As you know, RN committed to John Tower an appointment for Tony Jurich. The discussion concerned a place in the Defense Department or on the staff of the National Security Council. I gather that the National Security Council spot is unacceptable to Dr. Kissinger.

These alternative positions are suggested by Tony as possibilities: In Defense, liaison man with the NSC for the ISA; a key slot under the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Administration; staff director of the "Blue Ribbon Commission" named by Laird to study national defense.

Other possibilities: Staff man replacing Pat Coyne on the Intelligence Advisory Board; AID, on which programs Jurich worked for two years in the House of Representatives; Deputy Director of ACTA; Deputy Administrator for Administration and Technique in NASA; and Deputy Director of the National Science Foundation.

RE: Unofficial Reports from Various Departments
to the White House

There are numerous unofficial reports now being sent to President Johnson from various Departments. On checking, we find that many of these reports are, of course, essential but in some cases there are duplications and overlap.

It therefore is necessary to establish a procedure so that only very relevant unofficial reports reach the White House with no duplication or overlap with other reports coming from your Department.

In order to make this procedure work, would you please check with the incumbent Cabinet Officer who should have a confidential assistant who can give a catalog of unofficial reports now being sent to the White House. Would you please have an aide catalog this information and evaluate any areas of duplication and overlap, including any reports which, in your judgment, should not be sent to the White House.

After this analysis, it would be appreciated if your aide could send me a list of reports that you feel should be sent to the White House. These reports will then be checked against the lists of reports from each Department to again check for duplication and overlap. In this way, we hope to establish a "hard core" list of reports which should come to the White House.

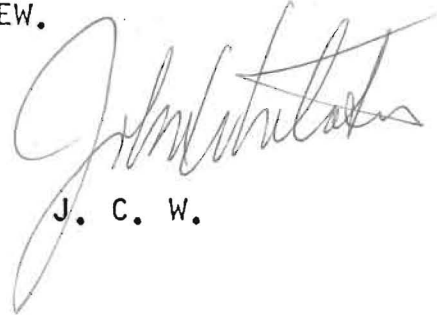
