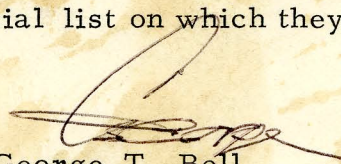

MEMORANDUM FOR WHITE HOUSE STAFF MEMBERS

The various documents and other papers included with this memorandum are intended to help you understand your role, and your responsibilities, as a member of the President's staff, as well as to assist you in becoming familiar with the White House facilities and procedures. Please examine them carefully, for the guidance they provide can make your activities here not only more useful, but also more enjoyable.

MATERIALS FOR THE PRESIDENT

The types of materials forwarded to the President by the White House Staff include the following:

1. *For the President—Signature*

Documents for the signature of the President include the following: Messages to the Congress, Proclamations, Executive Orders, nominations and commissions, memoranda and letters. (See C-1 for sample.)

2. *For the President—For Your Information, National Security*

Information papers on any number of national security subjects are prepared for the President to keep him informed on pressing world events. These papers are prepared by the Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs.

3. *For the President—For Your Information, Domestic*

Information papers on any number of domestic subjects are prepared for the President to keep him informed on pressing domestic events. These papers are prepared by the Assistant to the President for Domestic Affairs and other White House Staff Members who have special assignments to work on various domestic projects. (See C-2 for sample.)

4. *For the President—Action*

Proposals by White House Staff Members on matters requiring Presidential actions are for-

warded to the President in this general category. These papers deal with national security, domestic, economic and political subjects. Members of the White House Staff are advised of the President's actions immediately in order that they may proceed with implementation if such is indicated. (See C-3 for sample.)

5. *For the President—Meeting Briefing Papers*

The President receives meeting briefing papers for all meetings he holds with White House Staff Members and other public and private sector individuals. Great care should be taken in the preparation of these briefing papers in order to insure accuracy and brevity. The President is advised of the purpose, background, participants, press plan and talking points for each meeting. On the following pages appear a sample format for the preparation of the Meeting Briefing Papers. (See C-4 for format and C-5 for sample.)

Occasionally there is noted a gradual increase in the volume of memoranda forwarded from the various White House Staff Offices to the President. The Office of the Staff Secretary, through which all Presidential materials must pass en route to the President, attempts to instruct White House Staff Members relative to the importance of preparing accurate information in a brief and concise format. Presidential materials should be restricted to the absolutely essential items, and clarity and brevity should be on the minds of those who prepare such materials. There is nothing objectionable to the use of an outline format and it is oftentimes more appropriate than a narrative style.

SUBJECT: KANSAS CITY BRIEFING

As you noted from comments in the receiving line, yesterday's briefing was extremely well-received by the mid-West editors. The comments which reached me and others on the briefing panel were excellent in regard to the presentations, the format and the questions and answers. There was no question, however, but that your own presentation was a smash hit and left a deep impression with those attending. This was true not only with some of our old friends and supporters such as Clayton Kirkpatrick, Brady Black and Martin Hayden and the *Kansas City Star* people, but it was also representative of the view expressed to me and to other editors by such liberals as Jim Fain of Dayton, Loren Soth of Des Moines and Paul Ringler of the *Milwaukee Journal*.

Charlie Bennett of the *Oklahoman* quoted Fain as telling him that "in all the years he has listened to you speak (going back to the 1960 campaign), he had never heard a more thoughtful and eloquent presentation."

One other aspect of the briefings which we sometimes forget is that beside the newsmen, the impression on broadcasters is even greater because, prior to this Administration, they had never been included in programs with newsmen. The NAB directors' reception, for example, represented the first time they had been invited to the White House. The inclusion of radio and TV in the briefings therefore has the double effect of making the broadcasters feel equal and provides them with material which is impressive. I had numerous requests for a transcript of your talk for use in Sunday pieces, and this has been put in the mail today.

In summary, the briefing team made news and did an excellent job in providing editorial background and the news executives left feeling that they were more familiar with your programs. I believe each of these briefings is a major plus.

SUBJECT: Briefly State Subject

I. BACKGROUND

The President should be informed of recent actions by the Administration, departments, agencies, states, other foreign governments, etc., on issues.

II. OPTIONS

Two or three options should be presented for consideration. When discussing these courses of action, brief mention should be made of the advantages and disadvantages of each, and who (or what offices, agencies, and departments) within the Administration is in favor and why.

III. RECOMMENDATION

The recommendation(s) proposed by the writer should be made with a space provided to permit the President to indicate his Approval or Disapproval of each option. A short statement of the names of the other White House Staff Members who concur in the writer's recommendations should also be made.

(Note: Where necessary, tabs may be attached to Action Memoranda. However, as in the case of other written materials directed to the President, brevity is encouraged. Seldom should an Action Memorandum be longer than one or two pages, and tabs, whenever possible, should be held to less than four or five.)

SUBJECT: Timeliness—Format of Presidential Briefing Papers

In order that there will be no misunderstanding as to the format the President desires for all briefing papers, I would like to restate for you the outline that should be followed.

Format—

I. PURPOSE

One or two brief sentences describing the reason for the meeting.

II. BACKGROUND

A brief three or four sentence summation of what led up to the meeting and perhaps an insight into the organization or personalities represented in the meeting.

III. PARTICIPANTS

List all participants and their appropriate titles at Tab A.

IV. PRESS PLAN

Please indicate whether there is a press conference, press photo, Ollie Atkins' photo, etc.

V. REMARKS—TALKING POINTS—PROBABLE POINTS OF DISCUSSION

One of these three probable points of discussion should be pursued. Should they exceed one page in length they should be attached at Tab B. Hopefully, they will be short and to the point.

Timeliness—It is absolutely essential that these briefing papers be in my office no later than 1:30 p.m. the previous day. Where there are last minute changes in the President's schedule, certainly a later time period is understandable and acceptable. These briefing papers must be in by 1:30 in order that they are properly put in order and approved for the President's meetings. (This takes place at a daily 2:00 p.m. meeting.)

Copies—Please submit the original and eight copies to my office.

If this format and timeliness are followed, the President will be able to go about his duties in a more organized fashion and it will eliminate the late night extremes that the past several weeks have necessitated. It would be deeply appreciated if each of you would follow this outline and timeliness format. If there are any exceptions please feel free to call me.

The above subject is currently being processed for a White House Press Pass in accordance with written request from the press office. It is my understanding that, in the interim, Mr. Stanford has been entering the White House by appointment to the press office.

Investigation conducted by this office has disclosed that the subject has been arrested and convicted on three occasions in Washington, D. C., for homosexual offenses. Copies of the three incident reports are attached for your review.

In view of the foregoing, it is my recommendation that Mr. Stanford be placed in "Do Not Admit" status.

About 9:15 PM I went to the Capitol theater along with Officer Harrigan. At this time I went into the mens closet and from there I could see into the mens room thru the two small hole in the door between the mens room and the closet. At this time I saw this def. sitting on the booth to the far right. This booth had no door on it and the booth adjoining it to the left, there is a hole in the partition about the size of a base ball. There was an unidentified man in this booth and this def. was sitting in his booth and was stroking his erect penis. He was also looking into the hole in the partition at this other man. Statement of Facts as to Charge (including Method of Operation) _____

About 10:00 p.m. I went into the Art theater with officer R.J. Morris. Morris went in to the basement men's room and he remained there sometime, about 15 minutes. He came up stairs after that time and he remarked to us that there was a man in one of the closed booths who was opening the door and peeking out. Further that he had started a conversation, asking Morris for a light. I went down to the basement and I saw that there was someone in the booth and after a short time I heard the door open. I walked around and looked into it. It was open about 10 inches. I saw this man there. He had an unlit cigarette and he asked me for a match. Then he began to stroke and fondle his penis. He worked it back and forth and he would look up at me and wink. I continued standing in the opening of the doorway. He then made hand gestures, making motions at my privates. It seemed he wanted me to take it out. I didn't move but remained standing there. Pretty soon the picture broke and a group of men came into the room and I walked up stairs. After a few minutes I went back to the basement and this man was still in the booth. I saw the door open after a while and I walked over and looked in and saw the same man. He was again stroking and fondling his penis. He then made some motions at me and he also stood up and leaned over close to me and asked me if I had said something. I told him that I hadn't. Then he sat back down and continued to stroke his penis. He then motioned for me to come in closer. I walked into the doorway of the booth and he then asked me if there was anyone around. I told him that I didn't think there was. He then reached up with both hands and felt top of my privates and unzipped my trousers. I then showed him my badge and placed him under arrest. He immediately began to protest. He remarked several times that I had forced him on. I walked him up to the ground floor and there officer Morris joined me. We walked him outside and he began to plead with us to turn him loose that he would kill himself if his family found out about this. I asked him how long he had been doing this sort Bur. of thing. He told me that it had been for several years but that he just did Pet. if a couple times a year. Morris identified him as the same man he saw looking out

Dr. Edward E. David, Jr., Science Adviser to the President, will head up a group of six to eight government officials, supported by a staff of approximately two to four individuals to visit Japan, Korea, Taiwan, India, Pakistan, and Paris, France during the period of September 22 to October 15. Dr. David will be accompanied by Mrs. David and perhaps one wife of one of the other government officials.

The purpose of the trip is to hold high level meetings and discussions with foreign government officials in all science and technology areas in each of the countries being visited for the purpose of exploring and reviewing the many bilateral cooperative programs between the U.S. and the Mid-East countries. In addition, there will be great interest in the developing of scientific and technical basis for the economical progress return to the U.S. and each of the countries being visited.

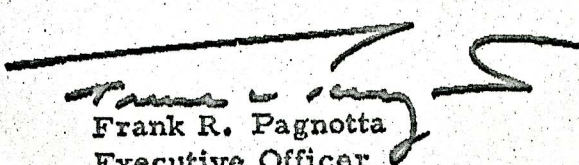
