SUBJECT: SEATTLE TRIP, SPECIAL ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

It is politically important that you recognize Dan Hartley, President of the 27,000 member Boeing engineers union during your Seattle trip. Most of the members are in the Seattle area.

The union, formally called the Seattle Professional Engineers Association, is not AFL-CIO affiliated and does not endorse candidates, although it takes stands on issues such as NAFTA and is considered an important political group.

President Hartley, himself an engineer, demonstrated considerable courage with NAFTA. Most of his membership thinks more like AFL, and he is obviously at odds with the Boeing machinists, who actively opposed.

Nevertheless, after extensive meetings with myself, Chris Dorval and Ken Brody at Exim, Hartley stopped his union's anti-NAFTA endorsement plans. He went so far as to hold a decisive vote to reject an anti-NAFTA plank and got over 50% of the executive board to vote for NAFTA. Unfortunately, he fell short on the union's 60% threshold rule to take a formal position for NAFTA.

Tomorrow in Seattle, you will be holding a rally at Boeing. Current plans, as I understand it, include a greeting line which includes the machinists representatives but does not include Hartley. I believe Hartley has earned a place in that greeting line or some other appropriate gesture from you. I will make the same recommendation to Joan Baggett.

SUBJECT: Background Information on the Washington State Economy

This memorandum presents background information about current conditions and issues in Washington. It addresses (i) issues of major concern in the state, and (ii) Administration programs that will help the state.

I. PRESSING ISSUES IN WASHINGTON

- *Boeing's Exports to China* -- Seattle-based Boeing employs 89,100 people in Washington -- down from 98,300 a year ago. Since 1972, China's airlines have taken delivery of 105 Boeing jetliners -- 60 of them in the past 6 years. Currently the announced value of unfilled Boeing orders from the Civil Aviation Administration of China is more than \$3.7 billion, involving 62 aircraft (737, 747, 757 and 767 aircraft, and Boeing's newest jetliner, the 777 twinjet). The company estimates every \$1 billion in exports = 8,700 labor years of direct employment in the United States. (Source: Boeing Commercial Airplane Group)
- *Exports Important to Microsoft* -- Washington State-based Microsoft has grown from 3 employees in 1975 to its current level of 14,500 (8,000 in Washington State). More than 55% of Microsoft's \$3.75 billion revenues come from foreign sales. APEC countries account for 15-20% of Microsoft's revenues -- APEC countries represent the fastest growing part of Microsoft's business. (Source: Microsoft Corporation)
- *NAFTA* -- Washington's exports to Mexico and Canada reached \$2.6 billion in 1992, and supported 18,900 jobs. (Source: USTR)

Microsoft's Bill Gates, "NAFTA contains the strongest intellectual property provisions negotiated by the United States in any trade agreement to date. Approval of NAFTA is vitally important to the software industry -- and to the country." (Source: Washington Post op-ed, January 18, 1993)

Washington Apple Commission, "U.S. fresh apples to Mexico are expected to double under the NAFTA. Annual sales of \$100 million will add significantly to our state's economy." (Source: Washington Apple Commission)

- **Job Losses in Manufacturing** -- According to DoC, employment in manufacturing fell from 376,000 in 1989 to 363,000 in 1992 -- a net loss of 13,000 jobs.

Net decline in total employment in manufacturing (Washington, 1989-1992):

- chemicals and allied products (-7,000 jobs)
- transportation equipment, excl. motor vehicles (-5,000 jobs)
- lumber and wood products (-5,000 jobs)

- **Base Closure** -- As a result of the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission's 1993 recommendations, Washington will gain 3,700 military and 450 civilian jobs. However 1,200 military jobs and 100 civilian jobs will be lost at Fairchild AFB. The Puget Sound Naval Shipyard will lose 175 jobs. (Source: BRAC)

FYI On October 22, you announced a number of early TRP award selections. The remainder of the winning projects will be announced sometime this month. One of the winners on the October 22 list was led by Seattle's Clean Washington Center. This recycling technology assistance project is worth \$2.5 million. (Note: Federal share to be negotiated. Other winning project partners include Seattle's Northwest Policy Center and the National Recycling Coalition.)

III. ADMINISTRATION PROGRAMS THAT WILL BENEFIT WASHINGTON

According to Treasury estimates, based on a variety of demographic and economic data, your economic growth plan for Washington (1993-1998) includes the following:

- \$396 million investment in worker training and higher education;
- \$261 million investment in schools and children;
- \$182 million investment in housing and communities;
- \$280 million investment in health and AIDS research;
- \$415 million investment in highways, mass transit and environmental infrastructure;
- \$221 million investment in technology (including defense conversion);
- \$388 million in tax incentives for business investment; and
- \$333 million in tax credits for the working poor (Expanded EITC, fully-phased).

SUBJECT: Washington State Update

In a visit to Seattle on November 10, Ira Magaziner had meetings with Governor Mike Lowry and other key officials to discuss Washington State's health reform efforts in the context of national health reform.

During a private meeting with the Governor, the Governor was concerned primarily with the flexibility in the President's proposal and how the Washington State plan would be impacted.

Following this meeting, Ira met with the Insurance Commissioner, Deborah Senn, state Senator Phil Talmadge (Chair, Senate Health Committee), the State Health Services Commission Chair, Bernie Dochnahl, the state health services commissioner Don Brennan and the State health services commission director Randy Revelle to discuss their concerns and benefit from their insights as a state that has just recently passed comprehensive health reform. Their concerns were the following: ERISA waivers, state flexibility, the fee-for-service requirement.

We also benefitted from some political insights: with a similar reform package, the State of Washington faced similar political hurdles to the ones we're currently facing: limited business support, small business opposition. They had the support of the provider community, both physicians and hospitals.

Concerns of the employer community

The employer community opposed the employer mandate, the comprehensiveness of the benefits package, the 80/20 employer/employee contribution and the premium caps. To placate business, the State went to a 50/50 contribution, a slower phase-in, added small business subsidies and went with a less comprehensive benefit package (skimming down on the mental health, dental and vision benefits).

SUBJECT Seattle Base Closure

The 1995 closure of Puget Sound Naval Air Station, Sand Point, has spurred disagreement over the disposal of the 151 acres of base property. While the City of Seattle and community groups have agreed that they want to use the property for several purposes, the Bureau of Indian Affairs has requested the property for the Muckleshoot Indian tribe.

The Tribe would like to use the property to house its fishing fleet, an Indian junior college, a drug treatment and alcohol treatment center and commercial and light industrial businesses and has threatened to sue if it is not awarded the base property. The city, the local community and local housing advocates want to use the property for housing the homeless, community cultural organizations and to expand the adjoining Magnuson Park.

The Department of the Interior and the Navy are actively involved in discussions regarding the priority of claims for the land according to several federal statutes.

We recommend, if asked, that you explain that the established process is continuing and no decision has been made regarding the property.

COMMERCE

Washington State, with \$74 billion in two-way trade in 1992, is the country's most trade-dependent state; one in five Washington jobs is tied to overseas commerce. Trade with Asia accounts for 85% of the Port of Seattle's business. Boeing, the nation's largest exporter, is headquartered in Seattle. Last year, Boeing sold one in six of its airplanes to China. Microsoft, also headquartered in the State, expects Asia to be its biggest market by the year 2000. Last year, Asia accounted for nearly 20% of Microsoft's \$3.75 billion in sales, and the market is growing at 60% per year, twice the rate of Europe or the U.S.

CRIME

Last Friday, Governor Lowry announced a "Youth Agenda" program to address growing youth violence. The plan will be discussed in public hearings next month and would outlaw possession of a handgun by anyone under 18-years-old.

DETENTION CENTER

Last week, the U.S. Bureau of Prisons announced intentions to build a detention center for prisoners awaiting trial or sentencing in federal courts at Sea-Tac, an 11-acre site south of Seattle-Tacoma International Airport. The \$63 million center, housing 500 inmates, should be ready by 1997 and will provide 225 jobs.

In preparation to your trip to Seattle for the APEC Conference I want to bring to your attention an issue of tremendous importance for the Puget Sound region.

The Department of Defense is currently giving serious review to acquisition of commercially derived aircraft to meet our critical airlift requirements. Undersecretary of Defense John Deutch last week visited Boeing facilities in Seattle with me to review the potential to utilize 747 and 767s for this mission. We are optimistic that a decision on this issue from the Department will be coming shortly, and the Congress has provided funding to initiate such a program.

I sincerely believe this is an opportunity to provide the nation with cost effective military assets while at the same time providing important work that can help avoid further employment reductions in the Puget Sound area.

I have provided background information on the issue to your staff and hope that you will be able to give this matter your personal attention.
