AT JOHNS HOPKINS UNIVERSITY**

I. PURPOSE

This event is intended to continue the momentum from the delivery of The Health Security Act of 1993 to Congress yesterday. This speech, to an enthusiastic audience of over 1000 people, is the public counterpart of yesterday's event at which you will hold up a copy of the Report to America as opposed to delivering the actual bill. In addition to signifying a new phase of this debate, your remarks are intended to convey three things: 1) we have a plan; 2) our plan is both universal and comprehensive and we will not accept a final plan which is not; and 3) we have listened to and incorporated advice and experience from the medical community which we now challenge to get involved in the debate which will follow.

II. BACKGROUND

The medical community at Johns Hopkins provides an ideal group to speak to following the delivery of the health care legislation to Congress yesterday. Johns Hopkins is identified as providing and training ground for some of the best quality health care in the country. The audience, a mixture of students from the schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Hygiene and Public Health, and health professionals from the Johns Hopkins Hospital have thought about and worked hard for health care reform. The undergraduates, although not all pre-med, are more attuned to health care issues than most undergraduates you would find.

This event is being held on the main undergraduate campus of Johns Hopkins University so that the largest audience possible could be accommodated. The audience is still largely comprised of people from the medical community.

History--The University

Johns Hopkins University was founded in 1876 and was the first university in the Western Hemisphere modeled on the European research institution, where research and the advancement of knowledge were integrally linked to teaching. The university is named for its initial benefactor, Baltimore merchant Johns Hopkins, whose \$7 million bequest was evenly divided to finance the establishment of both the university and the Johns Hopkins Hospital.

The university enrolls 15,865 full and part-time students on three campuses. About 27% of the undergraduate students from this campus go on to medical school. Johns Hopkins ranks first among U.S. universities in receipt of federal research and development funds.

History--The Medical Complex

The Johns Hopkins Medical Complex includes the schools of Medicine, Hygiene and Public Health and Nursing as well as the Johns Hopkins Hospital.

The School of Medicine created the first modern medical curriculum, including bedside patient care and laboratory research. It was recently ranked #2 (behind Harvard) by the 1993 U.S. News and World Report's Annual rankings. The School of Medicine is also the largest recipient of National Institutes of Health research grants to medical schools.

The School of Hygiene and Public Health is renowned for contributions to preventive medicine worldwide and ranks first among all public health schools in research support from the federal government.

The School of Nursing was one of the first to develop community-based coursework which takes students to transitional housing sites, homeless shelters, and inner-city schools. Hopkins has the only Peace Corps Fellows Program in nursing in the country.

U.S. News & World Report has also rated the Johns Hopkins Hospital the best hospital in America. The hospital has grown from its original 220 beds to more than 1,000 and is now the centerpiece of a larger, comprehensive health care organization, The Johns Hopkins Health Care System. The system, formed in 1986, also includes the Francis Scott Key Medical Center, a Baltimore facility with 315 acute-care beds. A 420,000 square foot Johns Hopkins Outpatient Center opened in 1992 adjacent to Johns Hopkins Hospital to consolidate and enhance outpatient treatment. Other elements of the health system are the Johns Hopkins Geriatrics Center, a chronic hospital and nursing home of 255 beds; Johns Hopkins Medical Services Corporation; a 19-site ambulatory care practice; and Johns Hopkins Home Care Group, which provides home health services and equipment.

(Many faculty from the Medical School and health professionals from the Johns Hopkins Hospital have been involved in the work of the Health Care Task Force and subsequent drafting of the legislation. More detailed information is attached.)

I. PURPOSE

Mayor Dinkins faces Republican Rudolph Giuliani in New York City's mayoral election Tuesday, November 2, 1993. This rally in Queens is to generate enthusiasm among the Mayor's supporters going into the campaign's final weekend. The theme is "Bring Democrats Home."

II. BACKGROUND

You last visited New York Sunday, September 26, for a health care event in Queens at the Future Diner and a Dinkins fundraiser in Manhattan. Queens is one of Dinkins' most difficult boroughs; mostly white and largely Jewish or Catholic, this area of the city is populated by Giuliani's strongest constituencies. To win on Tuesday, Dinkins must perform better than expected here. The rally will be held in an IBEW union hall in Representative Gary Ackerman's congressional district. Representative Ackerman will accompany you on Air Force One to New York and to the rally.
