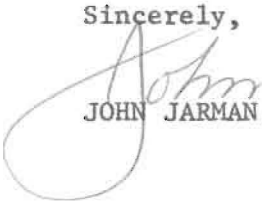

TAXES OR EXCHANGE CONTROLS TO HELP THE SITUATION. THE UNITED STATES AND THE UK EXPRESSED THEIR STRONG APPROVAL OF FRANCE'S DECISION TO IMPOSE SEVERE AUSTERITY MEASURES RATHER THAN DEVALUE THE FRANC.

THE REST OF THE WORLD HAS THE RIGHT TO EXPECT FRANCE TO DEMONSTRATE STATESMANSHIP IN TURN BY WITHDRAWING FURTHER OBJECTIONS TO U K MEMBERSHIP IN THE EEC AND TO JOIN IN AUTHORIZING A COMMON MARKET COMMISSION TO START NEGOTIATING UK ENTRY INTO THE COMMON MARKET. 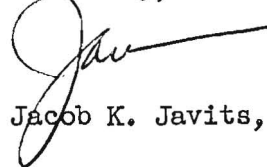

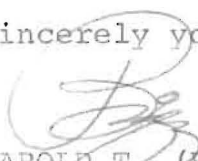

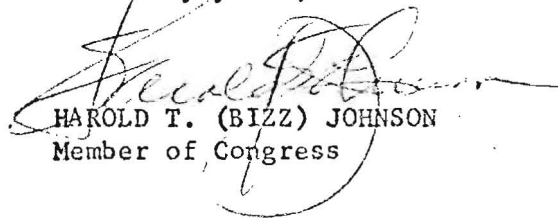

Dear Congressman Johnson:

I have been told by good authority that the Job Corps camps will in all probability be closed within nine to twelve months, and that the program will eventually be completely scrapped.

I feel that any program for the betterment of your young people which in turn is for the betterment of our country should be kept, but if need be we should look for ways to improve the program.

The Job Corps program in general is one of the best we have for our young people, but I do feel that it could be administered better. I am not implying that the people who are in charge of this program are incompetent; however I do feel that there should be more people from the skilled industries and less academic educators in administrative positions.

We all know that academic education is a must if our country and industries are to prosper, but we should not forget that we have to have people of physical production, and especially skilled craftsmen. I am not saying that the Job Corps camps are not teaching people to work, but I am saying that possibly with a change of emphasis a better program could be developed for the money expended. (I understand that this program is operating at only 50 to 55 percent of capacity.)

The reason I feel that people from the industries would be better for administration of this program is that they are more familiar with the training of skilled workmen, and are also more aware of what is expected of these workmen once they are trained, than are the academic educators. It is unfortunate that most of the young people who turn to this program are either school "drop-outs" or have had no opportunity to go beyond an elementary education. Industry is an employer of skilled and unskilled workmen, and I feel that those associated with the physical production of our great nation are better suited to lay out a program of learning for these people.

Now if this program was geared to teach a skilled trade first and, hopefully, create an interest in academic subjects second, I feel there would be more interest by the people who need this program. As we all know, all people are not academically minded, but if you can strike the right note you can sometimes bring out hidden talents in all of us.

The reason that I am interested in these programs for training young people is because, being a small businessman in the building field for more than fifteen years, I can see a great need for young people to learn a skilled trade. I am a licensed General Contractor and Registered Building Designer in the State of California, and in the past few years it has become more and more difficult to employ skilled craftsmen. With the cost of labor as it is today, it is almost

impossible for a small contractor to employ an apprentice and keep him on the payroll. But if the apprentice had some knowledge of the trade before he went out into the industry, he would be better prepared to hold a job and the employers could afford to hire him for a steady job.

These Job Corps camps could become one of our great assets in training young people in skilled trades by making them "Apprenticeship Training Centers".

As of Oct. 22, 1968, I have closed my business and have applied for a position with the Carpenters Apprenticeship Training Program; also with the U.S. Civil Service Commission for a "Mid-Level Position", possibly in the same type of work, as I can see a need for apprenticeship and training programs.

If I can be of any assistance in the Job Corps Program (which, by the way, I would like to see classified as apprenticeship training centers) please feel free to contact me.

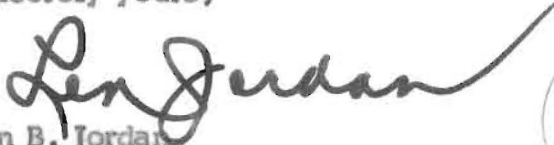
