Dear Mr. Blount:

Earlier this month, I informed Mr. Bryce Harlow by letter of my intention to introduce legislation which could effect a saving of over one hundred million dollars annually for the Post Office Department. This estimate is based on the Post Office Department's own figures of the cost of dispensing stamps.

Having received an acknowledgment from Mr. Harlow, I feel that you have been advised of this matter. Therefore, to follow-up, I am sending a copy of material, which was distributed to the communications media at a press conference held Friday, December 27th.

You will note that the implementation of this proposed legislation would result in an expanded convenience to the public, while reducing the expenses to the Post Office Department of dispensing a large percentage of the postage stamps, which now constitutes a cost of 8¢ a transaction.

In view of the problems which have beset the Post Office Department over a number of years and of your intention to use business like methods in solving these, I sincerely believe that your careful study of this proposal is most vital.

Thank you for your attention, and I send my very best wishes for your complete success in your new undertaking.
