Steelworkers Union A graduate of Waseda University, Washio played a key role in the creation of the moderate Japan Trade Union Federation and is a proponent of unity among Japan's opposition parties.

Michio Watanabe (70): Chairman, LDP Watanabe Faction A Hitotsubashi University graduate, Watanabe was a tax accountant before entering politics. He has been elected ten times from his Tochigi LH constituency. Watanabe resigned as Foreign Minister in April 1993 due to probable pancreatic cancer, but remains a potential successor to Prime Minister Miyazawa.

Tsuneo Watanabe (67) CEO, Yomiuri Shimbun A Tokyo University graduate, Watanabe joined the paper as cub reporter in 1950. He was the Washington bureau chief from 1968 to 1971.

Sadao Yamahana (57) Chairman, Japan Socialist Party A Chuo University graduate, Yamahana was a lawyer before entering politics. He has been elected six times from his Tokyo LH district. Yamahana was the surprise compromise candidate to succeed outgoing chairman Makoto Tanabe, who resigned in December 1992. He is seeking to modify JSP positions on the Self Defense Forces and nuclear power, which are out of step with majority opinion in Japan.

Points of interest will include candy shops, bakeries, traditional restaurants, Mahjong parlors (not recommended), pizza, book stores, used cd/record shops, a post office and two barber shops.

After the photo, THE PRESIDENT and other Heads of State will return through the Salon room and proceed to the second floor Kacho-No-Ma session room. At 2:30 p.m. the Summit meeting will begin. The first five minutes of the meeting will be open for a photo opportunity.

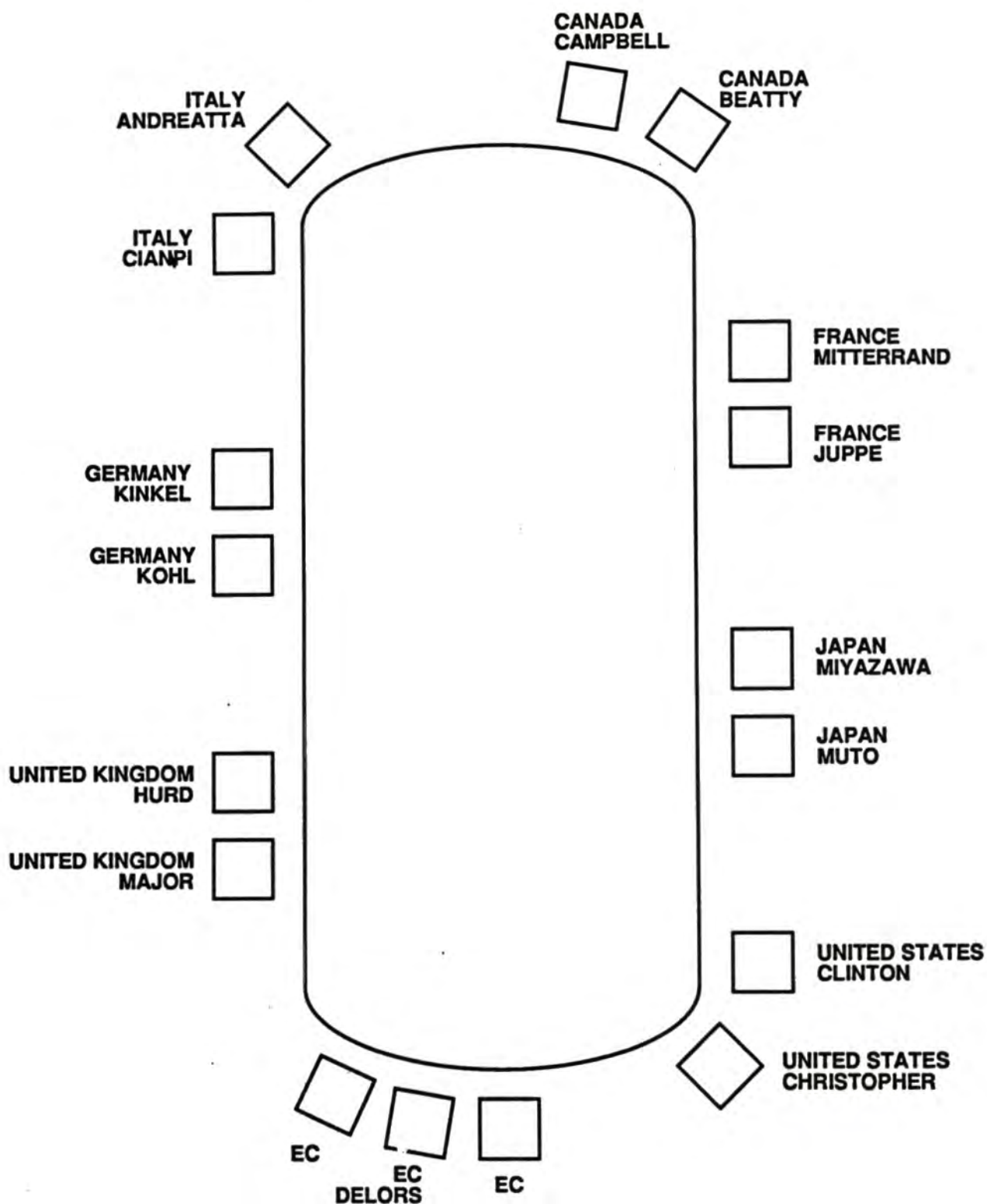

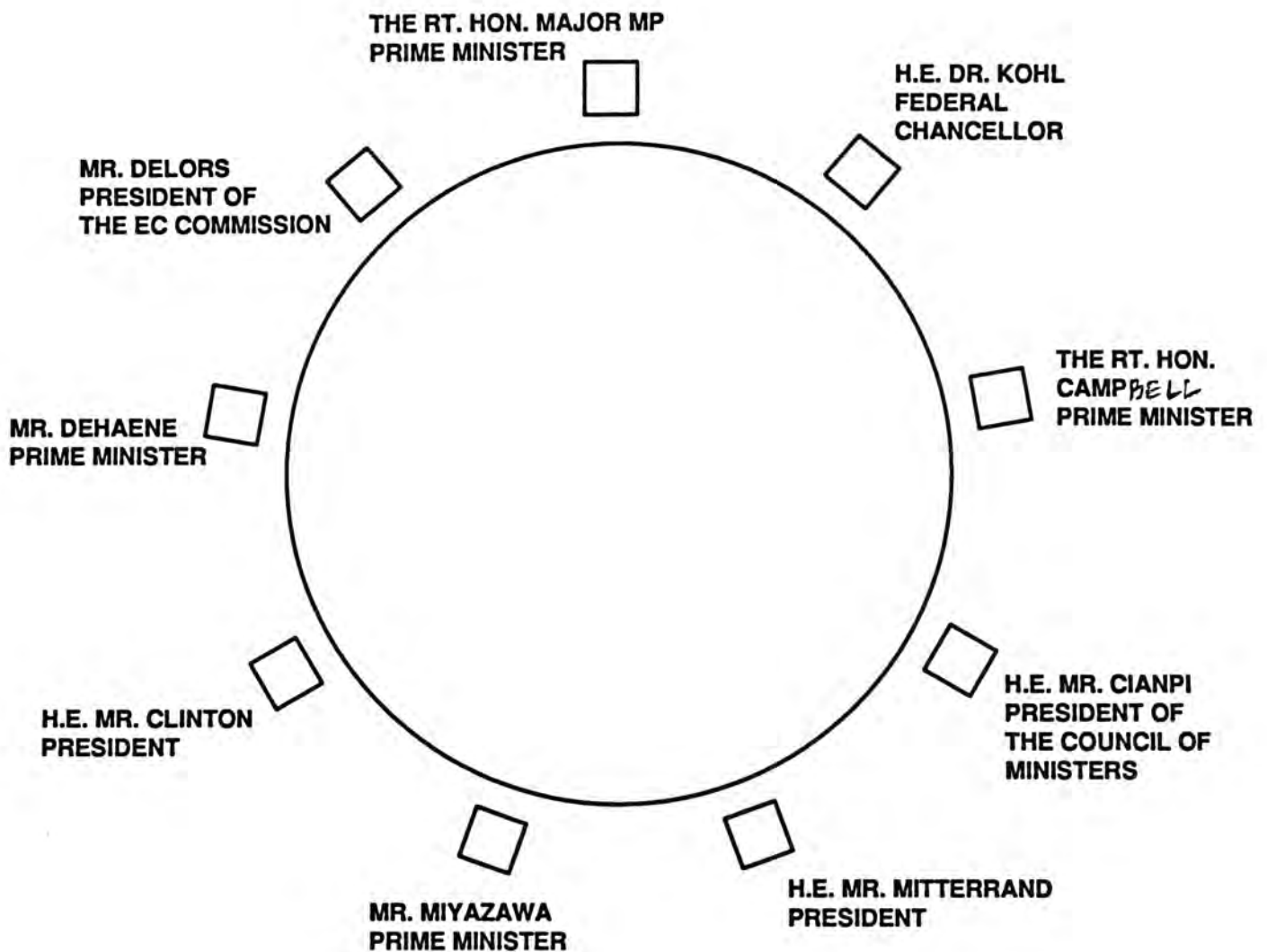

He and Secretary Christopher, escorted by a Japanese liaison officer, proceed directly to the second floor Hagaro-No-Ma room, where the Heads of Delegation and Foreign Ministers session will be held. 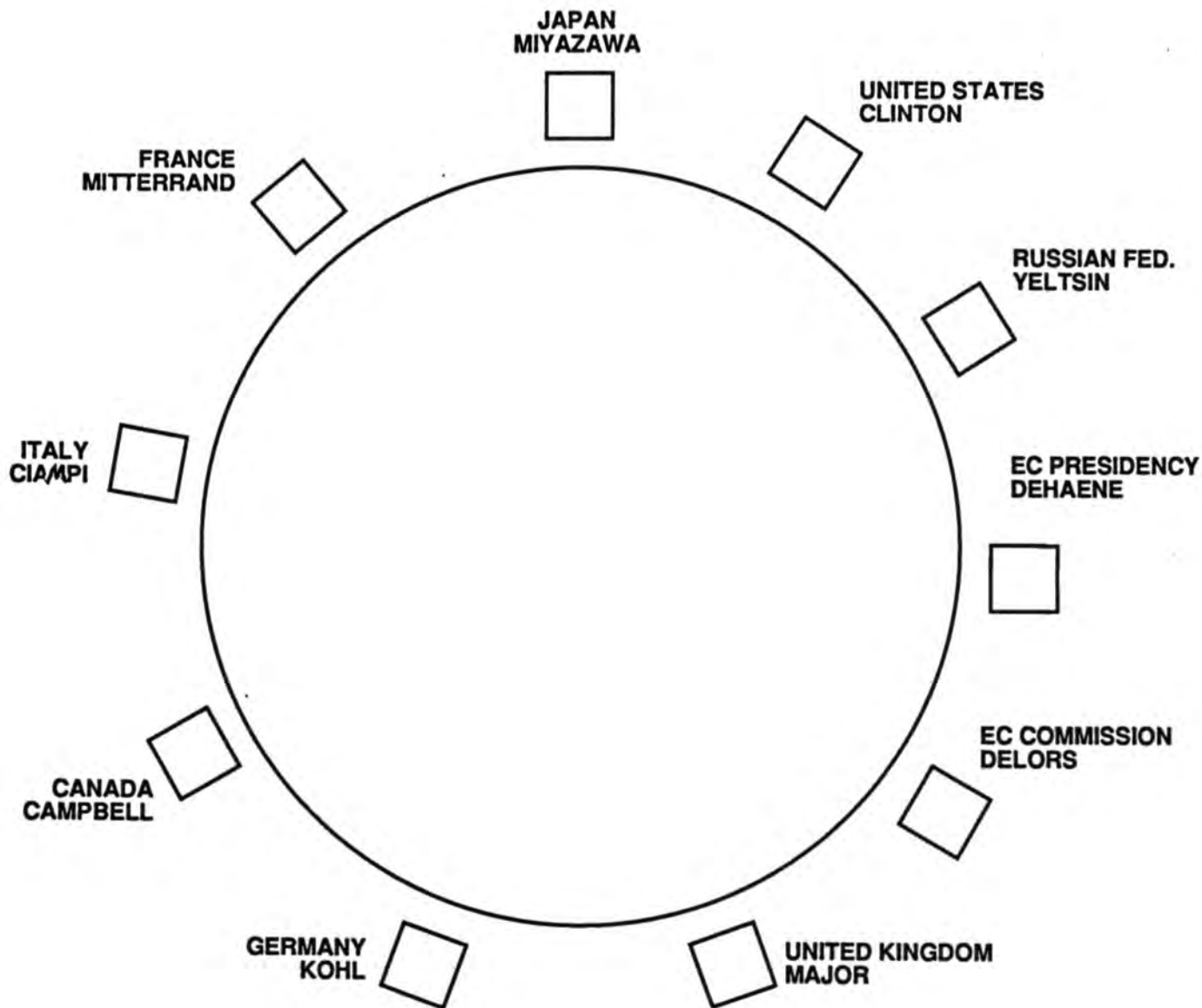

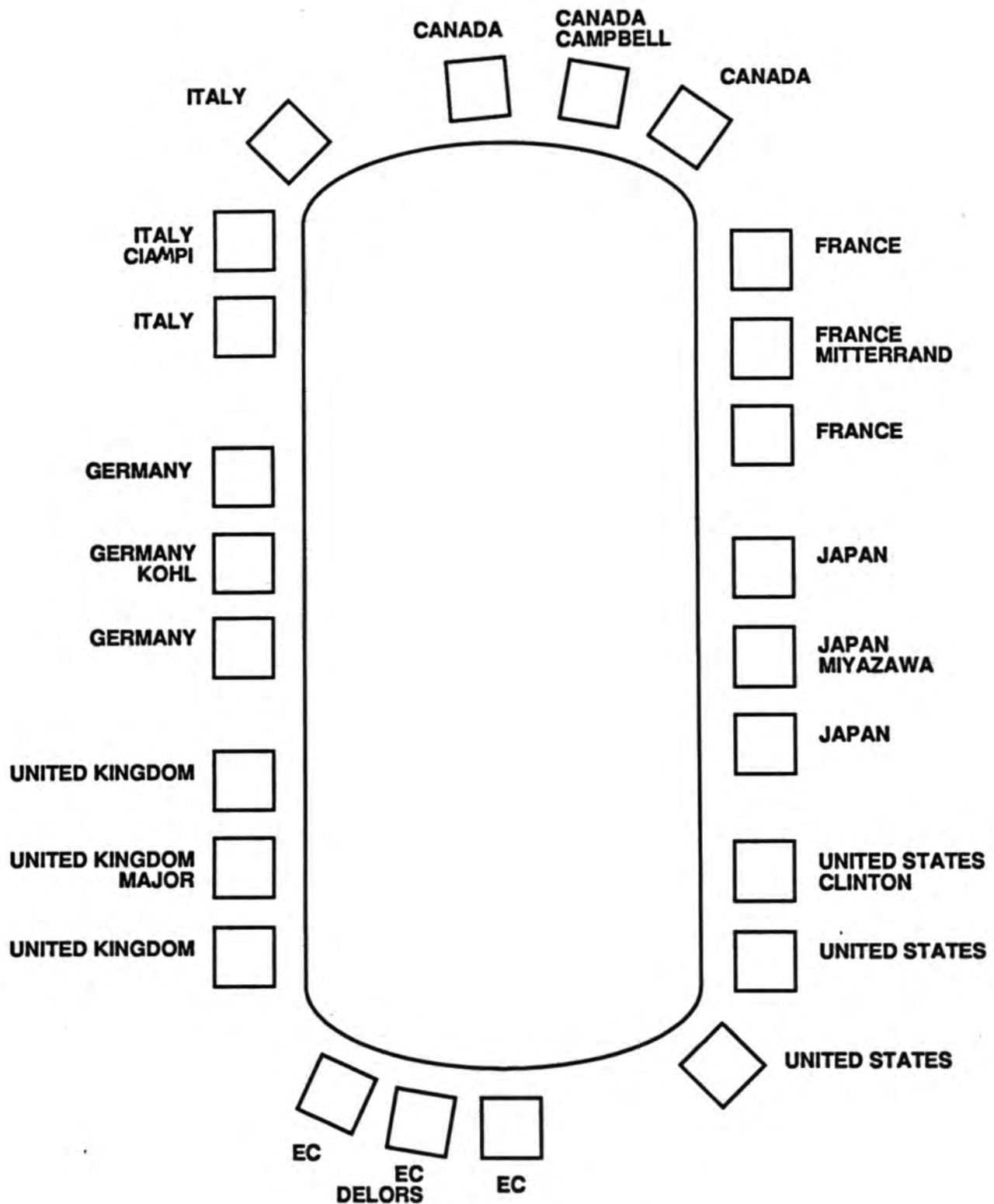
