Radio Address to the Nation
Los Angeles, California
December 4, 1993

Good morning. Today, I'm in Los Angeles, where I'm holding a meeting on the economy, and its impact on southern California.

I came into office with a national economic strategy. A strategy to regain control of America's economic destiny. To put confidence back into our people. To strengthen their families. A strategy to rebuild the American dream.

When I was growing up, Americans left the heartland to come to California and chase the American dream: a steady job; a home of your own; and a secure environment for your family. But in California today -- especially southern California -- too many people are running in place just to keep from falling behind.

For too long, the government in Washington ignored roadblocks that stood in the way of an economic recovery: a trade deficit; an investment deficit that hurts workers caught in changing times and communities plagued by crime; and a budget deficit that drains money from our economy.

All of these roadblocks kept America from moving. California most of all. And California is paying the price. But in my time in office, we've taken those roadblocks head-on. Let me tell you how:

The strength of our economy, and the security of American jobs, is now tied to our ability to sell our products abroad. That's why we just passed the North American Free Trade Agreement. With NAFTA, we'll sell more products stamped "Made in the U.S.A." We're also working hard on the GATT talks. And we've established better trade relations with Asia.

California is America's strategic link to the economies in Latin America and the Pacific Rim. This state exports more than any state in the union. Here, one out of every ten jobs is now tied to exports. We've launched America's first national export strategy. We cut back government export controls on \$37 billion worth of high-tech products. It's good for trade. And it's good for workers in high-tech industries, in places like California.

Just yesterday, we announced the third round of grants in our Technology Reinvestment Project. This plan helps small defense firms make the transition to commercial markets. It takes military technology and puts it to use in the civilian economy. All of this is just part of a national defense conversion plan that totals \$20 billion dollars over five years.

We've taken other steps to strengthen the value of work, our families, and the communities we live in.

For all of you parents who raise children, work full-time, and still live below the poverty line, we expanded your Earned Income Tax Credit. Twenty million of you will pay lower taxes next April 15. For American families, work is better than welfare.

We passed the Family and Medical Leave law. Now people can care for a sick parent, or a new baby, without fear of losing their jobs. We streamlined the student loan program, and made it easier for you to get a small business loan.

We've brought the deficit down. And interest rates are down. Maybe you've just bought your first home. Or refinanced your mortgage. Single family housing starts are at their highest level in 6 years. Existing home sales are at a 14-year high.

Maybe you've borrowed money to expand your business. Economic indicators -- from durable goods, to business spending on equipment, to auto sales -- show manufacturing and consumer confidence picking up. Personal income is up. And we've created more jobs in nine months than all the jobs of the last four years combined.

That's encouraging news. But it hasn't reached everyone yet. And too many people still lack good paying jobs. Of all the jobs lost nationally since 1990, one in five are right here in L.A. County.

This afternoon, I'm going to Canoga Park, in the western part of the San Fernando Valley, for a meeting on the economy with business and community leaders. We'll meet face-to-face, to go over ideas. See what's working. And identify what could be working better.

Our goal in California is the same nationwide: to build a recovery that will carry us through the changes in our economy and put us on the road to lasting economic growth.

For America to stay strong, every American must have a chance to compete and succeed. We've still got a lot of work ahead of us. But we're working hard.

And you have to work hard, too. None of what we do in our session today matters if people aren't ready to seize opportunities, take responsibility, and rebuild their communities. All this can't be done by government alone.

Leaders can't protect the economic interests of America's middle class if our people aren't living by middle class values. We have to rebuild our communities from the ground up: home by home, street by street, and block by block. And I need you to help me do it.

In times of change, Americans have always sought new opportunities, for themselves, their families and their neighbors. That expansive, forward-looking spirit is what brought people out here to California in the first place -- across wagon trails, and over highways on the open road.

Times have changed. They always do. But we're putting America on the right road to reach a better tomorrow. But to move forward, we have to go down that road together. I hope you'll join me.

BACKGROUND ON CALIFORNIA TRIP MEMBERS

Senator Barbara Boxer (D) recently voted against the NAFTA implementing legislation. Earlier in the year she voted for the Budget Reconciliation package. Senator Boxer is not a co-sponsor of the Administration's Health Security Act. She and Senator Feinstein, as well as Representatives Horn and Tucker are all new to their present elected posts. She took a leadership role on the Abortion Clinic Access Bill, spending a great deal of time defending the bill on the floor.

Senator Dianne Feinstein (D) also voted against the NAFTA implementing legislation. Like Senator Boxer, she voted for the Budget, and is not a co-sponsor of the Administration's Health Security Act. She sponsored the amendment to ban assault weapons, a stance that was risky and shows her skills and tenacity.

Representative Anthony Beilenson (D) worked the NAFTA vote for the Administration; although he was not one of the main players, his activity was consistent. He voted with the Administration on Penny-Kasich and the Budget. He is a co-sponsor of McDermott's Health bill. He won with 56% in a district where the President won with 48%.

Representative Howard Berman (D) was one of the more important undecideds who moved to work with the Administration on NAFTA. He voted with us on Penny-Kasich and the Budget, and is a co-sponsor of the Administration's Health Security Act. He won his 1992 election with 61% of the vote in a district the President carried with 56%. He is expected to play a significant role as an opinion leader in the health care debate.

Representative Julian Dixon (D) voted against the NAFTA, but with us on Penny Kasich and the Budget. He is a co-sponsor of the Administration Health Security Act. He won with 87% in a district which the President carried with 77%. As do several members of the CBC, he has strong concerns about worker retraining.

Representative Elton Gallegly (R) voted wrong on the Budget, wrong on NAFTA, and wrong on Penny-Kasich. He won his election by 54% in a district the President won with 38%.

Representative Steven Horn (R) voted right on NAFTA. More significantly, he was one of only 18 Republicans to vote right on Penny-Kasich. He has co-sponsored the Cooper Health bill. He, too, is a new member, winning the election with 48% in a district the President carried with 44% of the vote.

Representative Carlos Moorhead (R) voted right on NAFTA, and wrong on Penny-Kasich and the Budget. He won with 49% in a district the President carried with 44%.

I. PURPOSE

Meet with cross-section of Southern California business and community leaders to discuss the state of the California economy. In contrast to the Little Rock Economic Conference one year ago this weekend, our objective here will be to communicate the Administration's progress to date in addressing California's economic ills and to evaluate ideas for further efforts.

II. BACKGROUND

Thirty-three participants will join the President, Commerce Secretary Ron Brown, Mayor Dick Riordan, and Senators Feinstein and Boxer for this roundtable discussion. The President will moderate the meeting, which will commence with presentations on the State of the California Economy, and proceed with discussions regarding Defense Reinvestment and Technology; Trade and Trade Policy; and Community Development and Urban Planning. (See separate Roundtable Briefing Book, for scenario and support memoranda.)

The economy in California, and particularly Southern California, has been reeling since 1990 as a result of structural economic changes and the significant reduction of defense dollars and foreign capital flowing into the region. Moreover, in the aftermath of a long recession, significant high wage job loss, riots, fires, floods and wanton violence, many Californians feel that they live in the State of Job. For the first time, more people are leaving the State than arriving, and those that arrive often do so illegally.

Californians are hurting; many do not understand how the Clinton economic policies are benefiting the state, and are unaware of the numerous targeted steps that have been taken to boost the economy. Against this background, it is important to communicate that the President does understand the depth of the problems, and is taking direct and concrete steps to address them. It is also important, however, to remind people that these problems require long term solutions, with the private sector very much in partnership with all levels of government.

The audience of observers to the roundtable (about 100) will include most of the elected officials from Los Angeles County, at the local, state, and federal level.
