THE WHITE HOUSE

Others may also be included as Secretary Rogers may require. The Committee will not only consider the most effective means by which to prevent terrorism here and abroad but it will also implement procedures so our government can take appropriate action quickly and effectively should acts of terrorism occur. In this regard, Secretary Rogers will be in touch with other governments and international organizations.

Protective Service

The more frequently recurring protective responsibilities of the United States Secret Service (USSS) and the Executive Protective Service (EPS) are performed by these agencies without the necessity of a Presidential directive. However, in certain instances, protective functions are to be performed at the direction of the President. In the past, this responsibility has devolved upon the Office of Counsel to the President for handling, in close coordination with the Department of State and the Department of the Treasury.

The basic authority of the USSS is contained in 18 U.S.C. 3056, which states in pertinent part:

(a) Subject to the direction of the Secretary of the Treasury, the United States Secret Service, Treasury Department, is authorized to protect the person of the President of the United States, . . . , protect the person of a visiting head of a foreign state or foreign government and, at the direction of the President, other distinguished foreign visitors to the United States and official representatives of the United States performing special missions abroad (emphasis added)

The Executive Protective Service, the successor organization of the White House Police Force, also reports to the Secretary of the Treasury, and



performs such duties as the Director of the Secret Service, without the necessity of a Presidential directive, shall prescribe at various locations. These locations include the Executive Mansion and grounds, any building in which Presidential offices are located, and "foreign diplomatic missions located in the metropolitan area of the District of Columbia" (3 U.S.C. 202). This section also provides that EPS shall perform such protective duties at "foreign diplomatic missions located in such other areas in the United States, its territories and possessions, as the President, on a case-by-case basis, may direct."

To date, the only EPS contingent located outside of the District of Columbia metropolitan area is in New York City, due to the number of diplomatic missions present in conjunction with the United Nations. EPS presently possesses the only authority to provide such protection at diplomatic missions. Local police will generally not provide protection in the corridors of high rise buildings, thus making the EPS the only available source of protection for many missions.

The present practice with respect to requests for protective services that require a Presidential directive has been for the Office of Protocol of the Department of State to make an oral request of the Counsel to the President and to follow with a written confirmation. The Counsel's office then confers with the Protective Forces Division of the USSS as to the particular need for security for either that person or location. If the Secret Service then feels that the request is justified, the Counsel's office will send a written request to the appropriate office in the Department of the Treasury.

It can be expected that these requests will continue to remain a rather sensitive problem in the future. The prestige factor of being entitled to protection, as well as the accompanying limousines and the elimination of waiting in lines, will likely result in some requests that cannot be justified. In terms of long range planning, some thought might be given to relieving the relatively small USSS and EPS organizations of this responsibility, and instead placing it in an already existing security function elsewhere, such as that of the Department of State or the Federal Protective Service of the General Services Administration. This will, however, require new statutory authority. In view of the current congressional criticism of the already large number of federal security forces, a new organization should not be created.



Herewith, in accordance with the provisions of Executive Order No. 11030, as amended, is a proposed Executive order entitled "Protection of Foreign Visitors and Dignitaries."

This proposed Executive order was submitted by the Department of Commerce and modified slightly by us. It would have the effect of delegating to the Secretary of State the authority to designate certain foreign visitors as "official guests" entitled to protection by the Secret Service.

The Department of Commerce expects certain foreign visitors to arrive the first weekend in September. Time is thus of the essence and does not allow for the normal processing of this proposed Executive order. If we have not received your comments by 10 A.M. of September 3, 1974, we will presume that you have no objections; and, will forward this proposed Executive order for the consideration of the President with the approval of the Director of the Office of Management and Budget.

**In accordance with our recent conversation, enclosed are seven
copies of a draft Executive order entitled**

"Protection of Foreign Visitors and Dignitaries"

**which the Office of Management and Budget requested this Department
to draft.**

**The purpose of this order is for the President, under the authority of
18 U. S. C. 3056(a), to direct the U. S. Secret Service to protect dis-
tinguished foreign visitors to the United States during their stay. The
order would obviate the need for such a Presidential direction in each
specific instance. As provided in the order, the Secret Service would
act to provide this protection in those limited situations where a
citizen or national of a foreign country is in the United States as an
"official guest" of the U. S. Government pursuant to a designation as
such by the Secretary of State. "Official guest" is defined in 18 U. S. C.
1116(c)(4).**

**Security protection of these foreign official guests is a matter of
significant importance and urgency to this Department, and no
doubt to others as well. It seems clear from prior discussions with
your office and other concerned Federal agencies that the Secret
Service is the legally authorized agency of the Federal Government
to exercise this protective function. The language of 18 U. S. C. 3056(a)
is silent as to delegating this protective responsibility to other Federal
agencies. The Secretary of Commerce has been a designated host for
such foreign guests on a number of occasions during the past few years.**



There is an urgent need for this order. There is scheduled for September 7-11 and 21-25, 1974, specific visits to the United States of officials from Poland and Bulgaria where the Secretary of Commerce is the host and a role for security protection is foreseen and should be made available. The visits of similar foreign dignitaries are anticipated thereafter. A Presidential direction should be made to cover those situations. We shall be happy to confer with you on this matter at your earliest convenience.

Executive Order

Protection of Foreign Visitors and Dignitaries

By virtue of the authority vested in me as President of the United States and in furtherance of the purposes and policies of 18 U.S.C. 3056(a), as amended, January 5, 1971, Public Law 91-651, 84 Stat. 1941:

(a) The United States Secret Service, Treasury Department, is hereby directed to protect distinguished foreign visitors to the United States. For the purpose of this order, a distinguished foreign visitor shall be an "official guest" as defined in Public Law 92-539, 86 Stat. 1071, October 24, 1972, 18 U.S.C. 1116(c) (4).

(b) Such protection shall be effected during the entire authorized visit within the United States, which includes the several States, the Territories and possessions of the United States, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands and the District of Columbia.



Assistant Secretary Parsky is scheduled to proceed to Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, on Wednesday, September 11, 1974. He will remain there until approximately September 18, 1974.

Assistant Secretary Parsky is also the Executive Secretary and Chief Coordinator of the Joint United States and Saudi Arabian Commission on Economic Cooperation. He is leading a delegation to Saudi Arabia of United States Government experts in the field of agriculture, science and technology. He will chair joint working meetings with Saudi Arabian counterparts to assist that Government in the development of Saudi Arabia.

Section 3056(A) of Title 18 of the U.S. Code authorizes the President to direct that the Secret Service protect official representatives of the United States performing special missions abroad. In view of the importance of his mission and the critical potential for an outbreak of hostilities, terrorism, or disorders in the Middle East area, the President's approval for assignment of Secret Service protection to Assistant Secretary Parsky is requested. Attached is a memorandum for your signature indicating such approval.

1. There was proposed by Gen. Counsel of Commerce, an Exec. Order delegating to Sec. of State the President's power to protect foreign visitors.
2. State opposed this order pending recommendations from the Cabinet Committee to Combat Terrorism.
3. Treasury opposed this order because Secret Service would be overburdened and State would have authority to tell Treasury what to do. —
4. It appears this matter has been tabled — but you should know there is an underlying issue of the extent to which protection will be allowed foreign visitors and who will exercise the authority. Right now the Counsel's office authorizes such protection.

This responds to your letter of August 14, 1974, and accompanying draft proposed Executive order entitled "Protection of Foreign Visitors and Dignitaries."

This office circulated the proposed Order to interested departments and agencies. Copies of comments from the most concerned agencies are enclosed for your information. In summary, some of the key points raised are:

State Has completed a study on the protection of foreign visitors and resident diplomats, their families and property. Study delivered to Chairman of the Cabinet Committee to Combat Terrorism. Recommends that action await recommendations of the Cabinet Committee.

Treasury Questions the delegation to State of an inherent Presidential power to protect foreign visitors.

Questions giving one cabinet officer the authority to direct the activities of another co-equal cabinet officer.

Questions elevating all "official guests" to the status of "distinguished foreign visitors" within the meaning of the relevant statutes.

COPY FOR MR. PHILIP W. BUCHEN



Questions the ability of the Secret Service to perform the task, noting that 70 distinguished foreign visitors were protected in FY 75, while there were approximately 663 "official guests."

Questions providing the panoply of Secret Service protection in the absence of an expressed need.

In view of these negative comments, especially those on policy and manpower, no further action to process the proposed Executive order is contemplated.

In accordance with established procedure under OMB Circular A-19 here follows the Department of State's views regarding a Department of Commerce proposed Executive Order on "Protection of Foreign Visitors and Dignitaries."

The Department of State has recently completed and delivered to the Chairman of the Cabinet Committee to Combat Terrorism, a study on the protection of foreign visitors and resident diplomats, their families and their property. The response to this study could assist greatly in the establishment of a firm and effective policy on protection of all official foreign visitors. The Department of State believes that action on the proposed Executive Order should be delayed until a recommendation is received from the Cabinet Committee.

For the above reason the Department of State opposes the proposed Executive Order at this time.

THE UN DEBATE ON PALESTINE QUESTION AND PRESENCE IN NEW YORK CITY OF A PLO DELEGATION HEADED BY YASIR ARAFAT OR WHOEVER IS DESIGNATED IS EXPECTED TO PRODUCE STRONG REACTION FROM ANTI-ARAB GROUPS AND POSSIBLY FROM ARAB FRINGE GROUPS AS WELL. NEW YORK CITY POLICE AND UN OFFICIALS HAVE EXPRESSED CONCERN TO USUN AND ARE PREPARING PROVIDE HIGHEST POSSIBLE DEGREE OF SECURITY FOR PLO DELEGATES. THE UN WILL BE CLOSED TO THE PUBLIC AS A SECURITY PRECAUTION. NEW YORK CITY POLICE WILL PROVIDE SECURITY FOR ALL ARAB DIPLOMATIC ESTABLISHMENTS LOCATED AT STREET LEVEL AND FOR LARGE NUMBER OF NON-DIPLOMATIC ESTABLISHMENTS WHICH MAY BECOME TARGET OF ANTI-ARAB GROUPS. IT REMAINS FOR US GOVT TO DO ITS SHARE AND PROVIDE ADDITIONAL SECURITY IN THOSE AREAS NOT COVERED BY NEW YORK CITY POLICE.

2. USUN ACCORDINGLY REQUESTS INCREASED EPS CONTINGENT IN NEW YORK CITY TO PERMIT COVERAGE OF ALL ARAB DIPLOMATIC ESTABLISHMENTS LOCATED INSIDE COMMERCIAL BUILDINGS

ABOVE STREET LEVEL. USUN BELIEVES IT MAY BE NECESSARY HAVE ADDITIONAL FEDERAL SECURITY PERSONNEL (E.G. STATE, SECRET SERVICE) ASSIGNED TO PLO DEL FOR THIS PERIOD. 1. AS REPORTED IN MORE DETAIL SEPTEL, HASAN ABD-EL QADIR ABD-EL RAHMAN WAS ADMITTED TO RELEVUE FOR OBSERVATION AND TREATMENT OF BRUISES AND LACERATIONS AFTER ATTACK ON PLO OFFICES, 101 PARK AVE, AT 1:30 PM OCT 29. RAHMAN IS A JUNIOR PLO EMPLOYEE NOMINALLY ATTACHED TO YEMEN MISSION TO UN.

2. PLO REP SAADAT HASAN, AFTER TALKING WITH RAHMAN, SAID THERE WERE THREE ATTACKERS, ALL UNDER TWENTY-FIVE. THEY DID NOT IDENTIFY THEMSELVES. HASAN PROFESSED TO HAVE NO DOUBT YOUTHS WERE ASSOCIATED WITH JEWISH DEFENSE LEAGUE, CITING THEIR USE OF "USUAL OBSCENITIES" AND FAMILIAR PHRASES" SUCH AS "WE'LL KILL YOU ALL" AND "NEVER AGAIN."

3. ON LEARNING OF INCIDENT, AMB SCALI SOUGHT OUT HASAN IN DELGATES LOUNGE AND EXPRESSED DEEP REGRET, TOTAL DISAPPROVAL OF ACTIONS OF ATTACKERS, AND DETERMINATION TO DO ALL POSSIBLE TO ASSURE FULL PUNISHMENT UNDER LAW FOR THE CULPRITS. HE ASSURED HASAN, WHO RECALLED THAT THIS WAS FOURTH VIOLENT ATTACK ON PLO IN NEW YORK, THAT USG INTENDED TO FULFILL ITS HOST-COUNTRY RESPONSIBILITIES FOR SAFETY OF MEMBERS OF UN COMMUNITY. USUN SUBSEQUENTLY GAVE COPY OF SCALI'S PRESS STATEMENT TO HASAN, WHO EXPRESSED APPRECIATION AND SAID HE WOULD CABLE TEXT TO ARAFAT.

4. TEXT OF SCALI'S PRESS RELEASE (AFTERNOON OF OCT 29) FOLLOWS:

QUOTE. I HAVE JUST BEEN INFORMED THAT SEVERAL YOUNG FANATICS ATTACKED THE PLO OFFICE IN NEW YORK CITY THIS AFTERNOON AND BRUTALLY INJURED AN EMPLOYEE. THIS IS AN UGLY, REPREHENSIBLE ACTION BY MISGUIDED ZEALOTS WHO DESERVE TO BE PROSECUTED TO THE FULL EXTENT OF THE LAW. IN THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY I VOTED AGAINST HEARING THE PALESTINE LIBERATION ORGANIZATION, BUT MY VOTE DID NOT SANCTION THIS KIND OF VIGILANTE ACTION WHICH VIOLATES AMERICAN TRADITIONS. UNQUOTE

5. HASAN ALSO EMPHASIZED HIS FEAR THAT PRESENT INCIDENT WOULD STIMULATE VENGEFUL ATTITUDE AMONG EXTREMIST ELEMENTS

CHAPTER 3.—EXECUTIVE PROTECTIVE SERVICE

202. Executive Protective Service—Establishment, control, and supervision—Privileges, powers, and duties.—There is hereby created and established a permanent police force, to be known as the "Executive Protective Service." Subject to the supervision of the Secretary of the Treasury, the Executive Protective Service shall perform such duties as the Director, United States Secret Service, may prescribe in connection with the protection of the following: (1) the Executive Mansion and grounds in the District of Columbia; (2) any building in which Presidential offices are located; (3) the President and members of his immediate family; (4) foreign diplomatic missions located in the metropolitan area of the District of Columbia; and (5) foreign diplomatic missions located in such other areas in the United States, its territories and possessions, as the President, on a case-by-case basis, may direct. The members of such force possess privileges and powers similar to those of the members of the Metropolitan Police of the District of Columbia. (June 25, 1948, c. 644, § 1, 62 Stat. 680; June 8, 1962, P. L. 87-481, § 1, 76 Stat. 95; Mar. 19, 1970, P. L. 91-217, § 1(1), (2), (3), 84 Stat. 74.)

203. Personnel appointment and vacancies.

(a) The Executive Protective Service shall

consist of such number of officers, with grades corresponding to similar officers of the Metropolitan Police force, and of such number of privates, with grade corresponding to that of private of the highest grade in the Metropolitan Police force, as may be necessary but not exceeding eight hundred and fifty in number.

(b) Members of the Executive Protective Service shall be recruited under the civil service laws and regulations on a nationwide basis. Members of such Service may also be appointed from the members of the Metropolitan Police force and the United States Park Police force from lists furnished by the officers in charge of such forces. Whenever any vacancy is created in the Metropolitan Police force or the United States Park Police force as the result of an appointment to the Executive Protective Service, such vacancy shall be filled in the manner provided by law. In the period of time which follows the date of enactment of this sentence and precedes January 1, 1975, not more than thirty members of the Metropolitan Police force may be appointed annually to the Executive Protective Service. (June 25, 1948, c. 644, § 1, 62 Stat. 680; Aug. 15, 1950, c. 715, § 2, 64 Stat. 448; June 28, 1952, c. 481, 66 Stat. 283; June 8, 1962, P. L. 87-481, § 2, 76 Stat. 95; Mar. 19, 1970, P. L. 91-217, § 1(1), (2), (4)-(6), 84 Stat. 75.)

204. Grades, salaries, and transfers of appointees.

Amendment.—Act Mar. 19, 1970, P. L. 91-217, § 1(1), (2), 84 Stat. 74, amended this section by striking the words "White House Police force" whenever they appear and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Executive Protective Service".

205. Appointment in accordance with civil-service laws.—[Repealed.]

206. Privileges of civil-service appointees.—

Members of the Executive Protective Service not appointed from the Metropolitan Police force or the United States Park Police force shall be entitled to the same privileges as to salary, grade, uniforms, equipment, transfer, leave, relief funds, retirement, and refunds as members appointed from the Metropolitan Police force and the United States Park Police force. (June 25, 1948, c. 644, § 1, 62 Stat. 681; Mar. 19, 1970, P. L. 91-217, § 1(8), 84 Stat. 75.)

Secret Service powers.—(a) Subject to the direction of the Secretary of the Treasury, the United States Secret Service, Treasury Department, is authorized to protect the person of the President of the United States, the members of his immediate family, the President-elect, the Vice President or other officer next in the order of succession to the office of President, and the Vice President-elect; protect the person of a former President and his wife during his lifetime, the person of the widow of a former president until her death or remarriage, and minor children of a former President until they reach sixteen years of age, unless such protection is declined; protect the person of a visiting head of a foreign state or foreign government and, at the direction of the President, other distinguished foreign visitors to the United States and official representatives of the United States performing special missions abroad; detect and arrest any person committing any offense against the laws of the United States relating to coins, obligations, and securities of the United States and of foreign governments; detect and arrest any person violating any of the provisions of sections 508, 509, and 871 of this title and, insofar as the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, Federal land banks, joint-stock land banks and Federal land bank, associations are concerned, of sections 218, 221, 433, 493, 657, 709, 1006, 1007, 1011, 1013, 1014, 1907, and 1909 of this title; execute warrants issued under the authority of the United States; carry firearms; offer and pay rewards for services or information looking toward the apprehension of criminals; and perform such other functions and duties as are authorized by law. In the performance of their duties under this section, the Director, Deputy Director, Assistant Directors, Assistants to the Director, inspectors, and agents of the Secret Service are authorized to make arrests without warrant for any offense against the United States committed in their presence, or for any felony cognizable under the laws of the United States if they have reasonable grounds to believe that the person to be arrested has committed or is committing such felony. Moneys expended from Secret Service appropriations for the purchase of counterfeits and subsequently recovered shall be reim-

bursed to the appropriation current at the time of deposit.

(b) Whoever knowingly and willfully obstructs, resists, or interferes with an agent of the United States Secret Service engaged in the performance of the protective functions authorized by this section, by the Act of June 6, 1968 (82 Stat. 170), or by section 1752 of title 18, United States Code, shall be fined not more than \$300 or imprisoned not more than one year, or both. (June 25, 1948, c. 645, § 1, 62 Stat. 818; July 16, 1951, c. 226, § 4, 65 Stat. 122; Aug. 31, 1954, c. 1143, § 2, 68 Stat. 999; Oct. 10, 1962, P. L. 87-791, 76 Stat. 809; Oct. 15, 1962, P. Extension of protection for widow and children of former President.—Act Nov. 17, 1967, P. L. 90-145, 81 Stat. 466, provided: "The authority vested in the United States Secret Service by section 3056 of title 18 of the United States Code [this section] to protect the person of a widow and minor children of a former President is extended until March 1, 1969, with respect to persons receiving such protection on the date of enactment of this Act [Nov. 17, 1967]."

Secret Service protection for presidential candidates.—Act June 6, 1968, P. L. 90-331, §§ 1-3, 82 Stat. 170, provided:

Section 1. (a) The United States Secret Service, in addition to other duties now provided by law, is authorized to furnish protection to persons who are determined from time to time by the Secretary of the Treasury, after consultation with the advisory committee, as being major presidential or vice presidential candidates who should receive such protection (unless the candidate has declined such protection).

(b) The advisory committee referred to in subsection (a) shall consist of the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the minority leader of the House of Representatives, the majority leader of the Senate, the minority leader of the Senate and one additional member selected by the other members of the committee.

Sec. 2. Hereafter, when requested by the Director of the United States Secret Service, Federal Departments and agencies, unless such authority is revoked by the President, shall assist the Secret Service in the performance of its protective duties under section 3056 of title 18 of the United States Code [this section] and the first section of this joint resolution [this note].

Sec. 3. For necessary expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution [this note], there is hereby appropriated out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1968, the sum of \$400,000.



Subject: Permanent Guard for Washington Embassies of Jordan, Syria, Saudi Arabia, and Egypt

Early in October, the Executive Protection Service withdrew the guards who were placed at fixed posts at the Embassies of Jordan, Syria, Saudi Arabia, and Egypt and at the residences of the Ambassadors of Jordan, Saudi Arabia, and Egypt. We understand that the Embassies and residences are now being covered by roving patrols which move about the area where the buildings are located.

The Jordanian government has formally requested, through our Embassy in Amman, that the United States restore the permanent fixed guard at their Washington Embassy. The Jordanian Ambassador has likewise asked for restoration of an around-the-clock post at his residence. The Syrians have so far not raised this issue with us formally, but we know from informal contacts with the Syrian Embassy that they are concerned about the removal of the EPS fixed post. The Saudis, on instructions, have orally raised the issue with us and requested that the EPS restore permanent fixed guards at their Embassy and residence. The Egyptian government has not raised this matter with us, but we know of the Egyptian Foreign Minister's concern over security problems in general, and we feel it our responsibility to provide fixed permanent guard protection for the Egyptian installation also.

From the security standpoint, all the officials of these countries remain under the ever-present threat of terrorist actions by extremist individuals and groups who feel themselves politically aggrieved. The Jordanians have been targets of radical Palestinians since the bitter civil

war between the government and the guerrillas in 1970-71. Syrian representatives in this country have frequently been targets for demonstrations or for harassments by extremist Jewish groups. While the Saudis are not a primary target, their Embassies have been attacked by terrorists in Khartoum and in Paris. The Egyptians are also possible targets not only of Jewish extremists but also of Palestinian extremists who reject Egypt's political positions and her participation in peaceful efforts to bring about a Middle East settlement. The potential for trouble from such groups was underlined by the recent attack on the Palestinian Liberation Organization's New York office by members of the Jewish Defense League.

It is not possible to predict when the constant threat against these missions in Washington may turn into violent action. If carried out in the absence of fixed-post EPS protection, an attack on any of these installations could have a highly adverse impact on our relations with the countries which are of primary importance in the Middle East peace negotiations. Since specific threats against both persons and property in Washington could develop too rapidly to permit adequate warning, we see no alternative to the restoration of fixed-post EPS protection.

In view of the foregoing, we believe it important that around-the-clock fixed-post protection be re-established at the Jordanian, Saudi Arabian, and Egyptian residences and that, at a minimum, the Jordanian, Syrian, Saudi, and Egyptian Embassies each be given fixed-post protection during regular working hours.

It should be noted that Syria, Jordan, Saudi Arabia, and Egypt provide fixed guard posts at the American Embassies in Amman, Damascus, Jidda, and Cairo. All of these countries have demonstrated a real concern for the security of American officials. In Amman and Jidda, guards are permanently posted at the Chancery and the residence, and the American Ambassador is provided bodyguards who accompany him everywhere outside the Embassy.

The following persons met in General Scowcroft's office at 10:00 AM on November 1 for just over an hour:

The meeting was precipitated by a document^{ed} request from U. S. U. N. received by me today for immediate expansion of EPS personnel in New York to protect the respective offices of nine additional Arab missions to the U. N. , the PLO (Palestine Liberation Organization) Office and the League of Arab States. Secret Service protection for the head of the PLO delegation has been requested by State and was also discussed.

The following points were covered:

1. EPS is legally entitled to protect the 9 Arab missions upon direction from the President; and the Secret Service is legally



entitled to protect the head of the PLO delegation upon the direction of the President. Everybody present concluded that the situation warranted this kind of protection except that EPS is concerned about its own manpower problems.

2. The logical place for EPS to get additional manpower is to use personnel now assigned to protection of the New EOB (22) which could be protected instead by GSA, and Geoff Shepard agreed to investigate the feasibility of this change.

3. An opinion should be sought from the Department of Justice as to the legality of providing EPS protection to offices of PLO and of the League of Arab States. Justice should be asked also to provide the language for a direction to be issued in behalf of the President by the Counsel's office.

4. The security forces of the State Department are willing to protect the members of the PLO delegation other than the head delegate. However, to provide the needed manpower, State would like to have Secret Service relieve State of its current protection for Makarios, the former head of the Cyprus government, and Skip Williams will investigate the feasibility of such a shift.

5. Larry Silberman will be asked to initiate coordinated planning among the various security forces and law enforcement agencies as may be needed during the period of the U.N. Assembly's debate on the Palestine issue, including the FBI and the military.

Subsequently, I talked with Ed Schmults of Treasury and met with Larry Silberman on the implementation of the foregoing. By a later telephone call from Silberman, I received the opinion that the attached form of direction to the Secretary of the Treasury is legal and appropriate.

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

Secret Service protection for the head of the PLO delegation has been requested by State and was also discussed.

The following three items were decided during the course of the meeting:

2. The Secret Service ^{will} protect the head of the PLO delegation ^{at the direction of the President.}
3. State Security will protect the remaining members of the PLO delegation.

The protection for the offices of PLO and the United Arab League remains to be resolved. It was decided that we would get an opinion from Justice in order to determine the legality for protection of these installations by EPS. ~~Frank Niland is handling this. We emphasized the importance of getting the opinion as soon as possible.~~

There was some question about the FBI's range of activities in connection with the PLO delegation. Frank Niland will discuss this with Larry Silberman, who will resolve this matter with the Bureau and then report back.

The possible use of the military was raised in the event of large-scale disturbances in New York City during this period. Phil Buchen was going to discuss this with Marty Hoffman at Defense. Hoffman will then coordinate with Justice in order to determine what kind of preparation should be made in the event additional help is necessary. Options include use of the National Guard by the Governor.

In order to provide for greater availability of EPS officers for the New York operation, Geoff Shepard will check to see whether GSA can perform the protection function in the New Executive Office Building, thereby releasing about 25 EPS officers for other duty.

State indicated that a number of their agents were engaged in protecting Archbishop Makarios. Bob Blake suggested that they would need these men in order to provide the protection to the PLO delegation. Therefore, Skip Williams will check to see whether Secret Service can take over the protection responsibilities for Archbishop Makarios.

Paul Rundle was going to check to see whether a helicopter could be made available for transporting Arafat upon his arrival at New York. We decided that if possible it would be better if this helicopter were not military.



This is to confirm the decision that responsibility for protecting the New Executive Office Building (NEOB) will be transferred from the U.S. Secret Service to the General Services Administration for a period of 30 days. In order to release Executive Protective Service personnel for interim requirements in New York City in connection with activity at the United Nations in the month of November, the General Services Administration will begin guarding the NEOB at 8:00 a.m. Wednesday, November 6, 1974, and will maintain the same level of protection as previously provided by the Secret Service.

Mrs. Velma Baldwin, Assistant to the Director for Administration will be the OMB contact for working out the details of this interim transfer of protection responsibility.

Protection as directed by you was instituted at opening of business on November 4, 1974, in New York City, at eleven (11) additional locations.

As discussed at the November 1 meeting, the institution of this additional coverage in New York City necessitated a reduction of diplomatic coverage in Washington, D. C. In consultation with the Department of State, coverage in Washington, D. C. was reduced for the following listed countries:




