KEY DEPARTMENT NEWS

USDA Prepares For National Rural Conference

#X P7XP#USDA continues to prepare for the National Rural Conference and its series of six regional rural forums during the week of April 17-24. The forums and National Conference will focus on the challenges facing rural America and the importance of strengthening the rural economy and rural communities as the country prepares for the 21st Century. The forums will use a three-hour town hall meeting format and will include site visits, presentations by local individuals, and meetings with local USDA employees. During the forums, I will listen to the concerns of rural Americans and begin a dialogue which will help USDA and the Administration work together to develop solutions to create jobs and improve rural communities.

Today and tomorrow, I will be interviewed by targeted television stations during one-hour satellite tours to promote the Conference and forums. Today, I also convened a roundtable discussion with Iowa reporters. On April 11, I was interviewed by the Des Moines Register and tomorrow, I will also give an interview to WOI radio in Ames, Iowa.

USDA To Establish Task Force To Study Forest Service Policies and Programs

On April 11, I directed USDA Under Secretary for Natural Resources and Environment Jim Lyons to establish a task force to evaluate the statutes, regulations, policies, and programs that guide the activities of the USDA Forest Service, including those that are implemented by other agencies but affect activities on National Forest System lands. The task force was directed to consider how these authorities relate to each other, how they conflict, and where conflicts occur. In addition, they are to recommend measures which would reduce conflicts and

nd redundancies and improve

cost efficiency. During my confirmation hearings, I affirmed my commitment to improve the Forest Service's ability to fulfill its mission in the most efficient and effective manner possible. (See USDA Work On Presidential Initiatives: Forest Plan/Pacific Northwest Economic Adjustment Initiative)

National Meeting To Focus On USDA Food Safety Proposal

On April 17th, the National Advisory Committee on Microbiological Criteria Food Safety will meet in Arlington, Virginia to discuss the USDA proposed pathogen reduction and Hazard and Critical Control Points (HACCP) proposal, the Department's proposed rule which would significantly reform meat and poultry inspection systems, as well as USDA's "fresh" labeling poultry rule.

Kickoff Scheduled For South Carolina Food Stamp Improvement Project

On May 1, the South Carolina Department of Social Services, the Social Security Administration, and USDA will launch a major outreach effort to elderly and disabled persons while streamlining the certification process of the Food Stamp Program. The South Carolina Food Stamp Improvement Project should result in more elderly and disabled persons receiving food stamps. Also, as part of this effort, the South Carolina state agency should experience reduced administrative costs.

Animal Health Meeting in Mexico

On April 24th, the United States-Mexico Animal Health (technical working group) meeting will be held in Taxco, Mexico to discuss progress on technical animal health issues between the two countries. Significant phytosanitary and sanitary issues have arisen between the United States and Mexico on animal health issues, as well as on other agricultural commodity trade issues.

USDA WORK ON PRESIDENTIAL INITIATIVES

National Rural Conference

USDA continues to assist with the President's National Rural Conference, which

will
be held in Ames, Iowa on April 25. (See Key Department News: USDA Prepares For
National Rural Conference and Press Inquiries: Press Contacts With USDA)

Forest Plan/Pacific Northwest Economic Adjustment Initiative

On April 12, I issued a directive to USDA Under Secretary for Natural Resources and Environment Jim Lyons to establish a task force to evaluate the statutes, regulations, and policies that guide activities of the USDA Forest Service. (See Key Department News: USDA To Establish Task Force To Study Forest Service Policies and Programs) USDA Pacific Northwest Regional Forester John Lowe recently announced the creation of a Jobs-In-The-Woods Watershed Restoration Coordinator. This position will serve as the regional focal point for questions or concerns regarding the Jobs-In-The-Woods component of the President's Northwest Forest Plan. The program creates family-wage job opportunities in timber-dependent communities while completing important watershed restoration work. The Regional Forester also directed three Regional Staff Directors to assure timely assistance and consistent advice regarding matching up restoration projects with priority community needs.

USDA Continues Rescission Message

Members of the USDA SubCabinet, Deputy Secretary Richard Rominger, and I continue to carry the Administration's message on proposed budget rescissions through meetings with Members of Congress, constituent groups, and the media.

Empowerment Zone/Enterprise Community (EZ/EC) Update

A USDA Rural Economic and Community Development Community Facilities loan of \$750,000 will be made available soon for a County Agricultural Complex in the Jackson, Florida Enterprise Community. This will be the initial EZ/EC award for this Community, as well as the first Community Facility under the EZ/EC process.

% CONGRESS

Congressional Hearings

On April 17, the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee will hold a field hearing in Elwood, Illinois regarding H.R. 714, a bill to establish the Midewin National Tallgrass Prairie, the largest prairie preserve east of the Mississippi River. USDA Eastern Regional Forester Floyd Marita will testify.

On April 17, 24, 26, and 28, respectively, the House Resources Committee Endangered Species Task Force will hold field hearings on the Endangered Species Act of 1973 at the following locations: Bakersfield, California; Vancouver, Washington; Riverside, California; and Stockton, California.

On April 18 and 20, respectively, the House Agriculture Subcommittee on General Farm Commodities will hold farm bill field hearings in Grand Island, Nebraska and Sioux City, Iowa.

The House Agriculture Subcommittee on Dairy, Livestock, and Poultry will hold a farm bill field hearing in Eau Claire, Wisconsin. On April 19, 20, 24, and 26, respectively, the Subcommittee will hold farm bill field hearings at the following locations: St. Paul, Minnesota; Tulare, California; Syracuse, New York; and Okeechobee, Florida.

The House Agriculture Subcommittee on Resource, Conservation, Research, and Forestry will hold a farm bill field hearing on April 18 in Akron, Colorado.

On April 19, the House Resources Committee Wetlands Task Force will hold a field hearing in Sacramento, California on wetlands issues.

On April 21, 25, and 26, respectively, the House Agriculture Committee will hold farm bill field hearings at the following places: Stockton, California; Lubbock, Texas; and Dodge City, Kansas.

On April 26, the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Agriculture and Rural Development will hold a hearing on FY96 appropriations for the USDA Food, Nutrition

on, and Consumer Services. USDA Assistant Secretary for Food, Nutrition, and Consumer Services Ellen Haas will testify.

The Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee will hold an April 26 oversight hearing to determine how the management of the national forests is hampered by inconsistent and costly requirements under current statutes.

The House Agriculture Subcommittee on General Farm Commodities will hold April 27 and 28 farm bill field hearings in Vicksburg, Mississippi and Woodward, Oklahoma. The House Agriculture Subcommittee on Risk Management and Specialty Crops will hold farm bill field hearings on April 27 and 28 in Belle Glade, Florida and Albany, Georgia.

On April 27, the House Agriculture Subcommittee on Department Operations, Nutrition, and Foreign Agriculture will hold a farm bill field hearing in Portageville, Missouri.

On May 2, the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Interior will hold a hearing on FY96 USDA Forest Service appropriations. USDA Under Secretary for Natural Resources and Environment Jim Lyons will testify.

On May 3, the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Agriculture, Rural Development, and Related Agencies will hold a hearing on FY96 agriculture appropriations. I am scheduled to testify.

During the second week in May, I am tentatively scheduled to testify before the House and Senate Agriculture Committees on the Administration's 1995 Farm Bill proposal.

Key Congressional Visits and Activities

Senator Bill Bradley is expected to offer an amendment to the Budget Reconciliation legislation that would terminate the excise tax exemption for ethanol.

On April 20, Congressman Ralph Regula and other Congressional Members are tentatively scheduled to visit the USDA Forest Service Pacific Southwest Region to learn more about the salvage and forest health situation in California.

On April 10, the USDA Consolidated Farm Service Agency risk management staff briefed the Senate Agriculture Committee staff on California flood assistance.

The USDA Forest Service has developed its Draft Environmental Impact Statement on gypsy moth eradication and plans to provide it to affected House and Senate Committees between May 4 and 12.

The House Agriculture Subcommittee on Risk Assessment and Specialty Crops recently held a meeting with impacted interests to discuss legislative changes to the Perishable Agricultural Commodities Act (PACA). Another meeting is scheduled for May 2 between the various parties in an effort to reach an agreement between the conflicting interests. The USDA Agricultural Marketing Service has been asked to provide the Department's position and proposals. Previously, the Department expressed strong support for the PACA, noting the importance of addressing some key issues, including insolvency of the fund.

KEY REGULATORY ACTION

Today, the proposed regulation for National Forest System Land and Resource Management Planning was published in the Federal Register and will be open for public comment for a 90-day period, ending July 7. The proposed rule emphasizes streamlined processes, reduces regulatory direction, strengthens relationships with the public, other federal agencies, state, local, and Native American tribal governments, and clarifies the agency's planning and decisionmaking process. It also provides for increased citizen participation, shorter time periods for forest plan revisions, increased coordination between national forests, and clarification on what decisions are being made by local USDA Forest Service officials.

On April 7, the Federal Register published a final rule revising Food Stamp Program regulations associated with the medical expense deduction. The requirement to publish the final rule was part of a stipulation reached with plaintiffs in the Graeser lawsuit. Plaintiffs

sued the Department for its alleged failure to implement changes to the medical expense deduction contained in the Mickey Leland Memorial Domestic Hunger Relief Act of 1990.

The Food Stamp Program's (FSP) proposed rule implementing USDA's expanded authority to share information provided by participating firms with other state and federal agencies will soon be published in the Federal Register. This rule will enhance the Department's ability to reduce illegal activity and fraud in the retail part of the FSP. This proposed rule has been reviewed and cleared by the Social Security Administration and the Internal Revenue Service.

Knight-Ridder is also working on an extensive piece on the HACCP proposal and meat and poultry inspection.

ABC News is preparing to broadcast an investigation of USDA's Market Promotion Program (MPP).

The Christian Science Monitor is preparing a story on the USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service policy toward brucellosis-infected elk populations in

Wyoming and Department work to resolve the brucellosis problem in the Greater Yellowstone National Park ecosystem.

The Washington Post and Virginia Farm Bureau News requested information about the size of vulture flocks in Montgomery County, Virginia, and how USDA can assist producers with livestock losses associated with the birds.

Associated Press inquired about the status of a petition submitted by Mexico to the Department to allow Mexican avocados to be imported into certain states in the United States from a specified area in Mexico. The petition has raised significant phytosanitary concerns in the California and Florida avocado growing regions and with the states' Congressional delegations.

FOIA REQUESTS

Associated Press filed a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request for all documents relating to USDA Forest Service communications with the Federal Aviation Administration and Senator Tom Daschle since 1985 in regard to B&L Aviation.

c" WEEK IN REVIEW

Tax Refund Offset Program Proves Successful

To date, collections made under the 1995 Tax Refund Offset Program exceed \$15.9 million from 41,162 offsets. Participating USDA agencies referred over 190,000 accounts with a value of over \$653 million to the Internal Revenue Service for offset against tax refunds due delinquent debtors. It is anticipated that 1995 collections will be over \$30 million.

USDA Represented At UN Commission on Sustainable Development

On April 12 and today, Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt and USDA Deputy Under Secretary for Natural Resources and Environment Adela Backiel led the U.S. delegation to the United Nations Commission on Sustainable Development meeting. Major forestry issues that were to be addressed include consideration for a high level intergovernmental panel on forests, continuation of work on criteria and indicators of sustainable forest management, timber certification and labelling schemes, forestry

donor coordination, and further implementation of the Rio Forest Principles at national levels.

Banished Youth Found On National Forest

The location of two teenagers who were banished to an isolated island in Alaska as punishment for attacking a pizza delivery man were recently located on the Tongass National Forest. No permit had been issued for their occupancy on the Forest. The USDA Forest Service, in consultation with the USDA Office of General Counsel and the U.S. Attorney's Office, is working with Native American groups to seek resolution to this controversial issue.

#XP7XP#Inner-City Fire Crews Prove Successful

Last week, training was conducted for new members of the Panthers' and Aztecs' fire crews, made up mostly of African-American and Hispanic inner-city youth in California. Both crews worked over 75 days during the 1994 fire season and will assist during the Angeles National Forest 1995 fire season. Operation of these crews is less expensive than Los Angeles County crews and provides a diverse applicant pool for temporary hiring needs. The USDA Forest Service is gaining a reputation as a friend of inner-city residents of this area. Over \$1.5 million in firefighter pay was attributed to be directed to the inner-city during the first two fire seasons. The program allows the USDA Forest Service to add crews for initial attack when its own resources are drawn down due to off-Forest assignments.

White House Staffer To Speak At USDA Conference On Technology

The USDA Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) announced this week that Angela Phillips Diaz, President Clinton's Executive Secretary for the National Science and Technology Council, will be among its key speakers at the FSIS scientific

fic
conference on New Technology to Improve Food Safety. The conference will be on April 12-13 in Chicago, Illinois, and is part of USDA outreach on its proposed Pathogen Reduction/Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Points (HACCP) regulation.

Guam's AFDC Benefit Shortfall May Impact Food Stamp Program

The USDA Food and Consumer Service (FCS) has recently learned that Guam faces possible funding shortfalls for FY95 Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) benefits. As a result, Guam may elect to substantially reduce those benefits, effective June 1. Substantial AFDC benefit reductions would likely increase Food Stamp Program (FSP) benefits for many public assistance households. The FCS Western Regional Office is monitoring the situation and has asked Guam to submit estimates of the likely amount of FSP benefit increases to result from anticipated AFDC benefit reductions.

Fraudulent Liquid Formula Alert Not Expected To Impact WIC

On April 6, the Food and Drug Administration issued an alert advising consumers against using counterfeit labeled Similac with iron Ready to Feed liquid formula in 8 ounce plastic cans. This product had been illegally distributed and is labeled with a fictitious code number and expiration date. Impact on the USDA Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) program may be minimal in that state agencies generally authorize the use of ready to feed formula in only special situations, such as for homeless participants or in situations where water is contaminated.

WIC Conference Held In Washington

On April 11, I gave the keynote address at the National Association of Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) Directors Conference in Washington, D.C. Of special concern was the future of the WIC program and the status of block grant proposals. This group strongly supports the Administration's position opposing a block-granted WIC Program.

High Level Ukrainian Delegation Visits USDA

On April 10, Ukraine First Deputy Prime Minister Petro Trofimovich Sabluk and a delegation of government and private agricultural officials met with USDA officials to discuss agriculture cooperation between the two countries. The focus of the meeting with me was to request support for agricultural policy reforms that the Ukrainian government is implementing as it moves toward a more market-oriented economy.

Agreement Reached On Cattle Grazing Issue

The deadline for the Diamond Bar Cattle Company to remove over 500 cattle from the Diamond Bar Allotment on the Wilderness District Ranger of the Gila National Forest in New Mexico due to insufficient forage has been extended from April 10 to April 30. The new date was agreed upon after a meeting on April 6 between USDA Under Secretary for Natural Resources and Environment Adela Backiel, USDA Forest Service officials, and staff from the offices of Senator Pete Domenici and Congressman Joe Skeen.

San Francisco

Today's edition of the Stockton (CA) Record reports that an elderly SSI beneficiary has committed suicide after receiving a Social Security notice telling him that his benefits may be suspended under the new welfare reform law. The beneficiary, Ignacio Munoz, received the Social Security letter approximately three weeks ago and killed himself on March 17.

Under the 1996 welfare reform law, SSA is sending notices in February and March of this year to nearly 900,000 non-citizens nationwide informing them of new SSI eligibility provisions. An estimated 500,000 may lose eligibility. In California, letters are being sent to approximately 310,000 non-citizens, and as many as 175,000 may lose program eligibility.

An Administration proposal would restore SSI eligibility to legal non-citizens who become blind or disabled after entering the country, and also extend from five years to seven years the period that refugees, asylees and non-citizens in similar situations may be eligible for SSI after admission to the country.

In Mr. Munoz's case, he had 37 quarters of Social Security coverage--and some gaps in his earnings record. The Stockton Social Security field

office was working with him to see if they could find the requisite additional 3 quarters of coverage needed. A press conference is being held today at the Stockton City Hall by several social service agencies to reassure elderly immigrants that there are options and organizations willing to help individuals in need.

TWO YEARS OF COLLEGE & LIFELONG LEARNING FOR ALL STUDENTS

When the President announced "High Hopes for College for America's Youth" earlier this month, one of the programs highlighted was Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID).

AVID partners colleges with middle or high schools to provide low-income students with academic assistance, information about college prep courses & financial aid, tutoring, & other support to encourage them to go to college. The program is administered by a site team composed of the AVID coordinator, the principal, core academic teachers, & students -- all of whom meet monthly to discuss effective practices for accelerating student performance & removing barriers to rigorous curriculum. Local college students serve as tutors & mentors for AVID students, working with them in small groups & individually during the AVID class.

AVID serves more than 30,000 students in almost 600 schools in

11 states, as well as Department of Defense schools in 13 countries. Independent evaluations of AVID have found that:

- * Nationwide, 93% of AVID graduates enroll in college & 60% are accepted in 4-year institutions. In San Diego, 89% of AVID graduates are still enrolled in college after 2 years.
- * In San Diego, 55% of African-American AVID students & 43% of Latino AVID students enroll in 4-year colleges compared to national averages of 33% & 29%, respectively.
- * In 1996-97, 90% of high school AVID students nationwide were enrolled in college prep courses.
