MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

2. Since my last tally we have firmed up Boggs and placed Magnuson back in the (?) column because of Jackson's information on Magnuson's feeling toward SST. Scoop is certain we can get Magnuson. Scoop also reports that he, McGee and Pastore will constitute themselves as a team for floor action.

3. Seven Senators are considered uncommitted with leanings shown by question, plus or minus marks, as follows:

4. This notebook contains the names of 14 senators, including the (?) ones listed in paragraph 3 above, and 8 negatives as key targets. The "negative" targets are, Senators:

5. The targets and plans will change constantly from now on as data comes in and results achieved. As an example, since the notebook was put together, we probably should drop Ellender as a target and add Montoya because of information coming in from Senator Long subsequent to your meeting with him.

6. As a matter of interest, Long had the following to say:

Long urges the President to visit briefly with Senator Clinton Anderson - say, 15 minutes - re the ABM. He says this will do the trick - that Anderson has always required direct Presidential attention in order to get results. He is confident that this attention will obtain Anderson's ABM support - and then, he says, he (Long) and Anderson can "double team" Montoya and get his support, too.

Second, Long urges that the President telephone former President Johnson about the ABM struggle and discuss individual problem Senators. He believes Johnson knows best how to influence the undecided, particularly the Democrats. Especially he urges that President Nixon ask Johnson about getting the help of Murchison with Senator Cannon and some others, but mainly Cannon. Long feels sure that Johnson will gladly help.

Then, says Long, President Nixon should telephone Murchison and induce his cooperation with Cannon, explaining that Long had urged it on the ground that Murchison had been helpful right along with President Johnson and Long. Long believes this call will open a relationship that will prove fruitful for a long time to come for the President. Long wants to be called when the President has called Murchison.

Long believes that Ellender and Harris are too committed for anything useful to be done with them. The best bets, he says, are Gravel, Cannon and Montoya.

7. If we include Magnuson as reasonably certain, we are much closer to victory. Whereas, two weeks ago, we needed a combination of approximately 15 "aye" and/or "walk" votes, now a combination of six or seven would do the trick.

8. One added thought: Senator Dick Russell can be of great influence on Armed Services and Appropriations Committee members as well as Southern group. Because of his illness, I have not bothered him over last few weeks. Now that he is better and medical reports are good, it seems timely to enlist his more active aid.

9. Now that the targets are narrowing, the need for additional votes is becoming more critical. I believe that we must be quite selective and very conservative in actions we suggest the President himself take. I will have a suggested Presidential plan of action for your consideration upon your return to Washington.
