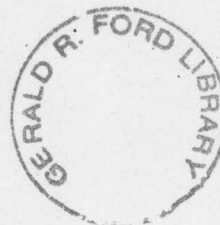

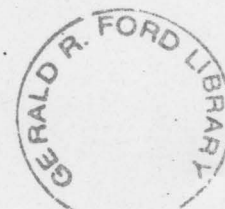

DESCRIPTION : This project is designed primarily to alleviate the tremendous problems related to high maternal and infant mortality and morbidity in this particular area of the country. There is a large component, supported primarily by the Bureau of Health Professions Education and Manpower Training of NIH, for the training of nurse midwives, who will in turn, conduct training sessions for granny-midwives. This training has already been initiated. This project also includes provision for the use of indigenous health aides whose training is supported by funds from the Office of Education. Prenatal, postnatal, and infant care clinics are to be established in several locations. The primary emphasis will be on health services for pregnant women, infants and young children including prenatal care, delivery, postnatal care for mothers and infants, nutrition counseling, family planning and treatment of episodic illness in young children. The project intends to utilize the limited number of physicians in the area on a fee-for-service basis.

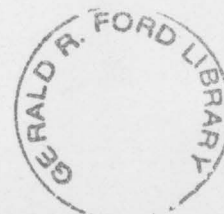

DESCRIPTION : The objectives of this project are the improvement of the operational efficiency of the five county health departments in this Delta area where there is a paucity of public health manpower, and the expansion and improvement of the delivery of basic comprehensive health services. The project provides for expansion of services beyond the traditional role of public health, specifically in the provision of medical care on an outpatient clinic basis, emergency dental care, and some in-hospital care. The project provides for the employment and training of community health workers as nursing and sanitation aides to be drawn from the target population. These aides perform para-medical tasks and, at the same time, serve as a cultural bridge between the health department's personnel and the target population. Environmental health services, nutrition counseling, and health education activities are offered in addition to basic medical care. The project is demonstrating that methods for the delivery of basic health services can be devised despite the lack of public health manpower in this area. Local physicians and the University Medical Center are cooperating in the program.

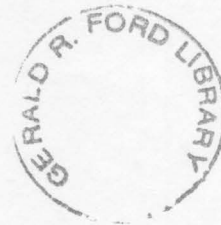

NMA PRESIDENT for the year beginning August 12, 1969

DR. JULIUS W. HILL, of Los Angeles, California, was chosen President-Elect of the National Medical Association by the House of Delegates at its convention in Houston, Texas, in 1968, to take office as the 69th President on August 12, 1969, at San Francisco.

Dr. Hill has served the NMA in numerous capacities. He was serving his second term on the Board of Trustees when he was voted into the position of President-Elect. As a Board Member, he served three years as Chairman of the Budget Committee and as a member of the Advisory Council to the Auxiliary.

He has been president for seven years of the Golden State Medical Association which he organized in 1961 under authority from the NMA Judicial Council. He has been treasurer for four years of the Charles R. Drew Medical Society (NMA affiliate in Los Angeles). He organized and was for two years president of the Meharry Alumni Association of Southern California.

Dr. Hill was born in Atlanta, Georgia, June 12, 1917. In 1933, he was awarded the B.A. from Johnson C. Smith University. He obtained a B.S. (1934) and M.S. (1937) from the University of Illinois. He completed two years' work toward the Ph.D. in physics.

Dr. Hill volunteered to serve in the U.S. Army and was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant after finishing Officers' Candidate School. He served three years in the South Pacific as a chemical warfare and intelligence officer, and was discharged as a Major in 1946.

In 1951, Dr. Hill received the M.D. from Meharry Medical College and served internship and four years residency in orthopedic surgery in Los Angeles County General Hospital.

In addition to his NMA affiliations, Dr. Hill is a member of the American Medical Association. He is also a member of the Board of Directors of the Julian W. Ross Medical Center, the Los Angeles County Hospital Advisory Commission, the Riverside

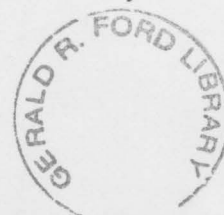

National Bank, and the Wofford Oil Drilling Company of Wichita, Kansas.

In 1967, Dr. Hill was appointed a member of the President's Committee on Medical costs and the Health Services Planning Committee of Los Angeles County. He is a senior consultant for District IX, HEW, on matters pertaining to hospital discrimination.

Dr. Hill is on the staffs of five Los Angeles hospitals and is a medical panel examiner for the Metropolitan Transit Company and the State Compensation Insurance Fund. He is a member of the Sigma Xi honorary society and the Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity and the Masons. He is married to the former Luella Blaine and they have one daughter, Sheila Lorraine.

DR. JAMES M. WHITTICO, JR., was born in Williamson, West Virginia, November 18, 1916.

After graduating from high school in Williamson, he entered Lincoln University (Pennsylvania) from which he received his B.A. in 1936. He obtained his M.D. from Meharry Medical College in 1940.

He received his residency training in surgery at the Homer G. Phillips Hospital where he held a surgical research fellowship for two years. He was also a surgical research fellow at Washington University (St. Louis). In 1951, he became a diplomate of the American Board of Surgery. The following year he was inducted as a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons and entered the private practice of surgery in St. Louis. Since 1960, he has been president of the Mound City Medical Center and director of the Surgical Tumor Clinic at Homer G. Phillips Hospital. From 1962 to 1965, he was chief of staff at St. Mary's Infirmary. He was chief of the Department of Surgery at Peoples Hospital and is currently a member of the staffs of seven hospitals in St. Louis. In 1966, he was appointed a surgeon to the St. Louis Police Department.

For more than twelve years, he has been an instructor in clinical surgery of Washington University and in 1967 was appointed to a similar post on the faculty of the St. Louis School of Medicine. He has also been an instructor in surgery in two schools of nursing. He has been for two years a Commissioner of the Board of Health of the City of St. Louis.

Dr. Whittico served in the Medical Corps of the U.S. Army and was in the Southwest Pacific Theater from 1943-1946. As a Major, he was Medical Unit Commander and Surgeon and Division Medical Inspector. His decorations include the Asiatic Pacific

Ribbon, Battle Stars for several campaigns, the Bronze Star Medal, the Combat Medical Badge and the Commendation Victory Ribbon.

In addition to the NMA, Dr. Whittico is a member of the American Medical Association, Chi Delta Mu and Alpha Phi Alpha (honorary society) and is a life member of the N.A.A.C.P.

Dr. Whittico, of St. Louis, Missouri, was installed as the 68th President of the National Medical Association at the Houston convention in August 1968. He had been a member of the NMA Board of Trustees since 1963 and served on its Executive Committee during 1966-67.

Doctor Whittico and his wife, Gloria, have two children, Jarrhet Mark and Jo Suzanne.

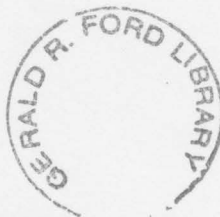
