Dear Bryce:

In response to your letter of November 27, 1968, I offer the following suggestions for inclusion in the program of the Nixon Administration.

1. Electoral College Reform. This is the most important matter that will come before the Judiciary Committee in the Ninety-First Congress. It is imperative that the office of elector be abolished and that the people and not the Congress determine who shall serve as President and Vice President if no one receives the required number of votes. Those reforms would allow the people to control the result. Beyond that, it is submitted that it is preferable that the possibility of a minority President (one who receives fewer votes than his main opponent) be eliminated.

2. Crime.

A. Bail Reform. In 1966, Congress passed a bail reform statute which has become the subject of much controversy. From the earliest times, the practice in the federal courts had allowed judges to set high money bonds on criminal defendants prior to trial in cases where the net result desired was to detain the accused. The 1966 Act substantially changed that practice by requiring that defendants be released prior to trial, under a graduated series of conditions, based on the sole consideration of the defendant's likelihood of return for trial. Substantial criticism has arisen against this provision. The argument is now made that judges ought to be able to take the likeli-

hood of danger to the community into consideration in determining release conditions for defendants and that in certain cases of grave danger, defendants ought to be detained prior to trial. The Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Constitutional Rights plans hearings early in the Ninety-First Congress. This subject should receive your prompt attention for possible inclusion in the new Administration's programs.

B. Stop and Frisk. It is suggested that Congress clearly define and authorize stop-and-frisk powers for federal law enforcement officers, such as those proposed in H. R. 16908, which I introduced in the Nintieth Congress. Congressional action is needed to make clear the national policy of supporting the police in the lawful performance of their duties, to serve as a guide to both the police and the detained suspects, and to limit the scope of Miranda by indicating that it does not apply to the investigatory stage but only to the accusatory stage.

C. Privilege Against Self-Incrimination. Judge Friendly of the Second Circuit Court of Appeals and Chief Justice Traynor of the California Supreme Court as well as Thomas Dewey, former Republican standard-bearer, have all questioned the continuing cogency of the Fifth Amendment privilege which was framed originally in an era when the rack and the screw were real fears. Although there is widespread dissatisfaction, there is no consensus on what should be done at present. Thus it is suggested that the Nixon Administration request legislative hearings so that the many proposals in this most controversial of areas can be studied with the painstaking care befitting the monumental task of amending the Bill of Rights. A fresh look is necessary.

3. Human Rights.

A. Open Housing. Last April Congress enacted a national open housing law which excepted single-family dwellings and "Mrs. Murphy's boardinghouse." Last June the Supreme Court construed an 1866 law (42 U.S.C. 1982) so as to prohibit all discrimination in housing without exception. Thus there now stands two independent inconsistent national laws on open housing. As a practical matter, the 1866 law will be looked to in order to define the "right" to open housing, whereas the 1968 law will be utilized because of its more effective "remedies." It is suggested that the exceptions to the 1968 law be repealed so that these new remedies can be employed in support of the 1866 right.

B. Political Participation, Economic Intimidation. The most recent report of the United States Commission on Civil Rights recounts cases of economic intimidation of Negroes because they have become active in the political process. Since such intimidation is generally difficult to prove beyond a reasonable doubt and since a criminal trial would not compensate the economically intimidated, it is suggested that a civil remedy (money damages or injunctive relief) be created and made available in both federal and State courts.

4. The Courts. Over the many years a recurring problem coming to the attention of the Judiciary Committee is that which surrounds the constitutional directive in Article III that federal judges "shall hold their offices during good behavior." and the Article II requirement that removal from office shall be "on impeachment for and conviction of treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors." The problem exists as to what sanctions can be taken against federal judges whose conduct is less than impeachable but yet serious enough to make continued exercise of office undesirable. In short, can the requirement of "good behavior" be made meaningful by devising some sanction less than impeachment to deal with such conduct. Some real study should be given to this question.

5. Redistricting. The Ninteth Congress enacted a truncated bill that did no more than forbid at-large House elections. There is still a pressing need for a clear mathematical standard to guide the State legislatures in districting as well as for a clear statement of policy against gerrymandering. Congressional help is necessary to bring peace to this very unsettled area. The courts have not drawn the precise guidelines that only a legislature could draw.

6. Interstate Taxation Act. Last year the House overwhelmingly passed this measure (H. R. 2158), but the Senate Finance Committee failed to act on it. The bill would allow businesses to engage in commerce in several States free of multiple taxation and unnecessary red tape. Most of the overreaching State laws are unenforceable in fact, and this legislation would declare them so as a matter of law.

The enactment of this legislation would particularly help small businesses, for although they seek to engage in interstate commerce, they do not have the ability to comply with the myriad overlapping complicated tax laws as might a large business. The status quo thus serves to intimidate the expansion of small businesses and to stifle nation-wide competition.

7. Interim Presidential Succession Act. It is urged that Congress amend the Presidential Succession Act of 1947 to require an election of an interim President and Vice President to complete the then current Presidential term in a situation where the Speaker of the House, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate or a member of the Cabinet would lawfully be entitled to act as President for a period longer than one year and ninety days.

8. Antitrust.

A. Reform of the Antitrust Laws. It is suggested that a commission to study the operation of the antitrust laws be established to examine their effect on competition, business conduct, cost-price levels, employment, market structures, enforcement procedures and agencies of enforcement. The commission should concentrate particularly on mergers gauging their impact on economic and social centralization, analyzing the motives for diversification and assessing their dangers to competition. At the conclusion of its study, the commission, to be composed of members of both the public and private sector, should recommend, if necessary, innovations or improvements in the antitrust laws consonant with America's ideal of economic decentralization.

B. Deterrence from Private Antitrust Action. It is recommended that the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 be amended to deny tax deductibility to amounts paid or incurred in satisfaction of a judgment or settlement of a private antitrust suit where a defendant has been convicted in a criminal proceeding of a violation of the antitrust laws. Such legislation is needed to restore in large measure the deterrent effect which treble damage actions were intended to have in securing compliance with the antitrust laws.

C. Use of Post-acquisition Evidence. Section 7 of the Clayton Act should be amended to correct an inconsistency currently existing in the law which both subverts Congressional intention and permits the businessman to be trapped into antitrust violations. This inconsistency would be resolved fairly by prohibiting the use of post-acquisition evidence in determining whether an acquisition of stock or assets of another corporation has the effect of substantially lessening competition or tending to create a monopoly in any line of commerce in any section of the country.

9. Enforcing Judgments Obtained in Other States. Pursuant to Article IV of the Constitution, Congress has enacted legislation prescribing how judicial proceedings in state courts should be authenticated, but Congress thus far has not enacted legislation that would prescribe the effect that should be accorded by one state of another state's public acts, records and judicial proceedings.

Legislation should be proposed whereby a judgment, decree or order obtained in one state court may be registered in any other state court and the judgment, decree or order so registered have the same effect as the state where rendered. Presently, in a majority of states, action has to be brought in the second state upon the judgment received in the first. Thus, before ultimate satisfaction of a claim, the successful plaintiff is subjected to the inconveniences of overcrowded calendars, extra expenses, long postponements and other dilatory activity on the part of his opponents plus the possibility of no recovery at all due to the second state's procedural peculiarities and to some extent, to local policies of the forum.

It seems an understatement to suggest in 1969, when most current reform is directed toward swifter and surer justice and a more economic utilization of the court's time and energy, that the present common law method for enforcement of sister-state judgments is obsolete and in serious need of reform.

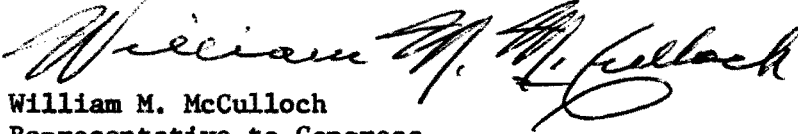
10. Protection of the Electoral Process. Much has been written since the 1960 election about the fraudulent voting practices of Cook County, Illinois. In view of the recurrent threat of fraud, especially in the Presidential elections, it might seem proper for the federal government to take the necessary means to insure an honest vote count in federal elections. However, control of elections has traditionally been a matter of State and local concern. The Illinois legislature has attempted election reform in the past only to have its proposals vetoed by a Democratic governor. At present leaders in Illinois' legislature are again demanding election reform. But this time there should be no gubernatorial veto. Thus it is suggested that the federal government wait to see if the State of Illinois does remedy this most serious evil in our electoral process.

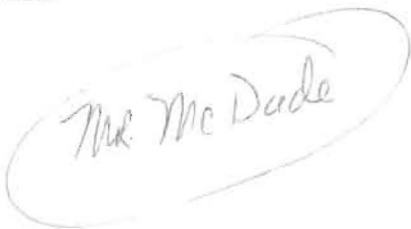

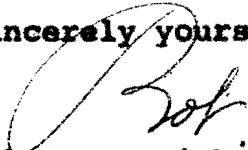

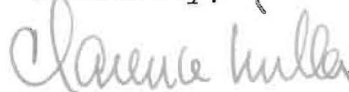

I would like to call your attention to a situation which is, in my opinion, a major impediment to the overall efforts of law enforcement to control obscenity. I refer here to the present configuration of the Presidential Commission on Obscenity and Pornography.

The Commission is dominated by attorneys William Lockhart and Barbara Scott, whose philosophical ^{positions} ~~decisions~~ in the obscenity area identify them as generally unsympathetic to law enforcement efforts. Lockhart's thinking is dominated by a scientific interest in the effects of obscenity on conduct and Scott's interests are aligned with doing away with censorship.

Attorney Paul Bender, chosen by Lockhart as counsel for the Commission, was on the brief for the Government in *Ralph Ginzburg v. United States*, and as such almost succeeded in giving that case away. Because of concessionary and damaging remarks made by Bender in his brief for the Government, CDL found it necessary to file an additional amicus brief, which it did on the day set for oral argument, so that it could address itself to those remarks. Since that time, Bender has, in public statements, indicated that he was disenchanted by Ginzburg's conviction - a position which, I feel, is absolutely inimicable to the People's cause.

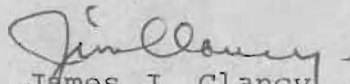
I strongly urge that the new administration examine closely the philosophies of the present membership with the objective of balancing out the case which is, in my opinion, at the present time, heavily weighted against the People's interest. In view of the recent evidence pointing up Associate Justice Fortas' deep involvement with President Johnson in other matters, I am inclined to speculate that Mr. Justice Fortas may have had a major hand in selecting the persons that President Johnson appointed to the Commission.

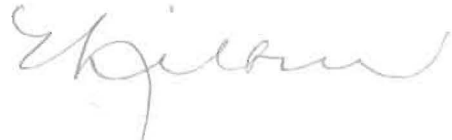

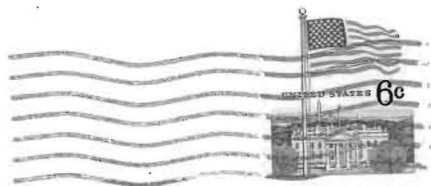

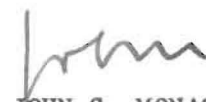
