Think about them next time you're in the market for a company with "prospects."

Out of the thousands and thousands of companies in business today, only a handful—just over 1,200—are listed on the New York Stock Exchange.

It works out to less than 1% of the total. Yet these few make about 70% of U. S. corporate profits.

This has generally been true for years, despite the fact that companies are added and dropped each year, depending on their ability to meet Exchange standards.

As members of the Exchange, we believe it is more important than ever (in view of the great surge of investing this year) for every investor to understand the high standards that come into play when the Exchange considers listing a company.

There are three primary results of these standards.

One is to maintain the leadership character of the market by listing companies important to the nation

and capable of breaking new ground for the economy.

Another is to help provide widespread ownership of Big Board stocks. This ready supply of buyers and sellers, plus the market-making ability of our specialists (with buying power of almost \$1 billion), makes it possible for you to buy or sell a listed stock, usually within minutes. (Specialists are members who contribute to the liquidity and stability of the market for stocks assigned to them, by buying and selling for their own accounts when public orders are not immediately at hand.)

A third result is to provide the public with information. The Exchange requires listed companies to make significant facts and figures available, in financial reports and news stories, to help you reach a well-informed decision.

All told, the 1,200 companies have some 12 billion shares listed on the Big Board with a market value of over \$600 billion. Over 20 million shares have been

traded in a single day—a good week's volume only a few years ago.

(A great many forces and procedures usually manage to keep the market remarkably unruffled in heavy trading. But when the price of a stock shows an unhealthy pattern of volatility, the Exchange may invoke special margin requirements, ban stop-orders, or even halt trading—to help keep the market fair and orderly.)

Some 80% of the common stock holdings of mutual funds are in Big Board stocks, and a higher percentage for bank-administered personal trusts.

Not every listed company is right for you, of course. Your objective, the risk you can afford, your timing—all belong in the picture. Even in an atmosphere of general prosperity, some companies fall on hard times, and this is usually reflected in the market. And some are de-listed, by another set of criteria. But over the years, the stocks of many Big Board companies

have out-paced the cost of living.

One of our aims, as Exchange members, is to set high standards, for ourselves as well as for listing companies, to help you share sensibly in the economy's growth.

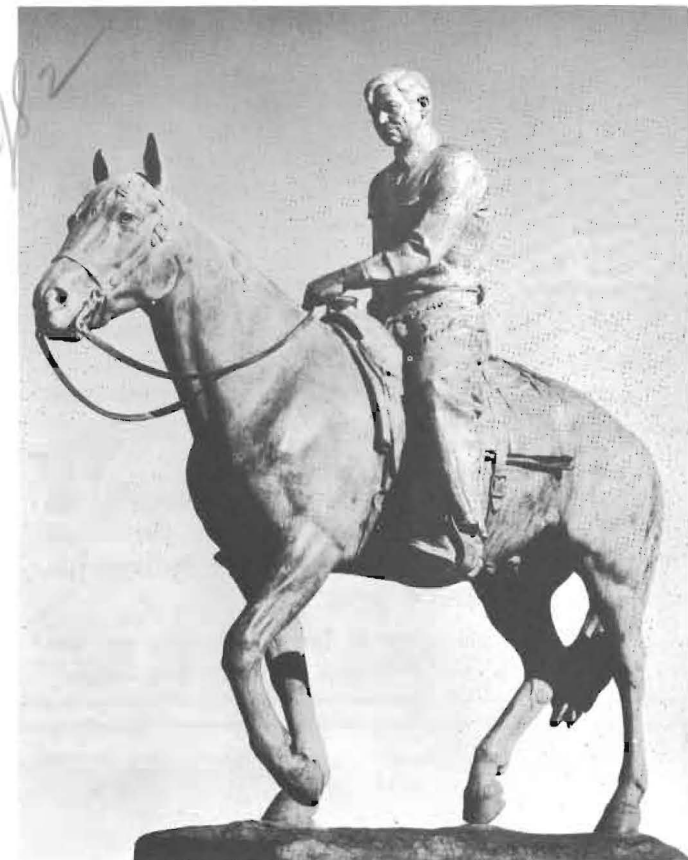

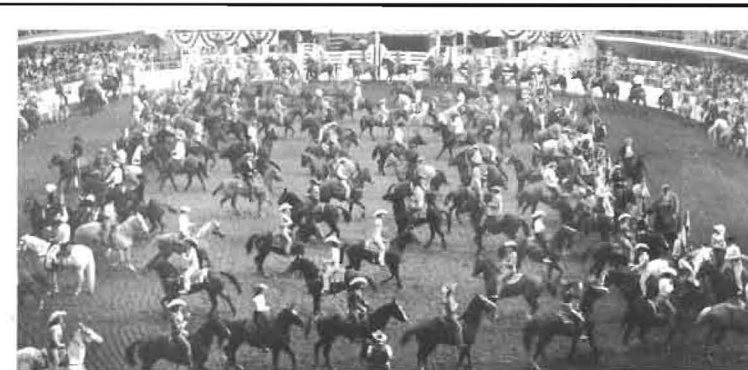

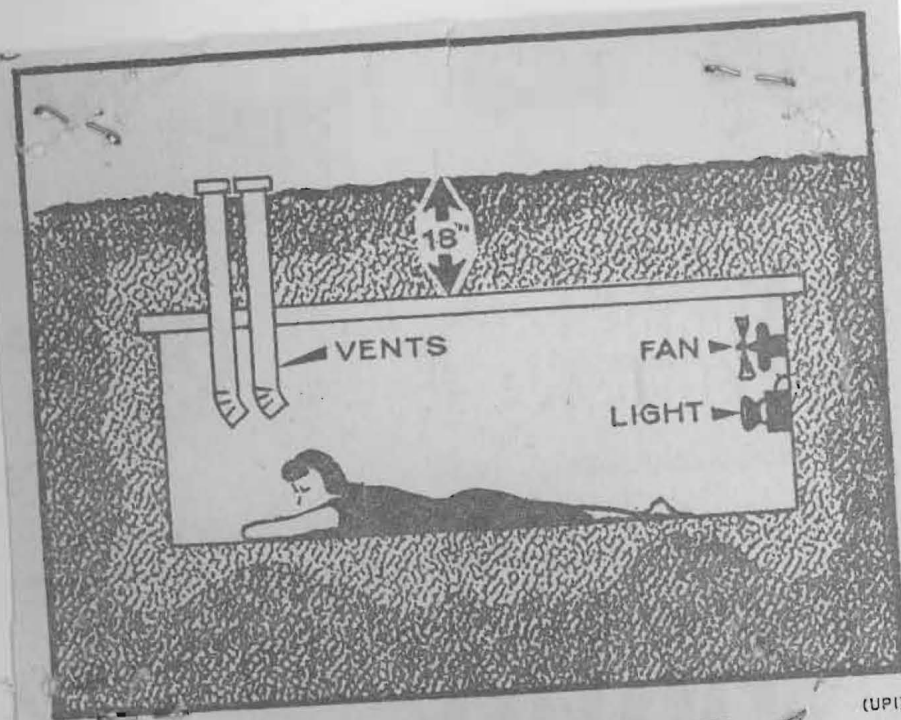

Dear Senators, Congressmen and President-Elect Richard Nixon:

The 90th Congress, although quite progressive in some ways, left much to be desired. In many respects it was negative and most inconsistent. Example: The 10% tax may have been necessary to cool inflation but it served no other useful purpose because of the inconsistencies of Congress and LBJ. Why didn't Congress also plug the tax loopholes so the rich would pay their fair share? Why doesn't Congress do something about the oil depletion allowance so the oil companies can pay their fair share? And how about those who avoid taxes by investing and depositing money in foreign lands? Billions can be raised if Congress and the Administration will have the backbone to do it.

The \$6 Billion dollar antiballistic boondoggle which could never stop a barrage attack will serve only to line the pockets of the big contractors and the special interest groups. The \$3.7 billion dollar farm subsidy boondoggle serves primarily to line the pockets of the selected few such as Senator Eastland's wife. Take a look at the USDA's report on these useless payments at the taxpayers expense. The program should have been eliminated long ago. We hope the 91st Congress and Mr. Nixon has the courage to eliminate it quickly.

It looks as if the 90th Congress and the LBJ administration succumbed to the special interest groups in matters relating to the development of shale oil in the Rocky Mountain areas. Let's hope and pray that Mr. Nixon and the 91st Congress has the integrity to give all concerned a fair shake on this in the future. We probably could pay off our national debt. We'll be watching with interests.

We would like to see Congress do some real soul searching on its own code of ethics-slush funds, The Adam Powells, The Dodds, Cramers, Mendel Rivers, use of funds, junkets that do not serve the public; just to mention a few. Too bad these congressmen made it back to the Hill.

We understand that some shallow thinking people are thinking of socking the taxpayers to pay for the costs of politicians running for office. We strongly oppose such nonsense. Limit the amount that can be spent. Use television more. Cut out the farce known as the National Political convention. Eliminate the Electoral College. It's a waste.

Stop our give-a-way programs such as: The \$5 million recently given to the so-called peacekeeping force on Cyprus; Military and economic aid that keeps fighting going on in the world. Many of these countries have been fighting all their lives. They will continue to do so. We should stop helping them and encourage other countries to do the same.

We have no business trying to police the world. Britain & France almost learned their lesson too late. Since the LBJ Administration has vacillated so much on Viet Nam, we should get out NOW. We should have closed Haiphong long ago and blasted Hanoi if necessary and dealt harshly with so called allies who continued to supply Hanoi. LBJ has had the most senseless foreign policy since FDR sold us down the river in some of his deals to appease the Russians in the way we needlessly divided Germany when I was in Europe during WWII. Let Japan take care of her own defense. We've appeased Her too long now. Stop being our brother's keeper and try being a brother.

## Other Items of Concern

1. Put on the pressure for other countries to pay their WWI & WWII debts-particularly France.
2. Let the 10% surtax remain another 6 months to year but be consistent and do something to plug the tax loopholes including favors to the special interest groups mentioned on the previous page.
3. Let's spend more effort here on earth. Here is where our people need help. We have the means to feed them and help them. Let's research the oceans and minimize space. We have long known that the moon is useless. Let's stop playing games and get back to earth. Let's exercise the space between our ears for more useful purposes rather ~~space~~ than space between planets.
4. Crime continues to flourish because we criticize our police, we tie their hands, we pay them poverty wages, we write and support laws that favor the criminal rather than the wronged, our courts turn criminals loose who are guilty beyond a doubt because of some technicality. This is absolutely wrong. The US Supreme Court is one of the worst offenders. We need new blood on it. It's high time Warren and some of the other old timers were fired and Congress should do something to prevent these lifetime appointments. Mandatory retirement should be age 70 in all branches of government. Crack down on the trouble makers.
5. Revamp the long obsolete rules of Congress. Seniority should only be meaningful if the member is the best qualified. McCormac should step down. So should all the others over 70 and make way for some new blood. Incidentally, Congress should not seat Powell, Dodd and Rivers and others of their kind. We cannot understand why the people elect them.
6. Pollution-We need to move on this quite strongly and let the chips fall where they may-on industry, the Cramers, the Government. Government continues to pollute the air and waters from Federal facilities. Trucks and buses do the same.
7. Proposed pay hike. This will set the stage for one of the biggest pay hikes throughout the U.S. LBJ talks out of the sides of his mouth. On the one hand, he proposes about 4% pay hikes and then wants to double the salary of a selected few. Congress should set the example and oppose such nonsense. 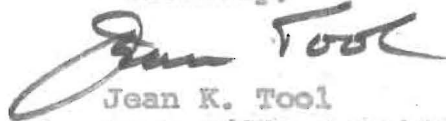
