I hope an appropriate member of Program Development can give attention to the Situs picketing issue for RN.

RN met about 3 weeks ago with George Meany; this subject was discussed. RN expressed the keen hope that a position can be worked out relatively satisfying to Meany that RN can recommend to Congress.

I believe the Eisenhower Administration position on this issue was agreeable to labor.

I am told that Congressman Al Quie has sponsored amendments which are relatively acceptable to House Republicans, yet not too offensive to organized labor. Perhaps he can give some guidance on this issue.

Mr. Nixon committed our staff to have a person familiar with this issue to meet with Mr. Meany's Administrative Assistant to discuss the subject and arrive at a suitable settlement. Can I leave this matter with your group?

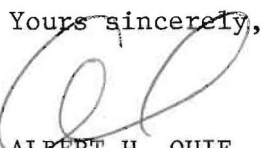
Congratulations on your election.

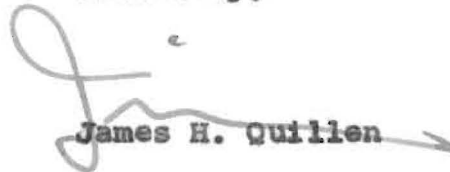

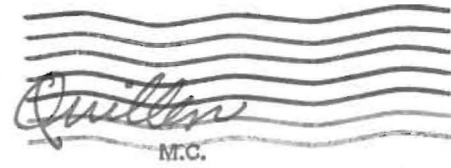
