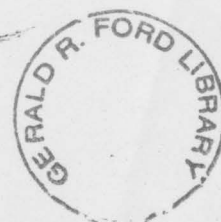

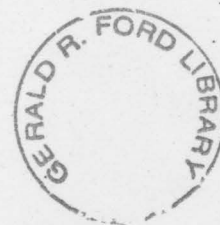

Its purpose will be to apprise them of federal programs and policies of the Administration that affect minority group members and to establish a meaningful rapport between them and Black Presidential Appointees.

The briefing will begin at 9:00 a.m. We have requested the use of the Roosevelt Room for the morning session. The afternoon session will be held in the Indian Treaty Room.

We would like for you to arrange to have certain selected news media personages to interview the appointees at 11:30 a.m. in one of your offices. We shall trust to your judgment as to which ones to invite.

MINORITY BRIEFING

I continue to feel strongly that we should maintain the offensive and project the Administration's initiatives to the minority community. The right format in a minority press briefing, I believe, would get us off to a running start in '72.

I would first recommend that we re-draft the recently released "Richard Nixon's Third Year," to emphasize clearly the bread-and-butter issues I see as being relevant to the minority areas.

The major thrust, as I see it, is economics. The Urban League's Vernon Jordan, Chicago's Jesse Jackson, Atlanta's Julian Bond and even Roy Wilkins are talking economics, and not revolution. On the economic front, we are witnessing in this Administration the rise of a new black interest in commerce and industry, employment in the Federal government and aid to black colleges.

Item: This Administration has spent millions to bail the Urban League out of bankruptcy. This should be publicized.

Item: This Administration has given more than four times the aid to black colleges than any prior Administration. \$125 million this fiscal year. \$25 million when President assumed office.

Item: This Administration is the first to make and meet a commitment of \$100 million to assist minority-owned banks.

- Item: In minority business enterprise, (Commerce) this Administration's '72 budget provides \$700 million--more than a three-fold increase over 1969.
- Item: This Administration appointed the first black to the U. S. Military Court of Appeals; appointed four black Generals, the first black Admiral, the first Asst. Sec. of the Navy. We have black General Counsels at Treasury and Transportation.
- Item: This Administration has provided funds to feed the poor--Food Stamp Program--despite opposition criticism.
- Item: Welfare Reform is a plus, bogged down by the opposition.
- Item: The black community--as the polls indicate--is more interested in quality education than the opportunity to be bussed to a seat in a white school.
- Item: This Administration has appointed more blacks-minorities-females to top-level jobs than any prior President--based on Johnson's last four years in office. (story attached)

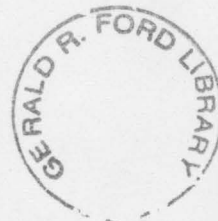
Indeed, in the '60's the rhetoric was revolution. The year 1972, I believe, will mark a turning point...if we sell our positives.

Possible flack: Supreme Court nominations which can be justified on the President's campaign mandate; Child Care--the President has his own plan; and Housing which can be justified by more housing starts for low income and disadvantaged than ever before; employment--economic initiatives will help all Americans.

NOTE: Other positive items attached.

Would include several top blacks in such a briefing whether it be led by the President, Herb Klein, Stan Scott or Robert Brown. This would help serve to give relevance to the minority community.

In maintaining the economic theme, I would recommend that the President take a five minute ride from the White House to visit the very successful "MR. MAN SHOP", and make a small purchase such as a tie or pair of gloves. This 14th Street modern store has received more than \$250,000 from SBA and is representative of the Administration's major efforts in Minority Business Enterprise. This could be done a day or a week prior to the briefing.

Finally, I would recommend that the minority media briefings be held on a separate basis, including one for blacks, Spanish speaking and other ethnics. In other words, when we speak of minorities, we are talking of those whose skin color has excluded them from the so-called American melting pot. The blacks and Spanish speaking represent 35-million, and when we speak of the Italian, Polish, Jewish and Catholic press, we are talking about newspapers and magazines representing only several hundred thousand. These groups are covered primarily by the general media.

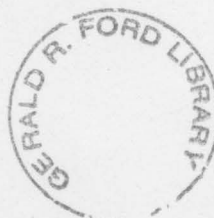

As you know, previous administrations held occasional Presidential briefings for members of the ethnic press. The last such took place on March 28, 1968. It seems to me that it would be to our advantage to hold one sometime in the next two or three months. I would suggest it be preceded by a State Department auditorium briefing by leading administration figures and followed by a White House reception. It seems to me a useful way to consolidate our strength with this group before the campaign begins.

As a separate event, we might also consider doing something along these lines for the Spanish-speaking press before we get too deep into the campaign year.

If you agree, we will try to get on the President's schedule and will cooperate with your office in arranging the details.





Civil Rights Initiatives:

Federal loans to small minority businesses have doubled under President Nixon. Grants, loans and other contracts to minority business enterprise under this administration have increased from \$200-Million in 1969 to \$600-Million in 1971. The 25 percent increase in the number of minority businesses since 1968 shows that these efforts are paying off.

Black Colleges:

Aid to predominately black colleges has jumped from some \$25-Million when the President took office to more than \$140-Million.

Food Assistance:

When the President took office in 1969, some 500 counties in this country were without food stamp programs to feed the disadvantaged... poor blacks and whites. Under this Administration, with the cooperation of the Sec. of Agriculture, food stamp programs to feed the needy are now available in nearly 500 counties.

Minority Employment:

Minority employment in this administration is at an all-time high. Not enough, but at an all-time high. There are more minorities in top-level jobs than ever before. The general counsel in transportation is a black man... the general counsel over at Treasury is a black man. An assistant secretary of Labor, two black assistant secretaries in Housing and Urban Development.

In the military, when the President assumed office, we had two black Generals in recent history... now, the number has reached six, including a black Admiral. I say progress is being made. We also have a black assistant secretary of the Navy. No fanfare on the appointment, but it's a matter of record.

WAGE-PRICE FREEZE:

The President's wage-price freeze will protect purchasing power and reduce minority unemployment. This happened during World War II and during the Korean war.

Black Caucus and the President:

What has gone completely unnoticed is the fact that the Democratic leadership -- in the Senate and in the House -- has flatly refused to meet with them altogether. The President did finally meet with them, giving an item by item response. However, to this day, the Black Caucus has yet to secure a meeting with its own party leadership.

While speaking of the Black Caucus, I should also like to point out that as

members of the House of Representatives, they could have... and still can... put their entire list of proposals in the form of legislation and submit them to the Democratic-controlled Congress for passage. However, it has been suggested that the reason for the Black Caucus' failure to do so stems from the fact they cannot get the support of the Democratic-controlled Congress.

Minority employment in Federal agencies increased by 3,348 jobs between May 1970 and May 1971, while total Federal employment decreased by 11,075 jobs. Minorities held 505,219 full time positions as of May 1971. Of the 2,592,956 employees on Federal rolls last May, 19.6 percent were Negroes, Spanish-surnamed Americans, American Indians, or Orientals.

When President Nixon took office in 1969 minority employment in Federal agencies was 500,508, while total Federal employment stood at 2,601,611. In other words, 19.2 percent of the Federal rolls were represented by minorities. (The above listed figures were reported in November 1969. The only employment figures listed prior to November 1969 were issued in November of 1967 because the previous Administration released its figures only once every two years.)

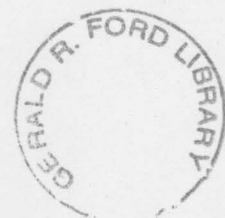
A positive example of the Administration's determination to strike down lingering discrimination can be found in its move to assure employment of blacks in Federal construction projects. The "Philadelphia Plan" -- as it is called -- raised minority man hours in that city's Federal projects from 2 percent of total work hours in early 1969 to almost 15 percent in 1971.

A total of 55 Negroes have been appointed to major executive and judicial posts by President Nixon, including the first black Admiral, the first black Assistant Secretary of Defense and the first black on the U.S. Military Court of Appeals. In addition, this Administration has named 62 blacks to Supergrade jobs and 94 blacks have been appointed to GS-13 to GS-15 posts. During the first 34 months of the Nixon Administration 77 Negroes were appointed to part-time assignments on Federal boards and commissions.

Note: Supergrade: employees in GS-16 or equivalent and above positions.

During the final four years of the Johnson Administration 49 Negroes were appointed to major executive and judicial posts. Fifty-eight Negroes were appointed to part-time assignments on boards and commissions.

This is the first time ever that seven black Ambassadors have been appointed to serve at the same time under any Administration. I am listing below the seven Negro Ambassadors who have been appointed by President Nixon during his first 34 month in office.

The previous high in this employment category was under the Johnson Administration when six black Ambassadors were serving at the same time.

When President Nixon assumed office in 1969 there were two black Generals. There are now six black Generals and one black Admiral, the first ever. The previous high was two black Generals under President Johnson.

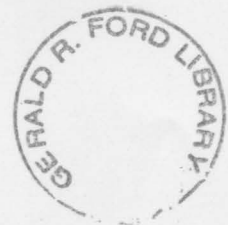

On the basis of the most complete records available there have been only seven black U.S. Marshals in the last 100 years. Three of the seven have been appointed by this Administration.

From the Taft Administration to the present time, there have been 47 black judges presidentially appointed by and with the advice and consent of the Senate.

At the outset of this Administration, the President asked the minority community to judge him on "deeds and not words." We think he is moving in the area of accomplishments. The President spelled it out last March when he met with the Congressional Black Caucus: "At issue now is whether all of us have the realism and stamina to persist in the long, hard task of realizing the bright hopes of a few years ago in American life, of translating rhetorical promise into concrete results." We think the President is gaining concrete results in minority employment in the federal government.

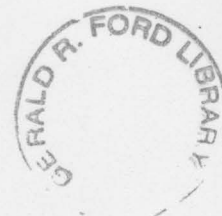

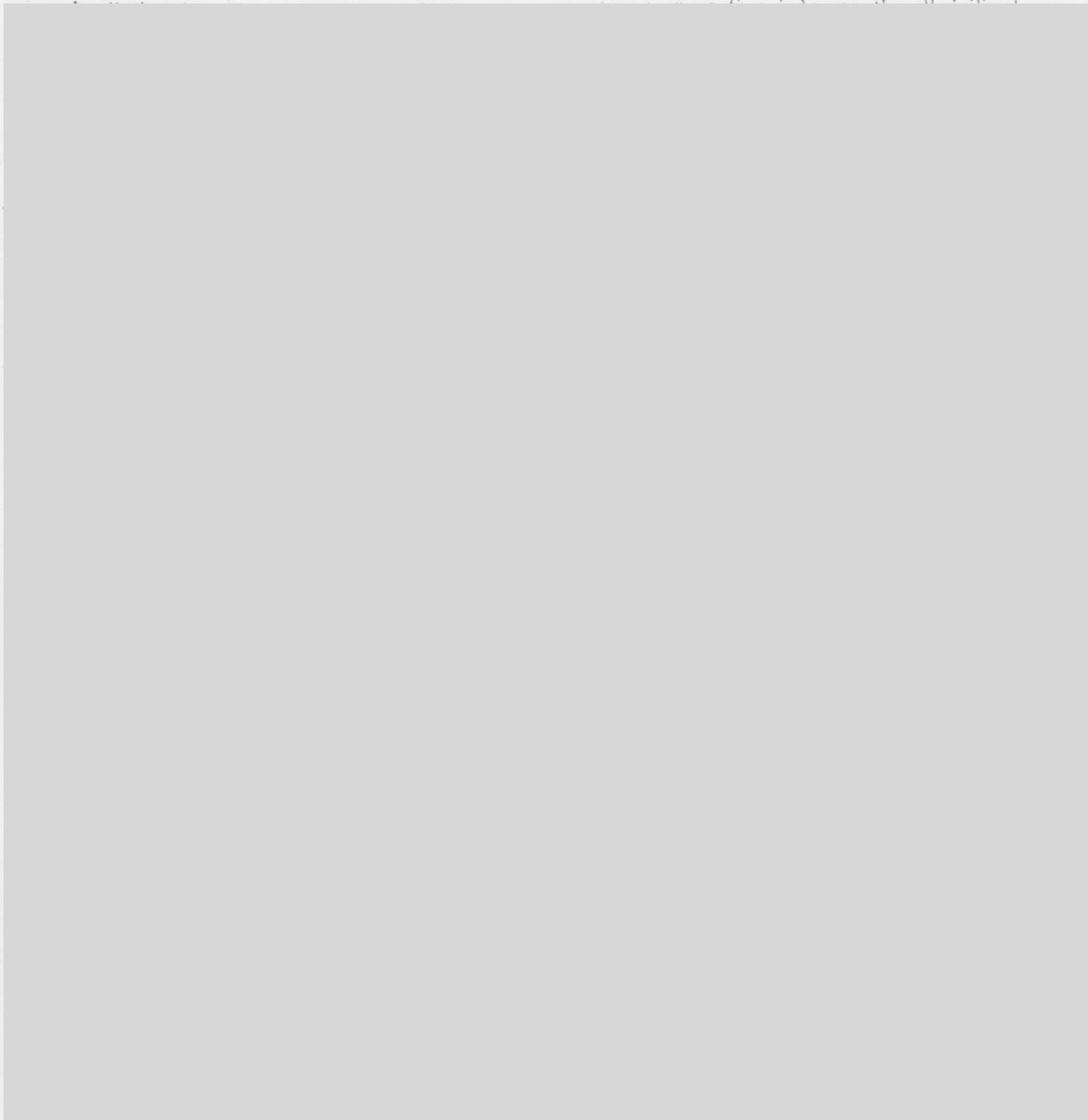

CIVIL RIGHTS NEWS BRIEFING

Listed below are initiatives by President Nixon you might want to mention during your meeting with newsmen:

— This Administration is the first to make and meet a major commitment to assist minority-owned banks. President Nixon set a goal of \$100 million in October 1970, to aid minority banks. One year later that goal was met on target. The President's Minority Bank Deposit Program, with 35% from the federal government and 65% from the private sector, has now produced over \$200 million in deposits in minority banks. This represents the largest single transfer of economic resources into minority economic institutions in the history of the country. It will make available in excess of 25,000 new loans into minority communities.

— Before President Nixon took office, only two black officers held the rank of general. Under this Administration, eight black officers have attained or have been nominated for general or flag officer rank. The President has appointed the first black Assistant Secretary of the Navy, as well as naming the first black to the U.S. Military Court of Appeals, the nation's highest military tribunal. Also, he has appointed seven black ambassadors.

— When President Nixon assumed office in 1969, there were 440 counties which had no food programs. All but 9 of the 440

counties have them now. The Food Stamp Program will be assisting over 12 million individuals by the middle of this year.

Minority Business assistance increased from \$200 million in 1969 to \$360.3 million in 1971. In 1973 outlays will amount to \$505.8 million. Federal purchases from minority firms has gone from \$13.0 million in FY 1969 to \$142.0 million in FY 71. Small Business Administration lending to minority enterprise has increased from \$41.3 million in FY 1968 to \$195 million in 1971.

AID TO BLACK COLLEGES (Bob Brown has facts and figures showing substantial increase in assistance.)

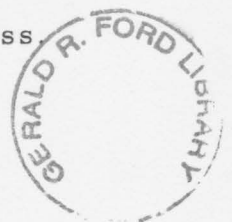
The 1973 budget, for example, calls for \$2.6 billion to be spent on federal civil rights activities, compared with \$835 million in 1969 when President Nixon took office. Outlays for civil rights enforcement have jumped from \$75 million in 1969 to \$295 million for 1972 and \$602 million in the new budget.

Under the present Administration, the percentage of blacks in government employment has reached a record 20 percent. Moreover, the Nixon Administration has appointed a record number of blacks to top positions. A White House staff assistant on domestic affairs is a black woman. The director of the Labor Department's Women's Bureau is black. A black woman now heads VISTA.

The first family assistance program, including welfare reform, was proposed by President Nixon.

BLACK CAUCUS and the PRESIDENT--What has gone completely unnoticed is the fact that the Democratic leadership...in the Senate and in the House...has flatly refused to meet with them altogether. The President did finally meet with them, giving an item by item response. However, to this day, the Black Caucus has yet to secure a meeting with its own party leadership. As members of the House of Representatives, they could have...and still can...put their entire list of proposals in the form of legislation and submit them to the Democratic-controlled Congress for passage. However, it has been suggested that the reason for the Black Caucus' failure to do so stems from the fact they cannot get the support of the Democratic-controlled Congress.
